Bids will be taken Monday by county commissioners for a new pedestrian bridge over White River at Logan Street. The structure is to be connected to the existing vehicle bridge to afford better and safer access to the Federal Hill Commons park complex west of the river.

In their regular meeting, commissioners will also consider the sale of an abandoned section of right-of-way in the platted addition of Farmington as recommended by the county highway department. Following the meeting, commissioners will present their annual Youth Service Award to a graduating senior from each of the county's high schools. The overall winner will receive a scholarship.

Man charged in poaching of three-legged deer

Indiana Conservation Officers have filed charges in Hamilton County against a man who shot a threelegged deer in January 2017. Local residents of Deming had frequently spotted the doe for several years, as it raised several sets of fawns. Local deer hunters had formed a pact to leave the deer alone.

Allegedly, the doe was shot illegally with a rifle from the suspect's vehicle

on a public roadway and was left in the field. The deer was recovered by Indiana Conservation Officers, who donated the venison. In February 2018, a phone tip led to a suspect, who later admitted to taking the deer.

The suspect is currently facing multiple Class C Misdemeanor charges, including additional wildlife offenses. The Indiana Department of Natural Resources did not identify the person charged.

Indiana Conservation Officers thank the person who called their tip line to report the information that led to a successful resolution of this case. Anyone wishing to report poaching activity can do so at any time by calling 1-800-TIP-IDNR. All information, including that of the caller, will be kept confidential and reward money can be issued for information that leads to the conviction of violators.

Gov. Eric Holcomb signs legislation adding tests for spinal muscular atrophy and severe combined immunodeficiency to Indiana's newborn screening panel. State Reps. Doug Gutwein (R-Francesville) and Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel) worked on the new law with SMA awareness advocate Adrienne Vollmer, whose son, Graham, has the disease.

Bill adding SMA to newborn screenings signed into law

On Friday, Gov. Eric Holcomb ceremonially signed into law new legislation at the Cure SMA Walk-N-Roll event in Carmel. The bill, which adds two tests to Indiana's newborn screening panel, was authored by State Rep. Douglas Gutwein (R-Francesville) and co-authored by State Rep. Donna Schaibley (R-Carmel).

This new law requires spinal muscular atrophy (SMA) and severe combined immunodeficiency (SCID) to be added to the list of screenings newborns receive in Indiana shortly after their births. These screenings identify diseases in newborns, providing opportunities for early interventions that can prevent death or the need for longerm care

"I am totally overwhelmed by the support that this legislation received," Gutwein said. "Making this testing automatic for newborns means physicians can begin a treatment plan almost immediately. I am very excited we were able to have a ceremonial signing during this special event to highlight the importance of this new law. Hoosier parents can now rest assured that their babies are being tested at birth for these diseases so they may have more treatment options and more hopeful outcomes."

Spinal muscular atrophy is a severe genetic disorder that alters the motor nerve cells in the spinal cord. Once affected by SMA, those cells will not regenerate, which results in muscle weakness and can eventually lead to the inability to walk, talk, swallow and breathe.

"Since the beginning, there has been a tremendous amount of support from both lawmakers and the community to see this proposal become law," Schaibley said. "The success here today is a testament to how important this legislation is to families and the lifesaving impact it will have for children in the future. Testing before symptoms arise gives families the opportunity to fight these diseases and help their kids go on to lead healthier lives.'

The Cure SMA Walk-N-Roll event was held in honor of Graham Vollmer, a three-year-old with SMA. Diagnosed at eight weeks old, Graham was not expected to see his second birthday. The Walk-N-Roll event, attended by more than 600 people, was a celebration of Graham's third birthday and a fundraising event that raised over \$60,000 for SMA research. His mother. Adrienne Vollmer, was an advocate for the new law and the organizer for the event.

