

Fadness announces Agri Park, 'Fishers First' collaborative education program

Mayor Scott Fadness used his annual State Of The City address to announce two major initiatives, what the mayor describes as quality of life enhancements - one dealing with agricul-

ture, the other a joint educational program called Fishers First.

The city will partner with Conner Prairie and the Hamilton Southeastern School District to create the Fishers First program. This effort is explained as bringing about a world-class educational experience for Fishers students that would combine inno-

vation, collaboration and new experiences.

What is described as "experiential learning" will be at the center of Fishers First. Among the programs envisioned include the geology behind patching potholes to experiencing ecology through already-es-



tablished programs such as Fishers Parks and Recreation's "Nature First," where students of all ages will have the opportunity to work alongside the Conner Prairie, the City of Fishers, and local businesses to deepen their knowledge of standards taught inside the classroom.

Students from Hamilton County schools participated in Wednesday's National School Walkout Day to honor victims of the recent Parkland, Fla., school shootings and to advocate for gun control.

The Noblesville Schools administration reported that approximately 700

students at NHS, 400 at Noblesville East Middle School and 200 at Noblesville West Middle School chose to walkout at 10 a.m. as part of the national initiative. Other NHS students chose to participate by being involved in empathy activities,

discussions and writing. Approximately 400 students at Hamilton Southeastern High School reportedly

left classes to participate in the walkout. At Carmel High School, students walked out of class and into the fieldhouse for 17 minutes, a minute for each of the Parkland shooting victims. Some students carried poster size photos of the Florida shooting victims.

SMC says it plans to keep its current 954 employees and add 92 more within 10 years of the proposed expansion.

SMC seeks tax breaks for new \$67M facility

Noblesville City Council members on Tuesday voted to approve a preliminary resolution that could provide Noblesville based SMC, a maker of technology operated by air or gas pressure, tax breaks to invest \$67 million in a new facility at its U.S. headquarters located near 146th Street and Cumberland Road.

SMC is proposing the addition of a 1 million square-foot building on land SMC owns near

its current headquarters, according to documents filed with the city.

Noblesville's Public Affairs Manager Robert Herrington stated, "SMC is requesting a 10-year declining real property tax phase-in and a 10year 80 percent reduced tax phase-in on personal property."

Noblesville officials indicated the proposed project is a competitive project, meaning SMC

could look to other cities. The project would bring a total new capital investment of \$67 million. To date, SMC has made a capital investment in Noblesville of approximately \$140 million. New investment in Real Property is estimated to be \$49.8 million, along with \$18 million in Personal Property.

The company plans to retain its 954 employees and add about 92 within 10 years as a result of the expansion.

A public hearing on the proposal is set for 7 p.m. on Tuesday, March 27 at Noblesville City Hall, 16 S. 10th St., the documents said.

Richardson honored for 26 years of service in General Assembly

Members of House of Representatives recently honored retiring State Rep. Kathy Kreag Richardson (R-Noblesville) for her 26 years representing District 29.

"Serving Hamilton County in the House of Representatives for 26 years has been an honor and privilege," Richardson said. "Choosing to retire from this position was a difficult decision, but I look forward to pursuing other opportunities in the community. Being a state lawmaker has been such a significant part of who I am, and I have many great memories and lasting friendships that I can hold dear in the next chapter of my life."

Richardson will continue her term in office until the Nov. 6 election.

As the House Majority Caucus chair, Richardson leads meetings and provides guidance to fellow members and staff. She is also an Indiana Legislative Council member who helps oversee nonpartisan

legislative staff. She serves as chair and vice chair of numerous committees, including



the House Committee on Elections and Apportionment, the House Committee on Ethics, the House Committee on Courts and Criminal Code, the House Committee on Judiciary and the House Committee on Local Government. Richardson helped lead efforts to establish online voter registrations and vote centers throughout the state.

