## Fishers moving toward increase in stormwater fees

Fishers has taken the first step toward increasing stormwater fees, following action last Monday by the Board of Public Works and Safety. The board voted to send the recommended fee

hike to the Fishers City Council Finance Committee. The full council could give final approval to the increase in September.

Rick Farnham, Director of Water Quality, an operation within the Fishers Department of Public Works, told the board that as a result of a study by Policy Analytics, he is recommending a stormwater fee increase on residential customers of \$1.71 per month. Since most Stormwater Utility residential users are billed annually, they would see an increase of \$15.40 in their yearly payment.

According to Farnham, if the city takes no action, the stormwater utility will be operating at a financial deficit in 2019.

Commercial users will see their rates increase between \$3,000 and \$63,000 a year, based on the size of their operations. Farnham told the board the Hamilton Southeastern Schools will be impacted by this increase.

Farnham told LarryInFishers that this is the first increase in the local stormwater fee in the last 10 years. Although this proposed residential fee increase is 35 percent,



Plans are underway to breathe new life into the White River.

Indianapolis city officials have been trying for nearly a decade to revamp the image of the river.

Last Wednesday, residents had a chance to voice their opinion on what they would like to see changed at the first of three public open houses to discuss the future of the White River.

The White River Vision Plan is a community driv-

en initiative that aims to enhance 58 miles of the White River in Marion and Hamilton counties.

"We want to hear what's important to them," said Emily Mack, the Director of the Department of Metropolitan Development with the City of Indianapolis. "What do they really value? What do they want to see happen? What is important to

## Colts Training Camp volunteers gearing up for action in Westfield

Training is underway for volunteers ahead of Colts Training Camp 2018, which for the first time will be at Grand Park.

More than 100 volunteers are preparing to help staff the 400-acre complex where the Indianapolis Colts will primarily use three practice fields.

Training camp will kick off July 25 and boast 18 public practices along with several themed days, including ones for kids, community, the Armed Forces as well as a BBQ Bash, Friday Night Lights and Bike

to Camp Day.

William Knox, director of Grand Park, said, "In my opinion, this will be probably one of the best camps the Colts have ever had."

Knox gave a golf-cart tour of the three practice fields and the bleachers still under construction.

"All the stands you see behind us are for public seating, and those are the 6,000 seats," he said, adding that there will be standing room available on the sidelines. "They'll be able to get really close and there will be plenty of opportunities to get autographs."

Fans will notice a few changes this year: Primarily

the need for a ticket to get into the practices. Tickets are still free to the public but you must log onto [tinyurl.com/ColtsGrandPark-Tickets](http://tinyurl.com/ColtsGrandPark-Tickets) to reserve yours.

Grand Park officials said people can print tickets out at home or show them on smartphones at the gate. Officials said they have already distributed tens of thousands of tickets.

Colts fans can also check out Colts City, which will sport food, games, Colts in Motion museum-like displays, the Play 60 Zone for kids to show off their skills and a Colts

are very enthusiastic. Kids are just more excited about doing shows, working together and building characters than you will see sometimes in adult productions. It's a

if you look at this on an annual basis, the increase comes out to about 3 to 4 percent per year over the past 10 years.

The fee increase proposal's next stop is the City Council Finance Committee. That panel will vote on a recommendation that will

go before the full council for first reading at this month's council session. The second reading would be scheduled for August, which would set-up the fee increase to receive a final vote in September, as part of the annual city budget process.

future generations?"

About 75 people packed a small room inside Noblesville City Hall Wednesday night.

"I wouldn't mind if we had a restaurant or some sort of entertainment venue along the river. I wouldn't want it to be overdone," Kitty O'Doherty explained. "I can just take a path from my neighborhood down to the river. So, I'm just kind of curious what ideas are planned, because I think some progress is really good. But, I'm concerned about environmentally. The path I go down to the river is beautiful and scenic, and people fish. So, I just want to see what it's about."

While some residents like O'Doherty are open to changes, others like Jim Flanders are not so sure.

Flanders farms nearly eight miles along the river and says bringing more people to the area could have dangerous consequences.

"I think we take pretty good care of it," said Flanders. "In developed areas like Carmel, they can do what they need to do with

it. But, it's not safe to have things along our property. I've almost ran over folks out in our field."

The project includes three phases and will study roughly one mile on either side of the 58-mile stretch of water.

