After all, this happened literally in the school district next door to ours. Noblesville Schools Superintendent Beth Niedermeyer was an assistant superintendent at our local school district before assuming the Noblesville job. This all hits way too close to home.

Mayor Fadness posted on social media how he has listened and interacted with people around Fishers after what happened in Noblesville. He described the fear and uncertainty expressed to him by local parents. Our mayor is a father and says he understands those emotions. But the mayor wrote, "We are a community of action, not complacency."

Mendenhall gives moving speech at Fishers Memorial Day observance

Her husband, A.J. White, was a Marine who suffered injuries during a tour serving in Iraq. He retired from the Marine Corps as a result of those service-related medical conditions.

Jesse talked about the difficulty Adam had in dealing with his injuries after returning home. A.J. suddenly died due to an enlarged heart connected to his injuries suffered serving in Iraq. That left Jesse without her husband and their three small children fatherless. Jesse had high praise for

Folds of Honor, a group dedicated to assisting families like Jesse's. All three children were able to continue in their Catholic school due to assistance from Folds of Honor.

Jesse is now remarried and is pregnant. When Jesse told her story, it was hard to find a dry eye in the large crowd assembled at Liberty Plaza in downtown Fishers. Even Jesse had to compose herself a couple of times as she told her story.

Jesse's story is just one of the many stories among families with loved ones serving in our Armed Forces around the world. She was warmly received by the crowd, and this warmth had nothing to do with the thermometer reading.

Navy veteran El Ahlwardt was the master of ceremonies for the annual event, a task he has performed a number of times around Fishers. Mayor Scott Fadness made brief remarks as well.

Baseball sectional game breaks attendance record...

Jason Seaman honored with game ball

Hero teacher Jason Seaman made his first public appearances Monday, after being credited with tackling and disarming a student shooter in his classroom on Friday.

He was one of thousands of Noblesville Schools students, parents and staff who flooded into Don Dunker Field for the Noblesville High School baseball sectional game Monday morning.

Seaman arrived at the game just an hour after speaking to the media at the Noblesville Schools Administration Building, where he said his actions Friday were the only acceptable actions he could have taken. He thanked those who have helped him in his rapid recovery and thanked the community for coming together with such strength.

During the Memorial Day pregame program, the announcer commended Seaman, injured seventh grader Ella Whistler and the staff at West Middle School for their brave actions during Friday's shooting. The crowds held a moment of silence before listening to the national anthem and beginning the baseball game.

Seaman arrived shortly afterwards and was seated along the first baseline, in a shaded seated section reserved for school administrators and separated from the fans by a fence. He watched the game and was presented with the game baseball in the early innings.

"He saved everyone," said Mackenzie

Miller, an eighth-grader at West Middle attending the game. "It would have been so much worse if he hadn't been so brave."

"He kind of protected all of us because if that gunman had gotten out, all us eighth-graders would have been in the hallway, then it would have been a lot bigger," explained Ashley Nickley, Miller's classmate.

Miller admitted she normally wouldn't have attended Monday's baseball game, especially given the near-record heat, but wanted to support the community, Seaman

and Ella. "Everybody's here to get shirts and probably talk and heal a little bit," said Deb Satterfield, attending the game as an Hamilton Southeastern Royals baseball fan from Fishers. "I think it's fantastic that so many people from both sides are coming out to support the community, being right next door."

Seaman didn't address the crowd or greet individual students during the game, but many there knew he attended and said they were impressed he cared enough and was healthy enough to come.

"I think it's great for the students and the parents to know he's here and he's okay

Identity of school shooting suspect will not yet be released

There has been little to no information released about the suspected shooter in the May 25 Noblesville West Middle School, and according to the Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office, that is unlikely to change.

The prosecutor's office says they are bound by the Indiana Rules of Professional Conduct and juvenile law, which creates extra protections for children in Indiana. They limit the amount of information that can be released to the public.

The Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office released the following statement on the matter:

Due to the number of media inquiries, the State provides this release relating to the shooting

incident that occurred at Noblesville West Middle School on Friday, May 25. The investigation into the shooting remains ongoing. Not only are prosecutors bound by the Indiana Rules of Professional Conduct with respect to making extra-judicial statements, in this situation, juvenile law also creates additional protection for the privacy of children in Indiana and further limits the release of information to the pub-

lic. Whenever a petition has been filed alleging that a child is delinquent as the result of an alleged act that would be a felony if committed by an adult, only then may very limited information be released pursuant to statute. The State cannot confirm the identity of the suspect, describe the nature of the offense, detail any steps in litigation, and so forth until such a petition has been filed. If filed, a

petition would be filed within seven (7) business days of a detention hearing, as required by statute. The fact that a child has been alleged to be delinquent is merely an accusation, and the child is presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty. Given the express constraints of statutes and the rules, no further details will be provided. Should a petition be filed with the court, the State will supplement this release.

SAFE SCHOOLS

As a result, the City of Fishers and the Hamilton Southeastern School Corporation are planning to host a discussion about local school safety tonight at 6:30 p.m. at Hamilton Southeastern High School in the Leonard Auditorium. Those planning on attending are asked to enter at door Number 18, entrance to the College and Career Academy.

Based on the mayor's social media post, the first goal of this event is to explain to the community what city and school officials already have in place to keep students safe in our local schools, as well as additional steps being taken.

You will also learn how you, as a member of the local community, can play a role in school safety.

Finally, members of the public will be given an opportunity to comment on the plans outlined by city and school leaders.

It was good to hear from Noblesville Middle School teacher Jason Seaman as he spoke to the media Monday morning. He wasn't able to say much, but he clearly is uncomfortable in his sudden role as a public hero. It appears he wants some privacy and that's why the media conference was arranged and the school spokesperson made it clear Mr. Seaman will not be doing one-on-one interviews

with anyone at this time. But it is very good to see Mr. Seaman is in good enough health to get up before the media and make a statement. It is also good to hear the young girl injured in the shooting, Ella Whistler, is expected to make a full recovery.

HSE Schools are already on summer break, but Noblesville finishes up classes this week. Noblesville Police have issued a statement that there will be officers at every Noblesville School Building the rest of this week.

I also know there was increased police presence at HSE Schools after the Noblesville shooting, just to be on the safe side.

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PUBLIC WORKS

Companies of Indiana and a Bridge Design Award of Excellence by the Portland Cement Association.

"I am humbled to receive this honor, but I am even more excited to know that my dedicated staff and I are playing a role, alongside Mayor Brainard and our City Council, in increasing the quality of life for our local residents," Kashman said. "I feel very fortunate to have, for the past several years, played a key role in the planning and implementation of the incredible vision that Mayor Brainard has for this community."

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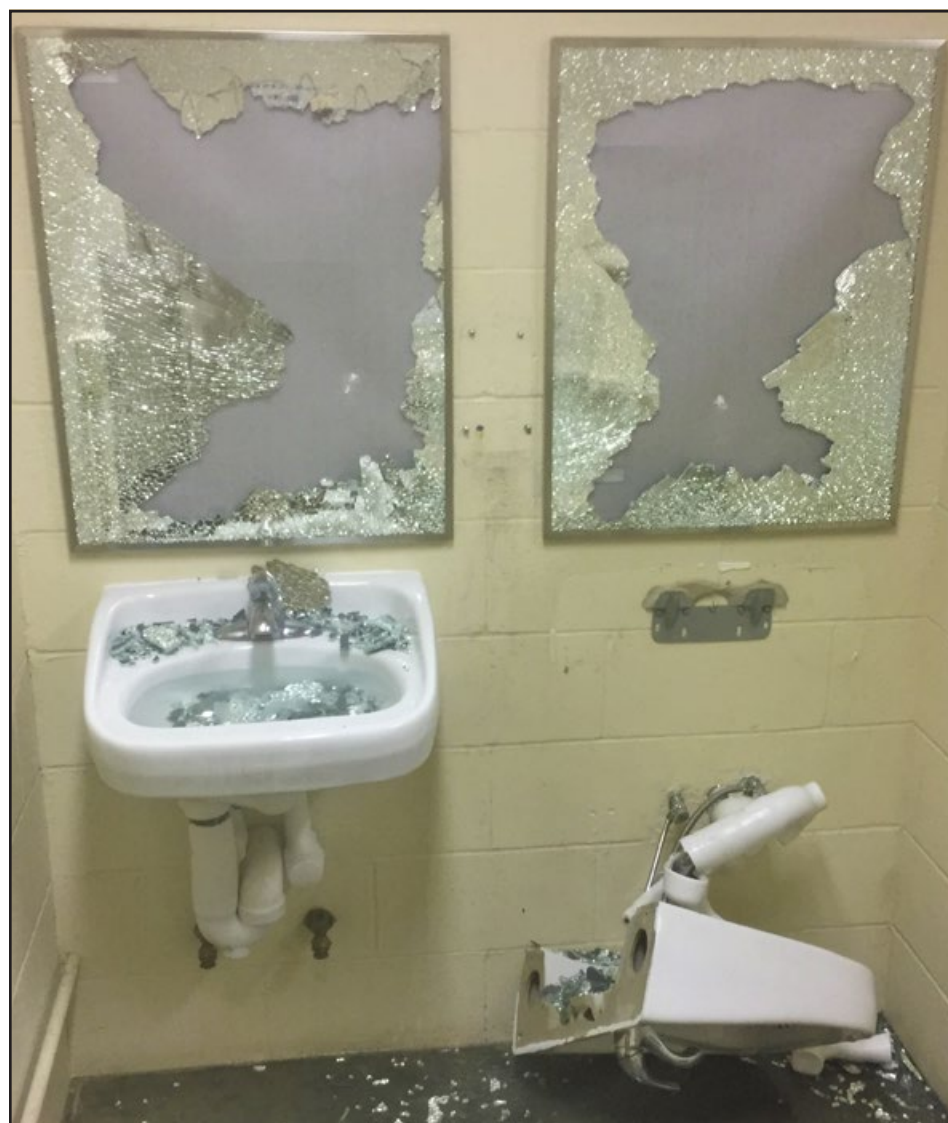

