## County 911 sets statewide example

Hamilton County Public Safety Communications Executive Director Mike Snowden was recently honored by his peers for helping establish a statewide training standard for 911 dispatchers.

The Don Kottowski Award is an award presented by the Indiana chapter of APCO (Association of Public-safety Communication Officials), an international professional organization for 911 centers. The Indiana chapter provides the award annually to the director they believe has had the most impact on statewide issues.

Snowden's award was presented by APCO at the 2018 Indiana NENA (National Emergency Number Association) and APCO Conference.

"It's humbling to know that the work you are doing is being recognized," Snowden told The Reporter.

Snowden said he does not know who put him up for the award and did not know he would be presented with the award before the conference. He does, however, know why he was chosen.

"The statewide 911 board exists, and they collect a lot of money every year from cellphone and wire-line telephones," Snowden explained. "\$1 each for every month. That gets distributed to the PSAPs (Public Safety Answering Points) throughout the state in

all 92 counties. There are about 120 PSAPs throughout the state. I went to them because no one was training our folks."

There are no requirements in the State of Indiana for training for dispatchers.

There no certification or licensing for dispatchers in the state.

There is no required continuing education.

"When I got here Hamilton County created our own," Snowden said.


"We have our own minimum training standards for ourselves because

no one else is holding us accountable. We are holding ourselves accountable."

Snowden approached the state 911 board two years ago and asked them to set aside money to do training for all the telecommunications in the State of Indiana.

"We are thrilled to welcome someone with Davis' extensive experience to our team," said Executive Director Deanna



## The French connection with Hamilton County

Bastille Day, the French equivalent to our Fourth of July, is Saturday, and, oddly enough, it's going to be celebrated in Carmel this year.

Probably unknown to planners of the event and most of the participants is the fact that there is a historic French connection with Hamilton County that dates back 200 years or more.

Most of Anglo-American settlers concentrated on Indiana-American settlers who arrived in the early 19th century. Actually, the French established settlements in what is now Indiana as early as 1732. Military outposts were built at Vincennes, Fort Wayne and near Lafayette to strengthen France's claim to the Ohio Valley.

A big part of the French presence also centered on the fur trade between French-

men and native American Indians. Early French traders moved along the rivers and streams in dugout canoes gathering prized beaver pelts from the Indians in exchange for blankets, steel knives, iron pots, axes and other goods previously unknown to the natives.

Among these traders was Michel Brouillette, born in 1774 at the French community of Vincennes. Although the British controlled the area by that time, many French traders and settlers remained. Brouillette (later Anglicized as Brewit) and probably a companion, plied the White River and other streams in central Indiana.

According to research done by the late Rue Hinshaw, Carmel historian and community leader, Brewit established a trading

post in what is now Carmel. The years of his presence in the area are unknown, but probably between 1800 and 1820. Hinshaw found artifacts on his property from an Indian encampment that was located near what is believed to be the site of the trading post.

Brewit was more than just a fur trader. He spoke several Indian dialects and aided Gov. William Henry Harrison in his dealings with the local tribes. He was able to gain access to the Indian settlement at Prophetstown to assess the number of warriors gathering there in 1811 prior to the Battle of Tippecanoe and report his findings to Harrison. Later he was appointed an Indian Agent by Harrison.

By the 1820s and 30s, settlers were flooding into central Indiana. The fur trade died off as the Indians left and the

land was cleared for farming. Brewit went back to Vincennes, entered the grocery business and died in 1838.

His Vincennes home is still standing. It is the only known French house left in

the city. It consists of vertical log and stucco construction unlike American pioneer homes of horizontal log construction. It is listed as one of the historic sites in Vincennes.

So, as the crowd gathers

Saturday for Bastille Day in Carmel to enjoy French music, food and dancing, few will know that they are within a stone's throw of where a real French connection was made two centuries ago.

"They finally – through a lot of negotiation – said 'yes' when they had some end-of-year money in fiscal 2016," Snowden said. "They set aside some money and started promulgating rules. I helped with the rule creation for what was going to be paid for."

Those rules came into effect in January 2018.

"In six months they have spent a couple hundred thousand dollars training dispatchers throughout the state," Snowden told The Reporter. "They will continue to do that in perpetuity as long as there is a funding source for it. The award I got was for that idea: To help train people to do their jobs."

By way of comparison, Snowden noted a person has to have hundreds of hours of training and be certified to cut someone's hair or to do nails. Meanwhile, you do not have to have one minute of training, according to the State of Indiana, to be a dispatcher. That is because there is no law that requires a set number of hours of basic training or any continuing education in order to work as a public safety telecommunicator.

