After Cliff Hackman, Assistant Princiand HHSC School Safety Coordinator, fielded a number of calls from parents expressing concerns and anxiety related to the school shooting in Parkland, Fla., he had an idea. With the monthly fire drill approaching, Hackman wanted to take advantage of a teachable moment.

While the school setting remains one of the safest and most secure places for students, Hackman understands the concerns. He reached out to the local fire departments

to see if they would like to participate in Heights regularly scheduled monthly fire pal, and Hamilton Heights Primary School drill. They were more than happy to help and arrived in force.

> Personnel from Jackson Township Fire Department and the Cicero Fire Department were excited to be present at the fire drills, interact with students throughout and provide a little safety education while they were there. Members of the media were there to capture the moment and help share the message about how one rural district continues its proactive safety efforts in the wake of a national tragedy.

Personnel in uniforms are a familiar sight for students at Hamilton Heights who have active and engaged School Resource Officers (SRO) at each of the four buildings. Local fire and emergency personnel are familiar and welcome sights. The local departments often bring equipment and personnel to the schools throughout the year for special educational and safety awareness programs and career days.

Josh Ireland, a member of the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department, a SRO

## Noblesville Schools cuts the ribbon at transportation center

Noblesville Schools officially cut the ribbon Friday on their newly-constructed transportation center at a public dedication event. The new center is located at 19790 Hague Road adjacent to West Middle School and replaces the previous location on Field Drive near Noblesville High School.

"Our former transportation center was built in 1978 when Noblesville Schools served approximately 4,000 students and couldn't provide the space we need today to serve over 10,000 students," said Beth Niedermeyer, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "Our new facility significantly increases capacity, providing room we need for our bus fleet, maintenance bays, office management, meeting space, driver parking and storage."

Transportation staff relocated to the new Hague Road location in January and bus routes have been running from there since school resumed following winter break.

"With almost 200 different routes, our 100+ buses and drivers travel approximately 1.2 million miles each year safely transporting 9,300 students a day to 10 school buildings and locations as far away as Downtown Indy and Beech Grove," added Niedermeyer. "The work they do is an important part of supporting students. We're also proud that our transportation mechanics have had a perfect safety inspection rate for 31 consecutive years."

The new transportation center location was chosen because of its accessibility for bus routes and its infrastructure design. It was also a cost savings for the district because they already owned the land. The location next to West Middle School will also

# Culvert repair causes temporary lane closure of Little Chicago Road

The City of Noblesville temporarily closed a portion of the southbound lane of Little Chicago Road between State Road 38 and Buttonwood Drive to make an emergency repair to the roadway.

An inspection from the Noblesville Street and Engineering departments determined that the culvert under the southbound lane was washed out due to recent rainy weather. Noblesville Street Department crews are currently onsite to fix the portion of the road. A temporary patch will be constructed now and will be replaced permanently once asphalt plants are back in service in April/May.

Little Chicago Road reopened to normal traffic flow at 5 p.m. Friday.



help address the parking shortage at that school, providing West event visitors additional parking options.

The design was crafted with the community in mind, incorporating a maximum set-back off the road

and landscaping buffers to address any sight or noise concerns from neighbors. Traffic impact was explored with the City of Noblesville and the Indiana Department of Transportation with no noted concerns.

The \$10.5 million cost of the construction project was financed through construction bonds, with no increased tax burden for residents and no referendum dollars being spent on the project.




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

at the Primary and Elementary Schools, said the safety of students and personnel is first and foremost. "When it comes to these monthly drills, we have it down to a science," said Deputy Ireland. "Even our youngest students know the procedure. We have our entire population out of the building, checked and cleared for re-entry in a matter of minutes. "Today was a treat because of the presence of the various first responders, emergency and fire personnel."

"While these young students may not be aware of the conversations and stories taking place at the national level regarding safety, we are pleased to take a proactive stance in working with our local school schools on situational awareness education and training," said Jackson Township Fire Department Chief, Jeff Muszar. "In addition, our department in cooperation with the Cicero Fire Department along with the on-site SRO's are planning future cooperative training events involving multiple public safety agencies to coordinate responses to school emergencies."



# Teen raises money for Carmel Dance Marathon while recovering from stroke during brain surgery

Today, more than 1,000 Carmel High School students will participate in their annual Carmel Dance Marathon to raise money for Riley Hospital for Children.

Last year's dance marathon raised more than \$424,000. This year, there are a number of students who have already raised more than \$1,000, including a student who is recovering from some very serious health issues of her own.

Bella Simons is a senior at Carmel High School. A few years ago, she had brain surgery to remove a brain tumor.

