# New parking rules approved for Fishers Nickel Plate District




Apartment dwellers in the downtown Fishers area will soon face a \$20 fine for parking their vehicles overnight in certain areas of down-

town. The Board of Public Works and Safety approved the amendment to the parking schedule at their Monday meeting.

Apartment residents have parking set aside in adjacent garages, but many find it more convenient to park in nearby surface areas.

There was a great deal of discussion about whether this rule could encourage some people to drive under the influence rather than risk a \$20 fine for parking overnight. Fishers Police Chief Mitch Thompson told board members he believes there are ways to handle that situation by working with the establishments in the area serving alcoholic beverages and that special event committees could deal



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## Fishers company develops app to track school buses

Mount Vernon Community Schools (MVCS) recently announced how parents can download a free app and use it anytime to locate their child's school bus within their fleet of more than 60 buses, thanks to a new app developed by a Fishers-based company, Mobil Trackr, an Internet of Things wireless provider.

Derek Shelton, Director of Operations at Mount Vernon Community Schools said, "The app tracks the bus, whether it's parked or driving, and the parent or child can pull the app up and see where their bus is. In after-school activities, when our buses have to travel significant distances, parents can still track the bus and know that the kids are on their way home."

Parents can adjust the settings in the "Don't Miss the Bus!" app to send them a push notification when

the bus nears their child's stop. The app also parents alerts when a bus number changes or if the schools have a delay or can-

ing Mount Vernon schools, says he feels incorporating the app into their system shows parents the schools prioritize student safety.

"You just have the peace of mind as a parent that the kids are safe, and where they're at, and if they're there when they're supposed to be there," Shelton said.

Other school districts in central Indiana have similar programs, but Mount Vernon's system includes WiFi on all buses and several layers of security to ensure only those authorized to enter the app can see the bus locations.

"When you can protect them when they go on the internet, and looking at them when they go places, as a par-

ent, you feel very secure," Logan said.

Logan says he's a graduate of Indianapolis Public Schools and has been in the wireless industry for almost three decades. He hopes to share this technology with other school corporations around the state and help more parents and guardians make informed decisions about their children.

### I-69 crash results in injury, snarled traffic

Traffic tie-ups along Interstate 69 in Fishers are not unusual during the evening rush hour, but a serious crash a little after 6 p.m. Monday at the 208 mile marker, just south of Hamilton Town Center, blocked the southbound lanes of the interstate for hours. One person was injured and taken to a local

hospital by helicopter. Fishers Police said in a

news release that based on evidence at the scene and witness statements, authorities determined that the crash occurred after a semitruck, driven by Maximino Cardenas, 56, from Mexico, slowed and then stopped due to heavy traffic.

Although the semitruck came to a stop in congested traffic, the driver of a vehicle, described as an

SUV, did not slow down and struck the back end of the semi-truck's trailer, according to police. The SUV driver, Brent Olson, 49, Indianapolis, was the injured party. Police say the extent of Olson's injuries are not known.

Fishers Police continue to investigate the accident.



# Striving for the gold standard in heart health

"I want to live, I want to give. I've been a miner for a heart of gold." — Neil Young,

Most of you are very aware that February is "National Heart

Health Month" as well as the "Go Red for Women" month. Fortunately there is much information available now about heart health, particularly as it relates to women. Few people are not surprised, thankfully, that heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women, surpassing all types of cancer and other diseases. In 2012, nearly 787,000 people in the U.S. succumbed to heart disease, with coronary heart disease being the most prevalent. Direct and indirect costs of heart disease total more than \$320.1 billion. That includes health expenditures and lost productivity.

While heart disease statistics have been available and research conducted for many years regarding heart disease and men, both research and information-gathering for women's heart issues are relatively

recent. While only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is her greatest health threat, heart disease causes 1 in 3 women's deaths each year, killing

approximately one woman every minute. Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease. The symptoms of heart disease can be different in women and men, and are often misunderstood.