When the Noblesville West Middle School shooting occurred, local dis-

patchers had been trained the day before on how to handle it. That is because at the local level, Hamilton County does not believe zero hours of training is acceptable.

"I am eternally grateful for this award," Snowden said. "It was an honor. It really was humbling that my peers thought enough of me to say I deserved that award. But the reality is we are just trying to make sure folks know how to do their jobs."

Snowden said he thinks consistent training standards are necessary for the safety of all Hoosiers.

"Hamilton County has a very mobile citizenry," Snowden said. "We are going down to the lake. We are going up to the dunes. We are going to Bloomington and Lafayette. We are on our way to Fort Wayne. If you have an emergency [on one of those trips] and you call for help, you should get the same level of care wherever you are in this state."





## State gets \$54M for housing, development, aid to people

Two Indiana agencies say they've received more than \$54 million for housing, community and economic development and aid to low- and moderate-income persons and special needs populations.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awarded the Indiana Office of Community and Rural Affairs more than \$30 million in funding for Community Development Block

Grants, an increase of \$3 million from last year. The agency distributes CDBG funds to rural communities to help local governments with various community projects such as improving infrastructure, downtown revitalization, improving public facilities and economic development.

HUD awarded more than \$23 million to the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority to fund various housing programs.



# Rep. Brooks tours immigration facilities

"Yesterday, I visited a number of federal immigration facilities in Texas in order to get a first-hand look and better understanding of our country's immigration process and family reunification efforts," said Brooks. "I was encouraged to learn more about the procedures in place, which provide migrant children and families who have come to the United States - Mexico border with safety, shelter, food, medical care, clothing and other basic necessities as their immigration status is pending."

"I was overwhelmed by the number of children who have come to our borders, some with families but the large majority are unaccompanied children under the age of 18," continued Brooks. "I remain committed to ensuring children are reunited with their families as quickly

as possible and will continue to advocate for an immigration system that is fair and reflects American values. I appreciate the hard work of the Department of Health and Human Services Office of Refugee Resettlement and

applaud their compassion and diligence in protecting and caring for these children and those held in their care."

**Background**

The Homeland Security Act of 2002 established

a definition of unaccompanied alien children (UAC) and divided responsibilities for the processing and treatment of UAC between the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the Department of Health and Human Services

(HHS) Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR). The law assigned HHS responsibilities including coordinating and implementing the care and placement of UAC in appropriate custody, reunifying UAC with their parents abroad (if ap-

propriate), maintaining and publishing a list of legal services available to UAC and collecting statistical information on UAC.

Congresswoman Brooks recently joined Energy and Commerce Committee Republicans to send HHS a letter regarding the ORR program and the management, treatment and reunification of unaccompanied alien children. The letter followed the adoption of an amendment at a #SubHealth markup. The amendment, which passed by a unanimous 29-0 vote, required weekly reports to the committee and a formal strategy regarding the HHS' efforts to reunite these children with their families, in addition to addressing challenges previously identified by the committee.

Additionally, Brooks along with Congressmen Fred Upton (R-Mich.) and Michael Burgess (R-Texas), led a letter to officials at HHS inquiring about, and advocating for, innovative solutions, specifically DNA testing, to ensure proper swift reunifications for families separated at the U.S.-Mexico border. # Fishers' Andy Winings ties for second

The Indiana Open Championship wrapped up on Wednesday at Prairie View Golf Club with three Hamilton County golfers placing in the top 20.

Fishers' Andy Winings was part of a three-way tie for second, finishing with a six-under par 210 for the tournament. Winings shot a two-under 70 for his third round, including four birdies on the front nine.

Winings is originally from Franklin, was a state qualifier out of Brownsburg High School, and went on to play college golf at the University of Kentucky, graduating in 2009. He has carved out a solid professional career, with two top-three finishes on the Web.com tour, and has earned almost \$190,000 in prize money.

It was a good day for Fishers, as three players from that city finished in the top 20 and thus are automatically qualified for next year's Indiana Open.

Eric Steger tied for seventh place, shooting a four-under 68 in his third round. That placed him under par for the tournament, finishing three-under at 213. Steger made five birdies in his final round.

Steger graduated from Noblesville in 2007, and was a state qualifier for the Millers. He went on to a successful career at Ball State University. Steger has been recently playing on the Web.com tour and the PGA LatinoAmerica tour, where this past May he finished tied for second at the Costa Rica Classic.

Johnny Watts, a recent Ball State graduate, tied for 11th by shooting a two-under par 214. Watts, a 2014 graduate of (and state qualifier from) Hamilton Southeastern, had three birdies in his third round.

