## County students to walk out over violence

### The REPORTER

The Reporter has learned that many Hamilton County students will be walking out of class at 10 a.m. on March 14 for 17 minutes in honor of the 17 victims of the February mass shooting in Parkland, Fla., and to call for legislation that responds to gun violence.

Although schools can punish students with an unexcused absence or even suspension for missing class during a protest, Carmel Schools will allow their students to participate in this demonstration without repercussion, according to district spokeswoman Courtney Taylor.

"Carmel High School

students have reached out to [the] administration, and we are working with them to allow for their voices to be heard while also being safe," Taylor said. "We encourage our students to be actively engaged citizens who are knowledgeable about multiple viewpoints surrounding current events. We will be respecting the rights of all students, whether they choose to participate or not."

Additionally, Westfield Washington Schools will allow their students to participate in an "awareness walk."

Superintendent Dr. Sherry L. Grate sent a letter to parents stating, "With input from our students, plans are in the works, including

an option for awareness walks at Westfield High School and Westfield Middle School to support kindness and safe schools." Dr. Grate's full letter appears on Page 4.

Noblesville Schools Communications Director Marnie Cooke told The Reporter, "We're preparing a communication on this for students/parents."

However, Cooke offered the following statement about school safety in general:

*Like all of us, students throughout the country are rightfully troubled about school shootings that have taken place in recent years.*

*The safety of our students and staff is always our*

*top priority and we have several measures in place to best address emergency situations, should they occur.*

*We encourage our students to be critical thinkers and thoughtful, engaged citizens. We are working with students on safe and constructive ways that they can express their views and make their voices heard on this important issue.*

Hamilton Heights and Hamilton Southeastern Schools have told The Reporter they will make announcements soon.

Sheridan Schools did not respond to The Reporter's request for information about their own plans to deal with a student walk out.

The public is invited to attend a free education and training session on the life-saving drug naloxone from 6 to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, March 14 at the Red Bridge Park Community Building in Cicero. The event is being co-sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Cicero and the Hamilton North Friends of the Library.

Jim Ginder, Health Education Specialist, Hamilton County Health Department, will show attendees how to save lives through administering the opiate antidote naloxone, which is sold under the drug name Narcan. It's one way local citizens can be prepared with the knowledge and use of this life-saving treatment in the event of an opioid overdose by someone in their home, neighborhood, work, church, or other community locations. Ginder, who is the Health Education Specialist for the Hamilton County Health Department, has dedicated the better part of more than two decades to accessing local health needs and developing presentations on all topics related to public health and safety education.

A grant provided by the Indiana Department of Health for the Narcan treatment helps provide the funding for Ginder to educate lay people around the county about the opioid drug problem, signs and symptoms of use and

abuse, prevention tips and how to administer Narcan in the case of an overdose.

Those who attend a training session leave with one dose of the medicine which they can keep or donate it to their local police or fire department.

"While we may be the healthiest county in the state, we're not immune from this nationwide problem," explained Ginder. "This problem extends into every corner of our county and it's going to take every one of us to fight it."

This multi-faceted issue can start out simply as a prescription for pain reduction after surgery or for a chronic condition that can escalate into addiction. Individuals of all ages who may experiment with combining prescription painkillers and/or trying street drugs like heroin or fentanyl could quickly find themselves into the throws of addiction. An overdose episode does not discriminate. It could happen the first time or into years of overuse. The Hamilton County Coroner's office investigated 36 drug over dose deaths from the county last year and found the majority of those overdose deaths were individuals between the ages of 25 and 29.

"We hope members of our community will come out in force to take advantage of this one-hour educational workshop right in our backyard," said Keith

## County budget order, final tax rates approved

### The REPORTER

The Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF) certified Hamilton County's 2018 budget order and tax rates on Feb. 14, paving the way for on-time property tax bills. The budget certification puts the county in a position to have taxes due on Thursday,

May 10.

"The certification of the budget order allows local governments to better plan for their operations for 2018 based on the approved budget and anticipated revenue figures. In addition, the certification of the budget order and tax rates sets the stage for on-time property

tax bills, which is important for the predictable administration of the property tax system," DLGF Commissioner Wesley R. Bennett said. "A tremendous amount of collaboration between local and state officials is required to ensure property tax bills go out on time, and it is rewarding to

see all the efforts pay off."

The first step in the assessment to tax billing process is the completion of the property assessments, which culminates with the submission of a ratio study. A ratio study is a comparison between property sales

prices and assessed values in the county to ensure that market values are being used to determine assessed values. Typically, these should be submitted to the state by March 1 and approved shortly thereafter in the year prior to tax billing. Hamilton County's ratio study was submitted on March 9, 2017.

Once the DLGF approves the ratio study, the assessor sends the gross assessed values to the county auditor, who applies exemptions, deductions, or abatements to determine the net assessed values -

the values upon which tax rates are based. That information was statutorily due to the DLGF by Aug. 1, 2017. Hamilton County's certified net assessed values were submitted on Aug. 10, 2017.

Now that the 2018 budget has been certified by the DLGF, the next steps are handled at the county level. The county auditor is to calculate tax bills, which the county treasurer should mail to taxpayers no later than Friday, April 13.

The entire project is being installed for \$100,000.

Ecker, President, Cicero Kiwanis. "This is a timely topic and an opportunity to be trained to potentially save a life during a medical emergency with this proven treatment. Communities are key to making a difference and reducing the upward trend of opioid addiction."

