

Evan Bourdon, an eighth-grade student at Sheridan Middle School, has earned a position on Indiana's National Junior High rodeo team. He will travel with his fellow teammates to Huron, S.D. and compete June 24-30 at the 14th annual National Junior High Finals Rodeo (NJHFR).

Bourdon will compete in breakaway roping, chute dogging, ribbon roping, goat tying, saddle cattle and bull riding.

This will be Bourdon's second appearance at the NJHFR as a member of Team Indiana. He was also nominated to the Cinch Team for being a returning qualifier and to Ariat's "All Around" Team for winning the 2018 Indiana Junior High All Around Cowboy title.

Featuring roughly 1,000 contestants from 43 states, five Canadian

Bike Carmel returns in 2018 with five rides

Delay in Judicial Center expansion likely

A one-year delay in construction of the planned major addition to the Hamilton County Government and Judicial Center is quite likely. A decision is not yet official, pending a joint meeting of county commissioners and county council on Wednesday, May 9, The Reporter has learned.

The reasons for postponing the 100,000 square foot expansion include the fact that bids are slightly higher than a proposed budget permits, plus a planned contingency fund is proposed at only two percent of construction costs which may not be sufficient and,

most of all, the bid prices do not include finishing any part of the interior of the new addition.

For these reasons, County Commissioner Steve Dillinger said it is his personal opinion that a delay is reasonable. Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt did not disagree, and said re-bidding in November or December may be financially advantageous. Bidding again at that time will allow the county to bond up to \$15 million toward the project without a countywide referendum, thanks to a new state law that increased public bonding limits.

Construction could then begin in early 2019,

hopefully with at least the main floor interior complete for use.

In the coming months work could be done on moving and extending certain utilities to get that process out of the way of construction. Commissioners made it clear that it is still their intention to do the expansion project to provide space for growing needs of the courts and other offices.

The joint meeting of commissioners and council will be held the day after the primary election when the coming year's make-up of both bodies will likely be known. Four council members and one commissioner are up for election this year. The Government and

Judicial Center is 26 years old, and at the time of construction officials said expansion might well be needed in about 20 years. The cost of the new addition is estimated at around \$23 million and can be completed without a property tax increase because existing bonds will have matured by next year, and new ones may be sold without any increase in the debt retirement levy, officials say.

The expansion will increase the size of the building by about 50 percent with the new construction to the west of the present structure and will include a new, more attractive west front facing White River.

"With last year's success, we are excited to

offer the program again, said Recreation Director Nichole Haberlin. "The program helps to mold our community's future leaders and provides an outlet for teens seeking something fun to do during the summer. It also helps teens learn skills that will continue to benefit them long after camp is over - like interviewing skills, organization and scheduling."

All interested teens will interview for the mentorship, be required to go through staff training from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. June 5-7, and be given specific tasks

for the week. To set up an interview, contact Nichole Haberlin at (317) 770-5750 or nhaberlin@noblesville.in.us. Interviews must be set up by Friday, May 18 and a maximum of 15 people will be selected for the program. Participants will get to create their own schedule with an average minimum of six hours a week. Teens will be assigned different rolls and tasks each day, which will include creating games for children, making a child feel welcomed at

camp, help the staff member stay on schedule and manage campers. To protect the mentorship program participants, no teen will be one-on-one with campers, able to assist with restroom issues or provide first aid beyond calming a camper. "We encourage six to 20 hours a week working with the campers to ensure they get the most out of this program," said Haberlin. "We know teenager schedules are busy which is why we designed such a flexible

program schedule. Participants also can use their camp time as service hours for other organizations." The cost of the program is \$250 which includes a staff shirt, and all the expenses with their adventure days. Adventures include Top Golf, Edge Adventures, horseback riding, laser tag, Indy Fever Game, Escape Room and canoeing. On these adventure days, counselor staff will focus on a professional development subject.



