## Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitt awarded as Distinguished Hoosier

Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitt was recently awarded the Governor's Distinguished Hoosier Award at the 2018 Indiana Association of Chiefs of Police Mid-Winter Conference. Jowitt was presented the award by Indiana Association of Chiefs of Police President Jason Dombkowski of the West Lafayette Police Department in front of his peers in law enforcement.

The Distinguished Hoosier Award is one of the highest honors that the Governor of Indiana bestows. It is a personal tribute given to those who have rendered a distinguished service to the state.

"I'm honored and humbled to receive this award," said Jowitt. "I've had the pleasure of working with so many wonderful people in law enforcement and in other areas of public service over the past 41 years. I'm very grateful that I've been able to be a part of public safety in Noblesville and Hamilton County."

Prior to his appointment in Noblesville in May 2009, Jowitt served as chief of police in

## Carmel HS student faces four felonies

A male student approached a female student with a knife in a restroom at Carmel High School last Thursday afternoon.

Reports indicated the female student disarmed the male student and alerted school officials. Students were held in their classrooms until Carmel Police officers cleared the incident.

Police reports indicate school administrators and police quickly identified and detained the male student.

The suspect, a juvenile, was transported to the Hamilton County Juvenile Detention Center on the following charges:

- Intimidation – Level 6 Felony
- Confinement – Level 3 Felony
- Battery – Level 5 Felony
- Criminal Recklessness – Level 6 Felony
- Possessing a knife on school property – Class B Misdemeanor

Currently, the investigation by the Carmel Police Department continues, but police say at this point, there is no credible evidence to support this was more than an isolated incident and the victim and suspect had no prior connection. Additionally, there is no evidence to support the suspect intended any further, widespread violence on other students.

## Carmel clears beetle-battered trees near West Park for trail, community center

Five hundred trees are coming down near West Park, after Carmel Clay Parks and Recreation officials say they've been irreparably damaged by the Emerald ash borer.

The invasive species came to the United States from Asia and has been known to eat Ash trees from the inside out. Michael Klitzing, CEO of Carmel Clay Parks and Rec, says the beetles hit the 40 acres west of West Park some years ago.

"Some of the trees are so compromised that a windstorm could actually cause the entire tree to fall," Klitzing said, giving 24-Hour News 8 a tour of the park and the forest.

Klitzing explained his department is embarking on a \$30 million, five- to seven-year development plan for West Park that includes building an 8,000-square-foot community center, new nature trails, an additional parking lot and an adventure low ropes course and playground in the woods. To do that, Klitzing says they'll

need to do a lot of ash borer spring cleaning.

"Five hundred trees is a lot of trees, and obviously we prefer to plan trees and preserve trees as opposed to take them out," he said. "We have a playground that's going to be incorporated into the woods. We don't want to have a tree that's at risk of falling on a kid or a member of the public on

## Stage is set for May 8 primary

There are races for county council in District 1 where incumbent Fred Glynn is being challenged by Sue Maki, in District 3 where incumbent Steve Schwartz faces Mark Hall, and in District 4 where Ken Alexander, Sheldon Barnes, Christine Pauley and Rick Sharp are seeking to succeed retiring Councilman Paul Ayers.

Hamilton County Commissioner Christine Altman will be challenged by Matt Milam in the District 1 race.

A competitive race is seen for the open state representative seat being vacated by Rep. Richardson. It features Brad Beaver, Gare Bragg, Charles Goodrich and Gregory O'Connor.

Contests elsewhere in the county find State Sen. Mike Delph being challenged by Corrie Meyer, and State Rep. Jerry Torr facing Tom Linkmeyer.

At the township level, there are GOP primary contests between Chris Miller and Robyn Cook for Jackson Township trustee, Fall Creek Township between Doug Allman and Ben Slota for trustee and in Washington Township Marla Ailor will run against Daniel Carey Tolan.

While Democrats have not filled at the top of their primary ballot, numerous candidates for precinct committeeman and state convention delegate have filed. But, these are party positions and actually not public offices. Republicans also have filed in large numbers for their state convention, but GOP precinct committeeman posts were filled two years ago and not up for election this year.