"No one plans to overdose but it can and does happen," continued Ginder, who has handed out nearly 200 doses of Narcan over

the past year. "Individuals can take too much of the drug or it can be cut with a bad batch. Those most at risk of an overdose fatality are those coming out of rehab and who relapse. They ingest a dose in amounts they took prior to treatment and having a lower tolerance post-treatment, can result in an overdose. Naloxone has no effect on non-opioid overdoses (e.g., cocaine, benzodiazepines, or alcohol)."

# Noblesville seeking temporary workers

# Groundbreaking for new solar project at Hamilton County jail

Hamilton County Commissioners will break ground on one of the state's largest solar panel projects at 10 a.m. on Monday, March 12 at the Hamilton County Health Department in Noblesville.

The \$8 million project will feature 9,300 solar panels on building roofs at the Correctional Campus on Cumberland Road and three acres of county property near the main public safety radio tower on the east side of State Road 37. In addition to the solar panels, the county will also change out all lighting to LED energy efficient light-

ing and convert the jail's HVAC systems from electric to gas.

"Utilities are the county's second-highest expense, behind employee salaries and benefits," County Commissioner Christine Altman said. "This project will save the county \$25 million in utility and maintenance costs over the next 25 years."

The county currently pays \$1.6 million a year in utility bills for county facilities. The solar project will provide enough ener-

gy to power 38 percent of the jail complex and 100 percent of the Health Services building.

"This project isn't about the right now, it's about our future," says Steve Wood, Superintendent of Hamilton County Buildings and Grounds. "This project will produce enough clean power to avoid greenhouse emissions equivalent to 10 million driven car miles. Plus, it will be a great learning tool for thousands of school kids right here in Hamilton County."

Johnson-Melloh Solutions, the project contractor, will provide live web monitoring of the energy being saved by the solar project. The county can share this information with local schools to teach students about energy consumption. Field trips to the solar field will also be available.

The solar project should be complete by late June. The county will make annual payments of \$623,000 over 20 years at a 3 percent interest rate. Utility savings generated from this project will pay the capital cost of the project in less than 12 years.

# State trail group suggests rail-with-trail on Nickel Plate

The Hoosier Rails to Trails Council (HRTC) sent letters to representatives of the city and county owners of the Nickel Plate Railroad, Fishers, Noblesville and Hamilton County, offering the organization's assistance in developing the Nickel Plate Trail project into a rail-with-trail, instead of a trail-only. The letter invites the owners to schedule a meeting with HRTC to discuss the proposal in more detail.

Citing their involvement as the original advocates and initiators of the Monon Trail - which is often used as an example of a highly successful rail-trail - HRTC believes that their involvement with the project will allow the own-

ers to "capitalize on thirty-one years of relevant, local experience to ensure long-term success of the project..." and to "create a world-class amenity above and beyond that of the Monon Trail."

Since the announcement of the Nickel Plate Trail on Feb. 28, 2017, the local communities have been tied up in contentious debate over the future of the Nickel Plate. While local officials have suggested that the proposed trail-only is the sole feasible option for the corridor between Fishers and Noblesville, opponents of the plan have stated from early on that rails-with-trails would be a more inclusive compromise to allow the railroad corridor to remain in-tact and operational.

Until today, there has been no public discussion among trail organizations as to the possibility of a rail-with-trail development that would preserve the railroad between Fishers and Noblesville. HRTC's letter marks the first assertion by an official trails group that rails-with-trails would be a better option for the proposed Nickel Plate Trail. By offering their assistance, HRTC is offering their expertise, network and resources to ensure that a Nickel Plate Rail-with-Trail project would be successful and would best serve the local community.

## Dilk, Kiser, Taiwo selected as Indiana All-Stars

Three Hamilton County girls basketball players have been selected to be on the 2018 IndyStar Indiana Girls All-Stars.

Carmel's Amy Dilk, Noblesville's Emily Kiser and Carmel's Tomi Taiwo are the three county players that will be on this year's team. The All-Stars will play three games in June -- one exhibition game against the Indiana Junior All-Stars as well as home-and-home contests against the Kentucky All-Stars.

Dilk was a varsity player for the Greyhounds since she was a freshman, and has been the backbone behind a streak of three consecutive sectional championships for Carmel. Dilk did it all for the 'Hounds, with per game stats of 17.8 points, 6.7 assists, 5.6 rebounds, 3.8 steals and 1.3 blocks. She will play basketball at the University of Michigan next season.

Kiser was also a varsity player from the start for the Millers, and was part of Noblesville's sectional championship team as a freshman. At 6-foot-3, she plays an expert post game, averaging a double-double of 21.0 points and 13.4 rebounds, as well as 1.9 points per game. Kiser will join Dilk at the University of Michigan next season.

Taiwo transferred from Homestead to Carmel in her junior year and made an immediate impact for the Greyhounds. A great 3-point shooter, Taiwo drained 63 triples; she attempted 153 3-point shots for a rate of 41 percent. Taiwo averaged 16.4 points per game, and will play at the University of Iowa next season.

The three Hamilton County All-Stars were among 13 players selected for this year's All-Stars team. The others are: Angel Baker of Pike, Jenasae Bishop of East Chicago Central, Mackenzie Blazek of Whiteland, Leigha Brown of DeKalb, Nia Clark of Ben Davis, Katlyn Gilbert of Heritage Christian, Cassidy Hardin of Center Grove, Anna Newman of Evansville North, Kayana Traylor of Martinsville and Michaela White of Pike.

The head coach for the 2018 Girls All-Stars will be Pat McKee of Columbus North. He will be assisted by DeAnn Booth of East Noble and Corie West of Avon. The 2018 IndyStar Indiana Miss Basketball will be announced from within the group of




