## Atlanta terminates contract with Jackson Township Fire

Last Tuesday morning, the Town of Atlanta gave 60-day notice that it is terminating its contract with the Jackson Township Fire Department for both fire protection and Advanced Life Saving (ALS) services.

A letter addressed to Trustee Miller and the Jackson Township Advisory Board reads in part, "The Atlanta Town council is providing notice of termination of the Fire Protection Agreement for 2018 effective as of July 1, 2018."

That letter, hand delivered and sent via certified mail from the Atlanta Town Council, is signed by Fred Farley, John Phifer, John Bengel, Pam Van Hook and Jody Price.

According to a press release given to The Reporter, the Atlanta Town Council recently signed a contract with Seals Ambulance Service for Advance Life Support and Basic Life Support Services.

"We are pleased to partner with Seals and excited to tell our residents that they will be receiving improved services at a considerable savings," said Atlanta Town

According to the press release, "With ambulances stationed in two locations, White River Fire Department and Tipton Hospital, residents can expect to see faster response times when seconds count."

When asked what this means for the Jackson Township Fire Department, Trustee Christina (Chris) Miller said, "It means we are no longer in a contract with Atlanta to provide fire and ambulance service."

Jackson Township Fire will now cover a smaller area, but also have a smaller pool of financial resources from which

## Fishers Fifty Club raises money for local public safety officers

When a Fishers police officer or firefighter is injured while performing her/his duties and must miss work, that city employee is eligible for workers compensation, but that is less than the public safety officer would earn while on duty. A local group is working to fill that gap by raising money to allow these workers to supplement their workers compensation payments with added benefits. That group is called the Fifty Club.

It's patterned after a similar organization that has been helping Noblesville for a number of years. The Fifty Club also provides supplemental benefits to a public safety officer's family when that worker suffers an untimely death. Fortunately, that

has never happened in Fishers Police history and there has been one instance of a death with Fishers Fire many years ago.

The Fifty Club is raising money to finance insurance policies for these added

benefits. As part of the fund raising effort, a special event was held last Monday evening at Topgolf.

## Delay in expansion of Judicial Center likely

A one-year delay in construction of the planned major addition to the Hamilton County Government and Judicial Center is quite likely. A decision is not yet official, pending a joint meeting of county commissioners and county council on Wednesday, May 9, The Reporter has learned.

The reasons for postponing the 100,000 square foot expansion include the fact that bids are slightly higher than a proposed budget permits, plus a planned contingency fund is proposed at only two percent of construction costs which may not be sufficient and, most of all, the bid prices do not include finishing any part of the interior of the new addition.

For these reasons, County Commissioner Steve Dillinger said it is his personal opinion that a delay is reasonable. Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt did not disagree, and said re-bidding in November or December may be financially advantageous. Bidding again at that time will allow the county to bond up

Featuring roughly 1,000 contestants from 43 states, five Canadian provinces, Australia and Mexico, the NJHFR is the world's largest junior high rodeo. In addition

# Fishers Mental Health Task Force moves forward with stakeholder meeting

When Scott Fadness became mayor of Fishers in January 2015, his first major initiative was the Mental Health Task Force. The mayor is now in his fourth year in office and the task force continues to make progress.

Those involved in the mental health initiative gathered at Launch Fishers on

Friday, April 27 for a progress report.

Perhaps the most telling piece of information shared during the session came from Fishers Fire Chief Steve Orusa. He told those assembled that there have been no teen suicides in the City of Fishers since 2014.

HSE Schools Superintendent Allen Bourff outlined how the recent referendum approved by local voters has allowed the

school corporation to place more mental health professionals in the schools, with 13 therapists serving 21 school buildings. This allows earlier interventions when students need mental health treatment.

Mayor Fadness pointed to the school shooting in Parkland, Fla. The public debate has centered on firearms policy, but the mayor cited the strides the task force has made in allow-

ing the many stakeholders, including the city and schools, to work together, is one way to intervene early when a teenager is troubled and in need of treatment. That can sometimes make the difference in preventing such situations, according to the mayor.

The Mental Health Task Force has accomplished much in nearly three-and-a-half years, but there is much more left to do.

to provide services. When asked what - if any - impact this might have on township fire and EMS service, Miller said, "Service and response will not change for the areas that we serve now."

Atlanta Clerk-Treasurer and Jackson Township Trustee candidate Robyn Cook told The Reporter she thinks this is good news for everyone in northern Hamilton County.

