Westfield homicide suspect sentenced

On Thursday, Hamilton County Superior Court 1 Judge Steven Nation sentenced Joseph Coccaro to nine years in prison for Coccaro's involvement in the 2016 Westfield homicide of Corey Zimmer.

Zimmer was found beaten to

death in a parking lot of an apartment building just east of the Kroger grocery store located near State Road 32 and Carey Road.

Coccaro's sentence came after pleading guilty in December to aggravated battery and involuntary manslaughter.

During the sentencing hearing Chief Deputy Prosecutor Andre Miksha argued for Coccaro

to receive the maximum term possible in the plea agreement.

"During this hearing we pointed out who Joseph Coccaro really is, the severity of the crime and the amount of brutality involved," said Miksha to Judge Nation.

Coccaro's attorney argued for Coccaro to be sentenced to work release. Miksha responded

by stating, "You shouldn't trust the defendant. He has a history of probation and parole violations."

Miksha also noted Coccaro had previously been convicted of theft and narcotics possession.

Coccaro's accomplice, Shakka Brogden, was recently found guilty during a jury trial. Brogden is scheduled to be sentenced in March.



Carmel cop honored for saving life

On June 20, 2017, Carmel Police Officer Tony Lovitt was on patrol when he received notification from Hamilton County Communications Center dispatcher Jill Jones of an unconscious male in the area of Bayhill Drive and Sugar Cay Court.

Officer Lovitt responded and, upon arriving on the scene, he observed a good Samaritan, Bill Schlies, performing CPR on the unconscious male who was later identified as Jeff Utzinger. Officer Lovitt immediately retrieved his automated external defibrillator (AED) and attached the instrument to Utzinger. The AED delivered one shock to Utzinger.

Also arriving at the scene was Sergeant Brady Myers. Myers assisted Schlies and Lovitt by performing chest compressions on Utzinger until Carmel Fire Department personnel arrived.

Officer Lovitt was recently honored for his quick and effective response along with Sgt. Myers for his assistance with chest compressions.

The Carmel Police Department stated the officers' quick actions resulted in Utzinger being revived on the scene and transported to the hospital for further care.

Following the incident Officer Lovitt maintained contact with a family mem-

ber and sought updates on Utzinger. Later, Utzinger and his family then met with Lovitt. The meeting was described very emotional as Utzinger thanked Officer Lovitt for his quick actions that played an integral part in saving his life.

Jeff Utzinger is married with three young children and as a result of these first responders they will have their father for many more years.

On Feb. 13, Officer Lovitt, Bill Schlies and survivor Jeff Utzinger were recognized by IU Health North and "Bolt for the Heart 5K Run/Walk" AED presentation at the State Fairgrounds Indiana Farm Bureau building.

Lawmakers send Sunday sales bill to governor

The prospect of ending a ban on Sunday carryout sales of alcohol in Indiana is now in the governor's hands.

On Thursday, the Senate voted 38-10 to approve a bill that had previously been amended to end the ban immediately instead of July 1. Bill sponsor Republican Sen. Ron Alting of Lafayette supported the change.

House members voted Tuesday 82-10 in favor of the amended bill.

Gov. Eric Holcomb has said he plans to sign it, but there was no immediate word from the governor when that might occur.

"There's a pen on my desk," the Republican governor said earlier Thursday during

Jackson Fire helps educate school children

In response to the school emergency in Florida, children have been concerned that if a fire alarm is activated in their school, they fear the possibility of there being an active shooter on the premise using the alarm as a decoy.

On Feb. 19, Jackson Fire responded to a reported fire alarm at the school, which was reported to have been activated by construction work in progress. In at least one case, a student reportedly called their parent when the school fire alarm was activated, fearful to exit the classroom.

In light of this, Jackson Fire and Cicero Fire will be meeting with the children of the Hamilton Heights Primary and Elementary Schools at 9 a.m. and 10 a.m., respectively, today, Feb. 23, to answer questions from the children in an attempt to reduce fear and anxiety. Firefighters will also perform a fire drill at each school, however, the children will be aware the drill is being performed and firefighters will walk them through the drill.