FBI urges internet users to reboot their routers

The FBI and US Department of Justice have released a public action notice for all internet router users to reboot their device due to a threat of malware known as "VPNFilter." This malware has been found in over 500,000 routers in 54 countries which Cisco Talos Intelligence has released a report discussing the findings.

When a router becomes infected, it allows hackers theft of website credentials and personal information. Taking it a step further, "VPNFilter" can also wipe portions of a device's firmware, either individually or multiple devices at once, making them unusable.

How do I reboot?

1. Unplug your router and wait 60 seconds before plugging it back in.
 2. If your router has an app, visit the device settings and click the reboot option.
- Rebooting the router will remove components of the VPNFilter malware and allow for the FBI to identify infected devices. Always remember to upgrade to the latest versions of firmware across your router, mobile device, tablet and computer to prevent any potential attacks from happening.

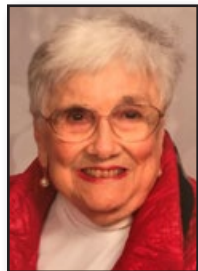

Tigers repeat as champions

NOBLESVILLE – Raising both arms victoriously as Ben Burton made a diving catch in left field for the final out on Monday night, Fishers' Matthew Wolff knew exactly what to do next.

With his head on a swivel, the senior pitcher caught a glimpse of catcher Alex Jamieson closing in fast before he turned and lowered the celebratory boom.

"After our dogpile for conference, Kiel (Brenczewski) had a tackle on Jamieson, and he tweeted out to our football coach. I knew I could definitely tackle better," Wolff boasted. "I wanted to show it off."

Spearing Jamieson in midair for an open-field takedown near the mound, Wolff nor his intended target felt any pain as the Class 4A No. 1 Tigers swarmed and pounced atop the duo on Donald J. Dunker Field.

