

# **Construction on State Road 37** scheduled to begin next year

The public received an update from officials involved in the

rebuild of State Road 37 from 126th Street north to 146th Street, and there was a lot to discuss. The main news is what the current plans are for constructing the various roundabout interchanges.

That is important because east-west traffic will be blocked at these intersections for the estimated nine-month construction period in each case. State Road 37 will have four lanes open during construction, two going north and two going south, although those lanes may be reduced in size and reconfigured.

Here is the current plan, as outlined in the meeting held Tuesday evening at the Delaware Township Building:

• The first interchange scheduled for reconstruction is 126th Street, which will be closed to east-west

traffic during the spring and summer of 2019.

• In 2020, both 131st Street and 146th Street are scheduled for construction, again during the spring and summer months.

• 141st Street will be set for construction of the only one-lane roundabout in the plans during spring and summer of 2021.

There was talk of finding a way to continue eastwest traffic on 146th Street



during construction, but no specific plan has been formulated.

One member of the au-

dience questioned whether the one-lane roundabout

# Expect increased traffic this concert season



Please plan to leave early, especially during larger concerts, and practice patience and courtesy during potential traffic congestion. Traffic from the north is encouraged to use State Road 38 and Olio Road or Boden Road.

In addition to deputies and officers assisting with traffic around Ruoff Home Mortgage Music Center, the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership regularly patrols the area to promote traffic safety, especially compliance with Indiana's seatbelt and impaired driving laws. planned for 141st could be expanded if needed in the future. City Engineering Department Director Jeff Hill replied that their studies show the one-lane roundabout will suffice for the next 30 years, but will consider a design allowing for future lane expansion if needed.

Because State Road 37 will be lowered for this project, drainage will be an issue and officials spent the first part of the session detailing plans to handle water drainage for the rebuilt highway.

There is a \$500,000 budget set aside for a marketing plan in order to assist businesses impacted by the State Road 37 construction. The Fishers-based digital marketing firm Imavex has been contracted to provide the marketing services.

Trov Woodruff of RQAW told the crowd most of the right of way has been acquired or is in the process of being purchased, although there may be a few property owners yet to be contacted.

The State Road 37 construction project is aimed at improving traffic flow along that highway by reconstructing it to resemble the design on Keystone Avenue in Carmel, with access from 126th Street to 146th via ramps taking motorists to and from roundabouts, except 146th Street.

This is a \$124 million undertaking, with the state providing \$100 million. Fishers and Hamilton County are chipping in \$12 million each.

are needed to win elections. County Democrats have a few, but need a lot more. To date, they have no candidates for the important county positions of Sheriff, Prosecutor, Superior Court judge or County Commissioner. They do have the opportunity to fill their ticket before November, but don't expect to see it done this vear.

County Chairman Joe Weingarten said earlier this year that he will produce some candidates for county office, probably for county council, county commissioner and maybe a few others. They do have candidates for State Representative in District 29, county council in Council Districts 1 and 3, Noblesville Township Trustee and a scattering of candidates for township and town board seats. But, there are about 50 offices on the various county ballots this year, so there's a long way to go. The party has until June 30 to recruit and file candidates to fill the many vacancies on the November ballot.

Although Hamilton County has prospered with Republican leadership over the years, it would be well to have a two-party presence. Even if a majority continues to support the GOP, choices in the general election would give both parties incentive to get greater voter participation. The 19 percent turnout in the recent primary certainly shows we could use something to encourage participation in our elections.



# Duke Energy chooses six locations statewide for economic development

Duke Energy's economic development consultants have selected six Indiana locations to participate in the company's 2018 Site Readiness Program.

Locally, 200 acres at the Indianapolis Metropolitan Airport located in Fishers was selected for the program that identifies, evaluates and improves sites in the company's service territory for potential industrial development.

Other locations include:

- A 66-acre site near Creek Way and 106th Street in Zionsville (Boone County)
- A 175-acre site in the River Ridge Commerce Center in Jeffersonville (Clark County)
- An 80-acre site along State Road 1 near the Interstate 74 interchange at St. Leon (Franklin County)
- A 143-acre site along East County Road 400 South near the interchange of State Road 3 and Interstate 70 (Henry County)

• A 500-acre site inside the Vermillion Rise Mega Park (Vermillion County)

"Duke Energy is honored to select these communities for participation in the 2018 Site Readiness Program," said Erin Schneider, director of economic development for Duke Energy Indiana. "We are eager to contribute resources to help promote economic development, jobs and quality of life for these regions."

A national site consulting firm will evaluate five of the six sites, while Banning Engineering will produce conceptual drawings and site plans.

Duke Energy will present its findings for each site – including a detailed report and conceptual drawings – to city and county officials when the studies are completed later this year. 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# INDOT to award matching grants to communities, counties for roads, bridges

The Indiana Department of Transportation announced Monday that the agency will begin accepting applications on Aug. 6 for matching funds for shovel-ready local construction projects through Community Crossings, the State's local road and bridge matching grant program.

Since 2016, the State has awarded \$300 million in state funds to support local road and bridge projects around the state.

Projects that are eligible for funding through Community Crossings include road resurfacing, bridge rehabilitation, road

reconstruction and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance in connection with road projects. Material costs for chip sealing and crack filling operations are also eligible for funds.