She was recovering well and was preparing for college, when, a few months ago, she had

That stroke required a second brain surgery that took place last month and there were some complica-

"When she woke up from surgery, I didn't know what was normal. From her first surgery, when she woke up, she couldn't see, so initially I was excited she could see, but then I soon realized, she couldn't talk," said Tasha

Simons, Bella's mom. "I woke up and I was trying

> hoped it was not. "This was a huge stroke over the language center of her brain that was really bad news. We asked if she would ever be able to speak again and she didn't know," Tasha said.

A MRI confirmed what

her parents and doctors

She could say "hungry," but nothing else.

"I knew what I wanted to say if I wanted to say 'Hey, I need to use the bathroom' or 'Hey, I need food,' it wouldn't come out right," Bella said.

Until one day, when what she wanted to say, was what came out.

"I woke up and I said 'Hi mom' and I didn't really realize that she could hear me," Bella said.

"I was over the moon, oh, it was just amazing 'cause I was just blown away by God's faithfulness. I was so afraid of losing her and having her, but not have her be herself and that was a danger, too and just seeing that I still had my Bella back, that my baby was still there," Tasha said.

Two weeks after her surgery, Bella was home.

"Her recovery is miraculous. We're talking two huge strokes, two major brain surgeries, two brain tumors and she's doing amazingly well," Tasha said about what doctors have told her about Bella's recovery.

It's allowing Bella to continue to be the strong, courageous and positive girl that she is.



# Carmel sends 24 to today's finals

## Fishers, 'Rocks, HSE qualify several swims - HH's Holder, NHS' Wolfred advance

Everything is shaping up for the Carmel boys swim team to have one of its biggest state meets ever.

The Greyhounds qualified 24 swims for today's state finals, this after a very successful round of preliminaries Friday night at the IU Natatorium. Nineteen of Carmel's swims reached the championship heat, with the other five making the consolation heat.

The 'Hounds started the meet with a new state and national record in the medley relay: Sophomore Wyatt Davis and seniors Stefano Batista, Drew Kibler and Andrew Couhon swam that event in 1:28.00 - almost a second and a half under the old record - to take the top seed. Kibler was back a while later to set a new state and national mark in the 50 freestyle, finishing that race in 19.38 sec-

"That's his best time and I think he's got more in there," said Carmel coach Chris Plumb.

Kibler also took the top seed in the butterfly race, finishing that one in 46.81 seconds. Batista earned the first seed in the breaststroke (54.28), with Couchon right behind him for a 1-2 Greyhound finish.

Sophomore Jacob Mitchell finished first in the 500 free, with this time of 4:27.14 good for a top seed. Mitchell was also second in the 200 free, with freshman Augustus Rothrock finishing third and junior Alec DeLong taking fourth.

"We swam great," said Plumb. "Having guys 2-3-4 in the 200 free is great."

Plumb enjoyed the fact that newer swimmers were stepping up to complement the "elite guys" that were setting new records. Rothrock and Griffin Hadley are two freshmen reaching championship heats at this year's state meet.

"Just great to see and great fun and we're looking forward to a better day tomorrow,"







# Pacers start strong, race past Atlanta

Coming out of the All-Star break, Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said earlier this week that he wanted his team to "start strong" as they embark on the final 24 games of the regular season. They did just that on Friday night at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, racing to a 116-93 victory over the cellardwelling Atlanta Hawks.

Domantas Sabonis recorded a doubledouble with 21 points and 13 rebounds, while Thaddeus Young added 20 points and five steals as Indiana (34-25) cruised to a win over the Hawks (18-42), who own the worst record in the NBA.

The Pacers showed little rust early despite the eight-day break, scoring the game's first five points and extending their lead to as many as eight points in the opening minutes. Thaddeus Young scored 10 of Indiana's first 19 points, knocking down 4-of-6 shots (2-of-3 from 3-point range) to ignite the offense.

The highlight of the night came with 3:51 remaining in the first quarter, when Glenn Robinson III checked in for the first time this season. Robinson missed the first 58 games this year after undergoing surgery to repair a left ankle injury he sustained in training camp, but returned to practice in recent weeks, even playing in two

rehabilitation games with the Fort Wayne Mad Ants in the NBA G League.

When he stepped onto the floor on Friday, Robinson received a standing ovation from the sellout crowd at The Fieldhouse, with teammates like Victor Oladipo motioning to the fans to cheer even

"It was amazing," Robinson said. "To be out there for the first time, put on that jersey again for the first time this year, it means a lot. Especially with what I've been through these past four-five months, having to start over walking again."

After missing his first attempt long, Robinson scored his first points of the season with 1:09 left in the opening period, using a head fake to make Isaiah Taylor fly by him, then stepping confidently into a midrange jumper.

"We've always said that he's an integral part of our team and what we do," Young said. "It's just a matter of working him back in. He's done a hell of job just getting himself back ready to get into playing