"Our family has been so honored to be a part of the process to add SMA to Indiana's newborn screening panel," Vollmer said. "We hope this legislation will be able to save families from some of the heartache we experienced when Graham was diagnosed. Our Walk for Graham this year is the perfect way to celebrate the success of this law and the families it will impact."

According to CureS-**MA.org**, approximately 1 in 11,000 babies are diagnosed with SMA. Out of the four types of SMA, the most severe and common is usually diagnosed within the first few months of an infant's life. Gutwein said children who received treatment for SMA through a new FDA-approved drug therapy were able to achieve unprecedented motor milestones.

"Indiana is at the leading edge of an effort to save the lives of babies born with spinal muscular atrophy," said Kenneth Hobby, president of Cure SMA. "SMA is currently the number one genetic cause of death for infants under two years of age, but we now have an historic opportunity to change that through newborn screening and early treatment. We congratulate SMA advocate Adrienne Vollmer, Representative Doug Gutwein, and Governor Eric Holcomb on their quick action on this issue, and hope that more states will follow their lead in the coming months."

To more quickly begin saving the lives of newborns, Gutwein said House Enrolled Act 1017 went into effect April 1.

State Road 37

A public meeting will be held on Monday, May 15 from 6 to 8 p.m. at the **Delaware Township Trustee Office**. Additional information is available on the project's **new website**. The State Road 37 improvement project is a \$124 million joint project between Fishers, Hamilton County, Noblesville, and INDOT. Questions or concerns may be directed via email to **Drive Fishers**.

136th Street

136th Street is closed between Southeastern Parkway and Prairie Baptist Road for the construction of a new roundabout. See the **Detour Map**.

Nickel Plate District

The Board of Works has passed an ordinance for no parking in the Nickel Plate District between the hours of 3 a.m. and 6 a.m., beginning on May 1 (there will be a two-week grace period where no tickets will be written). See the **Parking Restrictions Map** for more information.

Geist Ridge Drive

Geist Ridge Drive at Florida Road is closed as Hamilton Southeastern Utilities has contracted Culy Contracting to perform sanitary sewer repairs in this area. Access into Valleys at Geist subdivision is available on Olio Road and 104th Street. Temporary lane restrictions on Florida Road may occur in this area due

to construction traffic. 106th Street

106th Street is closed to through traffic from Eller Road to Allisonville Road and from Allisonville Road to Hague Road for the 106th Street Infrastructure Project. 106th Street is also closed to through traffic between Hague Road and the Crosspoint Boulevard/Lantern Road roundabout. the **Fact Sheet**. 131st Street

Beginning on May 29, the intersection of 131st Street and Cumberland Road will close for 45 days to construct a new roundabout.

Periodic lane restrictions will occur at the intersection of 131st Street and Cumberland Road as utility relocation work is completed.

Expect lane restrictions, weather permitting, along 131st Street between Allisonville Road and Lantern Road for the construction of the Conner Trail from Conner Prairie to the Municipal Complex. Lane restrictions will also take place on Lantern Road between 131st Street and Municipal Drive.

Eller Road

Eller Road is closed to through traffic south of White Horse Lane for concrete work associated with the 106th Street Infrastructure Project.

Allisonville Road

Lane restrictions will be in place, as weather permits, along Allisonville Road from 126th Street to 131st Street for tree clearing ahead of the start of the roadway expansion project. Restrictions will be in place between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. and flaggers will be on site directing traffic, as necessary. For more info on this project, view the **Fact Sheet**.

Interstate 69

As part of a \$92 million design-build contract, Milestone has added a third lane in each direction to the median, repaired and resurfaced existing pavement, and rehabilitated bridges and drainage structures on 15 miles of I-69 in Hamilton and Madison counties. Construction of an additional auxiliary lane between the 116th Street entrance ramp to I-69 South and the I-69 South Exit 204 ramp to 106th Street will continue

through next spring.

I-69 South will be temporarily reduced to two lanes to allow space for the State Road 37 and 116th Street entrance ramps to safely merge while construction continues on the southbound auxiliary lane between the 116th Street and 106th Street ramps.

