The idea behind the Safe Exchange Zone is to cut down on potential fraud and obberies that can be associated with thes ypes of transactions. The No. 2-ranked Royals got the early momentum with the sprint events, and held on to beat No. 1 Carmel $172-156.5$ to win the sectional trophy. The meet saw several records get broken, and of course, many athletes advanced on to next week's regional at Lafayette Jefferson. Southeastern's Camille Christopher was part of three new sectional record wins. The senior cruised to victory in the 100 and 200 dashes, then joined Olivia Burgess, Tierra Sydnor and Alyssa Barker to take the 4x100 in record time. Sydnor also got three wins: The relay, a record victory in the long jump, and first in the 400 dash, minutes after winning the 4x1. Kennedy Drish took the pole vault in a new sectional record leap of 12 feet, 10 inches. inches.
