

Police catch 3 in connection to Carmel car dealer theft

Police said an officer witnessed thieves stealing cars from a dealership Tuesday.

Officers arrested three people, but more may still be at large. It began around 2:15 a.m. at Penske Chevrolet, 3210 E. 96th St., just west of Keystone Parkway.

According to Carmel Police Department, the suspects smashed the windows to gain access to key boxes attached to the windows. Investigators said they believe the suspects intended to steal the vehi-

Penske operators said that the suspects damaged 30 to 40 vehicles. The operators were doing inven-

tory Tuesday to determine exactly how many vehicles were stolen. Penske leaders believe the thieves caused at least \$90,000 in damage.


"We have security cameras all the way around the building. We have motion sensors. I'm sure that

New office building planned for downtown Fishers

Office space in Fishers is a very scarce resource, but more is on the way. The City of Fishers and the Hageman Group have entered into a

project agreement for an office building, which was approved Monday night by the Fishers City Council. The plans call for a 31,000-squarefoot office structure with a total investment of \$8.5 million as lease commitments are finalized.

The office building will be multi-storied, located at 8939 Technology Way, across from the Meyer Najem building. The city hopes this will become a gateway to the Fishers Certified Tech Park. The park already houses operations such as Launch Fishers, the IoT Lab and Netfor.

"This will add needed office space to our downtown office inventory," said Brandon Dickinson, Director of Economic Development at the Monday night city council session. "We honestly can't build it fast enough for the demand that we have."

Fishers officials say the city will provide the land, \$2.05 million in

bond proceeds through Tax Increment Financing and a waiver of impact fees to assist with development costs, but only in the event the building is preleased and under construction within 30 months with a minimum private investment of \$5.6 million.

"Innovation companies are looking for a place to call home in Fishers and this development provides another opportunity for growing companies to join the entrepreneurial economy here in our city," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness in a city news release

The downtown area of Fishers has seen \$430 million in development over the past three years.

we can take a look at that and see if maybe they scoped out our place or anything like that," Siaba said.

According to Penske, the thieves got into their gated lot because of construction on Keystone Parkway that left an opening to their property. The Carmel officer who spotted the thieves early Tuesday attempted to pull over the suspects, but, according to police, they led police on a high-speed chase on Intersatate 465, with speeds reaching 100 mph. Police ended the chase.

Not long after, however, officers arrested three suspects in connection to the thefts: Two juveniles and an adult. Police identified the adult as Gerron Arnes Delaney, 24. All of the suspects are from St. Louis. Investigators said they believe at least three other suspects are at large.

There was no word on the suspects' connection to Indianapolis.

"It's very disheartening for any business in this area to be impacted the way they were," said Siaba at Coast to Coast.

Investigators said they are not sure where the suspects intended to take the vehicles or how many they planned to steal.

Arrowood issues statement on HHSC safety

In the aftermath of another tragic school shooting, especially one so close to home, I felt it was important to reach out to reassure you that the safety of



our students and staff remain a top priority at Hamilton Heights. As an educator and parent of a child at Heights, I deeply care about providing the safest and most secure learning environment possible.

Very reasonably, over the past couple of weeks, I have been asked about our security procedures, the types of security measures we have in place, and where we plan to go in the future with respect to school safety. There is always a fine balance between increased security and creating

a welcoming atmosphere for students, parents and the community. That balance is continually discussed and debated on a regular basis.

Student safety has long been a top priority of our School Board and entire staff with safety procedures and protocols in place long before I arrived five years ago. These procedures and

protocols are under continuous review and scrutiny as we look to the latest research, tools, and technology to improve and enhance our school safety measures.

Heights employs three full-time, onsite resource officers through a partnership with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department. We have a safety coordinator at each building, an internal Safety Leadership Team, and a Corporation School Safety Team, which meets regularly to review and make the best recommendations to keep our students and staff safe so they can do what they do best - learn and teach.

We will be holding sev-

eral special meetings in July and August to discuss our current safety measures, examine new training opportunities, discuss the role of mental health and school violence, and examine future safety enhancements.

The meetings will include the entire corporation School Safety team, our safety coordinators, and representatives from the Hamilton County Emergency Management, Sheriff's, Atlanta, Arcadia, Cicero Police, Jackson Township Fire, and Cicero Fire Departments.

Prior to the start of school, we will host a school safety information meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 1 for parents and families. At the meeting we'll provide an update on our latest safety measures, share research and facts related to school violence, and offer a Q & A session with Heights administrators and Safety Team members. In addition, our Resource Officers will give a presentation on their role and function. Additional details for this meeting will be forthcoming.

As our focus on safety initiatives, ongoing training, and applying the latest technological advances in safety and security continues, I would like to remind you that one of the most powerful weapons in the effort to improve school safety is to work together as families, friends, neighbors, and community to watch out for each other and to report unsafe conditions or concerning behavior

I was once asked what is the best part about being Superintendent of Hamilton Heights School Corporation. The answer is simple: I have never served in a community that cares more about their community's children than the people of the Hamilton Heights area. I have also been asked what is the hardest part of being Superintendent of HHSC. The answer is the same and I couldn't be more thankful. Thanks for caring about our children.

