\$13.5 million project designed to alleviate overcrowding . . .

Groundbreaking for jail expansion set

The REPORTER

Hamilton County will break ground on an expansion of its current jail at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, April 10. The first phase of the \$13.5 million project will add 120 beds, but some are fearful that may not be enough.

"We're bursting at the seams," says Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. "The jail was built 25 years ago to hold 296 inmates. We're currently pushing 400 insituation to get worse before it gets better."

A change in state law back in 2016 added to the County's woes. House Bill 1006 requires lower-level felons to serve their terms in county jails rather than state prisons.

"We've tried everything," County Commissioner Steve Dillinger admits. "We even moved the female inmates from

Cook's bill increasing transparency in adoption, foster care systems ceremonially signed into law

Gov. Eric Holcomb ceremonially signed legislation co-authored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) into law Tuesday increasing transparency for prospective adoptive and foster parents.

According to Cook, this new law requires adop-

tion agencies to provide prospective adoptive and foster parents with a report containing contact information of agency employees. Cook said he hopes this report will provide applicants multiple avenues to voice concerns, ask questions and receive feedback during the adoption or fostering process.

"All children deserve to grow up in a safe and loving place to call home," Cook said. "Ensuring those looking to adopt or foster a child are fully informed and can voice their questions or concerns can help encourage more Hoosiers to welcome a child in need

to their home."

The initial phase of the jail expansion will feature 11 cell pods with 84 prefabricated steel cells consisting of two- and fourman cells. The expansion

will also include an interior recreation area, classroom and medical support area. A second phase of the project could add an additional 136 beds. County Commissioners are hopeful that part of the expansion can still be completed this year, but are waiting for additional funds.

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

Should you make extra mortgage payments or boost your investments?

Every month, you pay your mortgage. And, depending your stances, you may be able to afford to put in additional payments perhaps sizable ones. But should

circum-

you? Or, if you really have the extra money, should you invest it?

Initially, you might think it would be quite nice to rid yourself of that mortgage sooner, rather than later. But is it really the burden it seems?

Actually, you get some real benefits from a mort-

gage. It certainly provides something of great value to you - your home. If you got your mortgage - or refinanced your home - within the past decade or

so, you are borrowing money at a pretty favorable interest rate, by historical standards. And even assuming a mild rate of inflation, such as we've had for the past several years, you'll essentially be paying off your mortgage with cheaper and cheaper dollars over time. Plus, your interest payments may well be tax deductible. (The new tax laws limit deductions on new mortgages of \$750,000 or more. For questions on your specific situation, consult your tax professional.)


So, given these advantages, an argument could be made that you should be in no hurry to pay off your mortgage. Still, you might be tempted to make the extra payments because you'll be building home equity. After all, isn't this equity valuable? It is - to a degree. The larger your home equity, the more money you'll get to keep when you eventually sell your home.

But in the meantime, that home equity may be less useful than you might imagine. For one thing, just building more equity won't make your home more valuable - it will rise (or fall) in value along with whatever's happening in the housing market. By contrast, you could take the extra money and buy more shares in an investment such as stocks - and the more shares you own, the more valuable your investment will be if the price per share rises.

Also, if you were to experience a temporary job loss or some other financial emergency, your home equity might not help you much; if you're not working, you could even have trouble getting a home equity loan. Conversely, your investment portfolio can offer you greater liquidity, depending on your specific investments. Most investment vehicles, such as stocks and bonds, generally can be sold quickly, without much difficulty. (Keep in mind, though, that if you were forced to sell investments when their price was down, you could take a loss on the sale.)

Clearly, you could gain some advantages by using any extra money to invest, rather than paying down your mortgage. Nonetheless, you may simply get emotional and psychological satisfaction by speeding your progress toward the day when your house is paid off – and that type of satisfaction certainly has value. You'll need to weigh these intangible factors carefully in deciding whether to increase your investments or make extra mortgage payments - because, ultimately, you need to feel that you're doing the right thing, for the right reasons.


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INDOT offers 'Local Trax' grants for railroad safety

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) recently announced the agency will make available at least \$125 million for high-priority railroad safety projects on local roads statewide through the agency's new "Local Trax" matching grant program.

Local Trax provides state matching funds for Indiana cities, towns and counties interested in pursuing high-priority railroad grade separations, crossing closures and other safety enhancements at railroad intersections with local roads.

"Much like Community Crossings, Local Trax is an innovative approach to infrastructure funding that creates a partnership between the state and communities willing to put skin in the game toward improving their local roads," Governor Eric. J Holcomb said. "Eliminating at-grade rail crossings on local roads makes our transportation network safer, reduces congestion, and better connects our communities."

INDOT will begin accepting project proposals from local agencies in May. The application window will stay open until Aug. 31 with the awarding funds expected to be announced requires local governments to provide only 20 percent of funding for land acquisition and construction with the state providing the other 80 percent.

"Thanks to Governor Holcomb's Next Level Roads plan and the support of state lawmakers, Indiana is able to invest in infrastructure, both highways and local roads, at levels not seen before in our state's history," INDOT Commissioner Joe Mc-Guinness said. "Local Trax will direct needed funds to high priority local rail projects, enhancing mobility and livability in our communities."

The goal of Local Trax is to encourage partnership between the state, local governments, private businesses and railroads to increase safety, improve mobility and enhance the quality of life for Hoosiers.

"The railroad industry is pleased to collaborate with state and local governments on this very important issue," commented Kristin Bevil, President of the Indiana Railway Coalition. "This unique program furthers efforts to improve safety at railroad crossings, a matter the railroads take very seriously."

Funding authorization for Local Trax was grant-


in late summer. Local Trax ed in HEA 1002-2017, the long-term, sustainable road funding plan passed by the Indiana General Assembly and signed by Governor Holcomb in April 2017.



CONTROLLED BY HAMILTON COUNTY, INDIANA
Notice is given that the Board of Commissioners of Hamilton County on the 3rd day of April, 2018, adopted Ordinance No. 04-03-18-A ("the Sign Ordinance"). The purpose of the Sign Ordinance is to prohibit the placement of all private signs within the public right of way contiguous to public streets, roads and bridges which are maintained by Hamilton County, Indiana.

The Sign Ordinance further provides a definition of Hamilton County Streets, as well as Hamilton County Right of Way. Under the Sign Ordinance any sign placed or maintained in Hamilton County Right of Way or on other land owned by Hamilton County may be removed and collected by the County Signs are prohibited in Hamilton County Right of Way which is defined in the Sign Ordinance as a minimum of twenty (20) feet from the center of any road in the unincorporated part of the County plus additional area for some County roads containing sidewalks, multi-use paths, ditches, directional signs and other improvements normally included in public rights of way. Questions concerning the width of Hamilton County Right of Way in specific locations can be addressed by calling the Hamilton County Highway Department at 317-773-7770 or by emailing questions to county.highway@hamiltoncounty.in.gov. The Sign Ordinance provides that signs placed in violation of the Sign Ordinance may be removed and held by designated employees of Hamilton County. The Sign Ordinance provides that the designated representative may retrieve signs collected by representatives of the County by paying a fee of Five Dollars (\$5) per sign for signs less than six (6) square feet and Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) for signs exceeding six (6) square feet. The signs may be retrieved at the Office of the Hamilton County Highway Department during normal business hours.

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