## Fishers Plan Commission OK's housing developments

The Fishers Plan Commission has sent a unanimous favorable recommendation to the City Council, moving forward a residential component of The Yard culinary development, to be located near IKEA. Developer Thompson Thrift had requested a text amendment allowing 255 residential units be added to a mixed use structure in the project.

Attorney Steve Hardin, representing the developer, told commission members that construction on The Yard should begin in earnest during April of this year, with an opening of The Yard expected in 2019.



The Yard culinary development will include 255 residential units. Construction should begin this April, with next year slated for its opening.

# Fishers diving coach resigns amid OWI arrest

A coach in charge of two separate diving teams in Fishers has resigned after he was arrested for allegedly driving while intoxicated.

Officials were dispatched out to the area of 126th Street and Cumberland Road on Feb. 4 to check the welfare of a driver when a caller reported him to be asleep behind the wheel of his vehicle in traffic.

Upon arrival, authorities observed a strong odor of alcohol from the vehicle and noticed signs of intoxication. 37-year-old James Davidson was later taken into custody after failing numerous sobriety tests and was confirmed to have had a .15 BAC.

24-Hour News 8 learned that before his arrest that Davidson attended a Super Bowl party at a house where a student diver lives. 24-Hour News 8 has been told by the party host that there were no students present.

Davidson was an assistant dive coach employed with Hamilton Southeastern Schools at Fishers High School. He's also the head coach for the Fishers Diving Tigers Club, a club sport based out of FHS's Natatorium that competes in USA Diving and AAU Diving competitions.

He had only been employed with HSE schools for a few months. Before this he worked for the Dominion Dive Club in northern Virginia.

HSE released this statement:

"We are aware of the OWI charge against one of our assistant dive coaches. After reviewing the matter, we have accepted his resignation effective immediately. HSE Schools has high standards for the conduct of employees and is addressing this matter with the utmost seriousness."

Tigers Club has not replied to questions about their head coach, but their website states the following:

"At Fishers Diving we strive to have the best and safest coaching staff around. Your athlete's mental, physical and emotional well being are our primary concern. As such, all of our coaches under go a background check before they are allowed to work with any athletes. In addition, all of our coaches are either USA Diving or AAU certified. In addition, we are constantly learning and teaching the latest and greatest techniques to all of our coaches."

Davidson bonded out of jail at 9 p.m. on Monday evening.

He faces one count of operating while intoxicated.

HSE Schools say they've called in a former dive staff member to coach the team through competitions this month.

Phi Beta Psi Sorority is a national philanthropic organization whose national project is cancer research, however, Indiana State Organization of Phi Beta Psi Sorority offers scholarships to high school seniors or returning adult students who wish to go into Medical Technology, Medical Lab Technology, Radiology Technology, Nuclear Medicine Technology, Cytotechnology, or Diagnostic Medical Sonography.  
This scholarship is \$1,000 per year, awarded for one, two or four consecutive years provided the student continues his or her studies in an approved field and has maintained a cumulative grade point average of

In the event the student doesn't maintain a 3.0 GPA their annual renewal will be forfeited and they must re-apply as

a new applicant.



August 15, 1918 – February 8, 2018

William (Bill) E. McColgin, 99, died February 8, 2018 at Hoosier Village in Indianapolis. He was born August 15, 1918 to Claude and Lottie (Green) McColgin near Greenwood.



Bill graduated from Purdue University and its ROTC program as a US Army second lieutenant. He served in World War II from 1941 to 1946 in the European, Indian and Pacific Theaters, and the US Army Reserve until 1953, where he was discharged as a Major.



After the war, Bill used his civil engineering degree working for the Pennsylvania Railroad until 1951. He moved his family back to Indiana and partnered with father-in-law, Lowell Carey, and farmed Carey Farms near Westfield, retiring in 1985.

A member of Sheridan Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), he served as an elder and chairman of the board. Bill was a member of the Westfield Lions Club where he served as its president, a member of the American Legion, and he served as a member of the Westfield Zoning and Planning Boards.

