

Noblesville creates website about golf cart usage, regulations

Earlier this year, the Noblesville Common Council adopted an ordinance to allow the operation of golf carts upon city streets within certain subdivisions and neighborhoods. To further educate the public and homeowner associations, the city has created a new website, cityofnoblesville.org/golfcarts, which provides frequently asked questions, the approved ordinance, an informative brochure, the approval process for neighborhoods and other information regarding the use of golf carts in Noblesville.

"The City of Noblesville welcomes the use of golf carts in our community as a way for residents to travel short distances within neighborhoods and from neighbor-


hood to neighborhood. But public safety is always our top concern," Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear said.

Officials also want to remind residents of several conditions within the ordinance to ensure the safe, permitted use of golf carts.

· Golf carts are described as a vehicle with four wheels sub-

stantially similar to vehicles originally designed for operation on a golf course and powered by a battery or internal combustion engine. This does not include ATVs, off road vehicles or four-wheelers.

• To drive a golf cart, you must possess a valid driver's license. If an unlicensed



• Drivers must abide by all traffic regulations applicable to vehicular traffic when using the authorized streets and parking areas of the city.

• Driving golf carts is only permitted within established

Ditslear subdivisions and neighborhoods that have complied with section 76.06 of Ordinance No. 60-12-17. Golf carts are not permitted on city trails and sidewalks and shall not be operated on any city street having a posted speed limit in excess of 25 mph.



Golf Carts in Noblesville

The City of Noblesville welcomes the use of golf carts in our community as a way for residents to travel short distances within neighborhoods and from neighborhood to neighborhood. But public safety is always our top concern.

Effective January 2018, Noblesville Common Council adopted an ordinance to allow the operation of golf carts upon city streets within certain subdivisions and neighborhoods - with limitations that are required for the safe, permitted use of golf carts.



Any violation of this ordinance or failure to comply with any of its requirements is a \$50 fine for the first offense; \$150 for a second offense; and \$300 for each additional offense (within a rolling each additional oriense (within a folling 12-month period). Additionally, penalties listed do not include court costs and fees that may be imposed by Noblesville City Court in addition to the penalty. A Noblesville Police Officer has the

discretion to issue any citations of an unlicensed juvenile to their guardians. Also, golf carts not in drivable condition or having a licensed driver may be towed at the police officer's discretion. All violations of Ordinance No. 60-12-

17 shall be docketed with the Noble City Court

What equipment is required?

· Operational headlamps: (2 required

or one long bar across the front) • Two operational tail lamps • Operational turn signals for left and

right turning. · Rearview mirror (mounted either in

center of golf cart or on each side) Slow moving vehicle emblem triangular emblem must be clearly visible and mounted to the rear with the base no lower than 3 feet nor the top higher than 5 feet from the ground. The emblem must not be obstructed

 The City of Noblesville and Police Department strongly recommend golf carts have side reflectors (2 front amber in color and 2 red in color), brake lights and an operational parking brake.

*All equipment must meet Indiana and Federal motor vehicle safety standards.

Only subdivisions or neighborhoods with a governing body, home-owners association or decision-making board authorized to speak on behalf of the welfare of the neighborhood are allowed to participate. If your neighborhood does not have one of the three listed above, golf carts are not permitted.

 The governing body must submit written certification to the Noblesville Police Department stating the board approves the use of golf carts within its community.

 The governing body also must notify the Noblesville Street Department. The Street Department will create and install signage at each entrance to the subdivision. The governing body will pay \$75 per sign that needs to be installed by the street department. Golf carts are not permitted to be used until the proper lineared in glaced in the subdivision. signage is placed in the subdivision

A neighborhood may rescind its approval by submitting a letter to NPD.

The driver must possess a valid driver's license or learner's permit

regulations applicable to vehicular traffic when using the authorized streets and parking areas of the city.

Can I drive on multi-use paths or through City parks?

No. Ordinance No. 49-10-17 prohibits motorized vehicles from using trails and sidewalks and limits the use such areas to pedestrians, bicyclists and recreational users. Violations may be fined a minimum of \$100

Where can I drive my golf cart?

Driving golf carts is only permitted within established subdivisions and neighborhoods that have complied with section 76.06 of Ordinance No. 60-12-17.

