Fishers Plan Commission OK's housing developments

The Fishers Plan Commission sent a unanimous favorable recommendation to the City Council, moving forward a residential component of The Yard culinary development, to be located near IKEA. Developer Thompson Thrift had requested a text amendment allowing 255 residential units be added to a mixed use structure in the project.

Attorney Steve Hardin, representing the developer, told commission members that construction on The Yard should begin in earnest during April of this year, with an opening of

The Yard expected in 2019.

Plan Commission members also gave a unanimous favorable recommendation to a \$20 million senior housing project with 160 units. If all goes as scheduled, construction will begin in 2019, with 12 to 18 months needed to completion. The development is planned in Parkside, between 126th and 131st streets, in what is now a wooded area near the Texas Roadhouse restaurant.

Thirty-nine acres of land located on the southeast corner of 113th Street and Florida Road received a unanimous favorable recommendation from the Plan Commission for a zoning change from residential to open space, but not before several objections were raised in the public hearing from residents in the Lux-

haven neighborhood. Luxhaven has existed in that location since 1946 and many of the residents are concerned about the possibility of the city constructing a park on the 39 acres.

City Planning and Zoning Director Tony Bagato says the city has a long-term idea to put a park on that 39-acre tract, but has no immediate or current plans to do so.

Luxhaven residents also raised concerns about a pedestrian bridge that would bring foot traffic near their homes. Plan Commission President Warren Harling said the commission has no legal jurisdiction over bridges, but City Councilor Pete Peterson, also a Plan Commission member, made it clear he would not favor a pedestrian bridge near the Luxhaven homes.







Hill files brief concerning Supreme Court police case

Attorney General Curtis Hill announced today that he is part of a coalition of 10 states that filed a friend-of-the-court brief in a U.S. Supreme Court case that could make it more difficult for police to do their jobs.

The brief comes in *Lozman v. City of Riviera Beach*, a Florida case regarding an individual who was arrested during a town council meeting and charged with disorderly conduct. Although there was probable cause for the arrest, the arrestee sued, claiming that city officials had conspired to arrest him in retaliation for his outspoken opposition to them. The Court must decide whether a plaintiff may sue police officers for retaliatory arrest if the arresting officer had probable cause to arrest the plaintiff.

"As Hoosiers and Americans, we all depend on police officers to protect our families by patrolling our streets and removing dangerous criminals from our neighborhoods," Attorney General Hill said.

"Officers who lawfully follow proper procedures should never have to live in fear of being sued by suspects. They should never feel discouraged from making arrests in situations in which they have probable cause for doing so."

The states' brief argues that a decision granting the arrestee's recommended rule would inhibit effective policing through a flood of litigation that would discourage arrests even when based on probable cause and when necessary to protect the public safety.

District of Columbia Attorney General Karl A. Racine led the brief's drafting.

"Police officers must be able to make quick decisions in dangerous situations, and they should be able to feel confident about their actions to protect the public when those actions have a lawful basis," Attorney General Racine said.

Acknowledging the importance of the First

Amendment interests at stake, the brief also argues that the states and the District already have effective administrative and disciplinary procedures in place, including civilian complaint review boards, to address misconduct by officers and to protect those interests.

"The threat of such suits would not only make officers' already difficult and dangerous jobs even more so, but also hinder law enforcement agencies from taking custody of offenders and implementing effective community policing," the brief says.

Oral arguments in the case are scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 27. In addition to Attorney General Hill and Attorney General Racine, attorneys general from Idaho, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah and Wyoming joined the brief.

From Westfield to Michigan State to the Philippines...

Kranda begins professional volleyball career

College seniors are always happy to know that they have a job lined up after graduation.

For Brooke Kranda, her first job out of college will allow her to continue to play the sport she loves - and see a new part of the world.

Kranda, a star for Westfield High School, has signed to play for the Foton Tornadoes of the Philippine SuperLiga, a professional volleyball league in the Philippines. Kranda signed the contract to play for the Tornadoes just a week or two after graduating from Michigan State University with a degree in zoology, and helping the Spartans to an Elite Eight appearance in the NCAA Tournament.

"I am really excited to be able to pursue volleyball professionally," said Kranda. "I am grateful to all of my coaches at Westfield High School, Munciana Volleyball and Michigan State who are the ones who got me this far. I can't wait to see where this opportunity takes me."

Kranda, a 6-foot-6 outside hitter, graduated from Westfield in 2013, where she earned school record for blocks per season, hitting percentage and career hitting percentage. After red-shirting her first year at MSU, she went on to play all four years. Kranda holds the record for most service aces in a four-set match, serving up nine aces against Purdue in 2016.