When asked, as a candidate for trustee, how this could impact the northern Hamilton County community given that there will now be a more complex set of agencies handling fire and emergency services, Cook said, "I think that we need to look at all those pieces and all the dollars involved, but I am confident we can work together to enhance services for the entire community including White River."

Cook and Phifer both specified that this was a town council decision.

A contributing factor of the timing of this was that Seals has signed a contract with White River Township, which brings Seals ambulances close to Atlanta from two directions. "When the [fire] territory first dissolved we had already looked at all out options," Cook said. "We wanted to work out a deal with Seals but could not afford it, which is why we went with Jackson. But when Seals put the ambulance at White River, it is my understanding that they approached us."

When asked if she was worried about the timing of this announcement coming only a week before a major primary election, Cook said, "The timing is such that we had the opportunity. My council, being as awe-

some as they are, asked, 'Robyn, how is this going to affect you?' My answer to them was, 'You have to do what is best for Atlanta.'"

According to Phifer, the Atlanta Town Council has not been pleased with their situation, their contract and their fees for fire and Advanced Life Saving (ALS) service since they began contracting with Jackson Township following the dissolution of the northern Hamilton County fire territory a few years ago. He also explained that the fee to contract with Jackson Township has increased over the years.

That situation will change on July 1.

"We got a good fire chief, Jerry Liston," Phifer explained. "We are forming our own fire department and we were able to contract with Seals and save the residents of the Town of Atlanta \$20,000

as opposed to what we were paying in the current contract."

According to Phifer, Jerry Liston became Atlanta's fire chief about two and one-half months ago and now has the town's fire department ready to go online by July 1.

# Noblesville Parks offering teen mentorship program

Noblesville Parks and Recreation is offering a summer teen mentorship program for ages 13-16 to learn and lead children at Noble Kids Camp, the full-day, week-long summer camp. This is the second year for the teen mentorship program.

In addition to providing a place to grow friendship amongst other teens looking to become leaders, the mentorship program will provide a unique adventure opportunity, as well as engage the teens in a service project each week.

"With last year's success, we are excited to offer the program again," said Recreation Director Nichole Haberlin.

All interested teens will interview for the mentorship, be required to go through staff training from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. June 5-7, and be given specific tasks for the week. To set up an

# What should you look for in an annual financial review?

**Your portfolio's progress** – Obviously, you will want to discuss

how well your investments are doing. Of course, you can follow their performance from month to month, or even day to day, by reviewing your investment statements and online information, but at your annual meeting, your financial professional can sum up the past year's results, highlight areas that have done well or lagged, and show you how closely your portfolio is tracking the results you need to achieve your long-term goals.

**Your investment mix** – Your mix of investments – stocks, bonds,

# Coyotes continue to cause concern for Carmel citizens

Coyote sightings have some people in Carmel worried.

A recent video shared hundreds of times on social media has people talking about safety concerns in the area.

The video taken last Tuesday morning by Jake Zimmer, 17, shows a coyote eating a squirrel in broad daylight.

People living in Carmel said the coyotes are becoming more bold and brazen.

"This one looked like

the biggest one I've ever seen and it was eating a squirrel and that's what I thought was crazy about it," Zimmer said. "I've seen coyotes before. But, the fact it was eating a squirrel in front of me was crazy."

That bold behavior is becoming the norm as people who live in the Lakes at Hazel Dell said the coyotes are 'taking over the neighborhood' and with dangerous consequences. The neighborhood is off 126th Street and Hazel Dell Parkway.

Teresa Vanzetta said her dog Teddy was at-

tacked by coyotes in the neighborhood three years ago.

"They just got one bite into him and it got right here and it ripped from his belly all the way to around to his back," Vanzetta said. "We heard a loud screech. We ran out and there were two coyotes sitting there and he was laying on the ground and he wasn't moving. My husband went to go get him but the coyotes weren't moving."

To combat the problem in Carmel and across the state, the Indiana Department of Natural Resources proposed a new law.

It would require animal control workers to kill raccoons, opossums and coyotes they trap. Right now, they have the option to release animals.

It's a plan Vanzetta and many of her neighbors are on board with. While Vanzetta said Teddy has made a full recovery, she hopes the Natural Resources plan will prevent another family from going through what she did.

"They don't walk away when you're there," Vanzetta said. "They're not afraid of you! We need to be able to live in our own yards without fear."

# Know your city: Noblesville Engineering

The following column is the third in a series on the various departments within the City of Noblesville, highlighting the hard work and dedication of the staff members who keep our community of 62,000 going strong.

with other government units at the county, state and federal level; or overseeing consultants.

