Westfield will be one of four Indiana communities on the OpenGov platform. This site provides an opportunity

OpenGov, a California-based company specializing in financial transparency, pioneered this application for the public to have full access to city finances.

Sheriff's Office offers new Safe Exchange Zone

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office unveiled its new "Safe Exchange Zone" Monday. With the increase in internet arranged transactions as well as child custody exchanges and other events where different parties may need to meet, Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen felt it important to create a safe location for area residents to connect.

The Safe Exchange Zone is located at the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office complex, 18100 Cumberland Road, Noblesville. Two parking spaces located near the main entrance are reserved for the Safe Exchange Zone. The area is well-lit at night and is covered by 24-hour video surveillance. The idea behind the Safe Exchange Zone is to cut down on potential fraud and robberies that can be associated with these types of transactions. Sheriff Bowen hopes people will use the zone to meet and sell their goods with less fear of a quick or violent rip-off. Child custody exchanges can also be completed in the Safe Exchange Zone.

While the spaces are available on agency grounds, Sheriff's Office deputies do not participate or act as official witnesses in the transactions, but can be dispatched to keep the peace, prevent disorderly conduct, or for criminal offenses.

A Safe Exchange Zone is also available

in the main lobby of the Sheriff's Office for those needing an indoor location. The lobby is open around the clock.

Here are a few safety tips to keep in mind when conducting such transactions:

- Only do transactions with local buyers/sellers.
- Do not go to a transaction alone.
- Make sure a friend or family member is aware of the transaction details.
- Insist on meeting in a public area like the Sheriff's Office Safe Exchange Zone.
- Do not go into someone else's house, and do not allow them into yours.
- Complete the transaction during daylight hours if possible.
- Be extra cautious when buying or selling valuable items such as vehicles and jewelry.
- Only use cash or money orders to complete your transactions.
- Trust your instincts: If it sounds like a

scam, it probably is.

If someone is not willing to come to the Sheriff's Office to conduct a transaction, this would be a sign to beware and possibly rethink the meeting.

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Speed limit on 96th Street east of Olio Road in Fishers set at 45 mph

96th Street from Olio Road, extending east to the county line, is one of those areas where the road goes in and out of Fishers City and Hamilton County jurisdiction. The two government entities have been discussing what speed limit is appropriate

for that stretch. The compromise reached was 45 mph, per Jeff Hill, Director of the Fishers Engineering Department. The Fishers Board of Works and Safety approved the speed limit Monday.

Hamilton County conducted a study and found that piece of 96th Street should have a speed limit of 50-55 mph. The city staff

came to a different conclusion, recommending a speed limit closer to 40 mph.

In other actions taken by the Board of Works Monday:

- \$188,000 will be spent on the second phase of the Experiential Learning Project, a joint undertaking between Hamilton Southeastern Schools and the city. KSM Consulting

will provide a technology platform for this project.

- The city will spend \$35,000 on neighborhood projects throughout the city, based on a committee evaluation of the 18 applications submitted for the Neighborhood Matching Grant Program. To look at which neighborhoods received funding, and how much, use [this link](#).

- The city is selling a 2010 Dodge Charger to the Arcadia Police Department for \$1. Fishers Police Chief Mitch Thompson says his department is trying to help Arcadia because that department is "in a pinch."

- The board voted to extend the contract with Verizon to provide the city with cellular service. The contract calls for 550 lines for an annual fee of \$335,000, including equipment and service.

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

Cops Cycling for Survivors touring across state this July

Cops Cycling for Survivors announced plans Tuesday for their annual bicycle tour of Indiana as well as unveiled the memorial photos on their support truck. Tuesday was National Peace Officers Memorial Day. The group, whose aim is to raise awareness and actively support survivors of Indiana law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty, will bike nearly 1,000 miles over 13 days in July to honor fallen law enforcement officers and their survivors.

In 2002, Cops Cycling for Survivors began with a ride to Washington, D.C., to honor fallen officers. The cyclists now ride through Indiana meeting with survivors of officers to support them as they continue to deal with the loss of loved ones. The group honors the more than 400 Indiana officers killed in the line of duty by reading a memorial for each officer during the tour. Cops Cycling for Survivors vows to never let Indiana's fallen heroes be forgotten and to support the survivors of those who made the ultimate sacrifice for the citizens of the state.