Phase one is called the 'discovery' phase, which is currently underway. This phase looks to analyze the area, determine the water quality and identify current land ownership along the river.

The second 'envision' phase, taking place from July 2018 to December 2018, will pinpoint areas for potential development.

The third 'action' phase will look at the legality of adding attractions to the area. That portion of the project will go from December 2018 to April 2019.

"People always say, 'Well, we don't have oceans and we don't have mountains,'" explained Mack. "They kind of feel sorry for us, right? I always say but we have this incredible resource. We have this wonderful waterway that runs right through our county. Let's capture that!"

"I am delighted to have Davis join our team, as he



# HSE approves new principal at Riverside Intermediate School, with some controversy

The Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) School Board approved a new principal for Riverside Intermediate School, over the objections of the local teacher's union. Dana Kaminski has now been officially named to the principal's post. The

concerns were not about the person named, but about the process used by administrators to select the new principal.

Mary Carson, speaking for the Hamilton Southeastern Education Association, said teachers were not involved in the selection process for the Riverside Intermediate principal, which

the association says is a departure from past practice. Carson argued that a local teacher in their association says "having teachers on the selection committee would help inform the decision and win the trust of teaching peers." Carson told the board the association asks the board and administration for a return to the past

practice in conducting principal interviews.

The board voted to select Kaminski on a tally of 4-1. Board member Michelle Fullhart voted no, and two board members abstained from voting.

Kaminski will replace the previous Riverside Intermediate principal, Danielle Chastain.

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
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# HAND looks at housing needs in Fishers

There were representatives of city government, the private sector, the One Zone Chamber of Commerce and other non-profits such as Habitat for Humanity.

One item revealed during the meeting is that the local Fishers firm RealAmerica Development is in the final stages of receiving approval to construct a low-income apartment development on Lantern Road in Fishers. Although RealAmerica has its head-

quarters in Fishers, and has several developments around the state, this will be their first project here in Fishers.

# West Nile virus recorded in Hamilton County

Hamilton County has joined nine other Indiana counties this year recording mosquitoes with the West Nile virus.

Indiana has reported no human cases of West Nile virus this year, according to the Indiana Department of Health. The state reports mosquitoes with West Nile virus also have been found this year in these Indiana counties: Allen, Bartholomew, Carroll, Elkhart, Marion, Monroe, Putnam and Tippecanoe.

Most people who become infected with the virus do not develop any symptoms, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

People with certain medical conditions including cancer, diabetes and kidney disease are at greater risk for experiencing symptoms which include headache, body aches, joint pains or rash. Less than 1 percent of people who are infected with West Nile virus will develop a serious neurological illness such as encephalitis or meningitis.

Tips from health officials to avoid mosquitoes:

- Stay indoors from dusk until dawn.
- Wear long sleeves and long pants when outside during these times.
- Use insect repellent containing DEET.
- Remove all standing water outside the home.

**Schools can request metal detectors**

Gov. Eric Holcomb said last Monday the state is giving metal detectors at no cost to Indiana schools that request them.

The governor describes the detectors as handheld wands. He said it will be up to local officials to decide how and when schools should use the devices.

"Unfortunately, we are living in a time when every school must prepare to respond to someone who might try to hurt themselves or others on school grounds," Holcomb said.

Schools can request one metal detector for every 250 students, meaning some schools could get multiple detectors.

State leaders said the program will cost up to

\$550,000 and will be funded by the Indiana Department of Administration.

Jeff Crays is a former teacher in Marion County's Warren Township Schools.

"I think it's an important thing to at least have some option there for those instances when (schools) feel like they need it," Crays said.

Crays said the schools he taught at had security tools and some schools will not need the detectors as much as others.

Schools can request the detectors at [in.gov/idoa/3134.htm](http://in.gov/idoa/3134.htm). The state will place the first orders for the devices on July 19 for delivery by mid-August. The program is open to public, charter and accredited nonpublic schools.

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# Faith greater than fear

What if the worst that could happen ... happens?

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Anxiety. Worry. Fear. Anticipation. So many unknowns.

Phil Heller, one of the pastors at White River Christian Church, gave a sermon last Sunday that explained fear of the unknown so well.

He wrapped so many feelings in a nutshell ... well, actually, in a backpack.

He said that it is on our journey through difficult times in our life that we begin collecting rocks (worries) and place them in a backpack. Eventually, the weight becomes a burden that wears us down. We are affected physically, emotionally, spiritually and mentally.