Local residents should appreciate the work of our engineering staff – even when you encounter "Road Closed" signs. Those signs mean improvements are coming, without which our city would literally grind to a halt.

Each year, the Engineering Department reviews and grades every city street and alley for the annual street rehabilitation list. The roads and alleys deemed highest priority based on a variety of technical factors are resurfaced first – not simply on the whim of an elected official. In 2017, Noblesville rehabbed 6.8 miles of roadway and 1.12 miles of alleys. And 2018 is following this same process.

Even as technical as their jobs are, there also is artistry to municipal engineering. Their work helps build greater pride in our community. Take a drive around the Five Points intersection at South 10th Street, Greenfield and Christian avenues. I think you'll agree the roundabout with its brickwork and centerpiece monument is not only functional but cool looking.

In addition to "paving the way" for automobile travel, Engineering also manages the construction of new pedestrian trails to our already robust trail system – which takes time when

projects require complicated right-of-way and property negotiations. 2017 alone saw the addition of 9.3 miles of trails, including the initial 1.4 miles of the Midland Trace Trail. A new trail head will soon open on Hazel Dell Road, and construction for the next phase of the Midland is already underway.

Another major responsibility of the Engineering Department is to develop procedures for prospective developments like the BorgWarner Technical Center, due to open in the coming months. And they provide construction management and support services for other city departments as well.

Everyone in the department would agree, though, that safety remains their top priority.

Whenever a new project is proposed, the first questions are always – what will the impact on traffic be? Is it safe? Historically, Noblesville experiences an average annual increase of about 50 traffic crashes for every 1,800 new residents.

Engineering continuously reviews accident reports to evaluate steps that can be taken to reduce the number of crashes. Thankfully, despite our continued growth, the city experienced zero traffic fatalities in 2017.

Finally, the Engineering Department oversees the city's Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Program, and manages compliance for ADA and Title VI programs.

It's startling to see how much our city accomplishes with so lean a staff – and does so with great results that are evident in the quality of our roadways, trails, sidewalks, neighborhoods, developments and sewer system – thanks to the Noblesville Engineering Department and the limited tax dollars that fund their efforts.

# Remember to "Click It or Ticket" this month

Later this month, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of law enforcement agencies in the county, will join law-enforcement agencies across Indiana and the nation to increase enforcement of seat belt laws for Click It or Ticket. Multiple weeks of high-visibility patrols will be watching for unrestrained occupants in cars and trucks, both children and adults, the front

seat and back, both day and night.

Click It or Ticket continues through the start of the summer travel season, including the Memorial Day holiday. Overtime police patrols are paid with National Highway Traffic Safety Administration funds administered by the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI).

2018 marks 30 years since Indiana's seat belt

law began. Since that time, Indiana – along with 34 other states – has enacted a primary seat belt law, meaning that police can pull you over for being unbuckled.

Indiana has participated in Click It or Ticket for more than 20 years. Last year, more than 240 law-enforcement agencies performed 8,728 hours of traffic patrols and issued more than 30,000 citations or warnings, of which

about 13,700 were seat belt and child restraint citations.

"Click It or Ticket means zero-tolerance for unrestrained drivers and passengers," said Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. "So why are we warning everyone in advance? Because the bottom line is not issuing seat belt citations but saving lives. Anyone who responds to a serious crash just wants motorists to buckle up in the first place."

to \$15 million toward the project without a county-wide referendum, thanks to a new state law that increased public bonding limits.

Construction could then begin in early 2019, hopefully with at least the main floor interior complete for use.

In the coming months work could be done on moving and extending certain utilities to get that process out of the way of construction. Commissioners made it clear that it is still their intention to do the expansion project to provide space for growing needs of the courts and other offices.

The joint meeting of commissioners and council will be held the day after the primary election when the coming year's make-up of both bodies will likely be

known. Four council members and one commissioner are up for election this year.

The Government and Judicial Center is 26 years old, and at the time of construction officials said expansion might well be needed in about 20 years. The cost of the new addition is estimated at around \$23 million and can be completed without a property tax increase because existing bonds will have matured by next year, and new ones may be sold without any increase in the debt retirement levy, officials say.

The expansion will increase the size of the building by about 50 percent with the new construction to the west of the present structure and will include a new, more attractive west front facing White River.





# Carmel sweeps, seven new records are set

It was a beautiful night for the Hamilton County track and field meet Friday at Carmel Stadium, and it turned to be a historic night as well, as seven new records were set - including two that broke old records that had stood for decades.