Firefighters are also planning future cooperative training involving multiple public safety agencies to coordinate responses to school emergencies.

INDOT awards contract to build Strawtown Avenue roundabout, restore bridge on State Road 37

The Indiana Department of Transportation has awarded Beatty Construction Inc. a \$1.6 million contract to build a roundabout at State Road 37 and Strawtown Avenue and begin work on a bridge deck overlay on SR 37 over the White River in Strawtown, northeast of Noblesville.

The roundabout is needed to improve safety at the intersection by improv-

ing sight distance and reducing drivers' speeds. The overlay on the SR 37 bridge over the White River will seal the deck against moisture intrusion and deterioration. At the same time, it restores the bridge's driving surface for a smoother, safer ride.

Strawtown Avenue will be closed for up to 90 days. Detour signs will direct traffic around the construction site via Mad-

ison Street, SR 37, 216th Street, Victory Chapel Road and Craig Avenue.

SR 37 will be restricted up to 90 days. A temporary traffic signal will be installed to regulate both directions of traffic sharing one lane in the work zone.

A start date will be announced after a project schedule has been submitted by contractors. Strawtown Avenue and SR 37 will be fully open to traffic in fall 2018.

the unveiling at the Statehouse of the ticket design for the Sunday, May 27, Indianapolis 500. "We're waiting for the process to take its course. But when it arrives ... we will sign it."

When Holcomb was asked if he was planning anything special for the bill signing, he replied: "We're working on it."

But he was coy when asked about other measures addressing outmoded alcohol laws, such as a bill that failed this year which would have allowed pharmacies, convenience stores and big box retailers to sell cold — and not just room temperature — beer.

That's a right primarily enjoyed by liquor stores, whose owners have fought fiercely to keep it that way.

"There's more work to be done," Holcomb said, adding that he would deal with those issues next session.

Indiana has prohibited carryout Sunday sales since the Prohibition era nearly a century ago. Lawmakers for decades have debated ending the ban, but those proposals all foundered amid squabbling among interest groups. That abruptly changed this year with Republican legislative leaders endorsing the change.

The Indiana Association of Beverage Retailers Chairman Jon Sinder issued this statement:

"The Indiana Association of Beverage Retailers congratulates the Indiana State Senate for voting today to concur with Senate Bill 1 which will send this historic piece of legislation to the Governor's desk. This is only the latest milestone in the long legislative process that we expect to end with Hoosiers being able to purchase alcohol for carryout on Sunday for the first time since prohibition.

We would especially like to commend Chairman Ben Smaltz and Chairman Ron Alting for their work in shepherding this landmark bill through the Indiana General Assembly and we appreciate Governor Eric Holcomb who has indicated his intention to sign it into law.

Indiana's small business package liquor stores have been preparing for this outcome for months by updating work schedules and if needed hiring, training and licensing new employees that reach the highest standards of safety as required by Indiana law. Indiana's neighborhood package liquor stores have been responsible merchants of alcohol products since 1933 and we will be ready to open our doors on Sundays for the first time. 

Reader speaks out for Milam, against Altman

Dear Editor:

I am supporting Matt Milam for County Commissioner in his race against long-time incumbent Christine Altman for several reasons. Matt is opposed to additional taxes, especially an income tax, to pay for mass transit in our suburban county. Ms. Altman is one of the leading proponents in favor of higher taxes for mass transit.

As Matt's campaign treasurer, I called nine of the largest donors to Ms. Altman's campaign in 2017 to see if they wanted to speak with Matt so he could learn their concerns. These donors are engineers and contractors. Is it possible they want both a fully-funded road system as we now have and additional tax money to engineer and build an unnecessary mass transit system? I don't know, since no one has indicated they want to meet with Matt to discuss what interests them so much in Hamilton County politics that they have helped Ms. Altman amass a \$158,000 campaign war chest over the years, despite having no opposition recently.

