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Commissioners cite safety concerns . . .

No more signs in right-of-ways

The Hamilton County Commissioners voted last Monday to approve an ordinance that prohibits the placement of signs in Hamilton County right-of-ways and on thoroughfares maintained by the county.

Commissioners say placing signs in public right-of-ways makes it difficult for motorists to recognize regulatory signs which are necessary for safe travel and can often block the vision of motorists at intersections. "Public safety is our num-

ber one priority," said Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt.

Monday's meeting drew a crowd of opponents, many of which felt the ordinance was specifically put in place to hinder campaign efforts of current political candidates; however, according to the Hamilton County Attorney Mike Howard, the ordinance prohibits all signs, not just candidate signs.

Hamilton County Council member Rick McKinney addressed commissioners Altman and Hierbrandt. "The little guy, the candidate that does not have

As school leaders across the country consider how to minimize the risk of tragedy in the wake of a school shooting in Florida that killed 17 people, Noblesville Schools are encouraging students to use an app to report suspicious behavior.

Last Thursday, two students did just that.

A message sent from the school to parents said students overheard a classmate making a threat against the school on the bus ride home. The students used a student iPad and an app

Riverview Health to open four new combined ER, Urgent Care facilities

Riverview Health has announced plans to build four new freestanding emergency departments with urgent care services all under one roof – the first of their kind in the Indianapolis area.

The new centers will be located in north Carmel, west Carmel, Fishers and the Nora area of Indianapolis. Construction will begin this spring with plans for opening all four locations in 2019.

"As the area continues to grow, the demand for urgent and emergency services has too," said Seth Warren, Riverview Health president and CEO. "Often when unplanned

medical needs arise, there's the question of whether or not to go to the emergency room. With the emergency and urgent care combination, patients will have a sin-

Fishers City Council to vote on Geist Park bond issue

Now that the City of Fishers will be paying more than originally proposed for the new Geist Park property, the Fishers City Council will be asked to approve a \$5 million general obligation bond to fund the remainder of that land purchase. The council has already voted for a \$12 million bond issue for the project, which remains in place.

The eminent domain process is valuing the land, now owned mostly by IMI Incorporated, at \$15.7 million, \$6 million more than originally budgeted for the land purchase.

The Fishers City Council

Finance Committee voted 2-1 to favorably recommend moving forward with the \$5 million bonds issuance. Committee President Selina Stoller voted no, while John Weingardt and Cecilia Coble voted yes. Eric Moeller was not able to attend last Wednesday's meeting.

Coble expressed concerns about the condition of Geist Lake. Weingardt said a conservancy district needs to be created so property owners around Geist Reservoir would pay for the upkeep of the waterway. However, several government jurisdictions other than Fishers have land on that lake, making the creation of such a conservancy difficult.

Coble expressed concerns about the city spending money to buy the land for the park if the lake is not being kept in good shape. She did,

The Hinkle Creek teacher decided to take action and launched a program to provide weekend meals to approximately 200 Noblesville students in need.

“Hamilton County isn’t untouched when it comes to food insecurities at home,” said Trusty. “While children are at school, we can guarantee two hot meals a day for those in need. My concern is what happens from Friday night until Monday morning.”

With the support of Ivy Tech, Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank and various grants and fundraisers, meals will be packed by volunteers and delivered to schools for distribution.

One aspect of Trusty’s

unlimited campaign resources from vendors and contractors doing business with the county, such as the two of you, should be allowed to place their signs in the right-of-way for the short time a campaign entails. Such a move, as the one you are proposing, smacks heavy handedness and absolute control one would expect a dictator to impose.”

Howard responded by stating the ordinance actually levels the playing field for political candidates. “It prevents the big budget candidate from purchasing a large number of signs and placing them in the right-of-ways.”

In a statement issued to the Reporter, McKinney

said, “Attempting to couch proposed changes as being in the interest of public safety or saving tax payer dollars is both shallow and hollow at best. Will the commissioners go as far as prohibiting signs of all nature, including realtor signs, which are far more intrusive and trashy, but present year-round?”

Christine Pauley, clerk treasurer for the City of Carmel and candidate for Hamilton County Council District 4, agreed that she does not like the litter of the signs in the right of ways; however, Pauley felt there needs to be an effort to educate the community before enforcement of the ordinance.

Commissioner Steve

Dillinger, who was not in attendance at Monday’s meeting, told the Reporter in a telephone interview that he agreed with Pauley. “I think Christine makes a valid point, we do need to educate the public.”

