'Greyhounds' coming to Main and Keystone roundabouts

The next roundabout landscaping project is going to the dogs ... the greyhounds, to be more specific. The City of Carmel will begin installation soon on an artistic rendering of 10 galloping greyhounds affixed to the cascading walls within the double roundabout interchange at Main Street and Keystone

Parkway. The design pays honor to the mascot for Carmel High School, which is located just west of the interchange. Five greyhounds made of multi-layered, brushed stainless steel will be affixed on each wall and installed with special back lighting to be visible at night.

"This interchange is the primary entry point

to Carmel High School for thousands of visitors who come to Carmel for academic conferences, shows at the auditorium and sporting events at the school, so it made sense to use our beloved greyhound mascot to adorn this roundabout interchange," said Mayor Jim Brainard.

Bomar Industries did the design and construction of the six-foot-long, stainless steel greyhounds, each one curved in order to match the wall radius. They will be installing the greyhounds, depicted in various stages of running. In addition, Bomar will supply the blue back-lighting behind each greyhound to accentuate the metal structure at night. The entire project is being installed for \$100,000.

HAND abandons plans at Co-op, moves on Sheridan, Carmel sites

Plans to develop a housing project on the site of the former Farm Bureau Co-op grain processing plant in Noblesville have been abandoned. For more than two years the Hamilton County Neighborhood Development (HAND) tried to secure funding from state housing authorities for an apartment development on the site at 8th and Mulberry streets, but has now decided against pursuing the project.

An option on the ground expired in recent months. The land is owned by North Central Co-op. The property, formerly the site of huge grain silos, is now vacant. Its future use is undetermined.

Before Farm Bureau began operations, the ground was the site of the Noblesville Milling Company founded in the late 19th century and was a major employer in the city.

HAND is now focusing on two other projects in the county. Cooperating with the Woda Group, Inc. of Ohio, HAND will be able to provide 32 living units at Blackhawk Commons in Sheridan, a project announced earlier that is now cleared to get underway in July. Approval of federal rental tax credits resulted in the final go-ahead.

The apartments will be located in the former Sheridan High School, an

Hamilton County man helps fallen officer's family

In the wake of the death

Hamilton County businessman is working to make a difference by setting up a fund to help Pickett's family.

Darren Peck, owner and vice president of Indiana Restoration and president of Noblesville Fifty Club from 2010 to 2017, has set up the Deputy Pickett Memorial Fund to help the fallen officer's family. Peck is also working to help establish a Fifty Club for Boone County.

"We have two objectives," Peck explained. "One is to receive money for Deputy Pickett's familv: to relieve Sheriff Nielsen of that burden. He has to lay to rest his deputy, so we need to take that burden off of him – collect the money and distribute that to his family at the time and place that's appropriate."

Peck has helped set

up an account at Key Bank called the Fifty Club of Boone County. People wishing to make contributions to the memorial fund can make checks payable to "Fifty Club of Boone

Co." or "Deputy Pickett Memorial Fund." According to Peck, you can take money to any KeyBank in Indiana or you can leave it at the Boone County Sheriff's office.

"Our second objective is to establish this same type of club in Boone County," Peck said. "While Indianapolis has had a club for 60 years and Noblesville for almost 50, Boone County has never had a Fifty Club."

Peck was kind enough to give The Reporter a bit of history on the Fifty Club.

"The Hamilton County Fifty Club was started in 1969 by 10 Noblesville businessmen," Peck told The Reporter. "Our bylaws are pretty specific. It was originally set up to provide a 'line of duty death benefit' to Hamilton County sheriff's deputies, Noblesville policemen, Noblesville firemen and state troopers patrolling Hamilton County. Back in the 50s was when the Indianapolis Hundred Club was formed and into the 60s there

"We've always had two golf outings a year," Peck explained. "It's not a traditional golf outing. It's just that two firemen or policemen play with two business people, so you get to know the guys. We don't have tee sponsors or try to raise money. We always have a big dinner after at the Moose Lodge where there are 100 or 150 guys in the room and we're just cutting up and having a good time. In recent years we've added sport shooting. Cabela's has always been a great sponsor of that."