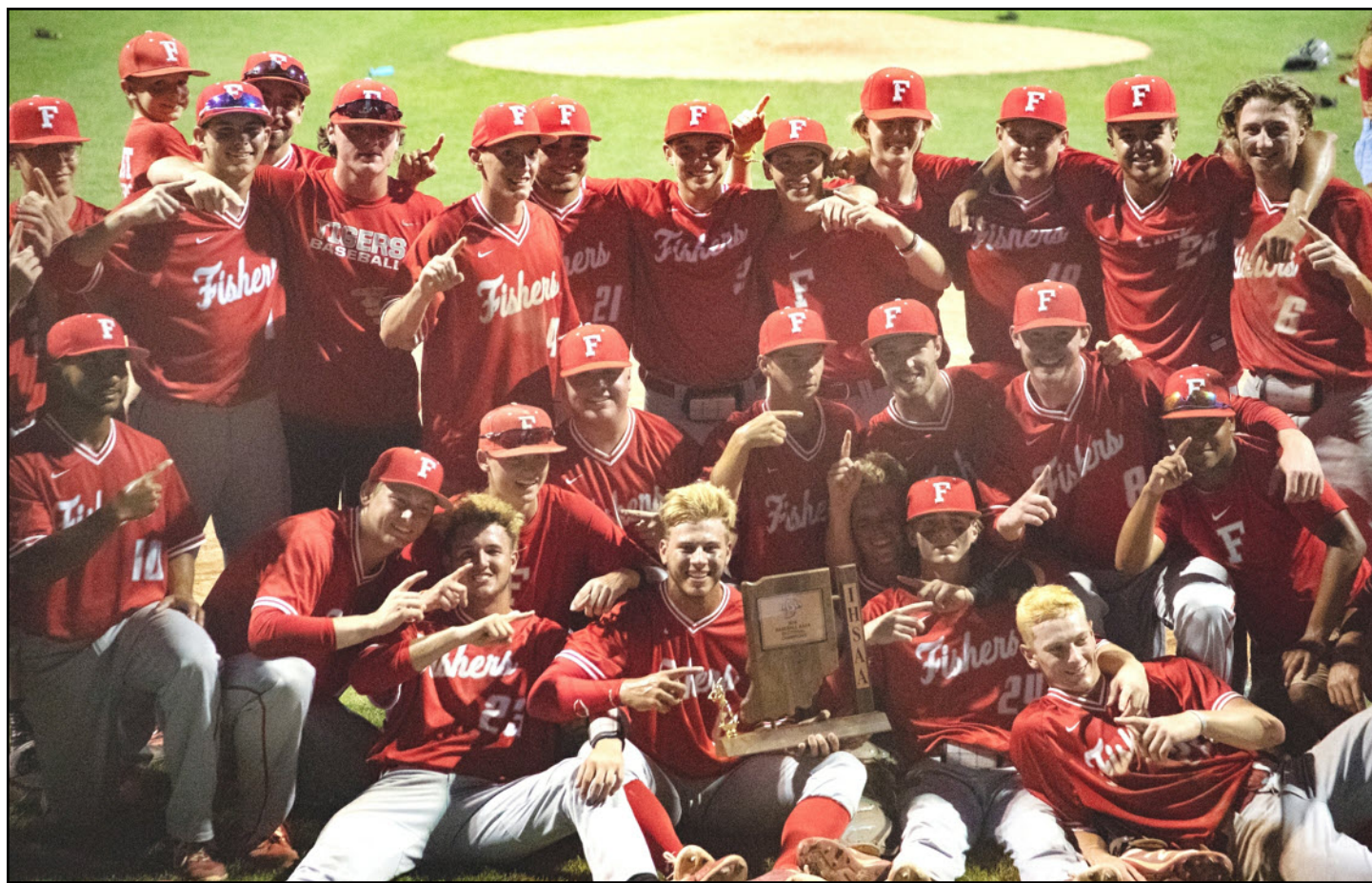
After breaking a late 3-3 tie with a two-run top of the seventh to upend Noblesville 5-3 in the Sectional 8 finals on Memorial Day, the Tigers collectively stuck the landing as repeat champions.

Starter Grant Richardson overcame some momentary command issues to pitch a quality four-hitter through five innings, Burton laced a clutch go-ahead RBI-triple in the seventh and Wolff closed out the Tigers' eighth straight win in 1 1/3 innings of hitless relief.

"He tackled me in the air," Jamieson remarked while shaking his head at Wolff's gridiron antics. "It was all fun. It was great."

When the Tigers (25-7) needed to be, they were just as profound, especially in pressure moments against an inspired Noblesville Millers (21-11), who were playing with Friday morning's school shooting at Noblesville West Middle School in their hearts and minds.

Both the Millers' semifinal morning game, which ended in a 6-3 win over Hamilton Southeastern, and their title game against Fishers drew massive crowds at The Dunk.