See what's new, improved at Indiana's state parks this year

The summer recreational season is approaching, and Indiana State Parks is working hard to make sure visitors have a good experional

The system of 24 parks and eight reservoir properties has finished or will complete this year hundreds of improvements to enhance campgrounds, restrooms and trails.

Partners and volunteers have helped with many of the projects. Non-profit "friends" groups have contributed thousands of dollars and hours.

Collectively, Indiana State Park properties have more than 2,000 buildings, 700 miles of trails, 636 hotel/lodge rooms, 17 marinas, 75 launching ramps, 17 swimming pools, 15 beaches, 7,701 campsites, more than 200 shelters, 160 or so playgrounds and 150 cabins.

That's a lot of maintenance, and a lot of time is focused on basic facility care.

"Creative and dedicated employees stretch the dollars that you pay when you enter the gate, rent a campsite, launch a boat or attend a special workshop or program," said Ginger Murphy, deputy director of Indiana State Parks.

Improvements include:
• New, efficient LED lighting in various buildings, from offices to com-

- fort stations.

 New pavement on entrance roads at Raccoon State Recreation Area (SRA) and at Brown County State Park.
- Various small campground improvements in different locations totaling \$750,000, ranging from leveling and adding gravel to sites to new fixtures, sinks and dividers in comfort stations, and upgrades from 30- to 50-amp ser-
- Invasive plant removal, prescribed fire and habitat improvements totaling several thousand acres at Fort Harrison, Spring Mill, Clifty Falls, Prophetstown, Tippecanoe River, Indiana Dunes and McCormick's Creek state parks and Salamonie, Mississinewa, Hardy, Patoka, Monroe and Brookville lakes.
- Fish habitat improvements at several reservoirs.
- Trail work: A new bridge on the accessible trail at O'Bannon Woods State Park between the nature center and group camp; a new wetland trail boardwalk coming this

summer at Indiana Dunes; trail structure repairs at Hardy Lake; trail armoring by Friends of Fort Harrison State Park.

- New trees in several locations to offset the loss of ash trees to emerald ash borer at Salamonie Lake, Raccoon SRA, and Clifty Falls and Lincoln state parks.
- Archery trail remodels at Patoka and Brookville lakes. A new range will open in Miami SRA at Mississinewa Lake this summer.
- A few pet-friendly rooms at each of the seven state park inns.



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

When did Indiana ratify the 15th Amendment?

1865 – John J. Williams from Jay County died at the Battle of Palmito Ranch in Texas. He is widely considered to be the last soldier killed in action during the Civil War.

1869 – Indiana ratified the 15th Amendment to the United States Constitution. The law prohibits the denial of voting rights based upon race or skin color. Indiana was the 14th state to approve the measure.

1902 – The Soldiers and Sailors Monument was formally dedicated in Indianapolis. General Lew Wallace was Master of Ceremonies. The program included the reading of a poem by James Whitcomb Riley and music written for the occasion and performed by John Philip



Sousa and his orchestra.

1928 - The Emboyd Theater opened in Fort Wayne. The movie theater and vaudeville house included a seven-story hotel. Now known as the Embassy Theater, the venue retains its majesty, including the original Page Theater Pipe Organ.

1946 - Over 20,000 people went to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway to witness the first day of qualifications since 1941. The 500-Mile

Race had been halted during World War II. Winning the pole position was Cliff Berger, with an average speed of 126.471 mph.

1988 - Orville Redenbacher, the "popcorn king," was awarded an honorary Doctor of Agriculture degree from Purdue University. He had graduated from Purdue 60 years earlier. Born in Brazil, Ind., he also lived in Valparaiso and is honored there by a life-sized


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Boys volleyball



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Will Power defends Grand Prix championship

The Indianapolis Motor Speedway is full of tradition, and it seems that a new tradition is under way: Will Power always does well at the INDYCAR Grand Prix.

