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

## Speculation on Amazon brings up many 'what ifs'

For better or worse, it just could be Hamilton County that attracts the much publicized Amazon's second national headquarters. We stress could be, but still far from a certainty.



The retail giant last week narrowed its search for a location to 20 sites including central Indiana. Folks in the Indianapolis media say that if the area is selected there are five most promising places for the billion dollar complex, two of which are in this county.

One possible site is east of Noblesville be-

tween State Road 38 and Interstate 69 where an as yet unidentified buyer is in the process of securing options on several thousand acres of farmland. With offers to pay

as much as \$40,000 per acre, you can assume the mysterious person or group is not planning to grow soybeans.

The other county site is Metropolitan Airport property north of 96th Street, south and east of the airport. It is ground that is not needed for airport op-

## Get your tax forms at Sheridan Public Library

Tis the season and the Sheridan Public Library will have a limited supply of state and federal tax forms available this year. Filing starts on Jan. 29 this year, but often times the federal and state forms are sent out late - mid-February or later in many instances.

Library director Steve Martin notes that tax officials do not send out as many copies of all the different tax

forms as they used to, and maybe that is a good thing. There are so many different types of forms anymore, and in the old days, at the end of tax season on April 15, most of the odd forms were just trashed. By not sending so many different types of forms, it cuts down on wasting your tax dollars.

Martin also notes that these days all the different tax forms and their instructions are available online

for easy downloading and printing. A lot of people file electronically and have no need for the paper forms anymore.

Martin reiterates that the library will have the basic tax forms but will help you download and print any tax form and its instructions for 10 cents per page. So if you need paper copies of any tax forms, try the library. It should have them by mid-February. And as Mar-

tin says, "What we don't have in stock, we can get off the internet in a matter of seconds."

The Sheridan Public Library is located at 103 West First Street in beautiful uptown Sheridan, just on the country side of Hamilton County. It is open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Friday and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday. It is closed on Sunday.

## Firefighter, fitness expert opens up about private health condition

A central Indiana firefighter who has also built a reputation as a health and wellness expert has opened up about a private health condition in hopes of raising awareness and motivation.

Tim Griffin is a spokesman for the Carmel Fire Department. He is also known as "Firefighter Tim" from frequent appearances and hosting on WISH-TV's Indy Style.

Seemingly a picture of health, Griffin recently revealed he has battled

ulcerative colitis (UC) for four years.

UC is a chronic inflammatory bowel disease that caused Griffin digestive distress and weight loss for two and a half months before he spoke to a doctor, or even his wife about his symptoms.

"I was in really bad shape. I lost about 12 or 13 pounds and on me that's pretty noticeable but it's one of those things, you know, at first you're sort of embarrassed. You don't want to talk about it," Griffin said. "Just because someone looks healthy on the outside doesn't nec-

## Fishers gets its Central Green/Amphitheater renovation wish list

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness told the Fishers City Council Dec. 18 of last year that the extent of the Central Green/Amphitheater upgrades will be determined by the bids submitted for the project. The bids have been opened and it appears the city will be able to afford the full range of improvements.

The plans start with improvements to the Amphitheater stage itself, including a 25-foot expansion of the stage area. A 1,700 square-foot pavilion structure will be built between City Hall and the Amphitheater stage. This will add rest room facilities and provide meeting space for local groups.

Mayor Fadness said in December that the extent of other improvements would hinge on how the bidding process works out.

The Fishers Board of Works is set to vote Jan. 22 to accept a \$4.1 million bid from Myers Construction to handle the renovation project. That bid includes the following features:

- Raising the grade of the site creating stadium seating north of the pavilion
- Site and infrastructure improvements south of the pavilion
- 24-jet fountain between City Hall and the new pavilion

- Additional electricity for events
- Site landscaping

The entire project is due to be completed June 1 of this year, calling for a very aggressive construction schedule. The Department of Public Works is asking the Board of Works to go ahead and approve the contract with Myers Construction Jan. 22 while the city's lawyers review the provisions, allowing the contractor to line-up materials and sub-contractors.