More than \$10,000 were raised throughout the day to aid acclaimed hero and Noblesville West Middle School teacher Jason Seaman and critically-wounded student Ella Whistler. The Millers primary objective by night's end was to win, not only to end their own four-year sectional drought, but for a community slowly trying to heal.

"It was a lot. The past 72 to 96 hours have been a tough experience for us," Noblesville head coach Justin Keever said. "But baseball has been that refuge for us and helps with that healing. These kids wanted

to win a sectional championship. That was their goal tonight. Unbelievable atmosphere tonight, unbelievable support from our community. We just couldn't get the job done tonight."

It wasn't from a lack of trying.

The Millers loaded the bases five times in the game and had five runners in scoring position through the first three innings, but they were held in check by Richardson, who retired the side with three straight strikeouts to end both the first and second innings.

"I had full confidence. He's been pitching great all year," Jamieson said. "I had no doubt he was going to get it done."

The Indiana recruit issued two walks to open the bottom of the first and issued another free pass to start the second, followed by a single to fellow future Hoosier Reese Sharp and a walk to Ethan Imel.

Despite the shaky stretch, Richardson was difficult to break. The left-hander struck out 10 batters, walked six and surrendered just one run in the bottom of the fifth – a RBI-sacrifice fly with the bases loaded by Jacob Thieman.

Richardson ended four of his five innings with strikeouts before getting lifted once he reached 116 pitches. Noblesville left 11 runners stranded in the game.

"He's really good. He can strike guys out and get out of the inning, so we were confident that maybe he could get a strikeout. There were less than two outs a couple of times with a guy on third, and he's one of the best we have to get strikeouts," Fishers head coach Matthew Cherry said. "We decided in the fifth we were going to try to get him through and go to our bullpen as long as his pitch count didn't go up past the 120 mark."

The Tigers offense provided Richardson with breathing room, scoring one run in the top of the first and two more in the fourth.

Wolff drove in the first run with a two-out RBI-single to bring home senior Craig Yoho from second base. In the fourth, Jamieson lined an RBI-single to left field, plating Brenzewski from second. Nick Lukac added the third run with an RBI-double.

"It pushed everyone to the max watching (Grant) battle out there, knowing we had to have his back," Fishers senior outfielder J.J. Woolwine said. "With our team, we never give up. We're never out of anything, and we go into attack mode the second we have pressure on us."

The Millers tested the theory behind a two-run, one-hit bottom of the sixth.

Trailing 3-1, Noblesville rallied back with two outs and Sharp on base with a leadoff walk. A second walk by relief pitcher Alex Klotz to Tyler Owens setup a two-out, RBI-single by Indiana verbal commit Cooper Miles.

A throwing error to first base on an A.J. Goudy grounder to second base off a 0-1 offering from Wolff tied the game 3-3 as Owens scored from third base.

"We got a little worried after the sixth, but then we got back together as a group and calmed down," Brenzewski said. "We got the job done. We got the W."

Jack Roudebush initiated the comeback charge with a one-out single to center field in the top of the seventh. Burton, the Tigers' nine-hole hitter and a converted middle infielder, punctuated the opportunity with an RBI-triple to right field.

"For me, I had to go up there and do something for my brothers," Burton said. "I had to do something to help us win this game. It might not have been that hit, but it might have been moving that runner over, do something, and that's exactly what I did. "I stuck with it, and what do you know? I can play outfield now, too."

Woolwine tacked on the insurance run with an RBI groundout.

Wolff and Jamieson teamed to do the rest with a strikeout and a pair of pop ups, including a diving stab by Burton to seal the program's second sectional title all time.

"(Ben) has made some great plays for us out in left, and again, I'm so proud of him because he's playing a position he didn't really want to in the beginning, but he's bought in and helped us get to where we're at," Cherry said. "That's kind of what their motto has been, 'just keep going until we run out of time.'"

For the Tigers, the season extends a minimum of five more days. They will next meet Zionsville in the Lafayette Jefferson Regional semifinals on Saturday morning in a rematch of last year's regional finals when the Eagles halted the Tigers postseason run.

"It's definitely not the last one. We're going to see a lot more," Jamieson remarked on the team's game-ending dogpile. "We're ready to be in this time and show out."

Trailblazers get hot, cruise to sectional championship

University claimed its first sectional championship in five years on Monday, winning 11-0 over Indiana School for the Deaf for the Class 1A Sectional 58 title.