Checks payable to "Fifty Club of Boone Co." or "Deputy Pickett Memorial Fund" may be taken to any KeyBank in Indiana or to the Boone Co. Sheriff's Department. You can also mail a check to 2 N. 9th St., Noblesville, IN 46060. Peck noted that 100 percent of the money collected will go to Deputy Pickett's family.

County budget order, final tax rates approved

The Department of Local Government Finance (DLGF) certified Hamilton County's 2018 budget order and tax rates on Feb. 14, paving the way for ontime property tax bills. The budget certification puts the county in a position to have taxes due on Thursday. May 10.

"The certification of the budget order allows local governments to better plan for their operations for 2018 based on the approved budget and anticipated revenue figures. In addition, the certification of the budget order and tax rates sets the stage for on-time property tax bills, which is important for the predictable administration of the property tax system," DLGF Commissioner Wesley R. Bennett said. "A tremendous amount of collaboration between local and state officials is required to ensure property tax bills go out on time, and it is rewarding to see all the efforts pay off."


The first step in the assessment to tax billing process is the completion of the property assessments, which culminates with the submission of a ratio study. A ratio study is a compari-

son between property sales prices and assessed values in the county to ensure that market values are being used to determine assessed values. Typically, these should be submitted to the state by March 1 and approved shortly thereafter in the year prior to tax billing. Hamilton County's ratio study was submitted on March 9, 2017.

Once the DLGF approves the ratio study, the assessor sends the gross assessed values to the county auditor, who applies exemptions, deductions, or abatements to determine the net assessed values the values upon which tax rates are based. That information was statutorily due to the DLGF by Aug. 1, 2017. Hamilton County's certified net assessed values were submitted on Aug. 10, 2017.

Now that the 2018 budget has been certified by the DLGF, the next steps are handled at the county level. The county auditor is to calculate tax bills, which the county treasurer should mail to taxpayers no later than Friday, April 13.

As a child I was taught not only the words, but what they mean. Most of all I was taught about

A few weeks ago I sat there in the second row, behind the family, at the celebration of life for the father of my best friend. I had known James Williams since I was 13 years old. That's when my friend Patrice and I began our best friend journey.

James was a quiet, kind and gentle man. He was a veteran of World War II. He was 94 when his tour of duty on this earth was finished. He was a man who I respected.

As the honor guard marched into the room there was a sacred sound of silence. When the flag was folded and presented to Mrs. Williams, I don't think there was a dry eye in the place.

It got me thinking.

My generation was raised hearing stories of World War II and the Korean War. Men came back wounded and scarred. Some wounds would never be seen but they changed these men in ways that would not always be understood. We respected them.

Then came the Vietnam War. 17.4 years. From the time I was born until the year I started college. The black and white pictures on the nightly news only gave a glimpse of what they endured in a hot jungle filled with what would later be a part of so many nightmares.

I remember cousins and friends fearing the Draft. When their mail would arrive they prayed "the letter" would not be inside. The Draft ended in 1973. I was a junior in high school. The guys my age did not have to register when they turned 18, yet many volunteered.

I am now friends with many Vietnam Veterans. What they have gone through over the years



breaks my heart. It's not just the physical wounds but the mental and emotional wounds. They fought in an unpopular, misunderstood They have felt the

pain of not only the war but the disrespect shown to them when they came home.

The definition of respect is admiring someone that is valuable and important. It is not about politics. It is not about being politically correct. It is not about rights. It is not about wealth or position. It is bringing honor to men and women who believe in "one nation, under God, indivisible, with Liberty and Justice for ALL."

I respect these men and women because they fought for my right of free speech and press.

When I see someone kneeling during the words "O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave" I am passionately angry ... and sad. They don't get it, they just do not get it.

These men and women who served our country don't get it either. Political correctness and "my rights" platforms have broken us. We are as divided as we ever have been. It's as if we are at war with ourselves.