Michael Sharp of Kendallville won the tournament, finishing with a seven-under 209. Sharp, who just graduated from Michigan State, played all three rounds under par, with his third round a two-under 70. Sharp birdied the 18th hole to clinch the win.

# Former Carmel girls basketball coach speaks about his firing

The former Carmel girls basketball coach is sharing his side of the story about his firing.

Tod Windlan was let go in April, in a move that sparked backlash from some parents and community members.

To this day, he says he still does not know exactly why he was fired.

In an interview with News 8, Windlan detailed his version of the events of the last few months.

"On March 21st, I had my first face-to-face meeting with our athletic director Jim Inskeep and Tom Harmas, concerns about the program and they said they met with

parents at the time and they're going to do an investigation into the program about where it's at, stuff like that," Windlan said.

Windlan said the review into the program included questions to the players about whether he had ever used any vulgarity or profanity in a practice or game situation, did he ever raise his fist or kick anything in practice.

Windlan said a few weeks after meeting Inskeep and Harmas, he met with them again on April 13.

"They went over the paper that was signed by all three of us stating that I would be retained," he said.

One week later, he said he received an email saying he needed to meet with the interim human resources director.

"We sat down at a table and he basically said, the executive staff has done a review of what's been turned into him and they feel

like there needs to be a change in leadership, in the direction and we're not going to retain you as our girls basketball coach," Windlan said.

He said by the time he got back to the high school from that meeting, an email had already been sent to parents and players stating that he would not be retained.

"The players were devastated, my phone was blowing up with texts, phone calls, my coaching staff. It was just devastation, it was just a heartbreaking experience," he said.

Some of the players attended a school board meeting protesting his firing, others held rallies. Windlan said he tried to stay out of the media during it all.

"I was just trying to see what the best course of action was to help my kids in the program and the parents who were really supportive of me and it was very clearly evident, they were not going to try to be remotely cooperative in the central office."

He said he requested his personnel file from the district on June 11, but didn't hear back for more than two weeks. When he got a chance to see it, he felt it was incomplete.

"The first page in the file was the termination from the girls basketball coach and when you read down, there's nothing on it but reason for termination: Just cause," Windlan said.

He said there were no notes from administrators or parents, no letters, emails from parents for or against him and that there were no verbal or written complaints.

But he believes it was complaints from parents about lack of playing time for their child that started this, and that those parents had been working to get him out. He believes one of those parents reached out to a school board member friend.

He said some of the parents collaborated to make false accusations against him, including ethnic and racial slurs.

He said one of the accusations had to do with a nickname he had given a player.

"I called her the 'Nigerian Nightmare,' you were a nightmare tonight, you had like 36, you're the Nigerian Nightmare, she loved it, she absolutely loved it. She came back to my office crying that they had said this," Windlan said.

"The other kid would do dreads one day, two weeks later she had pigtails, her running joke with me was how long in

practice before he notices my new hair," Windlan said, describing what he would say to the player, "You got one poof in, you got two poofs today."

He said she would respond with, "You got a Pee-wee Herman haircut coach."

"So they used that in the thing saying that I was saying she had cottontails in her hair, the dad, he was really upset, said this never happened."

Despite those accusations, Windlan said

he was never told by the district specifically why he was being fired. He says he saw a copy of the review that was conducted of the program, which he said found a large majority of the players were in favor of him.

"The real reason why I was let go, I'd really like to know that."

News 8 reached out to Carmel Clay Schools with a number of questions following Windlan's interview. There has been no response.

When Windlan was fired the district sent out this statement:

"Carmel Clay Schools is committed to providing high quality opportunities for students to succeed both in academics and athletics. We take great pride in ensuring our teachers and coaches lead by example and always put what's best for the student first. Regarding the girls basketball program, Carmel Clay Schools employs its head girls' basketball coach under a year-to-year contract that is reviewed annually. Unlike teachers under contract, there is no expectation that a coach will be continued in employ-

ment for the next season. After the basketball season ended, Carmel High School administrators conducted a review of the program. This review was thorough and included multiple interviews with student athletes, members of the coaching staff as well as parents. The results of this review were also shared with the interim co-superintendents. The review revealed that there were differences in opinion regarding the leadership provided by the head basketball coach. What became clear, however, was that the players and families involved in the program had become divided and the program could be adversely affected by that division. The administration determined a change in leadership was necessary. Accordingly, for the overall good of the program, the administration decided not to bring back the head girls basketball coach for the 2018-19 season. Instead, Carmel Clay Schools will employ a new coach with the intention of providing a fresh start for the program to move forward on a unified basis under new leadership."
