New sign installed at MacGregor Park in Washington Township

Westfield Washington Township Trustee Danielle Carey Tolan announced today the completion of new signage after the 15-acre reforestation wetland project at the township's MacGregor Park. This year-long project was completed this month and signage has been installed and on display.

This project and signage was a priority for Township Trustee Danielle Carey Tolan this year. "I am thrilled to finally see the signage being installed and I encourage our community to visit MacGregor to learn about the amazing reforestation wetland project," says Danielle Carey Tolan. "Since the expansion of MacGregor Park in both 2007 and 2012, this much-needed enhancement has been in the works."

As part of the project, more than 50 new directional and interpretive signs were installed throughout MacGregor Park, providing visitors with maps, information and educational material about park history and ecology. Carmel, state at odds over new law regarding short-term rentals

Drive through Carmel and you might pass a short-term rental such as HomeAway, VRBO or Airbnb.

David McGuire, who was walking in Downtown Carmel on Wednesday, said, "I have friends that rented out their homes, made pretty good money and never had any complaints."

But, there apparently were some complaints coming to Carmel City Council member Jeff Worrell.

Worrell, who represents the city's southeast district, said, "I know in my district, I had several situations where people were renting out their home for a weekend, for a bachelor party or wedding parties. There were people coming and going. It was causing problems, so we had to address it."

That's why city leaders passed an ordinance in January that puts rules on those short-term rentals outside of certain dates.

Worrell said, "So, there's some oversight, some permitting that occurs, giving their neighbors the opportunity to express concerns."

Now, state government is involved. Recently, Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb signed a bill into law that basically says, as an owner, you can rent your primary home on a short-term rental platform.

Jill Hudson, who was in Downtown Carmel on Wednesday, said, "I think that's absolutely correct."

David McGuire added, "If people want to rent out their home, they should be able to."

Carmel city leaders disagree with the new state law.

Strawtown Koteewi Park bridges project receives second recognition

The effort to rescue, renovate and reuse two Hoosier historic bridges has received a second award in as many months. The Great Lakes Park Training Institute has recognized Hamilton County Parks and Recreation with their Outstanding Facility Award for its vision and tenacity that culminated in the placement of a dramatic pedestrian span over the White River in Hamilton County. Previously, the park department was presented the Indiana Park and Recreation Association's Excellence in Landscape Design award for the project.

Two metal truss bridges from Washington and Wayne counties, slated for demolition, were saved and restored as part of the undertaking. They were joined by a re-created bridge from Hamilton County, adding to the span's historic significance. The three-section span now connects White River Campground to Strawtown Koteewi Park, allowing for pedestrian-only safe passage from the campground to

More than \$160M going to rural communities for infrastructure . . .

Westfield to receive \$1.3M for intersection improvement

The Indiana Department of Transportation announced recently that \$161.2 million in federal transportation funding is being awarded to 66 cities, towns and counties in rural portions of Indiana to invest in local road and bridge improvements as well as sidewalk and trail projects. Combined with local funds, approximately \$212 million is being invested in infrastructure in communities receiving funds. Locally, Westfield is the only Hamilton County community to receive funding. Westfield will receive \$1,312,000 for improvements to the 151st Street and Towne Road intersection.

Types of projects receiving funds include 27 bridge rehabilitation/replacement projects; 31 resurfacing/reconstruction projects; 17 Transportation Alternative

Program (TAP) projects that include work such as sidewalks, ADA ramps and trails, and six traffic safety projects.

"Indiana is investing in transportation at record levels and that includes more than just our highways," INDOT Commissioner Joe McGuinness said. "Our sustained commitment to modernizing local roads and bridges, adding sidewalks and growing our trail networks sends a clear message that we're building communities that are primed to attract and retain talent and spur job growth in the 21st century economy."

For this latest round of funding, rural communities will design, develop and purchase land for projects that would be bid during the fiscal year beginning July 2021.

While the funds awarded now are dedicated to construction, INDOT will be financially participating in design, engineering and right of way acquisition components of these projects.

INDOT dedicates approximately 25 percent of its federal highway funds to supporting local projects each year. Metropolitan Planning Organizations distribute those funds to cities, towns and counties within the state's larger urbanized areas while INDOT distributes funds outside MPO areas. Communities must pay at least 20 percent in local matching funds and meet other federal requirements to receive federal funding.