Sometimes I am able to release a few rocks from my backpack. Other times I pick them up again. And then there are those times that I find new rocks.

Pastor Phil quoted Matthew 6:25-34. One verse stood out to me: "Can all your worries add one single moment to your life?" verse 27 NLT. Another one was verse 34: "So don't worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring its own worries..."

And yet I tend to worry about the future.

Pastor Phil gave the definition of anxiety as the unpleasant, present emotion, current feeling of fear and inner turmoil produced by the uncertainty of the future.

Facing the unknown is scary. Questions fill my mind, especially in the middle of the night. Anxiety follows me around throughout the day. It is like a shadow that I can't out run and sometimes cannot pray away.

It's easy to say that you have faith when life is going along, smoothly, and you are just skipping along. Then you get a diagnosis that you were not prepared for. Worse yet, one that you were not prepared for when it is concerning your child.

I have two forever girlfriends who have a child fighting cancer. It does not matter that they are grown up. They are still their children. Fear greets them every morning.

I have a mother who is losing her independence and strength. It tears me up inside to see her struggle. And I know what happens as her final chapters are quickly being written. I don't like the last few pages of them.

Life. Is. Hard.

I grew up hearing about faith, not only in church, but sitting with my mother while she read her Bible. Even more so, I saw the

faith that she had.

Life, for her, had been filled with ... well, I'll just say that it was not easy for her.

Bad things happen, no matter who you are. Knowing you have a God who

Snowden said he does not know who put him up for the award and did not know he would be presented with the award before the conference. He does, however, know why he was chosen.

"The statewide 911 board exists, and they collect a lot of money every year from cellphone and wire-line telephones," Snowden explained.

"\$1 each for every month. That gets distributed to the PSAPs (Public Safety Answering Points) throughout the state in all 92 counties. There are about 120 PSAPs throughout the state. I went to them because no one was training our folks."

There are no requirements in the State of Indiana for training for dispatchers.

There no certification or licensing for dispatchers in the state.

There is no required continuing education.

"When I got here Hamilton County created our own," Snowden said. "We have our own minimum training standards for ourselves because no one else is holding us accountable. We are holding ourselves accountable."

Snowden approached the state 911 board two years ago and asked them to set aside money to do training for all the telecommunications in the State of Indiana.

"They finally - through a lot of negotiation - said 'yes' when they had some end-of-year money in fiscal 2016," Snowden said. "They set aside some money and started promulgat-

ing rules. I helped with the rule creation for what was going to be paid for."

Those rules came into effect in January 2018.

"In six months they have spent a couple hundred thousand dollars training dispatchers throughout the state," Snowden told The Reporter. "They will continue to do that in perpetuity as long as there is a funding source for it."

The award I got was for that idea: To help train people to do their jobs."

By way of comparison, Snowden noted a person has to have hundreds of hours of training and be certified to cut someone's hair or to do nails. Meanwhile, you do not have to have one minute of training, according to the State of Indiana, to be a dispatcher. That is because there is no law that requires a set number of hours of basic training or any continuing education in order to work as a public safety telecommunicator.

When the Noblesville West Middle School shooting occurred, local dispatchers had been trained the day before on how to handle it. That is because at the local level, Hamilton County does not believe zero hours of training is acceptable.

"I am eternally grateful for this award," Snowden said. "It was an honor. It really was humbling that my peers thought enough of me to say I deserved that award. But the reality is we are just trying to make sure folks know how to do

their jobs."

Snowden said he thinks consistent training standards are necessary for the safety of all Hoosiers.

"Hamilton County has a very mobile citizenry," Snowden said. "We are going down to the lake. We are going up to the

dunes. We are going to Bloomington and Lafayette. We are on our way to Fort Wayne. If you have an emergency [on one of those trips] and you call for help, you should get the same level of care wherever you are in this state."

# Fishers' Andy Winings ties for second

The Indiana Open Championship wrapped up last Wednesday at Prairie View Golf Club with three Hamilton County golfers placing in the top 20.

Fishers' Andy Winings was part of a three-way tie for second, finishing with a six-under par 210 for the tournament. Winings shot a two-under 70 for his third round, including four birdies on the front nine.

Michael Sharp of Kendallville won the tournament, finishing with a seven-under 209. Sharp, who just graduated from Michigan State, played all three rounds under par, with his third round a two-under 70. Sharp birdied the 18th hole to clinch the win.