Dillinger is suggesting the county work in cooperation with the cities to create an educational meeting to explain the ordinance.

“In the past I felt people placing signs in right-of-ways was an affordable opportunity for exposure; however, right of ways are being abused more and more,” said Dillinger.

Dillinger believes there needs to be consistency throughout the county. “We asked all of the mayors for their cooperation in

implementing ordinances that would be consistent throughout the county,” stated Dillinger.

Commissioner Altman said, “I’ve been against using right-of-ways for advertising. If you are running for office you should have the support of your friends and neighbors, your signs should be on their property.”

The ordinance defines a Hamilton County right-of-way as the land contiguous to a Hamilton County street, including sidewalks, multi-use paths, land conspicuously used for the placement of public utilities or directional signs. Violation of the ordinance is a Class C Infraction and subject to a fine up to \$500 per sign.

high-quality healthcare of our full-service hospital in Noblesville.”

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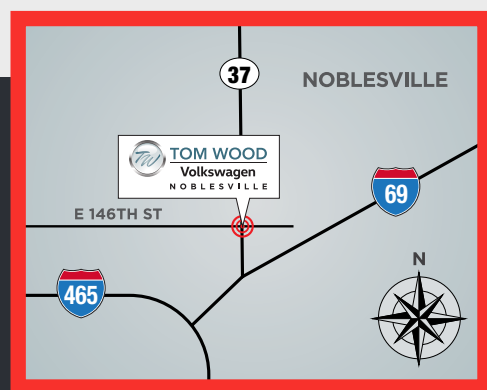
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Willard G. "Willie" New

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More HSE students being treated for mental health issues

When Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools contracted with Community Health to expand mental health services for students, there was much speculation on what would happen next. The HSE School Board received a report from Mental Health Coordinator Brooke Lawson

and representatives from Community Health last Wednesday night.

Before the Community contract, Aspire worked with 50 students in four schools. As of now, 21 schools have 13 licensed therapists and a crisis liaison, with 415 students now receiving mental health care.

Of those being treated, 70 percent of those in high school have been di-

agnosed with depression, nearly 50 percent of middle school students under treatment have been diagnosed with anxiety and about 39 percent of elementary school students receiving mental health services have been diagnosed with anxiety.

Of those being treated under the HSE contract with Community Health, 31 percent are receiving insurance coverage

under Medicaid and 69 percent are covered by private insurance. When asked by board member Terry Tolle how students with little or no insurance, or high deductibles, are handled, Community Health says they have always found ways to provide services to students needing treatment.

New parking rules approved for Fishers Nickel Plate District

Apartment dwellers in the downtown Fishers area will soon face a \$20 fine for parking their vehicles overnight in certain areas of downtown. The Board of Public Works and Safety approved the amendment to the parking schedule at last Monday's meeting.

Apartment residents have parking set aside in adjacent garages, but many find it more convenient to park in nearby surface areas.

There was a great deal of discussion about whether this rule could encourage some people to drive under the influence rather than risk a \$20

fine for parking overnight. Fishers Police Chief Mitch Thompson told board members he believes there are ways to handle that situation by working with the establishments in the area serving alcoholic beverages and that special event committees could deal with parking issues for big events.

City officials say it will take at least 30 days to make and place the signs warning of the fines if a vehicle is parked between 3 and 6 a.m. in the Nickel Plate District areas designated. Also, those living in downtown apartments will be notified of the change in parking regulations before police begin enforcing the new rules.

Carmel High School officials has previously released two statements last Thursday, addressing incidents occurring at Carmel High School. The first involved a student yelling "gun" loudly in the cafeteria and students running for the exit, and the other a student who brought a knife onto Carmel High School property. Principal Tom Harmas says no one was in danger in either incident.

Harmas' statement followed a statement and video issued earlier in the day regarding a threat of violence that was later deemed not credible by police and school officials.

Principal Harmas explained that before last Wednesday's high school shooting in Parkland, Fla., a Carmel High School stu-

dent posted a video showing off ammunition magazines. That video went viral within the school body and many students believed it was a threat.

Harmas says a rumor then began that a mass shooting was planned for a school convocation Friday, when all 5,000+ students at CHS would be present. Parents began calling the district and police department with questions, and when news of the Florida shootings hit Wednesday evening, parents said the situation suddenly looked much darker.