On September 26, 1943, Bill married Helen Carey and they celebrated 71 years of marriage before her death in 2015. He is also preceded in death by granddaughter, Allison McColgin. Bill is survived by sons, William C. (Becky), Bob (Alice) McColgin, Jim (Libby) McColgin and Jerry (Tara) McColgin; 12 grandchildren; and 17 great-grandchildren.

Services were held on February 12, 2018 at Randall & Roberts Funeral Center, 1685 Westfield Road, Noblesville, with visitation on Sunday, February 11, 2018, and before the service on Monday. Pastor Andrew Roberts officiated. Burial followed the service at Summit Lawn Cemetery in Westfield.

the playground."

The forest has 2,000 documented trees, so the project will clear 25 percent of the forest. Klitzing says the department does not plan on planting new trees but will use the space to forge new trails through the woods for park visitors. He also says the parks department has done their due diligence, calling in outside experts to confirm the 500 trees already dead or infected.

"Ash declines really quickly after an Emerald ash bore kill. It gets brittle," explained Joe Rainwater, a certified arborist, already working on felling trees Monday afternoon.

"We could take a walk through the woods; you'd see things that are 10-, 12-, 16-inch diameter that have just broken and fallen in the time between when we came and initially looked and we started our work here. We don't want anybody playing in here with that kind of

weight just waiting to fall."

Unfortunately, when Rainwater showed up at the West Park forest today, he discovered hundreds of additional trees had been marked with the same distinct pink paint professional crews used earlier.

"We have had a problem with vandalism," Rainwater said. "Somebody came in and marked a bunch of trees that weren't a part of the contract, so I'm going to go through one at a time as I cut and verify I'm getting the right trees."

Rainwater says kids will be kids, but he is already putting in extra time to keep to the city's schedule of clearing the 500 trees by March 31.

If all goes as planned, the multi-purpose community center and wooded playground should be complete by spring of 2019, with the remaining developments to follow in the following four to six years.

Beyond this basic structure, managed accounts can vary greatly in terms of administration, reporting, fees and minimum balance.

So, assuming you meet the requirements for a managed account, should you consider one? There's really no one right answer for everyone. But three factors to consider are cost, control and confidence.

**Cost** – Different managed accounts may have different payment arrangements. However, it's common for a money manager to be paid based on a percentage of assets under management. So, if your manager's fee is 1 percent and your portfolio contains \$100,000, the manager earns \$1,000 per year, but if the value of your portfolio rises to \$200,000, the manager earns \$2,000. Because the manager has a personal stake in the portfolio's success, this arrangement could work to your advantage. Be aware, though, that other fees may be associated with your account.

**Control** – With any managed account, you will give up some, or perhaps all, of your power to make buy-and-sell decisions. If you have built a

large portfolio, and you're busy with work and family, you may like the idea of delegating these decisions. And, as mentioned above, you can still oversee the "big picture" by either working through a financial advisor or, at the least, having your goals, risk tolerance and investment preferences dictate a money manager's decisions. But you will have to decide for yourself how comfortable you are in ceding control of your portfolio's day-to-day transactions.

**Confidence** – It's essential that you feel confident in a managed account's ability to help you meet your goals. And the various elements of a managed account may well give you that assurance. For example, some managed accounts include automatic rebalancing of assets, which, among other things, can help you achieve tax efficiency. Other features of a managed account – such as the experience and track record of the manager – also may bolster your confidence.

Ultimately, you'll need to weigh all factors before deciding whether a managed account is right for you. In any case, it's an option worth considering.

# HOUSING

Plan Commission members also gave a unanimous favorable recommendation to a \$20 million senior housing project with 160 units. If all goes as scheduled, construction will begin in 2019, with 12 to 18 months needed to completion. The development is planned in Parkside, between 126th and 131st streets, in what is now a wooded area near the Texas Roadhouse restaurant.

Thirty-nine acres of land located on the southeast corner of 113th Street

and Florida Road received a unanimous favorable recommendation from the Plan Commission for a zoning change from residential to open space, but not before several objections were raised in the public hearing from residents in the Luxhaven neighborhood. Luxhaven has existed in that location since 1946 and many of the residents are concerned about the possibility of the city constructing a park on the 39 acres.