## Former Carmel girls basketball coach speaks about his firing

The former Carmel girls basketball coach is sharing his side of the story about his firing.

Tod Windlan was let go in April, in a move that sparked backlash from some parents and community members.

To this day, he says he still does not know exactly why he was fired.

In an interview with News 8, Windlan detailed his version of the events of the last few months.

"On March 21, I had my first face-to-face meeting with our athletic director Jim Inskeep and Tom Harmas, concerns about the program and they said they met with parents at the time and they're going to do an investigation into the program about where it's at, stuff like that," Windlan said.

Windlan said the review into the program included questions to the players about whether he had ever used any vulgarity or profanity in a practice or game situation, did he ever raise his fist or kick anything in practice.

Windlan said a few weeks after meeting Inskeep and Harmas, he met with them again on April 13.

"They went over the paper that was signed by all three of us stating that I would be retained," he said.

One week later, he said he received an email saying he needed to meet with the interim human resources director.

"We sat down at a table and he basically said, the executive staff has done a review of what's been turned into him and they feel like there needs to be a change in leadership, in the direction and we're not going to retain you as our girls basketball coach," Windlan said.

He said by the time he got back to the high school from that meeting, an email had already been sent to parents and players stating that he would not be retained.

"The players were devastated, my phone was blowing up with texts, phone calls, my coaching staff. It was just devastation, it was just a heart-breaking experience," he said.

Some of the players attended a school board meeting protesting his firing, others held rallies. Windlan said he tried to stay out of the media during it all.

"I was just trying to see what the best course of action was to help my

kids in the program and the parents who were really supportive of me and it was very clearly evident, they were not going to try to be remotely cooperative in the central office."

He said he requested his personnel file from the district on June 11, but didn't hear back for more than two weeks. When he got a chance to see it, he felt it was incomplete.

"The first page in the file was the termination from the girls basketball coach and when you read down, there's nothing on it but reason for termination: Just cause," Windlan said.

He said there were no notes from administrators or parents, no letters, emails from parents for or against him and that there were no verbal or written complaints.

But he believes it was complaints from parents about lack of playing time for their child that started this, and that those parents had been working to get him out. He believes one of those parents reached out to a school board member friend.

He said some of the parents collaborated to make false accusations against him, including ethnic and racial slurs.

He said one of the accusations had to do with a nickname he had given a player.

"I called her the 'Nigerian Nightmare,' you were a nightmare tonight, you had like 36, you're the Nigerian Nightmare, she loved it, she absolutely loved it. She came back to my office crying that they had said this," Windlan said.

"The other kid would do dreads one day, two weeks later she had pigtails, her running joke with me was how long in practice before he notices my new hair," Windlan said, describing what he would say to the player, "You got one poof in, you got two poofs today."

He said she would respond with, "You got a Pee-wee Herman haircut

coach."

"So they used that in the thing saying that I was saying she had cotton-tails in her hair, the dad, he was really upset, said this never happened."

Despite those accusations, Windlan said he was never told by the district specifically why he was being fired. He says he saw a copy of the review that was conducted of the program, which he said found a large majority of the players were in favor of him.

"The real reason why I was let go, I'd really like to know that."

News 8 reached out to Carmel Clay Schools with a number of questions following Windlan's interview. There has been no response.

When Windlan was fired the district sent out this statement:

"Carmel Clay Schools is committed to providing high quality opportunities for students to succeed both in academics and athletics. We take great pride in ensuring our teachers and coaches lead by example and always put what's best for the student first. Regarding the girls basketball program, Carmel Clay Schools employs its head girls' basketball coach under a year-to-year contract that is reviewed annually. Unlike teachers under contract, there is no expectation that a coach will be continued in employment for the next season. After the basketball season ended, Carmel High School administrators conducted a review of the program. This review was thorough and included multiple interviews with student athletes, members of the coaching staff as well as parents. The results of this review were also shared with the interim co-superintendents. The review revealed that there were differences in opinion regarding the leadership provided by the head basketball coach. What became clear, however, was that the players and families involved in the program had become divided and the program could be adversely affected by that division. The administration determined a change in leadership was necessary. Accordingly, for the overall good of the program, the administration decided not to bring back the head girls basketball coach for the 2018-19 season. Instead, Carmel Clay Schools will employ a new coach with the intention of providing a fresh start for the program to move forward on a unified basis under new leadership."

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