‘Tuesdays with Friends’ to face opioid addiction

Hamilton North Public Library’s *Tuesdays with Friends* program once again tackles a tough and relevant social issue: Opioid addiction. Justin Phillips, founder and executive director of Overdose Lifeline, Inc. discusses the opioid epidemic and the chronic disease of addiction at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, May 15 at HNPL–Cicero. She also will hand out naloxone (Narcan) kits at this event sponsored by Hamilton North Public Library’s Friends of the Library organization.

Her goal for this program is to provide hope and help to those addicted to drugs as well as their loved ones. Phillips provides solid knowledge about the opioid epidemic, its rising overdose rates and proven solutions for individuals and the epidemic. At the current rate of one overdose death every 12 minutes, solutions are crucial.

Sadly, Phillips knows first-hand this statistic. One of her sons died from a heroin overdose in 2013, as did a friend of his. Because of these losses and countless other overdoses, Justin dedicated herself to Overdose Lifeline, Inc. in their memory. She believes that through advocacy and committed grassroots efforts, individuals and groups can impact their communities.

Her outreach and work in this endeavor has gained attention. In

2015, Sen. Joe Donnelly nominated Phillips for the White House ‘Champions of Change’ Recognition, and in 2016 she received the Richard M. Fairbanks Circle of Hope Award from Fairbanks Recovery Center.

Programming through Overdose Lifeline, Inc. focuses on offering hope and help to the addicted and their loved ones through advocacy, education, harm reduction, prevention, resources, and support. Its

website is overdose-lifeline.org.

The food will be distributed here in Hamilton County. They want to exceed last year's grand total of 32,470 pounds.

According to Map the Meal Gap, there are 26,710 food insecure individuals here in Hamilton County and many are children. In just over a month, food pantries and other community led groups will start serving approximately 1,100 children over 50,000 meals for Summer Lunch programs. These programs vary from hot served meals to healthy meal packs to extra food pantry privileges to packed lunches.

Good items to donate are: Canned chicken or tuna, Chef Boyardee cans, mac and cheese cups, canned fruit, small peanut butter jars and cereal such as Cheerios and Chex.

Scammers using Indiana State Police Pendleton District phone number

Command staff at the Pendleton District were notified Tuesday afternoon by concerned citizens that they had received possible scam phone calls from a phone number that appears as the Pendleton District phone number of 765-778-2121. There are many phone scams currently in the area, and know that the Indiana State Police do not serve arrest warrants by phone and will never call you to request money.

One popular phone scam in our area currently is the "Jury Duty" where the caller tells you there is an arrest warrant for you because you missed jury duty. Then like all of the phone scams, they demand you send them money by pre-paid credit card to avoid arrest. Other popular scams in our area are the IRS scam, Publisher's Clearinghouse and

the grandparent - grandchild in need scam. When receiving a call, never assume the caller ID is correct, and know that scammers will often use the names of local officers or agencies or even your own family members. If you receive a call from a number you don't recognize, don't answer. If it's someone that needs you, they will leave a voicemail. If in doubt, call the local agency or family member back to verify the call or voicemail.

Most importantly, never be tempted to give out private information such as date of birth, social security number, or credit card numbers over the phone. Never be pressured into making a hasty decision over the telephone and always think twice before sending money by prepaid card or wire transfer. Transactions like these are nearly impossible to trace once sent.

Ivy Tech, Gaylor Electric help 'Skill Up' Hamilton County

Ivy Tech Community College and Gaylor Electric are partnering with Launch Fishers, all Hamilton County school corporations and 26 additional employers to organize the Hamilton County Workforce Innovation Network. The network has been awarded a \$1.46 million Skill Up grant from the Department of Workforce Development.

According to the Indiana Department of Workforce Development, Indiana needs to fill 1 million jobs in the next 10 years. Of this 1 million, Hamilton County needs to educate and train approximately 50,000 workers in the next decade. Many of these jobs will be filled by retraining current workers and adults who are returning to the workforce.