Not less than a month before signing a contract with the Tornadoes, Kranda was blasting her way through the NCAA tournament. On Dec. 8, the Spartans made their way into the Elite Eight for the first time since 1996 by beating Illinois in four sets, 25-23, 18-25, 25-17, 29-27. Kranda hit 16 kills and two aces in the match. Michigan State fell to Penn State, the overall top seed, in three sets the next evening, 25-23, 25-17, 28-26.

"It was really cool," said Kranda of the experience. "Just nerve-wracking because at that point you're playing to go to the Final Four. It was just really exciting."

Around the same time, Kranda signed with an agent who put her name out for teams that needed players. If a team had a spot that Kranda could fill, she would be offered a contract.

"She enters the league mid-season," said Beth Kranda, Brooke's mother. "They have a draft in the mid-season so right now it's mid-season, so she goes to a team that has an opening or injury."

The Tornadoes took interest, and Brooke's agent told her a couple days after

Christmas that the team was looking to send her a contact. Kranda got the contract on Jan. 4.

"It's a really quick turnaround," said Kranda.

Speaking of quick, Kranda was soon trying to find out about her new team. The Foton Tornadoes are indeed a new team, having come into existence in 2014.

The Tornadoes were successful right away, winning the PSL's Grand Prix Cup in 2015 and 2016, then finishing third in 2017. The team was also the runner-up for two years (2015-16) in the Beach Challenge Cup, as well as in the 2016 All-Filipino Conference.

"They're one of the top two or three teams in the Philippines," said Kranda.

The name Foton comes from a Chinese motor vehicle company; the Tornadoes' owner, United Asia Automotive Group, distributes Foton cars in the Philippines. The team is based in Manila, the Philippine capital.

"Women's volleyball in the Philippines

is huge," said Beth Kranda. She noted that 3,000-5,000 fans are in attendance at every regular season game. In addition, all of the Tornadoes' games are broadcast on ESPN5, the main sports channel for the country.

"We were watching some games streamed online," said Beth Kranda. "I couldn't believe how packed the stadiums were for women's volleyball. It was amazing."

Brooke Kranda arrived in the Philippines in the third week of January. It was a 22-hour journey: Indianapolis to Detroit, then a 13-hour flight from Detroit to Tokyo, then a four-hour flight from Tokyo to Manila.

"They take care of my housing and everything and I believe I will be with a teammate," said Kranda a few days before departing to Manila. "Each team is only allowed so many what they call imports. There's a girl from Canada coming, so that's who I will probably be living with."

The Tornadoes will resume play in the PSL league on Feb. 17.



Kranda finished her senior season with MSU second on the team in kills per set with 3.06, second in aces per set with 0.38 and third in blocks per set with 0.55.



Girls basketball regional preview

'Hounds will take on Eagles for the third time

Any coach will tell you that it's not easy to beat the same team three times in a season.

In order to advance to the championship game of the Kokomo Class 4A girls basketball regional on Saturday, Carmel will have to do just that.

The No. 2-ranked Greyhounds will play No. 10 Zionsville in the second semi-final of the regional, which will tip off around noon. The first semi-final begins at 10 a.m. and features Fort Wayne Carroll playing Fort Wayne South. The championship game is set for 8 p.m.

Carmel did beat the Eagles easily in the first two games they played. The 'Hounds were 66-48 winners back on Nov. 14, the defeated Zionsville 75-51 in the championship of the Hall of Fame Classic on Dec. 29.

The Eagles breezed through the Logansport Sectional last week, taking care of McCutcheon 71-32, Logansport 74-32 and Lafayette Jefferson 73-46 in the final.

"Zionsville is a very good team and always well prepared," said Greyhounds coach Tod Windlan. "We will tweak a few things we have seen from watching film. It's basically a game that we need to just play Carmel Basketball and continue where we left off from Saturday night's dominant performance."

The 'Hounds beat Hamilton Southeastern 68-48 in the final at the Fishers Sectional, this after getting past Noblesville 50-45 in the semi-finals.

"We want to give great effort and bring a lot of energy. We have a veteran team and I expect them to play well. Our seniors must lead us this Saturday."

The vast majority of Zionsville's team are juniors, including three of their five probable starters. That includes Maddie Nolan, who is the Eagles' leading scorer with 21.9 points per game. Junior Delaney Richason adds 11.0 points per game, while freshman Katey Richason is averaging 9.4 points. All three are dominant on the boards, with Katey Richason grabbing 6.4 rebounds per game, Delaney Richason 6.2 rebounds and Nolan 6.0.