Carmel High School students told 24 Hour News 8 on Thursday that students are becoming more and more paranoid, and that the last two weeks have been markedly different than previous years.

called SpeakUp to report the threat confidentially.

Police contacted the student who made the threat and quickly found it not credible, according to the school.

Noblesville Police Department Lt. Bruce Barnes told 24-Hour News 8 he could not comment on details of the case, but he said students should not hesitate to report suspicious behavior.

"Without the help of society — school corpora-

tions, students, parents — we just simply cannot get our job done," Barnes said.

School leaders say people starting using the app during the 2017-2018 school year and have reported more than 200 issues ranging from cyberbullying to sexual harassment. Students can choose whether their report is anonymous when submitting the issue, according to SpeakUp's website, gospeakup.com/pri_sec.

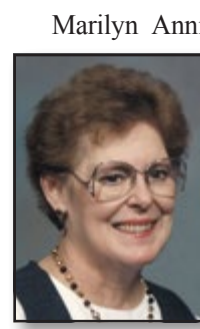

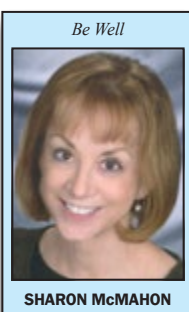
Striving for the gold standard in heart health

Most of you are very aware that February is "National Heart Health Month" as well as the "Go Red for Women" month. Fortunately there is much information available now about heart health, particularly as it relates to women. Few people are not surprised, thankfully, that heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women, surpassing all types of cancer and other diseases. In 2012, nearly 787,000 people in the U.S. succumbed to heart disease, with coronary heart disease being the most prevalent. Direct and indirect costs of heart disease total more than \$320.1 billion. That includes health expenditures and lost productivity.

While heart disease statistics have been available and research conducted for many years regarding heart disease and men, both research and information-gathering for women's heart issues are relatively recent. While only 1 in 5 American women believe that heart disease is her greatest health threat, heart disease causes 1 in 3

women's deaths each year, killing approximately one woman every minute. Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for developing heart disease. The symptoms of heart disease can be different in women and men, and are often misunderstood.

Thankfully, the information noted above, and much more, is readily available. I encourage everyone to talk frankly with their health provider about their risk factors, review their dietary habits and make this a priority. My own viewpoint on the subject also incorporates getting adequate sleep, removing stress, "getting up from sofas and chairs" and making the necessary life changes which can alter those statistics.

Additionally, the effects of isolation and loneliness have been widely studied as it relates to heart disease. To learn more about the "Roseto" effect in which a close-knit community experiences a reduced rate of heart disease, a recent PBS special documentary revealed attributes of positive relationships which reflect on our heart health. Information is also available online for those who wish to search for more in-

formation. The effect is named for Roseto, Pa., and describes family and community interaction there and the healthy effect on the inhabitants.

My quote this week may seem a little odd, but I hope that as we close up the month of February you do take responsibility and become a "miner for a (healthy) heart of gold." Let's strive for the "gold standard" in heart health by consuming fewer trans fats, packaged foods high in sodium, refined carbs, fried foods and whole milk products. Working on establishing better family and working relationships, getting in those 10,000 steps each day and adequate rest will do your heart good!

The Millers fell to the Bears 70-42. Noblesville kept pace with LC in the first half, but the Bears turned up the heat to open the second half, outscoring the Millers 23-7 in the third quarter.

"It was the start of the third that really put us behind the eight ball," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley.

Ryan Barnes led Noblesville with 12 points. "He was solid," said McCauley. "He did a nice job of posting strong and finishing around the basket well."

Noblesville nearly pulled off a comeback win Friday, Feb. 16 as the Millers hosted Avon in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game at The Mill.

The comeback fell one point short, as the Orioles escaped with a 53-52 win. After falling behind in the third quarter, Noblesville responded by scoring 26 points in the fourth.

It was a close game in the first half, with the lead going back and forth. The Millers skipped out to a 5-0 start after a jumper by Ian Gibbons and a 3-pointer from Jordan Gadis. Avon came back to finish the first quarter ahead 12-10, but two quick baskets from Zack Johnson put Noblesville back in front 14-12 early in the second.

Sophomore Gehrige Mickels then made a splash by scoring his first-ever basket, and what a basket it was.

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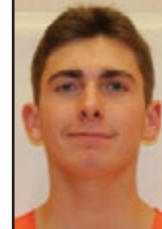
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Field day: Huskies take fifth-place HC game

The senior LePoidevin finished with 16 points for the Huskies. Knott led the way with 21 points, while senior Caleb Bean scored 10 and also had six rebounds and two blocked shots.

