# New Babyland sign highlights latest of several renovations at Noblesville's Riverside Cemetery

In the past year, several Noblesville departments have worked together to renovate Riverside Cemetery. Located in Downtown Noblesville along the banks of the White River, the earliest known burial marker at Riverside Cemetery is dated 1824. The cemetery, which is available to all regardless of race, creed or ethnic heritage, is maintained by the Noblesville Street Department and overseen by the City Clerk and Board of Works.

"An important function of the city is the preservation of Noblesville's history, and with the help of many people, we are making good progress at Riverside Cemetery," Noblesville Clerk Evelyn Lees said.

In the fall, work was done to distinguish Babyland's portion of the cemetery. Babyland was established and used in the 1950s, '60s and '70s.

# Hamilton County primary election early voting update

Hamilton County Elections Administrator Kathy Richardson reported eight days into early voting a total of 710 county residents have cast their ballots.

This year's numbers nearly double the number of early votes during the same time frame in 2014's off-year primary election. A total of 359 county residents voted in the first eight days of the 2014 Primary.

Richardson reported the county has

Nineteen infants are buried there; however, only six graves are marked. A new metal sign was designed and created by Rick Heflin of RC Metalworks in Downtown Noblesville to incorporate the names and years of those burials located in Babyland.

"Fewer and fewer people knew the boundaries, so we felt it was important to mark off the area," Lees said.

At the same time as work on Babyland took place, the chain link fence on a portion of the cemetery's southern boundary was replaced with the same black metal fencing used at the east and north

sides. As funding becomes available, the long-term goal is to replace the remaining chain link fence so the entire border has the same fencing.

Two State Heritage Cemetery signs have been installed, one at each entrance to the cemetery. The third sign will be installed just outside the north side of the cemetery at the Riverwalk trailhead.

For the past two years, GIS undertook the daunting project of mapping the entire cemetery, which included probing the graves to check accuracy. As work moved into the older parts of the cemetery, it was discovered that sev-

eral headstones had fallen down and over time become covered with sod.

"More than 50 headstones were uncovered, which the street department will reset," said Lees. "GIS entry of most of the cemetery is completed, with only the oldest part remaining. When the project is finished, anyone will be able to go to our website, click on a grave, and see information about the deceased and a picture of the headstone."

Lees said the next project will be preservation and restoration of the markers, which the city is researching.

with his private sector work.

The council also approved an economic incentive package for Flexware, a company already located in Fishers, to build a new headquarters building on the northwest end of the municipal complex, behind the Amphitheater. Councilman DeReamer questioned why the tax abatement is front-loaded with the largest part of the incentive in the early years. DeReamer voted no on the economic development package, and Council Members Pete Peterson and John Weingardt abstained from voting due to possible conflicts of interest tied to their private sector work.

Council members also approved an economic development package for Thyssenkrupp, an industrial firm that plans to create a

number of high-paying positions in Fishers.

At the public comment period at the end of the meeting, former Fishers Town Council Member Mike Colby expressed concern about the bad conditions on privately owned streets near commercial areas in the neighborhoods close to 116th Street and Allisonville Road. Mayor Scott Fadness replied that the legal issues surrounding this issue are complex and the city is working on holding the private parties responsible for maintaining those streets. The mayor added that he would not allow private roads in such commercial areas again, instead keeping those roads under the city's jurisdiction. Fadness described the situation as a "sin of the past."

## Rain barrel pre-order deadline extended

### The REPORTER

The deadline to pre-order rain barrels from the Hamilton County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) has been extended to Tuesday, May 8. Pre-ordering your barrels allows you to choose between terra cotta, black and grey coloring. All barrels are approximately 55-gallon recycling/repurposed barrels.

Rain barrels are installed next to downspouts on your home and capture part of the rainwater from your roof. The water is held in the barrel allowing you to reuse the water for watering plants, washing the car and other non-potable uses. Rain barrels provide water for use during dry periods, reduce stormwater runoff from your property and are a source of free soft water.

Interested individuals can visit [hamiltonswcd.org](http://hamiltonswcd.org)



to place their pre-order until May 8. Rain barrels are \$75 and can be picked up in Noblesville on Friday, May 11. Diverter kits that make installation simple and prevent overflow are available for pre-order for \$25. Rain barrels will be available for sale after May 14 from the SWCD office, but color choice and supplies will be limited.

## Westfield crash results in two deaths

Two people were killed in a crash in Westfield Thursday morning.

According to police at the scene, the accident involving a sedan and SUV, occurred just before 9 a.m. near the intersec-

# Retired Sheriff Dan Stevens endorses Captain Quakenbush

Dear Editor,  
The elected sheriff assumes three core job duties when taking office:

1. Provide law enforcement protection for the unincorporated population of the county and assist, when needed, those municipal and town police departments protecting the incorporated population.