City Planning and Zoning Director Tony Bagato

says the city has a long-term idea to put a park on that 39-acre tract, but has no immediate or current plans to do so.

Luxhaven residents also raised concerns about a pedestrian bridge that would bring foot traffic near their homes. Plan Commission President Warren Harling said the commission has no legal jurisdiction over bridges, but City Councilor Pete Peterson, also a Plan Commission member, made it clear he would not favor a pedestrian bridge near the Luxhaven homes.



# Noblesville keeps cool, beat Tech

While facing serious heat at The Mill on Saturday, Feb. 10 the Millers kept their cool.

Noblesville was in a battle with Arsenal Tech in front of a good-sized crowd, and everybody got their money's worth. The Titans kept themselves in the game with some hot shooting, but the Millers brought the heat when they needed it, and finished the game up at the free throw line for a 68-62 victory.

"We did so many things well tonight," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "I was proud of our guys. It's a very important win for our team, our program and I'm really proud of them."

The Millers got off to a good start, leading 12-3 midway through the first quarter. Eagan Keever-Hill and Xavier Hines scored four points each, including a cool turnaround jumper from Keever-Hill. Ryan Barnes ended the quarter with an easy layin off an assist by Jaron Youree.

"Eagan and Ryan did a great job establishing the low post," said McCauley. "Combined, they had eight points in the first quarter."

Brendan Fisher opened the second quarter with a 3-pointer to put Noblesville ahead 17-7. The Millers maintained their lead for the first part of the period, which

included a three-point play by Jaron Youree and a rebound basket by Keever-Hill. A '3' by Xavier Hines moved Noblesville ahead 27-19.

Tech got hot at that point, finishing the half on a 10-2 run that tied the game 29-29 at the break. Anthony Anderson scored 14 points in the second quarter, and it was his layin that tied the game.

"When they're pressuring like that, the game can get helter-skelter," said McCauley. "For the most part, I thought we did a good job of getting in formation and handling it."

Instead, the Millers came out firing in the second half, opening with a 13-2 run. Jordan Schmidt scored seven points, including a 3-pointer and a breakaway that resulted in an easy basket. The momentum from that start helped Noblesville to stay ahead 44-37 at the end of the third.

The Millers enjoyed 12-point leads on three different occasions in the fourth quarter, the latest a 53-41 advantage after another putback by Keever-Hill. Noblesville led 63-54 with 53.3 seconds left; Tech made one last furious push, but the Millers were unstoppable from the foul line, making 15 of 16 free throw attempts in the fourth period.

# 'Rocks pull away from Huskies, upset No. 6 HSE

Westfield got off to a strong start on Friday, Feb. 9, and that helped carry the Shamrocks to victory in a county rivalry game at The Rock.

Westfield beat Hamilton Heights 66-54. Despite being down for most of the game, the Huskies hung with the 'Rocks until the home team pulled away in the final two minutes. Westfield coach Shane Sumpter acknowledged that it was a game of runs.

"We would get up seven, eight, nine, and the next thing you know, it's a three-point game," said Sumpter. "We couldn't really shake them and got a little bit of breathing room there at the end. I'm proud of my guys. We fought and we grinded and we were able to get a nice win against Hamilton Heights."

The 'Rocks got a big boost from Zach Banks. The junior scored 12 points in the first quarter, contributing to a 21-15 first-period

lead for Westfield. The Huskies came back to tie the game at 24-24, but the Shamrocks edged ahead 32-28 at halftime. Camron Knott got hot for Heights, scoring 10 points in the second quarter.

That pattern continued into the second half, with Westfield getting baskets and the Huskies answering. The Shamrocks were able to add to their lead by the end of the third at 42-36. Zach Banks scored five points for Westfield, with AJ Field adding five to the Heights total.

The Huskies were still within 53-49 midway through the fourth quarter, but the 'Rocks were finally able to get the separation they wanted at that point. Banks poured in another 13 points in the fourth, giving him a game-high 30 points. Banks had four 3-pointers in the game.