Carmel's scoring leaders are seniors Amy Dilk, who is scoring at a 17.5 points-per-game clip, and Tomi Taiwo who is scoring 16.9 points per game and has made 63 3-pointers. Sophomore Jasmine McWilliams leads the rebounding with 6.8 per game, with Dilk grabbing 5.8 per contest and senior Blake Smith collecting 4.7. Dilk is also averaging 6.9 assists and 3.7 steals per game.

HUSKIES TAKE ON TALL GIANTS
Hamilton Heights will travel to Columbia City early Saturday morning to play in their first regional since 2013. The Huskies will take on Marion in the first semi-final at 10 a.m., followed by a noon game between No. 3 Fairfield and No. 9 Concordia Lutheran. The championship is also set for 8 p.m.

The Giants are 21-4 this season and won the Belmont sectional, defeating Mississinewa 60-23, Belmont 45-34 and Bishop Luers 56-53. Marion has a pair of towering players as their scoring leaders: Junior Jazmyn Turner stands 6-foot-1, while sophomore RaShaya Kyle is 6-foot-6.

Turner is scoring 15.9 points per game, with Kyle just behind her at 15.3. Not surprisingly, both players are the leading rebounders: Kyle is grabbing 8.8 boards per

game, with Turner corraling 6.5 per game. Kyle is also blocking 4.5 shots per contest.

"They definitely have tremendous length," said Heights coach Keegan Cheery during a Tuesday interview on Hamilton County Television. "They're much like Lafayette Jeff, who we played towards the end of the season."

"We have to be great in our technique, great in our position," said Cheery. "We're not going to block anybody's shot, but we're going to have to be really strong on the backboard, physical in our blockouts. They do have some girls who can shoot it, so we're going to have to recognize personnel, try to keep them out of the lane."

Cheery also said that he wants the team to "play at our pace."

"That's one thing that we try to do in all our games," said the coach. "We want to dictate tempo. They want to get up and down, press, turn you over, shoot layups. If we get them in the halfcourt, I feel good about being able to get quality shots and just hopefully we can score one more point than they do."

The Huskies won the Blackford sectional, beating the host Bruins 65-26, Jay County 57-45, and Yorktown in overtime 41-36. Senior Kayla Kirtley is Heights' leading scorer at 12.7 points per game, with sophomore Bayleigh Runner adding 10.7 points. Senior Ana Collar has been dominating the boards with 7.3 rebounds per game.

PRESTIGIOUS OPPONENT FOR 'BLAZERS

University is back in the regional for the first time since 2012. The Trailblazers have a tough opponent for their noon semi-final in No. 4-ranked Jac-Cen-Del. That game follows a 10 a.m. semi-final between No. 3

Tindley and Bloomfield. The championship is set for 7:30 p.m.

"Jac-Cen-Del is a very prestigious program and we are honored for the opportunity to compete against them," said UHS coach Justin Blanding. "Coach Smith is doing an amazing job there and his kids are well coached. We respect the heck out of that program and are looking forward to the opportunity to play."

The Eagles have a history of championship basketball, with 23 sectional and eight regional titles to their credit. Jac-Cen-Del made it to state in 1978, back in the one-class era, then won a Class 1A title in 2016.

The 2018 Eagles won the Waldron Sectional by trouncing Oldenburg Academy 74-30, then beating the hosts 50-35.

"I have not seen much film as many coaches would not send me film on them," said Blanding. "It's a tight group up there so I was expecting that to happen. In the film I see a physical team that is going to attack us. They are very disciplined and methodical so we have to stay focused on the long possessions."

Senior Lilly Simon is the leading scorer for Jac-Cen-Del at 17.2 points per game, followed by junior Mariah Day at 15.9 points and senior Morgen Carroll at 11.7 points. Carroll is also the leading rebounder at 9.2 boards per contest.

Freshman Paige Ledford collects 7.6 rebounds per game, followed by Simon at 5.6 and Day at 4.6. Simon dishes out 6.2 assists per game.

"They are balanced at every position and are very long," said Blanding. "They score in waves so we have to be ready and mentally tough enough to handle it. They are used to being on this stage so they have a ton of experience. The senior leadership they have you can really see it when you see them play. We are excited to play them."

University easily won its own sectional last week, defeating Metropolitan 90-23, Indiana Deaf 63-50 and Bethesda Christian 74-55.

Sophomore Lindsey Syrek is averaging a double-double for the Trailblazers, with 18.8 points and 14.3 rebounds per game. Syrek is also blocking 4.0 per shots per game. Senior Natalie Nickless is scoring 13.5 points per contest, with junior Brooke Andrus averaging 9.6 points and 4.9 assists.