Another senior, Drayden Thomas pulled seven rebounds and dished out four assists. Etchison handed out six assists and Knott made five steals.

Heights easily won the junior varsity game 67-33. Issiac Hickok had 15 points and seven rebounds for the Huskies, while Isaac Wilson added 13 points and Cory VonFeldt had 11 points, five rebounds, five assists and four steals.

The Huskies will finish their regular season on Tuesday, Feb. 20 by taking a road trip to Harrison.

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Jenna Jones' beam routine goes viral

Last month, Gymnaworld's Jenna Jones competed in the Out of This World Invitational.

Jones' routine on the balance beam was just that - out of this world. Now it's become famous around the world.

Jones, a Level 10 gymnast for the Noblesville-based Gymnaworld, became an Internet star after the website FloGymnastics.com posted her beam performance on its Facebook page. Since it was posted in January, Jones' performance has been viewed over 36,000 times.

"I think it's pretty amazing," said Jones. "I was thinking about how many people have viewed it, and what it would be like to do a beam routine in front of them. That's pretty cool."

Jones' grandfather Terry Jones posted video of the beam routine on YouTube the day after the Out of This World Invitational, which took place Jan. 6 at the Ivy Tech Community Center in Noblesville. (You can view the routine by searching "Jenna Jones beam routine" on YouTube.) The one minute, 20 second performance is a remarkable show of poise and grace.

Jones mounts the beam by slowly pulling herself up into a handstand, then quickly flips herself around to stand on the beam. Jones then shows off a couple graceful dance elements before doing a double backflip, landing perfectly each time.

As the crowd cheers her on, Jones follows that up with a couple leaps, a ballet-like pirou-

ette, and a couple "moonwalk" steps, confidently moving backwards on the beam. Then it's time for the grand finale: A forward flip, turn, and a double backward somersault for the dismount. She lands that one perfectly, too.

When the routine is finished, Jones is mobbed by her teammates, and is then embraced by her longtime coach, Gymnaworld owner Monti Edwards.

"She's been in gymnastics for 14 years," said Edwards. "She started with me at age 4. Now here she is a senior in high school."

Jones received a score of 9.50 for her beam routine. "I think it's actually the highest I've ever gotten on beam," she said.

"It was really neat because pretty much my whole family came to watch that meet," said Jones.

It was the finish of a perfect day for Jones, who won the all-around championship in addition to all four individual events: Floor exercise, vault, uneven bars and beam.

"Bars went a little rough before that beam routine, so I just wanted to hit that beam routine for myself to prove that I could do it, because I know how hard I've been working," said Jones.

There is a little bit of irony that Jones has become famous for such a great show on the beam. Jones, who is the daughter of Jessica and Mike Jones of Elwood, was featured in an article in the *Elwood Call-Leader* five years ago when she was selected to dance in the opening ceremonies at a gymnastics tour that was

taking place at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The tour featured the "Fierce Five," the gold-medal winning group of Team USA gymnasts that had performed a year before at the London Olympics.

Jones, then 13, told *Call-Leader* sports editor Ed Hamilton that although her favorite event was the uneven bars, she liked all the events, "except for the balance beam. Why? Well, you have to be so precise, and even if you get just a little bit off (balance), you're gonna fall," she said in the article.

Now 18, Jones is a veteran of Level 10 competition, the highest level of the USA Gymnastics Junior Olympic Development Program before the Elite level. Elite gymnasts compete nationally and internationally.

As a Level 10 gymnast, Jones regularly competes in national events; in fact, the weekend after the Out of This World meet, she participated in the beam event at a tournament in Las Vegas. Her score of 9.35 was good enough for second place in a field that featured competitors from 25 other states and Canada.

Jones will be competing this weekend in the Magical Classic event in Orlando, Fla., where Edwards said "there's usually between three and five other countries there besides the United States."

So, Jones will be seeing some international competition in the next few days. Has she been overseas yet.

"No, not yet," said Edwards. "That's a big goal of ours. Some-

thing we aspire to."

Jones is home schooling, but is interested in college gymnastics, "either this year or next," said Edwards. On the horizon this year are the Level 9 and 10 regionals, which take place April 12-15 in Battle Creek, Mich., and the Level

10 nationals, which are set for May 10-13 in Cincinnati.