"It was a game of big baskets," said Sumpter. "When they cut it to three, we'd come down and we'd knock down a 3 and get some more separation, get to the rim. I thought we shot the ball fairly well."

Knott finished with 15 points for the Huskies, while

Field and Caleb Bean both scored 13. Knott and Field each drained three 3-pointers, with Bean grabbing 11 rebounds for a double-double. Field dished out four assists.

"The effort's there," said Heights coach Chad Balenger. "The kids are working hard. It's just that time of year. It's a grind. We got kids tired. We got some that we tried to rest a little bit. We just got to scratch and claw."

Westfield scored an upset of Class 4A No. 6 Hamilton Southeastern on Saturday, Feb. 10 beating the Royals 57-50 in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference and all-county game at The Rock.

The Shamrocks trailed 25-22 at halftime, but slowly took over in the second half. Westfield took a 39-38 lead going into the fourth quarter, and out-scored HSE 18-12 in that final period.

Four Shamrocks finished the game in double figures. Zach Banks scored 15 points, Caleb Welch

added 13, Camden Simons threw in three 3-pointers on his way to 11 points and Josh Van Dyke added 10. Welch led the boards with six rebound, with Chris Chin and Van Dyke both collecting five.

Chaz Birchfield led the Royals with 11 points, followed by Nick Bowman's 10 points. Noah Smith corralled eight rebounds, with Birchfield pulling five. Bowman handed out four assists, and Birchfield and Smith each made four steals.

# Huskies reach championship, fall to Fairfield

Hamilton Heights reached the championship game of the Class 3A Columbia City regional on Saturday, Feb. 10.

The Huskies beat Marion 50-37 in the semi-final. Heights got off to a fantastic start, leading 15-2 after the first quarter. The Huskies were able to maintain that advantage for the remainder of the game, as they were up 24-13 at halftime.

Heights had a very efficient shooting day against the Giants, making 18 of their 27 field goal attempts - exactly two-thirds of their shots went in. Bayleigh Runner led the way for the Huskies with 18 points, while Lauryn Wiley added 14

The 2012-13 campaign was also the last time Heights had won a sectional; the Huskies broke that drought last week with a victory at the Blackford sectional.

Three seniors graduate from the Heights program: Lexi Branham, Ana Collar and Kayla Kirtley.

# Eagles stun Carmel

It's hard to beat the same team three times in a season.

That was the assignment for the Carmel girls basketball team Saturday, Feb. 10 in the second semi-final of the Class 4A Kokomo regional. The No. 2-ranked Greyhounds played No. 10 Zionsville, a team they had beaten convincingly in their other two meetings this season.

Unfortunately, things didn't go Carmel's way in the regional. The Eagles upset the 'Hounds 54-49, ending the Greyhounds' season at 24-3. Zionsville won the regional Saturday evening over Fort Wayne South Side 67-50.

The Eagles led 18-11 after the first quarter and were up by as much as 35-21 in the second period before Carmel cut that lead to 35-27 by halftime. The 'Hounds chipped away at the Zionsville lead, snipping it to 41-40 by the end of the third period. Carmel took its first lead of the game at 44-43 with 3:48 remaining, but the Eagles scored four straight points and held

on to the lead from there. The Greyhounds' loss meant the end of high school careers for three sensational Carmel seniors. Amy Dilk, a University of Michigan commit, played incredible in her final Carmel game, with 26 points.

Sophomore Jasmine McWilliams led the Greyhounds' rebounding with 14, while junior Reagan Hune had five rebounds.

Carmel finished its season at 24-3, a record for most wins in a season, and its third consecutive sectional championship.

# University comeback falls short

A late comeback effort fell short, as University's season came to an end Saturday, Feb. 10 falling 66-57 to No. 4 Jac-Cen-Del in the regional semi-final.

After a tight first quarter, Jac-Cen-Del (21-4) opened up some breathing room in the second quarter, as the Eagles stretched a 15-11 quarter-time lead to a 21-14 advantage with 5:42 to play in the half. University (18-8) clawed back, though, going on a 9-2 run to tie the game at 23-23, then answering a Jac-Cen-Del bucket to knot the game back up at 25-25. The Trailblazers never did recover the lead, though, as the Eagles closed the half with a 5-0 spurt to lead 30-25.