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





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## Moore files to run for Hamilton County Sheriff

erations and has long been seen as a prime location for business or commercial development.

Both these locations are close to I-69. Amazon is known to want easy access to interstate highways and an airport.

Last fall in this column we speculated on the possibility that someone saw at least the possibility of landing a giant distribution center, hence the optioning of big acreage in Wayne and Fall Creek Townships. The purchase of large tracts of land by anonymous buyers for a big development is not unheard of. In the 1950s the Indianapolis Water Company quietly bought 3,000 acres north of Noblesville. We know the site today as Morse Reservoir and the

subdivisions surrounding it. The Noblesville Ledger eventually figured out what the land was to be used for.

It's hard to visualize what an Amazon headquarters would look like with 50,000 employees, hundreds of thousands of square feet under roof and constant truck traffic coming and going at such a gigantic complex.

Many political leaders would see it as the greatest thing that could be imagined. Jobs, jobs, jobs and presumably reasonably high paying jobs. Of course, Hamilton County has very low unemployment so the employees would likely come mostly from surrounding counties. Nearby Madison County has been hurting for years since the closing

of major manufacturing plants there. Jobs within a few miles would no doubt be welcome.

Then, we must think of what would be needed to service Amazon. Major road improvements, sewer and water utilities, public safety personnel and schools. Most major industries expect a community to provide incentives such as property tax abatement.

We'd be getting ahead of ourselves to consider all this, but local government might have to do some calculations to see that some of the costs would not fall on current residents. It may well not happen, but it's never a bad idea to think about all the ramifications, good and not so good of any possibility.

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
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# Who was Elmo Lincoln?

**1867** – Indiana Governor Oliver P. Morton was elected by the state legislature to serve in the United States Senate. The remainder of Morton's gubernatorial term was completed by Lieutenant Governor Conrad Baker.

**1900** – Miriam Mason Swain was born in Goshen. She was a teacher and magazine editor before moving to Batesville, where she settled into a career as a popular author of children's books. Among her more than 50 titles are *Smiling Hill Farm*, *The Gray-Nosed Kitten* and *A Pony Called Lightning*.

**1918** – The silent movie *Tarzan of the Apes* was released to theaters across the nation. The leading role was played by Elmo Lincoln from Rochester. Lincoln appeared in over 80 movies during his Hol-



lywood career, including two *Tarzan* sequels.

**1930** – Members of the Indiana Bankers' Association met at the Claypool Hotel in Indianapolis to address the surge in bank robberies across the state. Over 40 banks had been hit in the past 16 months. The members recommended the establishment of a state police radio system and the organization of "well-armed guards and volunteer vigilantes."

**1967** – A flash fire aboard the Apollo I test capsule took the life of astronaut Gus Grissom

from Mitchell. An Air Force veteran of the Korean War, Grissom was one of the first seven Mercury astronauts. Also killed in the fire were fellow astronauts Ed White and Roger Chaffee.

**2009** – Katie Stam of Seymour was crowned "Miss America." She was the first person from Indiana to win the honor. In high school she was a 4-H member and showed dairy cattle at the Jackson County Fair. She graduated from the University of Indianapolis with a degree in communications.

# Fishers road construction updates, week of Jan. 22

**131st Street**  
Periodic lane restrictions will occur at the intersection of 131st Street and Cumberland Road as utility relocation work is completed.

**USA Parkway**  
Evening lane restrictions will be in place on USA Parkway and along the 106th Street roundabout during the week of Jan. 22 while a contractor completes sewer cleaning and inspection work.

**106th Street**  
Expect lane restrictions at the intersection of 106th Street and Allisonville Road (affecting the northbound and southbound lanes of Allisonville Road) as utility work is completed.

**Interstate 69**  
Milestone Contractors

has opened additional travel lanes on I-69 between State Road 37 Exit 205 and State Road 38 Exit 219. I-69 is open to three lanes in each direction on the heavily traveled stretch of interstate.

