Sharp says sign ordinance violates free political speech . . .

Candidate sues county commissioners

Rick Sharp, a former Carmel Council president and current candidate for an atlarge seat on the Hamilton County Council, has filed a lawsuit in Hamilton County Superior Court 3 alleging a new ordinance passed by county commissioners violates his First Amendment right to free political speech.

Last week Hamilton County Commis-

sioners unanimously passed an ordinance prohibiting the placement of signs in county-owned public right-of-ways. Commissioners cited public safety as the reason for the ordinance. Commissioners say placing signs in public right-of-ways makes it difficult for motorists to recognize regulatory signs which are necessary for safe travel and often block the vision of motorists

In his complaint Sharp says the commissioners make no showing of any public safety necessity and, even if they could, any alleged public safety concern does not outweigh the United States Constitution's First Amendment right of free political speech enough to allow commissioners to restrict or regulate political speech.

Sharp alleges he would suffer irreparable harm should the court not grant injunctive relief prohibiting the enforcement of the ordinance.

Sharp is asking Judge William Hughes to declare the ordinance void and to award him costs, expenses and attorney fees.

Sharp is represented by Westfield attorney Timothy Stoesz.

Local taxes relatively low compared with other areas . . .

Looking at your 2018 property tax bill

Property taxpayers in Hamilton County will not see any significant increase in their tax bills this year, although tax rates will be up slightly in 11 of the mu-

nicipalities and townships. Rates will decrease slightly in six other taxing units.

Local taxes remain relatively low compared with other areas of the state thanks in part to the county's huge base of taxable real estate now nearing \$21 billion. The tax base on which property taxes is levied has increased 4.2 percent in the past year due largely to new construction and trending increases of individual tax assessments. Individual statements, going in the mail in April, are a combined total of the tax bill for cities, towns, townships, libraries, schools and the county government. Taxes are due May 10 and Nov. 12.

Property taxes do not cover the entire cost of public services. In all taxing enti-

ties except schools, a one percent County Income Tax also funds a significant portion of local government spending. Schools receive a distribution of state tax revenue for the major portion of their cost of operation.

Among the county taxing units, Sheridan has the highest tax rate of \$3.21 per hundred dollars of assessed value while unincorporated White River Township has the lowest at \$1.50.

Deputy Auditor Lee Graham, who calculates the rates, notes that slight increases in the overall rate for Jackson Township, Arcadia, Atlanta and Cicero come because of Hamilton North Library improvements, and the higher Clay Township rate is due to a fire rate increase.

The table at right lists the tax rates paid in 2017 compared with new 2018 rates rounded to the nearest penny.

The figures are overall tax rates for the various districts. A complete breakdown of separate portions of the rates in each municipality, township, library district, school and county is found in a legal notice published in Monday's Hamilton County Reporter.

Reader speaks out on township pay raises

As the primary election approaches I feel it's important for the voter to become familiar with some of the insider issues that may affect your voting pattern and specifically when considering incumbents and township government.

Today I read that Pike Township of Marion County has a budget approaching \$40 million and the trustee is paid approximately \$94,000 per year. Wow!

The Pike Township board members are paid \$5,400 per year as per their published report printed in the Indy Star on Feb. 19. I am a past member of the Noblesville Township Board and have some knowledge of the requirements including the dedicated time required to attend meetings and preform these required statutory board duties.

Noblesville in contrast has a budget much, much less than Pike Township and did pay the trustee some \$15,000 less at last count. However the current board is now paid at the rate of \$15,000 per year, or three times the rate of most/ majority of township boards in Hamilton County and the State. SELF SERV-ING AT ITS BEST.

Recall that these board members have to vote on these ridiculous salaries - which are, in the opinion of many, totally self-serving. I think an estimated total time committed to this board position unless a drastic change has occurred on an annual basis is approximately three to five hours total. NOT A BAD RATE OF PAY.

The legislature this current session attempted to eliminate some of these smaller self-serving township govern-

ments and their boards, plus put a limit on the income allowed for board members, but this failed as a result of the grassroots effort put forth by the trustees and boards who have a vested interest in the continuation of the status quo.