The Trailblazers got the opening bucket of the second half when Lucy Snyder scored on an assist from Lily Snyder on the first possession, but Jac-Cen-Del soon took control of the game, going on a 6-0 run to open up a 36-27 advantage two minutes into the second half. That Jac-Cen-Del lead grew to 48-33 with 2:21 left in the half, before settling at

52-38 to close the third quarter.

The Eagles scored to open the fourth, 54-38, pacing them to their biggest lead of the game — but the Trailblazers kept chipping away at that lead, going on a 14-3 run over the next four minutes to draw within five. Lucy Snyder, who scored 19 of her game-best 21 in the second half to keep her team in the game, started the run with a bucket at 7:28. Brooke Andrus followed with two free throws just over a minute later to cut it to 54-42 before Jac-Cen-Del stretched the lead back out to 14 on the next possession. Lucy Snyder answered with a 3-pointer to bring the deficit back to 11, then Lindsey Syrek cut it to double digits with 5:17 to play on two made free throws.

Jac-Cen-Del pushed the lead back to 10, but Lucy Snyder rose for University, scoring five straight points — an and-1 capping her own mini-run — to close the gap to 57-52 with 3:52 left. University never got closer, though.

The loss closed University's season, but it was a year that returned the Trailblazers to the regional round at Southwestern (Shelby) for the first time since 2012.

The Trailblazers will graduate second-leading scorer Natalie Nickless, who will continue her basketball career at IU-Kokomo.

# Smith, Trexler win high school bowling state titles



Hamilton County crowned two high school bowling champions after the finals took place Saturday, Feb. 3 at Championship Lanes in Anderson.

Noblesville's Nathan Smith won the Indiana High School Bowling boys state title, while Hamilton Heights' Keagan Trexler won the girls state championship. Both bowlers began their state quest by finishing in the top four in the qualifying round, then worked their way through the stepladder round to place first.

Smith was the No. 4 qualifier, so he had to climb all the way up the stepladder to win state. He scored a 664 in the qualifying round, which put him into a match with the third seed, Lance Williams of Homestead. Smith won that match 209-155.

Next up for Smith was Warren Central's LaVon Hampton, the second seed.

Smith won 246-203, which advanced him to the final to take on top seed Scotty Kramer III of Muncie Central. Smith beat Kramer 206-192 to claim the state title.

Meanwhile, Trexler was the second seed out of qualifying with a 650. She first awaited a match between the third seed, Portage's Makayla Himden and fourth seed Madison Murello of Franklin Central, with Himden winning 183-182.

Trexler beat Himden 186-161 to advance to the final, where she took on top seed Katie Fraser of Elkhart Central. Trexler won the state championship by defeating Fraser 168-153.

Smith won the Lafayette semi-state, which took place at Mike Aulby's Arrowhead Bowl, and led the Noblesville boys team to a fifth-place finish at the semi-state. Trexler finished ninth in the semi-state to advance to state.

## HSE wins showdown with Carmel

In a series that has developed to be one of the better rivalries in Hamilton County in recent years, the Carmel-Hamilton Southeastern boys basketball teams found numerous ways on Friday, Feb. 9 to show why they'll be two of the favorites in a few weeks to win the Class 4A Sectional 8 tournament at Noblesville.

Carmel had its largest lead of the night at 24-16 in the second quarter, but Hamilton Southeastern defended its home court on Friday night with a come from behind 58-51 victory over the visiting Greyhounds.

The Royals were able to grab their first lead of the game when Chaz Birchfield snagged an offensive board and dropped in a turnaround jumper at 10-9. Birchfield scored six in the period to give HSE a 13-9 edge.

The Greyhounds climbed their way back into the game with 3-point shooting that would propel them back in the lead.

Karsten Windlan closed the gap to one with a '3.' Eddie Gill sank one from the left corner for a 15-13 lead. Nick Bowman put HSE back in front briefly 16-15.