Projects submitted to INDOT for funding will be evaluated based on need, traffic volume, local support, the impact on connectivity and mobility within the community and regional economic significance.

Community Crossings is open to all local government units in the State of Indiana.

· Cities and towns with a population of fewer than 10,000 will receive funds

using a 75/25 match.

· Cities and towns with a population of greater than 10,000 will receive funds using a 50/50 match.

• Counties with a population of fewer than 50,000 people will receive funds using a 75/25 match.

• Counties with a population of greater than 50,000 people will receive funds using a 50/50 match.

All application materials must be submitted by 5 p.m. on Sept. 28. Communities receiving funding for projects will be notified by INDOT beginning in November.

# Take steps to stop invasive species

#### The REPORTER

As summer approaches and boaters prepare to get on the water, the Indiana Department of Natural Resource reminds you to: "Clean. Drain. Dry."

Cleaning, draining and drying your boat helps prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species (AIS).

AIS are non-native aquatic animals, plants, microorganisms and pathogens that can hurt native aquatic plants and wildlife, harming the environment, human health and businesses. They arrive in a variety of ways, including on trailers, on boat hulls and motors, on fishing gear and through the pet trade.

"The best way for boaters to help protect our waters is by following the 'Clean-Drain-Dry' message," said Eric Fischer, aquatic invasive species coordinator for the DNR Division of Fish & Wild-

• Clean: When leaving the water, clean all equipment that touched the water. This includes watercraft hulls, trailers, shoes, waders, life vests, engines and other gear. Remove all visible plants, algae, animals and mud.

• Drain: Drain accumulated water from watercraft or gear, including live wells and transom wells, before leaving the ramp or public access point.

• Dry: Once home, let all gear dry for five days or more before using it in a different water body.

Some of the worst aquatic invasive species in other states have yet to be found in Indiana, according to Fischer, and the state wants to keep it that

Finally, remember that dumping bait or unwanted aquarium or terrarium pets can introduce invasive species to waterways. Dispose of all unused bait in a trash can instead of dumping it into the water or on the shore.

"Your diligence will help ensure that the next generation of Hoosiers can experience the same water activities that you enjoy," Fischer said.

If you suspect you have found an aquatic invasive plant, fish, mollusk or crustacean, report it to the Division of Fish & Wildlife at dnr.IN.gov/6385. htm, through the Report IN app at eddmaps.org/ indiana, or by calling the Invasive Species Hotline at 866-NO-EXOTIC (866-663-9684).






#### Spencer K. "Chip" Fulmer July 11, 1947 – May 14, 2018



#### James G. Reynolds June 18, 1935 – April 27, 2018

James G. Reynolds, 82, Ashland, Ohio, Professor emeritus of Ashland University, died April 27, 2018, at University Hospitals Samaritan Medical Cen-

ter in Ashland, following a period of declining health. Jim was born in Hamilton County on June 18, 1935 to Harold and Roberta Gordon Reynolds. The family lived in several Indiana

towns during WWII. In 1948 they settled in Greencastle, Ind., where Jim graduated from high school in 1954. At DePauw University (BA, 1958) he was a Rector Scholar, an

English and speech major, and a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon social fraternity. He was an English teacher at Kendallville High School in Kend-

allville, Ind., from 1958-59

At Indiana University (MA, 1961) in Bloomington, Ind., Jim studied playwriting under Professor Richard Moody and dramatic literary theory under Aristotelian world authority Professor Hubert C. Heffner.

As an instructor at The College of Wooster (1961-1964) he taught speech and theater courses and directed several dramas (most notably "The Crucible").

Jim spent two years as a freelance playwright in New York City during 1964-1966. In the fall of 1966 he started teaching at Ashland College and retired from Ashland University as a Professor Emeritus of English in 1998. He was a member of the Modern Language Association, the American Association of University Professors, and the Educational Theatre Association.

As well as teaching literature and writing courses (especially modern drama, the essay, existential literature, and playwriting), he was occasionally an advisor for "The Collegian," the university student newspaper. In the theater department Jim directed 43 productions. His presentations of Shakespeare's ("Hamlet, "Twelfth Night" and "Othello") were especially memorable, as were his contemporary interpretations of "Master Harold and the Boys," "Waiting for Godot" and "The Cherry Orchard."

Over the years Jim had various interests: He was a life-long fan of the Chicago Cubs; in the 1970s he constructed crossword puzzles for Dell Magazines, in the 1980s he played tournament bridge; in the 1990s he studied Shakespeare at Oxford University, England, and attended Shakespearean productions at Stratford-upon-Avon, the Globe Theatre in London and the festivals in Stratford, Canada.

In his retirement he continued his interest in New York Times Sunday puzzles and was a Sudoku enthusiast. He walked daily at the Ashland Family YMCA. He was a biannual participant in Almanac, the national trivia contest sponsored by The World Almanac (placing first in the state of Ohio in 2008). He was vociferous reader of contemporary noir detective fiction, Shakespearean criticism and memoirs.


He was preceded in death by his parents and twin sister, Judith Duane Reynolds, who died in 1995.

He is survived by many cousins in Indiana and close friends in Ashland, Wooster, Lakeside, and Maryland.

There will be no memorial services in Ashland. A private graveside burial took place in Cicero on May 5, 2018.