Rural communities were invited to submit project applications to INDOT for potential funding during a call for projects announced in October 2017.

Noblesville High School wins regional Envirothon competition

Despite being in its first year of participation, Noblesville High School won first place in the Central Region Envirothon Competition. Now NHS has its eye on the State Envirothon Competition on Wednesday, April 25 with the opportunity to win and represent Indiana at the North American Envirothon this summer. The Envirothon is a fun and exciting way for high school students, homeschoolers, 4-H'ers, Scouts, Green Club members and FFA members in grades 9-12 to learn about the natural world around us and compete against other teams with the knowledge gained.

Central Indiana historically has not had a close Regional Envirothon contests available to students. Organized by the Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation with their mission to provide leadership in natural resources conservation, high school students from Central Indiana now have a venue to learn and test their knowledge on high quality conservation subject.

"It is important that our youth understand that conservation of natural resources includes the responsible use of resources from forests to soils. We want to encourage students interested in natural resources to see what is involved with these subjects, what types of careers are available, and what it means to be involved in conservation," states Ginger Davis, Conservation Administrator with Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD)

Worrell said, "One law by the state of Indiana for all municipalities in the state seems to me to be an overreach and definitely we view that as a trampling on home rule."

The council member added, "In this case, this law, I think is bad law because it takes away local ability to manage that and to understand the needs of residents."

So what happens to Carmel's ordinance?

Worrell said the city's legal team advised them

the city should be grandfathered into the new state law because of when and how the ordinance was passed. The city is operating under the assumption that it will be grandfathered in.

Ian Harley, who owns a home in Carmel and has it listed on Airbnb said Wednesday, "Owning a townhome in Carmel and using AirBNB allows me to have a civilized place to live while I work in my business employing 10. I can travel home to see my family at weekends or oc-

asionally they join me in Carmel. I strongly object to local rules restricting short term rentals. I also enjoy using AirBNB when I travel with my family. It is great to be part of a local community rather than a "tourist" in a hotel and seems like a good way to share the resources of a city."

The author of the new law was State Rep. Matt Lehman, a Republican from Berne. He did not respond to a request for comment.

This first competition in this area brought seven teams from the region. The teams included schools that have competed before at other regions, like Zionsville High School and Pike High School, along with newcomers like Noblesville High School and Delta High School from Delaware County. The full day event kicked off with some inspiring presentations from experts in their field. The students had an opportunity to ask tough questions to help them fully understand the subjects they were tested on during the competition. The competition began after the students fueled up on lunch. The teams were tested on their knowledge of forestry, wildlife, soils and land use, aquatic ecology, and this year's current issue: Pasture management. No-

blesville High School Team placed first with 66 points. Pike High School Team One placed second with 60 points, and Zionsville High School Team Armadillos placed third with 57 points.

"The Envirothon competition was a wonderful hands-on learning experience in environmental issues. The knowledge gained from the experts was invaluable. We are excited and thankful to be representing Noblesville High School and the Central Indiana Region at the state competition in April," shared Alexandra Brownell, Noblesville High School Envirothon Coach and AP Environmental Science Teacher.

Darci Zolman, Indiana Envirothon President added, "The students should be very proud of their accomplishments. The Envirothon competition is a tough com-

petition and tests a high level of understanding for each of the subject areas."

Hamilton County SWCD coordinated this event with the help of surrounding county SWCDs and public-private partnerships. Sponsors helped make the day a success by providing speakers, funding, or food to support the event and students. 

- **Wednesday Concerts on the Central Green** presented by Meyer Najem from noon to 1 p.m. from May 9 to Sept. 26.


- **Friday AMP After Dark** concert series taking place from 9 to 11 p.m. from June 8 to Sept. 1.

Whitney Houston tribute will complete Symphony on the Prairie season lineup

The Lease will have a term of twenty-two (22) years with a maximum annual Lease rental of \$2,150,000. As required by Indiana Code 6-1.1-20-3.1(b)(1), the following information was available to the public at the public hearings on the preliminary determination: (i) the School Corporation's current and projected annual debt service payments divided by the net assessed value of taxable property within the School Corporation, which is 0.6677%; and (ii) the sum of the School Corporation's outstanding long term debt plus the outstanding long term debt of other taxing units that include any other territory of the School Corporation divided by the net assessed value of taxable property within the School Corporation, which is 6.63%.