Alex Jackson came off of the Carmel bench and canned two straight from outside the arc and Jalen Whack added another for the largest lead at 24-16, forcing to burn a time out with 2:51 until halftime.

"We lost some things, some transitions, things like that. That's the resolve our guys have had this year and I think it's been special for us all year long, that we didn't panic trying to some of that type of stuff," said Hamilton Southeastern head coach Brian Satterfield on his team's overall play of Friday night against Carmel.

A pair of Cole Jenkins free throws would be the difference for Carmel, as they would take a 26-25 slight edge into the halftime.

The lead would swing back and forth a couple more times in the third.

HSE opened up the second half with an alley-oop from Noah Smith to Aaron Etherington for a power dunk and the Royals on top 27-26. Carmel would answer right back with a trey from Luke Heady and it was 29-27. Etherington tied it 29-29 on a reverse layup.

Heady sank another 3-point bomb that helped jump start Carmel's biggest scoring quarter of the night. The Hounds got their lead back to seven twice in the period, but that just fueled the Royals charge back.

Hamilton Southeastern knew what they had to do and that was find every way possible to come out on top and avoid losing their second consecutive game.

"That's one thing that's been special about this group. We keep getting better about not letting things bother us," said Satterfield on his team's play that helped them stage the comeback to eventually win.

Southeastern had a little momentum push in the final seconds of the third, as Nick Bowman stole a pass and raced to the far end and showed off his vertical, elevating for a dunk to ignite the HSE student body. That dunk narrowed the Carmel lead to 44-40 after three quarters.

Slowly, but surely, Hamilton Southeastern chipped away at the Greyhounds' lead.

All night long, it seemed to be the combination of Etherington, Bowman and Birchfield that would make the Royals go.

HSE would take the lead once again on an Etherington pull up three from the left wing for a 48-46 advantage and the Royals wouldn't give up the lead again.

Carmel called a timeout with 4:32 left. The first play out of the huddle, John Michael Mulloy lofted up a '3' to cut the Royals lead to 50-49.

In the fourth quarter, Southeastern was able to really grab ahold of the rebounding advantage and it became the problem down the stretch that kept Carmel from making a comeback of their own late in the game. HSE out-rebounded Carmel 33-19.

"They had some key offensive rebounds. We got some stops, we missed the front end of a one-and-one twice. I think we missed another free throw late in the fourth quarter and we gave up some offensive rebounds," said Carmel head coach Ryan Osborn on how his team gave way late in Friday night's loss at Hamilton Southeastern.

The Royals went on an 8-2 run in the final minute to secure the home court win over Carmel, 58-51.

"We were off balance a little bit, out of tempo and they made the plays," said Osborn on his team's play in the fourth.

This turned out to be the great game that was anticipated and could also become a preview of a possible sectional championship match-up in a few weeks.

The Greyhounds were led by John Michael Mulloy's 17 points, while Luke Heady added eight.

The Royals were led in scoring by a trio in double-digits. Aaron Etherington led with 17, Nick Bowman had 16 and Chaz Birchfield pitched in with 13.

# Carmel wins 32<sup>nd</sup> consecutive championship

## Royals take third, Tigers fifth, Verbrugge and Huff earn medals

Several years ago, Carmel girls swim coach Chris Plumb said that each of the Greyhounds' state championships has a different path from the beginning of the season to the end.

The destination is always the same, of course: Carmel holding up the state trophy. This year was no different: The Greyhounds continued their record state championship streak, winning their 32nd consecutive state title Saturday, Feb. 10 at the IU Natatorium.

Carmel scored 363 points, with a spirited Northridge team taking second by scoring 215 points. After the traditional jumping in the diving well, Plumb took a moment to reflect on this year's team.

"In terms of the team, I think the way this group came together was unique and special," said Plumb. "The great teams are better than the sum of their parts, and I felt like that's what this team became: Greater than the sum of their parts. If you had told me six months ago we would score 363, I would've told you you were crazy, but these guys really came together and performed well."