Ladies first: The Carmel girls edged out Hamilton Southeastern 173-165, an eight point margin between two teams that could arguably be the two best in the state. The 'Hounds and the Royals won all but one of the events, including a tie for first in the pole vault. Carmel's Kara Deady and Southeastern's Jessica Bray both finished with vaults of 12 feet, 6 inches.

The Greyhounds were led by Phoebe Bates, who proved to be the iron woman of the meet. The sophomore swept the 800, 1600 and 3200 runs - that's a total of 14 laps around the track, or three and a half-miles. Bates took the 1600 run by seven and a half seconds, set a new meet record of 2:15.34 to win the 800. Bates bested the 25-year old record of Carmel's Amy Morris, who ran the race in 2:15.40 back in 1993. Minutes later, Bates cruised to a 25-second victory in the 3200.

Bates scored 30 points for Carmel at the meet, giving her the award for the highest girls point-scorer.

"I just took it race by race," said Bates. "The mile, I thought 'four laps,' then the 800, I was like 'Okay, this is only two laps,' and then the two-mile I just had eight more laps to get done."

Beverly Thompson and Olivia Elkin made a 1-2 sweep of the 300 hurdles, while Marie Kress took the shot put. Carmel also won the 4x800 relay to begin the meet, then finished the meet with a 4x400 relay victory; Reagan Hune pulled away at the end to seal the win.

"I think as a whole team, we did great," said 'Hounds coach Aaron McRill. "We knew HSE was a really, really good team. We just wanted to see how we would compare to them, and I think we stack up pretty good. So it's going to be a good tour-

nament."

Southeastern was led by the great Camille Christopher, who was part of three new records in the meet. In doing so, the senior broke through time barriers in each of those events.

First in the 100 dash, Christopher delivered the county meet's first under-12 second time, winning that race in 11.95 seconds. Later, she placed first in the 200 dash in 24.96 seconds, the first sub-25 second result. In both cases, she broke her own record.

In between, Christopher teamed up with Olivia Burgess, Tierra Sydnor and Alyssa Barker to win the 4x100 relay in new record time of 47.72 - the first meet time under 48 seconds.

"It feels great," said Christopher. "It feels like I'm back in the mix and ready for state."

"I just haven't even processed the whole thing yet, honestly," said Barker, a freshman.

"I think we ran pretty good," said Sydnor, a junior. "We had little bobbles with the handoff and stuff, but we worked it out and we kept going. That's the best part about it."

Sydnor was a double winner, finishing first in the 400 dash and the long jump. Tayah Irvin triumphed in the 100 hurdles and Valerie Obear cruised to a win in the discus.

Noblesville's Shelby Tyler broke through the Carmel-HSE dominance to take the high jump. Tyler easily cleared 5 feet, 9 inches, breaking the old record set by another Miller, Rachel Mather, by one inch.

"It feels really good," said Tyler. "I've been training really hard for it and have gotten a lot of support from both parents, coaches, teammates. Everyone's been super helpful and that makes it fun and it makes it motivating."

In the boys meet, Carmel used its depth to win by a solid margin. The Greyhounds scored 158 points, with Fishers totaling 130 and HSE scoring 123.

The depth was necessary, as individual wins were hard to come by. All six partici-

pating schools scored at least one individual event victory.

Carmel began the meet by winning the 4x800 relay, then got 1-2 finishes in two events. Trey Harris placed first in the 1600 run with Eli Konow second, then Graham Hatfield won the discus, followed by Jon Williams.

"I thought the boys competed very well," said Greyhounds coach Ken Browner. "On paper, Fishers and HSE and us were separated by about three points. I was a little concerned, because I knew we weren't running some of our better kids today. But I knew with that, once we got into the competition, we had some really great performances from the young kids that never really get a chance to run in this kind of environment."

Southeastern won the most individual events, with six first-place finishes. That included a photo finish between the Royals' Noah Malone and the Tigers' HL Lewis in the 100 dash. Malone edged out Lewis by .01 seconds - 11.72 to 11.73. Both runners were under the old 100 dash record of 11.80, and it was indeed an old record: It was set by Carmel's Bill Davis back in 1982.

Malone also won the 200 dash, and was part of the

Royals' winning 4x100 relay. As a result, he earned the trophy for the boys highest point scorer of the meet.

"It was tough," said Malone. "This is the most competition I've had all season. I had a PR in the 100 and overall it was a good meet."

Madison Norris cruised to victory in the 110 hurdles, also in a new meet record time of 14.22 seconds. That lowered the standard of HSE's Jeremiah Wright by one-tenth of a second. Nathan Smith took the 300

hurdle race, while Chase Maxey finished first in the long jump.