Reader lists reasons to put the brakes on commuter tax

Dear Editor:

Twice this year, my dad, who lives in the Nora area of Indianapolis, has gotten a flat tire due to an extremely deep chuckhole along Westfield Boulevard between 86th Street and Real Street. Finally, after months of request for action, the City finally patched these chuckholes but these patches are only temporary.

The impact of the citywide potholes south of 96th Street is huge. Lower and middle class families are facing the financial burden of paying hundreds of dollars to pay for flat tires and realignments. Some are late to work or can't show up due to a lack of transportation.

The problem is real, and yes, I live in Carmel where the roads are smooth and the potholes are filled quickly, but this is an issue that needs to be addressed by the entire region. We don't want to see our neighbors to the south crumble to pieces and we want to help.

Some are calling for a commuter tax to fix these concerns.

It's important to note that Carmel has more residents coming into the city during the day than leaving (a 14 percent net gain). So Carmel would actually make money with a commuter tax. It's still not a great idea for the following reasons:

Commuters are not a drain

While it's true that commuters drive on Indianapolis streets without paying local income tax to the area, they do go out to eat and support Indianapolis businesses which in turn pay property taxes. It could be argued that if not for the influx of workers from neighboring cities, the Indianapolis businesses that employ them and provide food and services to them would pay much less in property taxes – funds that flow to cities.

In addition, sales tax and food/beverage tax are boosted by commuters, a portion of which flow to cities. Finally, the businesses employing commuters headquartered in Indianapolis also pay taxes to the City. And, of course, not everyone who drives into Indianapolis does so for work. I only really go into Indianapolis for entertainment such as Pacers games or going out to eat. But if Indianapolis doesn't invest in its roads, I might not choose to travel south anymore because I can't risk the damage to my car.

Hard to determine impact

These proposals are based on the assumption that commuters are causing wear and tear on Indianapolis-owned roads. While this is certainly true, it's hard to determine to what extent. Many commuters choose to take state roads or interstates such as I-465, I-65 or I-69. It would be hard to determine how many local roads are truly affected by commuters and some of the streets in the worst conditions in Indianapolis are far away from the circle or downtown Indianapolis. They're in mostly residential areas.

Furthermore, not everyone who works

at an Indianapolis business negatively affects Indianapolis roads. Some carpool, bike or take a bus. Some work from home several days a week even though the office is in Indianapolis. Many salespeople at Indianapolis-based businesses spend more time driving on the roads in Carmel driving to clients. And how do you factor for someone who works just over the county border? They could drive miles through Carmel or Fishers and literally be on the other side of 96th Street and suddenly taxes need to be redistributed.

It's taxation without representation

If part of your taxes went to Indianapolis, their City-County Council — which you can't vote for - gets to decide how to spend it. It's essentially taxation without representation. If the money isn't spent wisely, you couldn't hold the elected officials accountable.

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



Tyler wins high jump at USATF Juniors

Shelby Tyler's last two trips to Bloomington have been quite successful.

On June 1, the Noblesville senior-to-be won went to Indiana University and won the high jump in the IHSAA girls track and field state finals. This past Saturday, Tyler returned to IU and won a national championship - and a trip to Finland.

Tyler won the high jump in the USA Track & Field (USATF) Junior Outdoor Championship, which took place this past weekend in Bloomington. Tyler won with a jump of 6 feet, 3/4 inches.

"It was exciting," said Tyler during an interview on MileSplit (http://www.milesplit.com/videos/298082). "It was a good competition here, it was a really fun meet and I've had an incredible amount of support from almost everyone. So it's been wonderful."

Tyler went toe-to-toe with another state champion, Sanaa Barnes from Byron Nelson High School, which is located north of Fort Worth, Texas. Barnes won the high jump state championship as a junior in 2017 in Class 6A, the highest of Texas' track classifications, and was runner-up this year as a senior.

Both Tyler and Barnes cleared the 6 feet, 3/4 inch mark, but Tyler did so on her first trv. Barnes made it on her second try, so Tyler got the win for her third major championship at IU. Tyler also won the IHSAA high jump state championship in 2017 as a sophomore.

"It's awesome," said Tyler. "I love this facility. It's brought good outcomes for me. It's also a familiar place, which I think helps a little bit, because I've been here quite a few times jumping."

Soto finished fourth in the high jump (6 feet, 2 inches) to increase his lead over Haack, who took eighth in that event (5 feet, 11-1/2 inches). After that, Soto was first in the 400 dash (49.95 seconds) with Haack second (50.15 seconds). Halfway through, Soto had 3,727 points and Haack 3,665.

Haack surged into the lead in the sixth event, which is one of his specialties: The 110 hurdles. He finished first in that event (14.58 seconds), while Soto placed 11th. From that point forward, Haack stayed in front, outperforming Soto in the next three events: The discus (fifth place; 125 feet, 6 inches), the pole vault (first place; 15 feet, 5 inches) and the javelin throw (second

place; 151 feet, 3 inches). After nine events, Haack had 6,545 points to Soto's 6,313. The final event was the 1500 meter run, in which Soto finished first with a time of 4:35.07. Haack placed sixth in 5:02.58, but earned enough points

to keep the lead. Haack has committed to the University of Iowa and will participate on the Hawkeyes' track and field team.