The Greyhounds started the meet on fire, winning the first three events. Carmel was first in the medley relay, which was important because 1) They were not seeded first after the state preliminaries and 2) It got the Greyhounds' momentum going for the remainder of the meet. Grace Pangburn, Trude Rothrock, Grace Estabrook and Kelly Pash swam on that first-place relay.

"We were really trying to figure out where to put Kelly in what relay, and we just knew we had to start off the meet with a W, and that we had that ability," said Plumb. "It was just a matter of choosing the right relay and was that the right place for Kelly to go. And we made a choice to do that, and it really got us started, because we won a lot of the first events out of the game and we had a lot of momentum from there."

Carmel's manifest destiny asserted itself in the next two events, with junior Pash winning the 200 freestyle and senior Rothrock holding off future Olympic gold medalist Emily Weiss of Yorktown to win the individual medley. Weiss would come back later to win the breaststroke in a new national record time of 58.40 seconds.

The Greyhounds also picked up championship heat finishes from Kendra Bowen (sixth) and Ashlyn Underhill (seventh) in the 200 free, and Katie Dougherty (fourth in the IM), helping Carmel to get that early separation.

Rothrock and Pash would each pick up one more individual win, with Rothrock triumphing in the butterfly and Pash winning the 100 free. Northridge outdueled the Greyhounds to win the 200 free relay, but Carmel finished the meet with a win in the 400 free relay. Rothrock, Pangburn, Underhill and Pash swam on that relay.

### ROYALS TAKE THIRD

The coaching part everybody already knows about. That showed in the Royals' third-place finish at the state meet Saturday. Southeastern scored 165 points to get the third-place finish, beating out Franklin Community by two points.

We're just elated because it's just been an up-and-down year. We lost some kids and the team just kept battling, kept fighting. It's kind of amazing to think that this team was able to come up with a third-place finish. I'm really proud of them. And today was like the season, so to speak. It wasn't a perfect day, but it ended up being a great day."

Pedersen said last year that then-freshman Abby Harter was a rising star in the sport. Harter proved herself greatly this year as a sophomore. She finished third in the backstroke, and was also on two of HSE's medal-winning relay teams. Harter joined Madison Kertin, Hannah Pugh and Emily Barnes on the third-place medley relay, then swam with Molly Pedersen, Barnes and Ellie Pedersen on the fifth-place 400 free relay team. The 400 relay's finish is what pushed the Royals past Franklin for third in the team standings.

Barnes earned a medal in the 50 free, taking fourth. Southeastern also got help from its divers: Sarah Ballard finished fourth and Halli Siwik took eighth.

"It feels so good," said Ballard. The sophomore finished ninth last year by less than a point - "I was a mess, I was devastated," she admitted. "But this year to go from ninth to fourth feels so good."

"This is my very first time," said Siwik of getting a state medal. "I finalized last year, but did not get podium."

### TIGERS FINISH FIFTH

Fishers had to endure some adversity on its road to state this season, but it all came together over the weekend for the Tigers, who placed fifth with 155 points.

"We had a good solid meet today," said first-year Fishers coach Joe Keller. "Last night we were a little better. It's always tough to swim this meet and come back the next day and be equally as good."

Amelia Nusbaum picked up two medals for the Tigers, tying for sixth in the 50 free and placing eighth in the 100 free. In the 500 free, Samantha Hietpas was third, while Abigail Jahns took seventh.

Fishers took seventh in the medley relay, with Corinne Yorkman, Miya Wai, Nicole Rueff and Ellen Fero swimming on that squad. The Tigers ended the meet solidly with a fourth-place 400 free relay finish. Nusbaum, Jahns, Kyla Srnck and Hannah Pratt were the swimmers on that relay.

Keller also had special praise for his freshman divers Morgan Casey and Grace Mossing, who placed ninth and 14th respectively. All in all, it was a good performance for the entire Fishers team.

"They've persevered, and we've got to the end to be a top five team," said Keller. "We're pleased with that and certainly gives us something to build upon for the future."

### TWO MEDALS FOR VERBRUGGE

Westfield junior Erin Verbrugge marked her third year at the state meet this time, and she brought two medals back home.

"It's nice," said Huff. "I've had better swims, but it felt good."