I live in Home Place, which is under the jurisdiction of Ms. Altman and the county since Matt has successfully fought the seizure attempts by Mayor Brainard. Some people here do complain that Home Place is not as well-cared for by its government as Carmel does for places in its city limits. The county has much authority here in Home Place. If it is unloved and uncared for properly, doesn't that reflect less on Carmel doing well versus Ms. Altman not even caring about Home Place, just biding her time until Mayor Brainard does the "dirty" work?

As I did some background research on Ms. Altman, I noted she buys properties at Hamilton County tax sales, where properties are auctioned by the county she represents for failure to pay taxes. If bids at these sales aren't high enough to cover tax deficiencies, the County Commissioners take over the property. I also noted that she is the property owner where Woody's (Carmel City Council President Rider) Library restaurant is, which has been delinquent and paid penalties on its taxes recently. I assume she won't be able to bid on her own property if it is taken over by her as a County Commissioner for delinquent taxes.

She also serves as the attorney for two of the nine townships in our county. At a Commissioner meeting on Feb. 17, 2015, Commissioner Christine Altman asked the client of Christine Altman, Esq., the Wayne Township Trustee, "if she had any concerns". I do have concerns: Where does Commissioner Christine Altman end and where does Christine Altman, Esq. begin?

Let's let her focus on her legal clients, her tax bills and bids, her business ventures and advocating for unpopular and unnecessary mass transit income taxes as a private citizen, and let's let Matt Milam focus on the citizens of Hamilton County by nominating him May 8. Registration now open for summer day camps at Conner Prairie

Indiana State Police increase patrol for March Madness, St. Patrick's Day weekend

The Indiana State Police is joining law enforcement agencies across Indiana this March to increase dangerous and impaired driving patrols for the NCAA Tournament and St. Patrick's Day.

Last year, the weekend beginning St. Patrick's Day had the highest number crashes involving impaired drivers. With March 17 falling on a Saturday this year, police are conducting random patrols, saturation patrols and sobriety checkpoints intended to make our roads safer.

"This is when we celebrate a time honored Hoosier tradition, March Madness and basketball," said Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter. "However, if you drink, your plans should include a designated driver, ride sharing program, or taxi to get you home safely from your celebration. Troopers will be out looking for those drivers who fail to heed this advice and will provide another form of transportation to those drivers; but it won't be to their home."

The top causes of all Indiana traffic crashes are drivers following too closely and failing to yield the right of way. Aggressive, distracted and impaired driving reduce reaction times to unexpected slowed traffic, bicycles and pedestrians.

New impaired driving equipment

In every state, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.08 or higher. In Indiana, drivers under 21 with a BAC of 0.02 are subject to fines and a license suspension for up to one year.

Last year the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) and National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) purchased 1,759 new portable breath tests for Indiana law enforcement agencies. An additional 836 devices will be purchased this year.

But unlike alcohol, there is no quick field test for the legal and illegal drugs that can impair drivers. ICJI and NHTSA are issuing Android tablets and apps to assist 185 highly-trained police officers

in the recognition and enforcement of drug-impaired driving.

If you're taking a new medication or higher dose, talk with your doctor or don't drive until you know how it affects you. Even over-the-counter medication such as cold medicine or sleep aids may cause impairment, especially when combined with alcohol or a second drug.

Layden coached Tri-Central to three consecutive Class A championships in 2003, 2004 and 2005. With a victory, she would become just the second coach to lead two different schools to a state title joining Donna Cheatham who coached the Scottsburg (1989) and Southwestern (Hanover) (2002) girls to titles. While at Tri-Central, Layden won her first state championship at age 26, the second-youngest girls coach to win a title.

Won its regular season meeting at Warren Central 52-44 on Jan. 6.


School playing for its third girls state championship of this school year having collected the big trophies in girls golf back on Sept. 30 and girls cross country on Oct. 28.