As part of a \$92 million design-build contract, Milestone has added a third lane in each direction to the median, repaired and resurfaced existing pavement, and rehabilitated bridges and drainage structures on 15 miles of I-69 in Hamilton and Madison counties. Construction of an additional auxiliary lane between the 116th Street entrance ramp to I-69 South and the I-69 South Exit 204 ramp to 106th Street will continue through next spring.

I-69 South will be temporarily reduced to two

lanes to allow space for the SR 37 and 116th Street entrance ramps to safely merge while construction continues on the southbound auxiliary lane between the 116th Street and 106th Street ramps.

The Noblesville girls got exactly that on Saturday afternoon, and it helped that the game was exciting, too. The Millers beat a good Martinsville team 78-71 for their sixth straight victory.

"Our last time playing in The Mill," said Noblesville coach Donna Buckley. The coach said as the game went into the fourth quarter, the girls realized it was the last eight minutes they would be on their home floor - "let's make sure we make the most of it," said Buckley.

"My goodness, these kids have done so many things for our program and had a tremendous career," said Buckley about her two seniors, Emily Kiser and Olivia Morales. "So to finish with two wins this week against really good teams, it was a nice way to send these seniors out."

The game was back and forth during the first three quarters, with the Artesians leading 17-15 after the first period, and the Millers up 35-34 at halftime. Kiser took over in the second quarter, scoring 13 points. That included an 8-of-8 performance from the free-throw line, a sign of things to come later in the game.

The two teams continued to trade the lead during the third period, with Abby Haley and Maddie Knight both hitting 3-pointers to put their team in front on separate occasions.

Kiser got the Millers ahead 50-48 on a traditional three-point play, but that was answered by a basket from Martinsville's Jessica Nix. So, the "last eight minutes" began with a 50-50 tie.

But Noblesville would never trail in the fourth quarter. Knight's 3 opened the period, then Mallory Johnson made it a run by making three of four foul shots, as an Artesians personal foul was followed by a technical foul. Knight then made a layin, and the Millers were up 58-50 just like that.

Noblesville took its biggest lead of the

quarter with 4:38 left, when another pair of Knight free throws put the Millers ahead 63-54. Martinsville made one last push, getting to with 68-66 on a Nix jumper.

Not to worry, as Noblesville got it done at the free-throw line. The Millers received 26 foul shot attempts in the fourth period, making 21 of them. Knight was 10-of-12 all by herself.

Buckley credited the free throws with clinching the game for Noblesville. Those foul shots offset a ferocious rebounding effort by the Artesians, who at one point scored a basket after getting three consecutive offensive rebounds.

"It was very frustrating to not rebound better than what we did," said Buckley. "We were able to make some plays. Maddie Knight really took over. Her and Emily, big free throws."

Kiser made 5 of 6 foul shots in the fourth quarter. Overall, Emily was an astounding (and outstanding) 16-of-17 from the line, and finished with 31 points, 17 rebounds, six assists and two blocked shots.

Knight totaled 26 points, which includes 11 of 14 foul shots made and three 3-pointers. Johnson had 13 points and four assists. Abby Haley dished out five assists.

The Millers are now 13-7, and play their next game Wednesday at Pendleton Heights.

# Huskies pull away from Sheridan in fourth quarter

Saturday night's Hamilton Heights-Sheridan boys basketball game at Hobbs Memorial Hall had several of the elements that make classic rivalry games so entertaining.

There was tension, there were great performances. Kids stepped up, and there were also a few incredible plays. The game was close for three quarters, but the Huskies pulled away in the fourth for a 76-61 victory over the Blackhawks.

The first period was played at a torrid pace, with Heights leading 10-7 halfway through. The Huskies led 16-13 by the end

of the quarter. Sheridan's Ange Gnamkey had eight points, including a dunk that put his team of 5-3.