The Hamilton County Workforce Innovation Network will provide education and training for middle skills jobs in information technologies, skilled trades and innovative manufacturing that require industry certifications and associate degrees. The partnership between Hamilton County employers and educators will provide state-of-the-art workforce training for students entering the workforce and adults seeking retraining.

Ivy Tech's partnership with Hamilton County high schools provides opportunities for high school juniors and seniors to earn 12 college credits in information technology and construction. These students earn both industry certifications and credits toward associate degrees. They can also gain work experience through internships and apprenticeships. "Information technology, construction and manufacturing jobs are being changed by robotics, cloud computing, mobile apps, virtual reality simulations and the Internet of Things," said Dr. Kathleen Lee, chancellor of Ivy Tech Indianapolis. "Our Hamilton County partnerships are training a workforce for the future."

The Hamilton County Workforce Innovation Network will focus on the impact of new technologies on job skills.

Ivy Tech Hamilton County houses many of the State's adult education and training services in the same facility in Noblesville. An Excel Center Adult High School, the Hinds Career Center Adult Basic Education program and an Indiana Work One training center work together with Ivy Tech to provide programs for all adults seeking workforce training.

Governor signs Rep. Cook's bill expanding computer science programs in schools

Gov. Eric Holcomb on Thursday ceremonially signed into law legislation sponsored by State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) expanding student access to computer science classes in Indiana schools.

Retired school administrator and vice-chair of the House Committee on Education, Cook said this new law ensures computer science education is offered to Hoosier students and establishes the Next Level Computer Science Grant Program to help local schools train teachers to instruct these courses.

According to Cook, there are more than 8,000 job openings statewide in the computer science industry. He said by tasking all public and charter schools with offering a computer science course as a one-semester elective at least once each school year by 2021, Hoosiers can begin developing skills needed in high-demand industries.

"The tech industry is a rapidly growing sector throughout the state," Cook said. "By offering computer science programs in

Indiana schools, students will have the opportunity to explore the field and see for themselves if this is something they may want to pursue as a career. Establishing a fund to help schools create these programs and

train teachers will ensure students receive a quality education."

According to Cook, statistics show that students introduced to computer science in their K-12 schooling are more likely

to pursue computer science degrees in college.

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) represents House District 32, which includes all of Tipton County and portions of Hamilton, Madison, Delaware, Howard and Grant counties.

Who was Paris Dunning?

1825 – Marquis de Lafayette visited Jeffersonville on a tour of all 24 states at the time. He was welcomed by Indiana Governor James Brown Ray and many other officials.

1861 – A huge crowd gathered at the Indiana Statehouse as flags were presented to Colonel Lew Wallace's 11th Zouave Regiment. The soldiers were leaving to serve in the Civil War.

1876 – Colonel Eli Lilly opened a laboratory on Pearl Street in Indianapolis. He had three employees, including his 14-year-old son Josiah. The firm grew over the years to become one of the largest pharmaceutical companies in the world.

1884 – Paris C. Dunning died in Bloomington.



He had served as the ninth Governor of Indiana (1848-1849.) He had also been an Indiana House member, Indiana Senator, Senate Pro Tempore President and Lieutenant Governor. He is the only person in state history to have served in all of these offices.

1914 – Indiana Governor Samuel Ralston proclaimed the second Sunday of May to be "Mother's Day." He was following the national observance recently announced by President Woodrow Wilson.

Ralston said that mothers are "the strength of the nation" whose philosophy "shapes the destiny of man."

1945 – German officials surrendered to the Allies, bringing an end to the European conflict in World War II. Signing for the Allies was Lieutenant General Walter Bedell Smith, Chief of Staff for General Dwight D. Eisenhower. Smith had grown up in Indianapolis and attended Emmerich Manual Training High School.

Fishers road construction updates, week of May 7

136th Street

Beginning on or after May 7, 136th Street will be closed between Southeastern Parkway and Prairie Baptist Road for the construction of a new roundabout. See the [Detour Map](#).