The Australian defended his championship at the Grand Prix, which took place Saturday at IMS. Power led early in the race, hung around during the middle stages, then took the lead for good on Lap 51 and ran in front for the remainder of the 85-lap race.

After a slow start to the season, Power said "it's just fantastic to get the win." This is the third win at the Grand Prix for Power and his 33rd career win. It also marked the 200th win for Team Penske, a name that has become so well-associated with the Speedway, and Power is aware of the legacy that Roger Penske has built.

"Two hundred wins in IndyCar shows Roger's determination," said Power. "It's amazing to be a part of that history of Penske racing, because it's such a deep history. I'm so grateful to be able to drive for this team."

Power started at the pole, and led the race for the first 19 laps. After that, the lead changed hands five different times over the next seven laps, as the front-runners all made their first pit stops. Sebastien Bourdais, Josef Newgarden, Alexander Rossi and rookie Kyle Kaiser all held the top spot at

On Lap 26, Canadian Robert Wickens moved up to the lead. The 29-year-old from Toronto is racing his first full year in the Verizon IndyCar Series. He has been a top-level racer since his teenage years, and spent the last six seasons in the Deutsche Tournwagen Masters, a German racing

league with car designs similar to that of the stock cars used in NASCAR. Wickens won

six DTM races.

Wickens got his first taste of IndyCar 2.2443 seconds behind Power. last June, when drove Mikhail Aleshin's practice car for Schmidt Peterson Motorsports as the IndyCar drivers prepared for the Kohler Grand Prix in Wisconsin. Wickens was on standby because Aleshin was having visa issues returning from France after participating in the 24 Hours of

Aleshin was able to race, but SPM was impressed enough to give Wickens a fulltime ride for 2018. Since then, Wickens has been impressive, finishing second at the Phoenix Grand Prix and fourth in the Grand Prix of Alabama.

Wickens wound up leading a total of 20 laps at IMS, holding on to the lead until Lap 41, when Power returned to the front. That's when the second round of pits began, and Power temporarily ceded first place to Graham Rahal, the seventh leader of the race (tying a race record).

Wickens got back in front on Lap 46, but Power moved ahead on Lap 51 and stayed in front until the checkered flag. At that point, Power's toughest opponent was dehydration, admitting as such once the race was finished on the muggy day. Power admitted that he didn't drink enough before the race, and not at all during the race.

"When you're racing hard, you forget to drink," said Power. "While you're racing you're fine, but as soon as I stopped, it was Power. "It always helps you because the like 'ooh.'"

Meanwhile, Scott Dixon made a steady climb from the 18th starting position to second place, which is where he finished,

"The goal is to finish bettter than 18th, that's for sure," said Dixon. "You have an understanding that you can move up."

Wickens wound up in third place, easily the highest-finishing rookie. Wickens said that the strategy of saving fuel during the race was a new experience for him.

"I've never raced in a category where you had to save fuel," said Wickens. He said that apart "from warm-ups and in and out laps, it's not something that I'm practicing very

"I haven't raced him enough," said Power. "We passed each other twice, no prblem. He's obivuosly very good. Being fuel safe is probably a new thing for him." Power also noted that Wickens has as much experience as he does at the top level.


Bourdais finished fourth, while Rossi

Next up is the biggest of all, the Indianapolis 500. All three men have this race in their sights - Dixon is the 2008 champion, Power is a perennial contender, and Wickens appears to be another promising rookie in a race that has seen its share of first-timers do well.

Power said he's had his eye on the 500 since last year, and winning the Grand Prix is a good start to the month of May.

'I've had this a couple times now," said team has more confidence. I'm very upbeat and have a lot of confidence."

"I've dreamed of doing a 500 since I can remember," said Wickens. "I just want to take it one day at a time, because every day in IndyCar seems to be different. All next