Social media, newspapers, television, politicians, the entertainment industry, they all fight to tell us how and what to think. Anger erupts when we refuse to agree with them. It was reported this week that fake news travels faster than the facts. How do we even begin to sift through the muck of the news and find the truth.

With Spring Break around the corner, parents still have time to sign up their children in kindergarten through sixth grade for Noblesville Parks and Recreation's Spring Break Camp. The parks department is offering full-day, week-long camps in conjunction with Noblesville Schools' Spring Break from March 26 through April 6.

The recreation staff will provide two weeks of games, crafts, nature, laughter and friendship. Campers should pack their lunch, two snacks, a water bottle and wear gym shoes. Campers will have a science project, arts and crafts, and will stay active each day of camp.

"I love our Spring Break Camp options because it really caters to those who do not have travel plans and those that do," said Assistant Recreation Director Lorna Steele. "It is a really great way to switch up a child's schedule, give them something fun and active to do, have them interact with different kids and ultimately, experience new and fun things during Spring Break. The options are very flexible ... we can accommodate you."

Spring Break Camp is 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. March 26-30 and April 2-6 at Forest Park

Lodge. The weekly cost is \$125 for residents (\$155 for nonresidents). A day option is also offered, which is \$30 for residents (\$40 for nonresidents). Before and after care is available each day. What should investors know about recent stock volatility?

have heard, the stock market has been on a wild ride lately. What's behind this volatility? And, as an investor, how concerned should you be?

Let's look at the first question first. What caused the steep drop in stock prices we experienced on a few separate days?

Essentially, two main factors seem to be responsible. First, some good economic news may actually have played a significant role. A 17-year low in unemployment and solid job growth have begun to push wages upward. These developments have led to fears of rising inflation, which, in turn, led to speculation that the Federal Reserve will tighten the money supply at a faster-than-expected rate. Stocks reacted negatively to these expectations of higher interest rates.

The second cause of the market volatility appears to be simply a reaction to the long bull market. While rising stock prices lead many people to continue buying more and more shares, some people actually need to sell their stocks – and this pentup selling demand, combined with short-term profit-taking, helped contribute to the large sell-offs of recent days.

Now, as for the question of how concerned you should be about this volatility, consider these points:

Sell-offs are nothing unusual. We've often experienced big sell-offs, but they've generally been followed with strong recoveries. Of course, past performance is not a guarantee of future results, but history has shown that patient, persistent investors have often been rewarded.

Fundamentals strong. While short-term market movements can be caused by a variety of factors, economic conditions and corporate earnings typically drive performance in the long term. Right now, the U.S. economy is near full employment, consumer and business sentiment has risen strongly, manufacturing and service activity is at multi-year highs, and GDP growth in 2018 appears to be on track for the best performance since 2015. Furthermore, corporate earnings are expected to rise this year.

So, given this background, what's your next move? Here are some suggestions:

Review your situation. You may want to work with a financial professional to evaluate your portfolio to determine if it is helping you make the progress you need to eventually achieve your long-term goals.

Reassess your risk tolerance. If you were unusually upset over the loss in value of your investments during the market pullback, you may need to review your risk tolerance to determine if it's still appropriate for your investment mix. If you feel you are taking on



too much risk, you may need to rebalance your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, "playing that by it safe" and investing heavily in vehicles that offer greater protection of principal, but

little in the way of return, you run the risk of not attaining the growth you need to reach your objectives.

Look for opportunities. A market pullback such as the one we've experienced, which occurs during a period of economic expansion and rising corporate profits, can give long-term investors a chance to add new shares at attractive prices in an environment that may be conducive to a market rally.

A sharp market pullback, such as we've seen recently, will always be big news. But if you look beyond the headlines, you can sometimes see a different picture - and one that may be brighter than you had realized.