"She does have a chance," said Edwards. "She's competing a new balance beam, new uneven bars and new vault. New floor. All with greater difficulty. Four newly upgraded routines."

Boys swimming sectionals

Carmel, Fishers win team trophies, several county swims make state

This year's Carmel boys swimming sectional was one that re-wrote the record books.

In winning their own sectional championship, the Greyhounds set seven new sectional records, qualified 26 of their 27 swims by the state cut time and won 10 of 12 events at the Saturday, Feb. 17 sectional finals. Carmel scored 560.5 points to claim its 11 consecutive sectional title and 31st overall.

The other Hamilton County schools had good days as well. Both Noblesville and Westfield qualified three swims for this weekend's state meet at the IU Natatorium, with Shamrocks senior Chris Kenney breaking through for a win in the 100 freestyle. Hamilton Heights junior Jared Holder had a fantastic day, smashing the state cut time and qualifying for state in two events.

Senior Drew Kibler picked up three new sectional records for the 'Hounds. He won the 50 freestyle in 20.10 seconds, then later dominated the butterfly race in 49.27 seconds. Kibler finished the meet by joining junior Patrick Cavanaugh and freshmen Augustus Rothrock and Griffin Hadley to set a new 400 freestyle relay mark of 3:06.67.

Sophomore Jacob Mitchell set two new records. First was the 200 free, which Mitchell swam in 1:38.09. Mitchell then swept the long-distance events by taking the 500 free, in a time of 4:28.88. Rothrock finished second; his time of 4:31.23, was a quarter-second under the old record, set last year by then-freshman Wyatt Davis.

Don't feel bad for Wyatt, though: He got a record swim in the backstroke. Davis reset his own record in that event by over a second, clocking in at 49.20 seconds. In a very fast race, two other swimmers also finished under the old record: Holder, whose time of 49.98 set a new Hamilton Heights school record, and Carmel senior Drew Amaral, who took third in 50.09.

Finally, senior Andrew Couchon set a new mark in the breaststroke. He finished that race in 55.03, exactly 1.20 seconds faster than the old record. Senior Stefano Batista

took second in 55.59, also under the old record.

The 50 free was exceptionally fast, with six swims under the state cut time of 21.59. You already know about Kibler's time, but the next five are impressive: Kenney took second in 21.02, while Couchon placed third in 21.05. Holder's fourth-place time of 21.27 is another Heights school record, while Noblesville junior Evan Diamente got into the mix with a time of 21.49. Batista's swim of 21.54 took sixth, but placing doesn't matter: Swim at or under the state cut in your event, and you are heading to the Natatorium.

Another good example of that is the 100 free, which featured five state cuts (the qualifying time is 47.42). Kenney got Westfield an individual victory in 45.97, followed by Carmel freshman Griffin Hadley (46.48) and junior Alec DeLong (46.79). Fourth place was a tie, with Noblesville junior Jack Wolfred and Carmel senior Andrew Morozov both clocking in at 47.01.

The Carmel foursome of Davis, Batista, junior Jota Iwase and Couchon began the meet with a victory in the medley relay. Davis was back in the pool minutes later to take first in the individual medley. The Greyhounds also took the 200 free relay, with Morozov, DeLong, junior Andrew Rafalko and Mitchell swimming in that race.

Other Carmel state cut qualifiers are: Rothrock and DeLong in the 200 free, Rafalko and senior Brett Sherman in the IM, Iwase in the butterfly, Rothrock and Sherman in the 500 free, Hadley in the backstroke and Rafalko in the breaststroke.

Diamente finished third in the butterfly with 51.60 and received a callback to state, which means his time was fast enough to fill a field of 32 swimmers after all the sectional winners and state cut qualifiers are placed. Aaron Helms received a callback in the 500 free.

Diamente and Wolfred both also made the cut for the Millers in the 400 free relay. The two joined sophomore Cameron Kramer and senior Jakob Janson to swim the race

in 3:13.07. That same foursome also swam the 200 free relay, which received a callback.

Westfield's Kenney can also add a relay to his two individual state cut times. Kenney teamed with senior Cody Fenimore, sophomore Cameron Clayton and junior Brett Calvin to swim the 200 free relay in 1:27.75.

In diving, two county sophomores placed in the top four: Noblesville's Jared Newman was third and Carmel's John Curcio took fourth. Both will advance to Tuesday's diving regional at Hamilton Southeastern.