The School Corporation's current debt service levy is \$20,790,894 and the current rate is \$0.6677. After the School Corporation enters into the proposed Lease and the bonds are issued, the debt service levy will increase by a maximum of \$2,150,000 and the debt service rate will increase by a maximum of \$0.0728. However, as existing obligations mature, the anticipated net increase to the debt service fund tax rate will be \$0.00.

The estimated amount of the School Corporation's debt service levy and rate that will result during the following 10 years if the School Corporation enters into the lease and issues the bonds, after considering any changes that will occur to the debt service levy and rate during that period on account of any outstanding bonds or lease obligations that will mature or terminate during that period:


This construction is

Keep campaign signs out of rights-of-way

The REPORTER

As primary elections approach, the Indiana Department of Transportation reminds Hoosiers that campaign signs are prohibited from state right-of-way according to Indiana Code 9-21-4-6. INDOT personnel are required by state law to remove all unauthorized signs within the state right-of-way.

Areas that should remain sign-free include:

- Intersections
- Interchanges
- Rights-of-way that run parallel to highways

Where the right-of-way is not clearly marked, boundaries may be estimated as the fence line, the back of the ditch or behind utility poles.

INDOT personnel will remove campaign signs and other illegal signs from right-of-way – pursuant to code – as they are encountered in normal highway maintenance activities. Crews may also remove a specific sign if it presents an immediate safety risk, such as being too close to the roadway or creating a sight obstruction. Campaign signs placed off the right-of-way will not be removed.

Removed signs will be taken to the nearest INDOT facility. Campaign signs may be claimed by the owner between 7:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for holidays.

INDOT urges drivers to slow down and stay alert near crews.

Boys track and field

Carmel edges HSE in dual meet

The Carmel and Hamilton Southeastern boys track and field teams got together for a dual meet Wednesday night at Carmel Stadium.

The Greyhounds, three-time defending state champions, won the dual 73-59. Despite the cool and occasionally misty conditions, Carmel coach Ken Browner was happy to get his team competing outdoors for the first time this season.

"I thought we had a good day," said Browner. "We were excited to finally get on the track. We've been running indoors for quite a while. With the number of kids we have out on this team, we needed to evaluate a number of athletes. And I liked what I saw today out of our young kids and some of our older kids who finally got to run some different races. So I'm excited where we're at, at this point."

The 'Hounds won nine of the 16 events, including a pair of 1-2-3 sweeps. Keelan Grant led the way in the 800 run, with Ben Miller and Colin Murphy right behind him. In the 3200 run, freshman Hudson Alden placed first, followed by Ben Myers and Murphy finishing within a second of each other.

Other track winners were Trey Harris in the 400 dash, Jakob Pearson in the 300 hurdles and the 4x800 and 4x400 relay teams. In the field, Alex Audia took first in the pole vault, with Vance Roudebush winning the discus and Graham Hatfield placing first in the shot put after a runner-up finish in the discus.

The Royals were led by Noah Malone, who won two events, the 100 and 200 dashes. Madison Norris started the meet with a victory in the 100 hurdles, while Grant Wilson paced the 1600. Southeastern also won the 4x100 relay.

Chaz Birchfield took first in the high jump, while Chase Maxey won the long jump.

"Carmel always does a great job running the meet," said HSE coach John Albrecht. "They're a great host and we enjoy coming here, especially because, even this early in the season, it gives our higher-end athletes some great experience in what's going to be our county meet and our sectional."

Both teams are off for Spring Break. Carmel is back in action April 12 at North Central for a dual meet. The Royals will run a junior varsity meet at Fishers that same day, with the varsity traveling to Franklin Central on April 13 for the annual Flashes Showcase.

The 'Hounds also swept the long jump, with Ellie Clark winning and Molly Kracht and Jasmine Middleton tying for second. Reagan Hune led a 1-2 finish in the 100 dash with Carly Markley second, and Carmel also went 1-2 in the 1600 run; Maddie Dalton won and Lindsey Roper was second.