"Kathy is a true public servant who places the needs of Hoosiers and the integrity of the institution above all else," said House Speaker Brian Bosma (R-Indianapolis). "We have served alongside one another for over 20 years, and she is an invaluable member of our team who always shows great leadership and heart. Kathy was also the first female elected to a caucus leadership position in our state's history. Her experience on the local level, especially with elections, has helped expand the use of vote centers, centralize the counting of absentee

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



Culvert replacements on State Road 32

The Indiana Department of Transportation's contractor Calumet Civil Contractors will begin closing State Road 32 from State Road 38 to State Road

9 on or after March 19 for up to 45 days to replace two drainage culverts.

One culvert is located 3.5 miles east of State Road 38 between Durbin Road and Prairie Baptist Road in Hamilton County. The other culvert is located 2.8 miles east of State Road 13 between Madison County Roads 800 and 725 West.

During the closures, a signed detour will direct highway traffic around construction via State Road 38, Interstate 69 and State Road 9.

All work on the projects is expected to be complete by November 2018.

Fundraiser launched to support Noblesville **Youth Assistance**

Noblesville Youth Assistance Program is reaching out for help in a way the organization never has before. From now through the end of March, NYAP is launching its first ever fundraising campaign. Its first ask? The local business community.

"Noblesville area businesses can have a direct impact on improving the lives of youth who are facing some of life's greatest challenges," said Matt Nelis, president of the NYAP board of directors. "Our supporters can give hope and encouragement to those in our community who need just a little extra to truly thrive – and funding these critical programs is the key to making this happen."

The Noblesville Youth Assistance Program's daily mission is to advocate for at-risk kids ages 3-17 with a holistic approach tapping into all the area's resources. NYAP coordinates these resources to provide food and clothing, one-on-one tutoring and mentoring as well as camp and other recreational opportunities.

NYAP currently supports 140 students. In 2017, NYAP served 8,000 meals during the summer months in a partnership with Hamilton County Food Bank, provided one-on-one tutoring and mentoring for 105 students and offered summer camp opportunities to 48 students. Its two fulltime staff members want to reach more students as the need has grown beyond NYAP's current funding through Hamilton County, the City of Noblesville and other charitable providers.

"Despite the image of affluence of Hamilton County, the need here is very real," said Tricia Akers, executive director of the Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program, the umbrella organization that oversees all six of its chapters. "Thanks to our partners, we have been able to provide those things that are not accessible to a great number of our youth. Now we want to reach even more kids in need, and we're asking the business community to step up and help."

Donors at all amounts are encouraged to give. Sponsors who donate to NYAP at the \$1,000, \$5,000 or \$10,000 level will be recognized on social media and at the Noblesville Schools Shining Stars event to be held May 2 at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds. This annual event honors a student from each of the ten schools from elementary through high school.

Hamilton County just celebrated its 32nd Ag Day. Around 2,300 second graders and their teachers visited 11 educational displays including agricultural products and live animals on Monday through today at the Hamilton Coun-Fairgrounds 4-H in Noblesville.

Displays included information on corn, soybeans, wheat, beekeeping, soil and water conservation, robots in agriculture and more. Animal production and animal by-products were explained with the use of beef, goats, horses, llamas, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. More than 140 volunteers helped make presentations to the students and got them involved in hands-on activities.

The Agriculture Council of America will host National Ag Day on Tuesday, March 20. This will mark the 45th anniversary of National Ag Day, which is celebrated in classrooms and communities across the country. The National Ag Day program encourages every American to understand how food and fiber products are produced, appreciate the role agriculture plays in and affordable products, value the essential role of agriculture in maintaining a strong economy and acknowledge and consider career opportunities in the agriculture, food and fiber industry.

Everyone knows that food and fiber don't just arrive at the grocery or clothing store or magically appear on the dinner table or in the closet. There is an entire industry dedicated to providing plentiful and safe food for consumption as well as a wide range of comfortable, fashionable clothing choices. People rely on agriculture for the very necessities of life. 
Maggie Hampton is another senior; she brings back 10 runs from last year. Also back for her senior year is Cheney Gertz, who hit .250 as a junior.