Cops Cycling for Survivors makes every attempt to contact survivors, including family, co-workers, descendants and others of fallen officers but may not have contact information for some. Survivors are asked to be in touch with the group at Cops Cycling for Survivors, P.O. Box 597, Ellettsville, IN 47429, by calling 812-727-0725, or by emailing copsyclingforsurvivors@gmail.com. Interested cy-

clists may also contact the group for more information on joining the ride for all or parts of the ride. Cyclists include survivors, law enforcement officers and friends of law enforcement.

In addition to memorializing Indiana's fallen officers, Cops Cycling for Survivors raises financial support for survivors. Proceeds from the annual ride provide line of duty death benefits for primary survivors as well as fund scholarships, camps and other avenues of support for survivors. The group also assists Line of Duty Death Justice as survivors work through years of court dates, including parole hearings and appeals. More information and a donation page are found at copsycling4survivors.com. Cops Cycling for Survivors was granted 501c3 status as a not-for-profit in late 2011 and is no longer directly affiliated with Indiana Concerns of Police Survivors (IN COPS).

The 2018 Cops Cycling for Survivors truck was also unveiled Tuesday. While the group rides in support and memory of all fallen officers, each year the support truck honors officers killed in the line of duty from the previous year. This year's truck is in special memory of Sgt. Joseph Cox, Jr., Allen County Sheriff's Department, and Lt. Aaron Allan, Southport Police Department. Cox suffered a fatal heart attack on Feb. 12, 2017, during his tour of

Royals win, many records fall

Hamilton Southeastern won the girls track and field sectional showdown on Tuesday at Reynolds Royals Stadium.

The No. 2-ranked Royals got the early momentum with the sprint events, and held on to beat No. 1 Carmel 172-156.5 to win the sectional trophy. The meet saw several records get broken, and of course, many athletes advanced on to next week's regional at Lafayette Jefferson.

Southeastern's Camille Christopher was part of three new sectional record wins. The senior cruised to victory in the 100 and 200 dashes, then joined Olivia Burgess, Tierra Sydnor and Alyssa Barker to take the 4x100 in record time. Sydnor also got three wins: The relay, a record victory in the long jump, and first in the 400 dash, minutes after winning the 4x1.

Kennedy Drish took the pole vault in a new sectional record leap of 12 feet, 10 inches.

"I think I've definitely improved," said Drish. "I've been working on the short run stuff to get my technique and I just moved back to my long runs the last couple of meets. So I think I got the speed and the technique down. Just trying to put it all together."

Mia Mackenzie swept the 100 and 300 hurdles. In the 100 hurdles, Mackenzie set a new record and led a 1-2 finish, with Tayah Irvin taking second.

Southeastern's 4x400 relay team also won, while Valerie Obear also got a win in the discus.

"We pretty much did everything that we hoped to do," said HSE coach Julie Alano. "There's a couple spots that we hoped to be a little higher for those advancing spots, but we're hoping to get some callbacks."

Carmel started the meet with a win in the 4x800 relay. Phoebe Bates was a double winner in the 1600 and 3200 runs, including a new meet record in the 1600. Marie Kress

"It's tough to score 156.5 points and finish second, but we know HSE has a great team," said Greyhounds coach Aaron McRill. "We accomplished what we wanted by advancing who we thought would move on, plus a few more. We are looking forward to a great regional meet."

Fishers finished third as a team with 107 points and had a sectional champion in Kamy Lapsley. The senior won the 800 run for the second year in a row.

"I wanted to go out and practice a fast start for state," said Lapsley. "I practiced that and then practiced holding on at the very end and kicking it in and throwing everything I have into it. I did what I wanted to do."

Noblesville placed fourth, with Shelby Tyler winning the high jump in a new sectional record of 6 feet even.

Westfield was fifth as a team, with

Sydney Spears taking second in the 400 dash and the long jump. Hamilton Heights' Lauryn Wiley was the runner-up in the discus.

The top three athletes in each event advance on to next week's regional.