The Blackhawks took the lead going into halftime after a crazy sequence of events. With Sheridan down 28-24, the Hawks' Drake Delph made a basket while being fouled with less than two seconds to go in the half. However, he had to come out of the game after it was discovered that he had a bloody nose. Austin Hunter stepped in to make the free throw, which he did.

The Huskies tried to inbound, but the ball was overthrown and went out of bounds. That gave the Blackhawks the ball back under their basket. It was inbounded to Gnamkey, who threw up an off-balance shot from beyond the 3-point line.

You know where this is going, right? Gnamkey's shot went in at the buzzer. In 1.7 seconds, Sheridan went from being down 28-24 to leading 30-28. Huskies coach Chad Ballenger said that was big.

"That was a game-changer," said Ballenger. "When you go late in the third quarter and you're looking, that's six points you can take off. It's a totally different game."

Ballenger is normally mild-mannered, but he can be a firecracker when he needs to. He got fiery with his team during the halftime break.

"I got on them pretty hard," said Ballenger. "We weren't really focused this morning and that was a big key. I felt like we didn't start the game and be totally focused the way I wanted to. I think Sheridan's a very good basketball team, they did a lot of good things to us tonight."

Heights briefly took the lead early in the third quarter when Drayden Thomas converted a three-point play. Hunter answered with a 3-point shot, and the 'Hawks would not trail for several minutes of the period.

In fact, they made an 8-2 run to go up 43-37. Four different players (Gnamkey, Delph, Hunter and Nick Burnell) scored baskets.

The Huskies needed someone to step up and Camron Knott answered the call. Knott made a 3-pointer to get Heights within 43-40, and that would start a 20-6 run that carried the Huskies well into the fourth period.

Knott got hot - very hot, in fact. His second 3-pointer of the game trimmed Sheridan's lead to 46-45 and came after Hunter his second '3' of the game. Then Caleb Bean added two more baskets, and Heights was in front 49-46 at the three-quarter buzzer.

"As I told our guys at halftime, 'We're going to find five guys that can guard and lock down and make a run,' and I thought we did," said Ballenger. "I thought we did a good job defensively."

Sean Weitzel got the first points of the fourth quarter, a traditional three-point play to tie the game at 49-all. But Knott drained his third 3 soon after, and the Huskies would hold the lead from there. Knott continued his hot shooting, making two more triples - his fifth one gave Heights a 63-53 lead.

"Camron Knott was big, that's what he does," said Ballenger. "We've waited for that to happen. We got stops and we hit free throws."

In all, five Huskies players reached double figures in scoring. Knott led the way with 17 points. Freshman Gus Etchison did his part, scoring 15 points.

Bean played an assertive game with 14 points, seven rebounds and four blocked shots. Thomas and Michael Cross both added 10 points, with Cross getting six rebounds and Thomas making a pair of blocks. Hudson Hochstedler grabbed six rebounds and handed out four assists. Max Beale dished out six assists.

As for Sheridan, Gnamkey led the way with 18 points and seven rebounds. Weitzel finished with 13 points and Delph added 10. After a frustrating loss to Indiana Math & Science on Friday, Blackhawks coach Chris Schrank said that his team's play was "like a 180" on Saturday night.

"If we can play like that all the time, we'll be just fine," said Schrank. "They're one of the better teams on our schedule. They're always good, they're always tough. And we were right there with them for the majority of the game, until #4 (Knott) decides to make every shot that he threw up. He just got really hot.

"I'm a lot happier with our effort," said Schrank. "Our attitudes are great. We're good teammates. I thought we played pretty well until they started to break away from us and then it was tough for us to try to claw back."

Heights is now 7-7 and has another big







## Noblesville gymnasts take third at Northwestern Invitational

The Noblesville gymnastics team placed third out of seven teams at Saturday's Northwestern Invitational.

On the balance beam, Kauzlick, Devyn Palmer and Mangin all had beam sticks.

"I am proud of our team today on beam as three out of the five gymnasts competing for us today had a "beam stick," which shows consistency and confidence in this

event," said Ramey. "This is always important to have and will certainly be important when it is time for sectionals."
