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Fishers City Council to vote on Geist Park bond issue

Now that the City of Fishers will be paying more than originally proposed for the new Geist Park property, the Fishers City Council will be asked to approve a \$5 million general obligation bond to fund the remainder of that land purchase. The council has already voted for a \$12 million bond issue for the project, which remains in place.

The eminent domain process is valuing the land, now owned mostly by IMI Incorporated, at \$15.7 million, \$6 million more than originally budgeted for the land purchase.

The Fishers City Council Finance

Committee voted 2-1 to favorably recommend moving forward with the \$5 million bonds issuance. Committee President Selina Stoller voted no, while John Weingardt and Cecilia Coble voted yes. Eric Moeller was not able to attend the Wednesday meeting.

Coble expressed concerns about the condition of Geist Lake. Weingardt said a conservancy district needs to be created so property owners around Geist Reservoir would pay for the upkeep of the waterway. However, several government jurisdictions other than Fishers have land on that lake, making the creation of such a conservancy difficult.

Coble expressed concerns about the city spending money to buy the land for the park if the lake is not being kept in good shape. She did, however, vote in favor of recommending a "yes" vote by the council on the bond.

"I think we need to get that conser-

vancy district," Stoller said in explaining her "no" vote. "We need to go into a partnership with (Geist Lake property owners) to clean up that lake and to get it done. This project is already over budget from the beginning, and to know there's residents out there and the way I look at it, they're just sitting back (and saying) 'well, there's a mess out there, yes it's at my back door, why don't you clean it up for me?' I don't feel, until they're on board with cleaning this up, that we need to be putting this type of money into (the park)."

The city council is being asked to suspend the rules and approve the bond on first, second and third reading Monday night. Since it takes a unanimous vote to suspend the rules, I asked Selina Stoller whether she plans to vote yes or no on suspending the rules and allowing a final vote on the bond Monday. Stoller declined to comment.

Carmel High School principal issues statement following rumor of threat

The principal of Carmel High School has said that rumors of a threat of violence at the school have been deemed not credible.

Dr. Tom Harmas, principal at Carmel High School, said that officers with the Carmel Police Department and school administrators looked into the rumors.

Good morning everyone. I know the events of the last few weeks have put some of us on edge and to help all of us I wanted to tell you the facts instead of you reading rumors on social media.

So, let's look at some of the things that have occurred.

- A young boy accosted a girl with a paring knife in a bathroom. This has been dealt with by the school and Carmel Police Department in an appropriate manner. There were no injuries and the student and was apprehended within minutes. As a matter of fact, the young lady has not missed a day of school.*

- There were two altercations on Tuesday. The first lasted literally two seconds and the second lasted 1.5 seconds before staff members stepped in. So this was a total of two altercations lasting a combined 3.5 seconds. Again, the school and Carmel Police Department dealt with these? issues appropriately.*

- Yesterday, we were made aware by students of a rumor of a possible school shooting. This rumor started due to a text strand between a group of students. To paraphrase, they were talking about the past two weeks' events and then a student wrote that he didn't want something like a school shooting to happen. Another wrote to a friend that a dangerous time would be when all the students are in a convocation. Then others chimed in saying "let's talk about good things" and they began to write about puppies.*

- From there the rumor mill went to "there is going to be a school shooting at Friday's convocation." To be clear, a threat was never made. Ladies and gentlemen, there is not a convocation on Friday and there has never been a convocation scheduled*

on Friday. NEVER.

- Some of you have shared with us or have seen a video of one of our students showing off ammo magazines. This has been investigated by the school administration and Carmel Police Department and has been deemed no threat to our staff or students.*

We appreciate students, staff, parents and the community's willingness to report events. We believe in "See Something, Say Something." Because of this, we have been able to investigate each event, even before most of you knew what was happening. Social media, when used incorrectly, can be damaging to people. Always remember to use this only in a responsible manner.

We have been working closely with Carmel Police Department to ensure the safety of everyone in this building.

We are a Greyhound family and we have always taken care of one another and we always will.

Now everyone take a second to breathe. We are all OK and looking out for one another. We will move forward. That is what makes Carmel High School a special place for everyone.

Bolt For The Heart donates lifesaving AEDs

On Tuesday, the Bolt For The Heart (BFTH) foundation continued to deliver on the promise to equip Indiana State Police patrol vehicles with lifesaving Automatic External Defibrillators (AED) with the gift of 90 additional AEDs. This brings the total number of AEDs donated to the state police to 305 since the first donation was made in 2014.

During the event, held at the Indiana State Fair Grounds, The President of IU Health, Jon Goble also made a special presentation to Good Samaritan Bill Schiles and Carmel Police Officer Richard Lovitt, who shared their story of how they used CPR and an AED to save a person's life.

At the presentation event Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter thanked Pierre Twer, the President and founder of the foundation,

for his consistent support and dedication to put lifesaving AED devices in state police patrol cars. Pierre was also presented with a Proclamation from Gov. Eric Holcomb which proclaimed Feb. 13, 2018 as "Bolt For The Heart Day".

The donation of the AED's to the state police was borne the result of an experience Pierre Twer had while running in the 2010 Boston Marathon. During that race Pierre witnessed another marathon runner suffer a cardiac arrest. That runner was saved by an AED.

This inspired Pierre to collaborate with Heart Reach Carmel and establish the Bolt for the Heart 5K Family Thanksgiving Run, of which 2017 was the sixth year for the run and the third consecutive year the Indiana State Police was the primary recipient of the AEDs. Since its inception,

this 5K run has grown from 41 runners to more than 2,800 that participated this past Thanksgiving Day run or in a virtual run held at locations across Indiana.