The Trailblazers hosted the sectional this year at their home field of RoundTripper Academy. Despite starting the championship game at 11 a.m., it was a hot and humid final. But University, the No. 1-ranked team in the Prep Baseball Report (PBR) rankings, got hot in the third inning, scoring five runs to take control of the game.

Asher Thompson and Dawson Estep both drew walks, then each advanced a base after Garrett Hill hit a single into left field. Brock Moore stepped up next, and his left field hit sent Thompson and Estep home.

Tyler Galyean scored both Hill and Moore with a double, then got home himself on a wild pitch. With that, the 'Blazers had a 5-0 lead and had managed to get past ISD's pitcher Kolton Dickerson, who had thrown six strikeouts in the first two innings, giving up just one hit in the second inning.

"That kid could really throw, and he established fastballs up in the zone," said UHS coach Chris Estep. "We didn't make an adjustment until about the third inning on

him. And once we made the adjustment, we put up five runs. I thought that kid threw a really good game. You can't take anything away from them."

Meanwhile, Moore was pitching for the Trailblazers, and he threw an exceptional game. He didn't allow a base runner until the fourth inning, and didn't give up his first hit until the fifth inning. Moore finished the game with 12 strikeouts against three hits and no walks.

"He did a fantastic job today," said Estep. "When you get into this, it's all about pitching and defense, and the offense is going to come how it's going to come because the pitchers are going to throw great games against you."

"I thought I just needed to work inside, because I realized they're a little late on my fastball," said Moore. "So I just kept working my fastball inside and see what they could do with it."

Moore also credited his defense with helping him out with balls that were put in play - "they were always there for me," he said.

The 'Blazers added two runs in the fifth inning. Estep and Hill got on base with singles, then both were scored on another base hit from Galyean.

University scored four runs in the seventh inning. Estep got home on a wild pitch, then Galyean smacked his second double of the day to get Hill and Ben Westerkamm home. That put Galyean's RBI total at six RBIs for the day on a perfect hitting day, 4-for-4 at the plate.

Reggie Mables, one of the Trailblazer's seniors, scored University final run of the game. He was sent home when Ryan Williams drew a bases-loaded walk.

"It feels really good to bring it back to University, especially for all the sophomores, all the juniors and the freshmen that are on the team, so they can get it and so they understand the work that it takes next year and the years ahead to get it," said Cade Carlson, another senior on the team. "And also for my brother who went here and got a few sectional championships, and it hasn't been back to University since he was there."

"When you're in the process of building a program, it's those guys that have been with you for a long time and these seniors have helped build this program," said Estep. "Now the foundation may be, we've got some sophomores and some freshmen, juniors. But at the end of the day, it's the seniors and their leadership that takes you from Point A to Point B. And hopefully in

this case, it takes us a lot further."

University is 25-5 for the season. The 'Blazers will play at the Morristown regional on Saturday, taking on Indianapolis Lutheran in the first semi-final at 10 a.m. Seventh-ranked Shakamak and No. 3 Hauser will play in the second semi-final at noon, with the championship game set for 7 p.m.

Will Power said he “couldn’t stop screaming” after he won the 102nd running of the Indianapolis 500 on Sunday. Power won his first-ever 500 by 3.1589 seconds over Ed Carpenter, ending the race as champion after starting from the third position. The 37-year-old Power became the first Australian to win the race, and received prize money of \$2.52 million at the Monday victory banquet.

“I was wondering if I was ever going to win it, and thoughts went through my mind during the month like that,” said Power. In my career, I’ve had so many wins, so many poles. But everyone always talks about the ‘500.’ And I won it. I just couldn’t imagine winning a race in front of crowd like this, this many people. It’s just amazing. What an event. I love it.”

After placing 22nd in his first 500 back in 2013, Daly had a string of frustrations at the race, but was finally able to put together a solid performance in 2018. Daly started from the 33rd position, so he improved by a respectable 12 spots.

Pictured at right is Ed Jones, who finished 31st after making contact during Lap 57. Jones wasn’t the only driver to have bad luck. Notable names such as Tony Kanaan, Danica Patrick, Helio Castroneves and last year’s winner Takuma Sato all saw their Indy 500 days end early due to contact.