2. Operate and maintain the County Jail and Juvenile Detention Center.

3. Serve and protect the seven state courts housed in the Government and Judicial Center.

The sheriff's operating budget is \$17.3 million which includes 216 personnel and a fleet of over 100 vehicles. The staff consists of 61 sworn police officers, 131 staff assigned to the corrections operation and 24 civilian staff. The next sheriff will face many challenges:

• Continue to work with the state and local police departments to address the opioid crisis in our com-

munity.  
• Define an operational program for an expanding jail population impacted by substance abuse and mental health issues.

• Evaluate the most effective strategy for protecting the shrinking unincorporated.



# Noblesville's insurance rating upgraded to Class 3

The Noblesville Fire Department is pleased to announce that Noblesville's Insurance Service Office (ISO) rating will be upgraded from Class 4 to Class 3, effective July 1. The city's upgraded rating was awarded by ISO Mitigation, a national organization that collects, analyzes, and provides information for insurance underwriters.

A higher ISO number may result in lower insurance rates for some city residents and businesses. Noblesville's improved rat-

ing was based on the several criteria including the city's ability to respond to fire calls, the fire department's first alarm response and the community's ability to supply water.

"Through the Public Protection Classification (PPC) program, ISO evaluates municipal fire protection efforts in communities throughout the United States," according to information from ISO Mitigation. "A community's investment in fire mitigation is a proven and reliable predictor of future

fire losses. Some insurance companies use PPC information to help establish fair premiums for fire insurance - generally offering lower premiums in communities with better protection."

For many years, ISO has used statistical information to assess risk. ISO uses a 1-10 scale with a 1 being the best possible score. Of the 46,042 fire departments rated in 2017, only 4,974 scored in the top three classes. This new rating puts Noblesville in the top 10.8 percent of all communities rated last year.

# Sprinklers save Noblesville apartment building from fire

Shortly before 6 a.m. on Wednesday, April 18, the Noblesville Fire Department (NFD) was dispatched on a reported apartment fire at The Flats at 146.

The first units on scene encountered a three-story apartment building with no smoke or flames seen from the exterior. When crews arrived, the residents of the 16-unit building were evacuating as the alarms sounded. Crews made their way to the second floor apartment and found the

remnants of a kitchen fire that had been extinguished by the apartment's sprinkler system. The occupant reported that he attempted to put out the fire with an extinguisher but was unsuccessful.

Noblesville Fire Marshal Darrel Cross stated, "Once again, fire protection systems functioned as designed. The fire sprinkler system controlled the fire with one sprinkler head activated until fire department arrival, and the fire alarm system alerted all occupants of the building

to evacuate. Tenants of the other 15 units in the building were able to reoccupy their apartments within an hour, and there was minimal damage to the affected unit."

This makes the second time in the past five weeks in which sprinklers have been credited with controlling a fire in this apartment complex. The functioning fire protection systems have not only saved property but provided safer conditions for evacuating tenants and responding firefighters.



**Get answers about new Medicare cards**

The Indiana Department of Insurance State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), a free and impartial counseling program, answers Hoosiers' questions about Medicare. Many are asking if it's true that they will be getting new Medicare cards and they want to know why, how and when. The Department provides the following information to help answer those questions.

It is true. Hoosiers who had Medicare before April 2018 will receive a new card with instructions in the mail. Those new to Medicare in April 2018 or later will get the new card when they are enrolled.

The biggest reason the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) are supplying new cards is to remove the Social Security number from the card to keep Hoosiers safe from medical identity theft. CMS began mailing the new cards this month to various states. They plan to mail out the cards to Indiana residents after June. However, everyone in Indiana may not receive their cards at the same time. For those retired from a railroad, the Railroad Retirement Board will mail the new cards.

**Important things to remember**

- Only your Medicare card and number are changing
- Your Medicare benefits stay the same.
- Your Social Security Number stays the same.

- Any enrollments in Medicare Advantage, Part D prescription plans, and Medigap (Supplemental) policies don't change – keep those plan cards. Be sure to destroy your old red, white and blue Medicare card, but don't destroy your plan's card.

- You should start using your new card as soon as you receive it. Beginning Jan. 1, 2020, you can only use the new Medicare card and new number.

**Protect yourself from fraud**

- Do not share your Medicare card with anyone. Treat it like a credit card. Don't carry it unless you need it. Keep it in a safe place.

- Scam artists may try to get personal information by contacting you by phone about your new card. If someone asks you for your information, for money, or threatens to cancel your health benefits if you don't share your personal information, hang up.

- Never give out your Social Security number over the phone.

- If you suspect Medicare fraud, contact Indiana's SMP at 317-205-9201, or contact SHIP for assistance.