Over at Fishers, that sectional featured another close battle between the Tigers and Mudsock rival Hamilton Southeastern.

Fishers jumped out to an early lead, thanks to a medley

relay win and 1-2-3 finishes in three events. That helped carry the Tigers through to their second team sectional championship, with a score of 533 points. Fishers won its first sectional title in 2016.

"The boys were outstanding today," said Fishers coach Joe Keller.

Keller made a prediction before the meet: That his medley relay team would finish the race in 1:35 flat. Sure enough, the Tigers team of seniors Kyle Haflich and Joel Crull and juniors Trevor Adcock and Cory Jacocks won the event in - wait for it - 1:35.00.

Keller said he had made the statement to his coaches: "If we do that, we're going to be outstanding all day." He was right.

"That set the tone," said Keller. "Back in the fall, I challenged this group. The best team has the best relays, and the relays today were awesome. I'm just really happy. It's a team effort. Everybody had a contribution that was over the top."

Fishers then swept the top three in the 200 free and the IM, giving them the

maximum points (146) possible after three events. Junior Drake Stallworth won the 200 free, and Haflich powered his way to the IM victory.

Those were the first of two individual wins for both swimmers. Stallworth would later take the butterfly event, with Haflich placing first in the butterfly. The duo would finish the meet by teaming with senior Nicholas Harris and sophomore Aaron Frollo for a victory in the 400 free relay. Frollo also won the 500 free, leading a 1-2-3 finish for Fishers there.

For Stallworth, it was a great day as he broke 50 seconds in the butterfly for the first time. The junior's time in that race was 49.90.

"It was really exciting," said Stallworth. He had been trying to get past the 50 mark for a while. After trying last year and at Junior Nationals in December, Stallworth finally got it.

"It's just really relieving to finally break that time," he said.

In the diving well, senior Cole VanDevender had an outstanding day. VanDevender set a new pool record

of 601.15 points - it's a very rare achievement for a diver to break 600. VanDevender qualified for the diving regional at HSE on Tuesday.

Speaking of qualifying, Fishers had 14 swims make it to the state meet. After the winners - all of whom achieved state cut times - other state qualifiers were senior Sam Kuhn in the 200 free, Frollo and Jacocks in the IM, Harris and Kuhn in the 500 free, the 200 free relay team of Stallworth, Crull, Adcock and Jacocks and senior Noah Baldwin in the breaststroke. Baldwin finished second in that race in 57.59, just out-touched by Yorktown junior Nathan Hicks' 57.58. Crull placed third in 58.48, just .01 seconds off the state cut time of 58.47. Crull got a callback to state in the event, as did Jacocks in the 200 free.

"I think they swam amazing," said Stallworth of his teammates. "Going in, some people dropped six seconds in the 200 IM, and two seconds in the 50. And I was like, 'Wow.' This is probably one of my favorite meets, because you get to see people drop so much

time. It gets me really excited for state."

Southeastern finished second with 506 points. The Royals are young, but had some great swims in the sectional finals.

Sophomore DJ Rogers led the way with victories in the 50 and 100 freestyle races, leading a 1-2-3 sweep in the 100 free. Rogers was also part of an all-sophomore, first place 200 free relay. Rogers joined classmates Marcus Eden, Andrew Christopher and Connor Harrison to win that race.

The Royals had three other swims qualify for state in cut times. Harrison and Christopher teamed with junior Blake Ratliff and

sophomore Andrew Truxall to get a cut in the medley relay, while Eden, Rogers and Ratliff joined freshman Keegan Streett to qualify in the 400 free relay. Both took second place. Ratliff also earned a state cut in the IM. "I thought our kids were really, really good today," said HSE coach Andy Pedersen. "I was proud of so many different swims. Tough effort, stayed with it all day."

Pedersen was pleased with how his swimmers kept their heads up after Fishers got off to its fast start.

"I was just proud that our guys stuck in there," said Pedersen. "That could have been very demoralizing, and our guys just stayed

with it. I was really proud of them for that."

Ratliff received a callback in the 200 free, as did Harrison in the butterfly and Streett in the 500 free.

Two Southeastern divers, senior Garrett Garwood and junior Nathan Barr, placed third and fourth respectively and will advance to the Tuesday regional.

University placed sixth at the North Central sectional.

Freshman Keegan Priest led the way for the Trailblazers with a second-place finish in the butterfly. His time was 53.44 seconds. He also took fourth in the backstroke in a time of 54.19 seconds.
