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HAND awarded \$7,500 grant for needs assessment

HAND Inc. has been awarded a \$7,500 grant from the Duke Energy Foundation to update the Hamilton County Housing Needs Assessment, a data-driven analysis of the state of housing in the county.

Last completed in 2013, the report is required of communities that receive federal Community Development Block Grant funding in order to determine local needs. The Legacy Fund and Noblesville Housing Authority also are financially supporting the twice-a-decade update.

This spring, HAND will solicit proposals from consultants interested in completing the comprehensive report, which will evaluate broad indicators of community well-being in addition to quantifying housing demand, supply and affordability.

"Adequate and affordable housing is so important to maintaining and im-

proving the quality of life for any community," said Mark LaBarr, Duke Energy community relations manager for Hamilton County. "We're pleased to support this updated housing assessment that will help make Hamilton County an even more welcoming community for current and new residents."

Results of the 2018 assessment are expected to be released at HAND's annual housing conference, scheduled for Sept. 21. The findings will inform HAND's community-development activities, and other local not-for-profits also use the data to ensure they are addressing community needs.

Founded in 2003, HAND addresses the housing needs of low- and moderate-income individuals, families and senior citizens in Indianapolis' suburbs. Its mission is to be a leader in promoting prosperity and diversity by providing quality housing

HAND owns six apartment communities that offer a total of 96 affordable

units in Hamilton County; 10 additional units are under construction along 106th Street in Carmel.

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
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

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Chrysler issues recall on certain Ram trucks

Fiat Chrysler is recalling more than 300,000 older Ram pickup trucks worldwide because the fuel tanks can sag.

The recall mainly affects trucks in cold-weather states and Canada where salt is used to clear snow

from roads.

It includes Ram 1500 pickups from the 2009 through 2012 model years. In the U.S. the trucks are in 20 states and Washington, D.C.

The company says an investigation found a bracket can corrode and let the tanks sag. The remaining structure will

stop the tanks from falling. Fiat Chrysler says it's not aware of any crashes, fires, leaks or injuries due to the problem.

Dealers will reinforce the bracket. Owners will be told when to schedule service. Anyone who notices a hanging strap or lower tank should contact their dealer.

Valpo's Kiser named MVC Honorable Mention Scholar Athlete

Noblesville graduate and Valparaiso University sophomore John Kiser was recently named as an Honorable Mention Scholar Athlete by the Missouri Valley Conference.

To be eligible, a student athlete must be a starter or important reserve with sophomore athletic/academic standings and at least a 3.20 cumulative grade-point average. Kiser maintains a 3.49 cumulative GPA as a mechanical engineering major at Valparaiso.

"The memories inspired by these chairs are endless, and they are a great conversation piece and keepsake for IMS fans and race fans everywhere, especially as we approach the magical Month of May."

Race Day ticket holders for any IMS event in 2018 will receive a \$10 discount on either chair option if they purchase the chair using the same IMS account with which they bought Race Day tickets.

Metal folding chairs were used in the B Penthouse and in the B Stand until 2015, replaced by aluminum bench seats during the Project 100 renovation program of the facility, which opened in 1909.