Fishers got two victories: DiSean Graham paced the 400 dash and Luke Martin won the shot put. Fourth-place Noblesville had three wins: Drew Herman took the high jump, freshman Andrew Anderson was first in the 800 run, and the Millers' 4x400 relay team edged out Carmel for a win in that event. Noblesville coach Jay Taylor said that his team "had some guys pull through big time" to win that race.

"Really pleased with

how Andrew ran," said Noblesville coach Jay Taylor about the 800. "I'll tell you that Nick Dombroski was in that race as well, and he pulled through just as well as Andrew did, relative to himself."

Westfield's Peyton Haack finished first in the pole vault, while Guerin Catholic's Quinn Gallagher won the 3200 run, his first time as a county champion.

"It's pretty neat, because last year I got outkicked and then this year, it was really fun and I was ready for it," said Gallagher.

# Millers take HCC series with Southeastern

Noblesville won a Hoosier Crossroads Conference baseball series with Hamilton Southeastern last week.

The Millers recovered from dropping a big-hitting opener on Thursday, which the Royals won 11-7. Noblesville then beat Southeastern 6-2 on Friday and 7-0 on Saturday.

The Thursday game was a rumble on the Royals' Ken Seitz Field. Both teams held the lead at one point during the slugfest, but it was a grand slam from Jacob Daftari that propelled the Royals ahead for good. Southeastern then held off a late charge from the Millers to win 11-9.

Daftari's slam came in the sixth inning with the game tied at 7-7. Jacob Dewolf and Anthony Eggers both drew walks, then Cole DeWael loaded the bases with a base hit. (Zach Boyle came in to courtesy run for Dewolf after his walk.) The Royals absorbed a strikeout before Daftari came up, and he nailed the ball into center field.

A grand slam is amazing any time, but this one broke the tie and moved HSE ahead 11-7.

"I expected it to at least hit the fence, because it went solid off my bat," said Daftari. "I didn't really expect it to go over."

That hit was the third of three home runs for Southeastern on Thursday. The other two came in the third inning, again getting the Royals in front after Noblesville held an early lead.

The Millers scored two runs in the top of the second. Jacob Thieman got on base with a hit, was moved to third by Bryce Randolph's single, then scored on an error. Randolph was home seconds later, scored by a single from Reese Sharp.

The Royals began the third inning with a homer from Jake Stout, who hit a grand slam himself earlier in the season. That put HSE on the board, and they were ahead a couple minutes later. Boyle, again running for Dewolf (who singled), tied the game after scoring on an error.

DeWael then hit a sacrifice fly to get Eggers home and give the Royals a 3-2 lead. Then, it was a 4-2 lead after Greyson Droste cracked a homer into left field.

Noblesville didn't give up, of course. In the fifth inning, Tyler Owens sent a 1-1 ball over the center field fence, a three-run homer that scored himself, Sharp and Jackson Ramey. Just like that, the Millers

were up 5-4.

Later, Mark Goudy drew a walk, and was sent home right away by DJ Owens' triple. Thieman got Owens home quickly with a single.

The Millers were now up 7-4, but the Royals tied it up in the bottom of the fifth. Droste batted Eggers in, then Daftari smacked a triple to score Droste. Daftari tied the game up after scoring on error, and would be back up in the sixth inning to give HSE the lead.

"The one thing that I know about Noblesville is that they're never going to quit," said Southeastern coach Scott Henson. "And that's what I tried telling my guys. We got up 4-2 and guys kind of relaxed a little bit and I said, 'Guys, there's no way that this game is ending 4-2.'"

The Royals had to get past one last rally by Noblesville in the seventh inning. Thieman doubled in Cooper Miles, then DJ Owens scored on an error. The Millers had two men on with one out, but Southeastern got the last two outs to end the game.

"The fact that we came back and stayed in there and battled - it'd be really easy with the way our season's gone so far just to have gone 'Well, here we go again,'" said Henson. "I think the guys did a good job of having good approaches at the plate, battling in the field, even though we made a couple errors that could've cost us. Bottom line was, when we needed it, we did what we had to do to get the job done."

Droste, Daftari and Dewolf all had two hits, with Daftari totaling five RBIs. Matt Buckingham and Brayton Harrison both hit a double. Henson credited Sam Bachman with pitching well; Bachman threw five innings. Tyler Schweitzer finished the game and got the win.

Meanwhile, Thieman finished 4-for-4 at the plate, driving in two runs. Tyler Owens' home run resulted in three RBIs.