Each year since the run started 100 percent of the proceeds have been used to purchase AEDs for donation to not for profit organizations.

In 2015, the Board of Directors of Bolt for the Heart identified the Indiana State Police as the recipient of AEDs from funds raised in the 2015 Thanksgiving Day run, which ISP Supt. Carter was also a registered runner. In fact Supt. Carter ran the entire 5K run in full state police uniform.

At the conclusion of the press conference attending troopers were issued their AEDs and placed window stickers on their patrol cars to easily identify the police vehicle was equipped with an AED.

Prevail is excited to partner with Westfield High School in an "Orange Out" at the Feb. 20 boys basketball game to promote awareness of teen dating violence. Orange is the color of Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Month, which takes place during February. The game will start at 6 p.m. and feature special giveaways from Prevail for attendees.

One in three adolescents is a victim of physical, emotional, or sexual abuse from a dating partner; only 30 percent of these teens ever tell anyone else about the abuse. Dating violence during adolescence can have major long-term consequences, including increased risk of substance abuse, higher prevalence of eating disorders, anxiety, depression,

suicidal ideation and a greater likelihood of being in an abusive relationship as an adult.

Educating young people about healthy relationships is one of the most effective methods of preventing dating violence. When kids know what they should expect in a healthy relationship, they are better prepared to recognize warning signs of abusive behavior. Kids can also influence their peers by calling out unhealthy behaviors or helping friends find resources like Prevail.

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
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Students agree to new HSE Schools tagline

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Hill urges Congress to help protect employees from sexual harassment

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill has joined a bipartisan coalition of 50 states, five territories and the District of Columbia urging Congress to end secret, forced arbitration in cases of workplace sexual harassment. Too often employees are required to sign employment contracts containing arbitration agreements mandating that sexual harassment

claims be resolved through private arbitration instead of the judicial process. The secrecy surrounding these proceedings can protect serial violators and provide inadequate relief to victims. "Our American judicial system stands for the proposition that everyone gets their day in court," Attorney General Hill said. "Mandating arbitration undermines this fundamental principle."

The attorneys general letter sent Monday to leaders in the U.S. House of Representative and the U.S. Senate asks Congress to pass appropriately-tailored legislation to ensure that sexual harassment victims have a right to their day in court. "Congress today has both opportunity and cause to champion the rights of

victims of sexual harassment in the workplace by enacting legislation to free them from the injustice of forced arbitration and secrecy when it comes to seeking redress from egregious misconduct condemned by all concerned Americans," states the letter co-sponsored by Attorney General Hill. 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


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
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Boys swimming sectional preliminaries...

County teams easily send swimmers to finals

Everything went according to plan for Hamilton County schools at the boys swimming sectional preliminaries on Thursday.

At Carmel, the three-time defending state champion Greyhounds qualified all 27 of their swimmers for the championship heat of Saturday's sectional finals. Carmel earned the top seed in all 11 swimming events, eight of them in state cut times.

The big news was senior Drew Kibler, who set a new sectional record in the 50 freestyle. His time of 20.41 seconds lowered the old mark by .08 seconds. Kibler also has the top seed in the butterfly race.

Other first seeds for Carmel are Jacob Mitchell in the 200 and 500 freestyles, Wyatt Davis in the individual medley and backstroke, Griffin Hadley in the 100 free, Andrew Couchon in the breaststroke, and all three relays: Wyatt Davis, Stefano Batista, Jota Iwase and Couchon in the medley; Alec DeLong, Andrew Morozov, Mitchell and Andrew Rafalko in the 200 free and Kibler, Patrick Cavanaugh, Gus Rothrock and Griffin Hadley in the 400 free.

"We did what we needed to do," said Greyhounds coach Chris Plumb. "We didn't lose the meet tonight, which was good. Took care of business, and I feel pretty good about our chances on Saturday."

Noblesville advanced 21 of its swimmers to the championship heat, with the other six heading to the consolation heat. The Millers had two relays earn the second seed: The medley, which consisted of Nick Beeson, Sam Bleisch, Andy Buna and Lawson Crum; and the 400 free relay, which was swam by Aaron Helms, Will Huff, Beeson and Cameron Kramer. Helms also took the second seed in the 500 free.

"We had some swimmers that we weren't pleased with, but we know they weren't in suits, hadn't shaved," said Noblesville coach Rich Wolfred. "We were hoping they would swim a little bit faster today, but they didn't. But we know we're ready for Saturday."

Westfield sent 17 swimmers to the championship heat and the other 10 to the consols.

Senior Chris Kenney earned the Shamrocks' highest seed, taking second in the 100 free. Cameron Clayton got the third seed in the breaststroke in a new school record time of 58.58 seconds.

"We had an outstanding day," said Shamrocks coach Darrick Thomas. "We broke a school record for our breaststroker Cameron Clayton. We had a lot of great time drops, we got our hand on the wall first in a lot of closely contested races. Really proud of the kids' effort, the way they stood behind

each other and cheered for each other. It was a really, really good day for our team."

Hamilton Heights junior Jared Holder had an excellent meet, qualifying second in the backstroke and third in the 50 free, both in state cut times. The Huskies' medley and 400 free relay teams also made the championship heat, finishing eighth in both races. Holder joined Logan Fakes, Joe Ringer, Josh Glover to swim both relays.