Fishers Plan Commission pushes back vote on Geist-area Greenway

After a flurry of public comments from residents on one specific area, Fishers Plan Commission members voted unanimously to postpone a decision on adding Greenway overlay areas in some

Geist neighborhoods. City Planning Department staff assured the residents that language in the Greenway proposal would not require individual land owners with homes in the proposed Greenway to add a walking path along their property lines when improving their property. A total of 13 residents spoke during the public hearing, arguing that the language in the proposal was so vague they feared that installing a walking path on their property could be required if they choose to improve their home or add a barn to their property.

City staff said the language is aimed at requiring subdivision developers to build such walking paths when the development is built-out, in line with the city's long-range comprehensive plan.

Commission members instructed staff in the city's Planning Department to look at language that is more precise in order to ease the concerns of the residents.

The Plan Commission is expected to take the matter up again at its April 11 meeting.





"I'm proud of the way we played today," said Laffer-

man. "I thought we were in some tough spots late in the University coach Brandon Lafferman said it best after second quarter and throughout the whole third quarter, where calls weren't really going our way, shots weren't town Saturday: "It was one of those falling. Our guys just hung around and hung around, kept games that felt like both teams fighting. We got it to the fourth quarter and I thought we did everything we needed to do to win minus one basket."

University fought for the entire game. The 'Blazers trailed 6-2 early in the first, but then went on a 7-0 run to lead 9-6. Flamion and Ethan Sickels made layins, and David Howard drained his first 3-pointer of the game.

University then led 15-12 early in the second period, unfortunately, there can only be one but that's when Morristown made its first big run, scoring eight unanswered points. Langkabel scored six of those points. Still, the Trailblazers hung tough, and a Howard layin kept them within 22-20 at halftime.

University got the Yellow Jackets' lead to one point on The 'Blazers tied the game at 49-49 with 2:40 left after three different occasions in the third quarter, including thanks to a 3-pointer from Josh Watson. But a sudden 7-0 spurt put Morristown ahead 35-27 for what would be the

The Yellow Jackets matched that lead at 37-29, but The Yellow Jackets then led 53-51, but Hodgin struck that's when Howard began to assert himself. During the last half of the third quarter, Howard made three 3-pointers, and that helped the 'Blazers trim Morristown's lead to 42-40 by the end of the period. A '3' by the seemingly unstoppable Langkabel got the Yellow Jackets ahead 47-42 early in the fourth, but that's when University began its last push.

"Once we slowed them down a little bit, started to make baskets, I thought we were going to get it and then 25 (Langkabel) made a tough shot there at the end," said Lafferman.

"We just grinded our way back in it," said Lafferman. "That's what we kept talking about in the third and fourth quarter in the huddles. I'm proud of the guys. They did everything they needed to do."

Howard finished the game with 18 points (including four total 3-pointers), six rebounds and two blocked shots. Hodgin added 13 and Watson scored 10. Flamion totaled six rebounds as well. Langkabel led all scorers with 24 points; Morristown beat Tindley 82-64 to win the regional in the Saturday evening championship game.

As for University, it ended its season at 21-3.

"I think this was the best season we ever had at University High School," said Lafferman. Indeed, there were some significant wins: An undefeated Pioneer Conference championship (the first time the Trailblazers have ever won a conference championship), a victory over defending 1A state champion Tindley, a first-ever win over a 4A school (Pendleton Heights), several weeks on top of the 1A Associated Press poll, and of course, a sectional championship, the first for University in five years.

"We had a great year and our seniors, hats off to them," said Lafferman. "I think they've really set the stage for what the culture and the expectation now is for University basketball. I'm really proud of them."

88-year-old structure later used as Adams Elementary which is currently vacant.

In addition to the housing for moderate income tenants, the school's gymnasium will become a community recreation facility made possible with \$300,000 in county funds. The gym, once the largest in the county, hosted sectional basketball tourneys prior to the mid-1950s and is considered a local historic structure.

HAND also has a small apartment project underway in the Home Place area of Carmel. Located near 106th Street and College Avenue, the 10-unit complex will be completed before the end of the year, according to a release from HAND officials.

The non-profit organization has 96 living units for rent in the county, not counting the Blackhawk Commons and Home Place complexes. HAND was founded in 2003 with the mission of providing affordable housing for