Nickel Plate District

Municipal Drive in front of City Hall will be closed for the Hope for Happiness event on Friday, May 4 from 3 p.m. to 12 a.m. All other access around the Municipal Circle will remain open.

On Saturday, May 5, between 6 a.m. and 1 p.m., road closures will take place along the east side of the Municipal Circle along Municipal Drive for the Fishers Farmers' Market. Access to Municipal Drive from North Street will also be closed during this time. Farmers' Market parking is available in The Depot and The Switch garages (see the [Parking Map](#) for more details).

The Board of Works has passed an ordinance for no parking in the Nickel Plate District between the hours of 3 a.m. and 6 a.m., beginning on May 1 (there will be a 2-week grace period where no tickets will be written). See the [Parking Restrictions Map](#) for more information.

Geist Ridge Drive

Geist Ridge Drive at Florida Road will be

closed beginning on May 7, as Hamilton Southeastern Utilities has contracted Culy Contracting to perform sanitary sewer repairs in this area. Access into Valleys at Geist subdivision will be available on Olio Road or 104th Street. Temporary lane restrictions on Florida Road may occur in this area due to construction traffic.

106th Street

106th Street is closed to through traffic from Eller Road to Allisonville Road and from Allisonville Road to Hague Road for the [106th Street Infrastructure Project](#). Closures for through traffic will also take place from Hague Road to the Crosspoint Boulevard/Lantern Road roundabout. For more info on this project, view the [Fact Sheet](#).

131st Street

Beginning on May 29, the intersection of 131st and Cumberland Road will close for 45 days to construct a new roundabout.

Periodic lane restrictions will occur at the intersection of 131st Street and Cumberland Road as utility relocation work is completed. Expect lane restrictions, weather permitting, along 131st Street between Allisonville Road and Lantern Road for the construction of the Conner Trail from Conner Prairie to the Municipal Complex. Lane restrictions will also take place on Lantern Road between 131st Street and Municipal Drive.

Eller Road

Eller Road is closed to through traffic south of White Horse Lane for concrete work associated with the [106th Street Infrastructure Project](#).

Allisonville Road

Lane restrictions will

be in place, as weather permits, along Allisonville Road from 126th Street to 131st Street for tree clearing ahead of the start of the roadway expansion project. Restrictions will be in place between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and flaggers will be on site directing traffic, as necessary. For more info on this project, view the [Fact Sheet](#).

Interstate 69

As part of a \$92 million design-build contract, Milestone has added a third lane in each direction to the median, repaired and resurfaced existing pavement, and rehabilitated bridges and drainage structures on 15 miles of I-69 in Hamilton and Madison counties. Construction of an additional auxiliary lane between the 116th Street entrance ramp to I-69 South and the I-69 South Exit 204 ramp to 106th Street will continue through next spring.

I-69 South will be temporarily reduced to two lanes to allow space for the State Road 37 and 116th Street entrance ramps to safely merge while construction continues on the southbound auxiliary lane between the 116th Street and 106th Street ramps.

What should you look for in an annual financial review?

Given the complexities of the investment world, you might consider working with a financial professional to help you move toward your goals, such as a comfortable retirement. Carmel wins loaded State Preview meet

"The back nine was really good for us today, and proud of the way the boys hung in there and stuck with it," said Reid.


Seventh-ranked Zionsville took second with a 296, while No. 5 Bishop Dwenger was third with 299. Westfield, the state's No. 3 team, was fourth by shooting 303. Andrew Lewis placed fourth with a round of two-under par 70. Drake Biggs shot 75 and Ethan Lutz scored 77.

Fourth-ranked Noblesville finished in sixth place with a score of 312. Jacob Deakyne continued his solid play by carding a 73, with Jack Barnes shooting 77.

No. 17-ranked Fishers scored 314, with three players in the 70s. Noah Chamberlin carded 76, followed by Caleb Bopp with a 77 and Shivom Patel with 79.