Mine and others' experiences suggest no sincere interest exists in efficiency and cost savings and will routinely not be implemented or considered by any form of government including local, county, state, regional and federal. The Indiana Association of Trustees was in favor of this recent attempt to modify the age-old township government model, but was unsuccessful with their support. Kevin Brinegar of the State Chamber of Commerce was also supportive of these and other changes affecting the form of township government as we know it now.

A need exists to continue implementing the cost saving details of the bi-partisan report presented by Governor Kernan and retired Indiana Supreme Court Justice Shepard - known as the Kernan Shepard report - who have reported and suggested in their many recommendations that the old model of 1,007 Indiana township government sites needs eliminated, and all duties preformed at the townships could be transferred to the county and handled more efficiently and effectively, thus improving service and reducing cost.

Just a few thoughts regarding township government including board salaries and other issues to ponder.

According to Carmel officials the property would require rezoning. The Carmel Planning Commission would need to make a recommendation before passing the project on to the city council.





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



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Ken Alexander, leader in the construction industry, speaks with Purdue University students

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

'Rocks fall to Marauders, teams combine for 26 3s

Playing at The Rock on Tuesday evening required both Westfield and Mount Vernon to think outside the line - the 3-point line.

Both the Shamrocks and the Marauders reached double-digits in terms of 3-pointers. Westfield was also staying close with Mount Vernon until a long run in the second half helped the Marauders leave The Rock with a 65-59 victory.

Mount Vernon made 15 3s in the game, with the 'Rocks hitting 11 triples. That includes two 3s from senior Josh Van Dyke in the second quarter, and a big one late in the third that gave Westfield a 40-39 lead. This came after the Shamrocks trailed 30-23 at halftime.

But the Marauders blasted back, making consecutive 3-pointers after Van Dyke's basket. Mount Vernon then scored at the third-period buzzer to go up 47-40. That 8-0 run became 14-0, as MV hit another pair of 3s early in the fourth to go ahead 53-40.

"No surprises that they can shoot the 3," said 'Rocks coach Shane Sumpter. "They shoot more than 20 a game. I think they were 15-of-26 from 3-point range and 2-for-15 inside the paint. We didn't really do a good job of running them off the line like we wanted to do."

Westfield continued to fight, with Camden Simons getting a jumper with five minutes left. Then Van Dyke nailed his fourth triple of the game to get the 'Rocks within 53-45.

The Marauders led 59-47 with 2:49 to go before Westfield made one more run. Zach Banks hit a 3 while being fouled with two minutes left, then made the free throw to complete the rare four-point play. Chris Chin added a layin to cut Mount Vernon's lead to 59-53, but that would be as close as the Shamrocks would get.

"Every time that we tried to make a run, they came right back with a run," said

Van Dyke finished the game with 18 points, while Banks scored 13. Caleb Welch added 11 points, including three 3-pointers.

Westfield finished its regular season at 10-12. The Shamrocks will play Carmel next





Several Hamilton County boys basketball players have been suspended after alleged violation of an IHSAA by-law.

Six players for Noblesville and two for Hamilton Heights are among the players suspended. The Reporter was told that the violation stemmed from basketball games that were played at the Boys and Girls Club of Noblesville.

IHSAA by-law 15-1.2 Team Sports (Baseball, Basketball, Football, Soccer, Softball and Volleyball) states:

• "a. Participation by a student in any organized non-school sports competition during the Authorized Contest Season, or at any time prior to the conclusion of the student's participation in the IHSAA the IHSAA Tournament Series, in that sport shall cause such students to become ineligible for their School team in that sport for a period not to exceed Three-hundred Sixty-five (365) days as determined by the Commissioner."

"There was a violation of IHSAA rules," said Marnie Cooke, Noblesville Schools Director of Communication. "We can't comment or provide information on specific student issues like this."

Hamilton Heights Athletic Director Kurt Ogden confirmed two boys basketball players have been suspended. Ogden would not comment further.

Neither school indicated if the suspension extended into next week's sectional games.