· Golf carts shall not be operated or any City street having a posted speed limit in excess of 25 mph.

Golf carts may cross a street that has a posted speed limit in excess of 25 mph, but no greater than 45 mph, when crossed at intersections in a path perpendicular to the streets or highways.

Golf cart operators shall stay in the far right of the travelled portion of the road and yield the right-of-way to over-taking vehicles as soon as possible to do so safely.

So how did the Pences end up in Sheridan? That is a long and winding story. Les was an educator; specifically, he was a music teacher. After high school in Columbia City, he went to Morehead State College in Kentucky and earned a degree in music education. Interestingly enough, while in college he formed a student jazz band which played at various Kentucky venues and became so well known that the Governor named him an honorary Kentucky Colonel, an honor he cherishes to this day!

After college and a stint in the Army, Les moved at times. After arrival in

Still trying to Save the Nickel Plate

Dear Editor:

After multiple FOIA requests, neither Noblesville nor Fishers have been able to provide a key legal document which would show how they bypassed the Indiana Transportation Museum's (ITM) original right to purchase the Nickel Plate Railroad. Documents obtained show that the previous railroad owners, Norfolk & Western, entered an exclusive two-year lease with option to purchase agreement with the ITM on Feb. 27, 1992. On Nov. 1, 1993, Noblesville and Fishers notified ITM that they would be exercising ITM's option to buy the railroad. What remains missing is any proof that Noblesville and Fishers had the legal right to purchase the railroad, instead of ITM.

As you are likely aware, the mayors of Fishers and Noblesville announced plans in 2017 to convert a functional, intact, 9.2-mile stretch of the current Nickel Plate Heritage Railroad (NKP) into a walking and biking trail between their communities. The trail plans call for the removal of the rail, which will cut off access to over 18 miles of the active line from



Noblesville into Indianapolis.

Until 2015, the NKP was host to a variety of railroad excursions operated by the ITM with permission from the Hoosier Heritage Port Authority (HHPA). Most popular among the train excursions were the Indiana State Fair Train (Fishers to Indianapolis) and the Polar Bear Express (Fishers to the "North Pole"). After the HHPA suspended ITM's rail operations due to track safety concerns (despite the FRA's recent inspection approving the railroad for use) all rail activity came to a halt, allowing for city leaders to suggest a plan to convert the "unused" rails to a trail.

Former mayor of Noblesville Mary Sue Rowland said, "It is impossible to imagine that future administrations would aggressively try to dismantle the historic museum and railroad corridor as is being done today, disregarding the years of tourism that has attracted millions of dollars in economic development opportunities along with many thousands of visitors and citizens experiencing a rare ride on an historic train ... It is now clear, the 25 years of dedication and hard work has been declared a waste, with rails and history having no value on today's market. Once the rails are gone and another trail is in place, the rail line

When plans to convert nearly 10 miles of the historic Nickel Plate railroad to a trail were announced on Feb. 28, 2017, the community immediately sprang

Nearly 400 residents packed each of the "public listening sessions" hosted in Fishers and Noblesville in March. With nearly 80 percent of the attendees opposing the removal of the railroad, 14 individuals met and formed a grassroots organization called "Save the Nickel Plate," which now reflects the sen-timents of more than 12,000 people who support op-

Save the Nickel Plate's solution is to build trails next to the rails (rails-with-trails), explore cultural and economic development opportunities, and build and strengthen two assets - not just one. The organization wants to retain and enhance a feature that

"I stand with the thousands of citizens who believe that the plan by Fishers and Noblesville should be reversed and the historic rail line should remain as an important historic part of Hamilton County connecting Indianapolis to towns north expanding opportunities and vision yet to be discovered," says

Research by community members has found:

• No safety violations were ever identified in any of the official reports and studies conducted.

• The trail construction estimates outline a minimum of \$13.3 million to build the trail in taxpayer

• All available data shows that a minimum of 60 percent of area residents support continued or expanded use of the railroad. In addition, more than 12,000 people have signed the petition to save the



Carmel wins, Gingerich is GC's first medalist

The individual and team champions at Thursday's Lafayette Jefferson boys golf regional took different paths to their victories, but both were impressive nonetheless.