Thankfully, the information noted above, and much more, is readily available. I encourage everyone to talk frankly with their health provider about their risk factors, review their dietary habits and make this a priority. My own viewpoint on the subject also incorporates getting adequate sleep, removing stress, "getting up from sofas and chairs" and making the necessary life changes which can alter those statistics.

Additionally, the effects of isolation and loneliness have been widely studied as it relates to heart disease. To learn more about the "Roseto" effect in which a close-knit community experiences a reduced rate of heart disease, a recent PBS special documentary revealed attributes of positive relationships which

reflect on our heart health. Information is also available online for those who wish to search for more information. The effect is named for Roseto, Pa., and describes family and community interaction there and the healthy effect on the inhabitants.


My quote this week may seem a little odd, but I hope that as we close up the month of February you do take responsibility and become a "miner for a (healthy) heart of gold." Let's strive for the "gold standard" in heart health by consuming fewer trans fats, packaged foods high in sodium, refined carbs. fried foods and whole milk products. Working on establishing better family and working relationships, getting in those 10,000 steps each day and adequate rest will do your heart good!

# Jenna Jones' beam routine goes viral

Last month, Gymnaworld's Jenna Jones competed in the Out of This World Invitational.

Jones' routine on the balance beam was just that - out of this world. Now it's become famous around the world.

Jones, a Level 10 gymnast for the Noblesville-based Gymnaworld, became an Internet star after the website FloGymnastics.com posted her beam performance on its Facebook page. Since it was posted in January, Jones' performance has been viewed over 36,000 times.

"I think it's pretty amazing," said Jones. "I was thinking about how many people have viewed it, and what it would be like to do a beam routine in front of them. That's pretty cool."

Jones' grandfather Terry Jones posted video of the beam routine on YouTube the day after the Out of This World Invitational, which took place Jan. 6 at the Ivy Tech Community Center in Noblesville. (You can view the routine <u>here</u>.) The one minute, 20 second performance is a remarkable show of poise and grace.

Jones mounts the beam by slowly pulling herself up into a handstand, then quickly flips herself around to stand on the beam. Jones then shows off a couple graceful dance elements before doing a double backflip, landing perfectly each time.

As the crowd cheers her on, Jones follows that up with a couple leaps, a ballet-like pirouette, and a couple "moonwalk" steps, confidently moving backwards on the beam. Then it's time for the grand finale: A forward flip, turn, and a double backward somersault for the dismount. She lands that one perfectly, too.

When the routine is finished, Jones is mobbed by her teammates, and is then embraced by her longtime coach, Gymnaworld owner Monti Edwards.

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





# Pacers head into All-Star break with victory

Looking to head into the All-Star break with a full head of steam, the Pacers had seemingly the perfect opponent on Wednesday night, a Nets team that had lost 10 of its last 11 contests.

Brooklyn, however, proved to be far from a pushover, storming ahead of the Pacers in the third quarter and carrying a six-point lead into the fourth at the Barclays Center

But in the fourth, after seven lead changes, the Pacers took the final lead of the evening, escaping the road battle with a 108-103 victory to enter the All-Star break on the right note.

"It's good for us," Victor Oladipo said. "It's a great way to end the first half of the season. Got a lot more work to do, obviously, but it was a good win."

The game was close from start to finish, with the teams trading leads 29 times during the topsy-turvy affair.

The final lead change came with 2:55 left in the game as Thaddeus Young

deficit back down to two with a pair of free throws, Oladipo exploded down the lane, finishing in traffic for two of his game-high 25 points on the night.

From there, the Nets elected to foul the Pacers (33-25), but were unable to to pull within striking distance as the Pacers wrapped up their pre-All-Star slate with their third consecutive win, completing a season sweep over Brooklyn in the process.

To open the game, the Pacers trailed for nearly the entire first quarter until Oladipo delivered in the closing seconds of the frame, drawing a foul while attacking the basket and hitting both free throws to put the Pacers up 22-21. But with the clock winding
