Noblesville unviels capital improvement projects

The City of Noblesville on Wednesday announced its Capital Improvement Plan for 2018-2023 projects to relieve traffic congestion, improve connectivity via roads and trails, introduce multi-family apartments to downtown, and address the needs of the police department.

The Noblesville NOW Capital Improvement Plan unveiled 10 top-priority projects that span the entire community - including Olio Road and Pleasant Street improvements, a downtown parking garage and a new police headquarters. Each project achieves at least two of Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear's objectives for 2018-2020 strengthening infrastructure, creating greater economic development, enhancing public safety, improving connectivity and expanding the downtown area.

"The time is now to address residents and visitors," said Ditslear. "I look forward to leading this effort and working with our

Common Council to ensure we are acting in the best interests of our taxpayers and moving our city forward to meet our goals and objectives."

Ditslear said his greatest excitement is for the new mixeduse projects that will introduce multi-family apartments to downtown that meet the criteria set in Noblesville's recent housing study, which called for more urban densification and

walkability. "Our downtown is applauded for being historic as well as authentic – but we have long sought to infuse the downtown with more residents who would frequent our local merchants and restaurants," he said. "And I'm proud to say, with this capital improvement plan, we will finally provide Noblesville's first parking structure in downtown."

Fishers Council offers incentives for low-income housing

RealAmerica is a local Fishers business that develops low-income housing projects in many Indiana locales, but has never developed such a project in Fishers. That may change if

the firm is successful in getting state and federal approval for the credits needed to construct such an apartment complex in Fishers.

The Fishers City Council, acting on an agenda item added at the very last minute, passed a resolution Monday night establishing incentives in a project agreement with RealAmerica to construct a 70-unit apartment development on Lantern Road and Appel Drive, near Interstate 69 and 116th Street.

Noblesville seeks expansion to current

school referendum The REPORTER

The Noblesville School Board voted Tuesday to seek an expansion of their current operating referendum by asking residents to vote on a proposal that would add an additional 18.1 cents per \$100 of assessed property value.

Noblesville Schools report the new referendum would replace the existing one passed in 2016 and would provide funding through 2026.

The expanded referendum would provide Noblesville Schools with a reported additional \$6.25 million increase over seven years for school safety, mental health and recruiting / retaining top teaching staff.

The current operating referendum tax rate is 18.9 cents. The proposed referendum would replace the 18.9 cents rate with a new rate of 37 cents.

Noblesville, Westfield announce school security updates

Noblesville and Westfield parents and students will see security updates during the upcoming school year.

Noblesville Superintendent Beth Niedermeyer, at Wednesday evening's Parent Safety Meeting held at Noblesville High School, announced the district has put in place enhanced safety measures, including additional surveillance equipment, new visitor and student procedures and more safety training.

"We intend to pursue enhanced facility structures, increased lockdown classroom barricading products, parking lot access controls, additional technology for increased safety communications, additional counseling staff and increased mental health supports," Niedermeyer said.

Niedermeyer also confirmed the Noblesville Police Department will be increasing the number of officers in schools.

Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitt told the crowd at Wednesday's meeting his department is committed to tripling the number of officers assigned to schools, including officers in all elementary schools, later this school year.

Indiana State Police Superintendent Doug Carter and Chief Jowitt both explained the importance of recognizing behaviors displayed by individuals, including students, which could be a potential threat.

Noblesville and the West-Washington School District announced they will implement a new visitor management system. This new comprehensive system will enhance school entrance security and better ensure that every visitor is permitted and authorized

Magazine.



activities in the schools where visitors will need a completed SafeVisitor background check include lunch guests, classroom parties, classroom volunteers / helpers / room parents and field trip chaperones. Noblesville will also require background checks for school visitors.

According to Carter, several schools have taken advantage of a recent State of Indiana initiative to provide handheld metal detectors to all schools that want them.

In a recent email to parents, Superintendent Niedermeyer said the metal detectors will be used in "individual cases where reasonable suspicion exists."

According to the Indiana Department of Educa-

tion's website, Noblesville, Hamilton Heights, Sheridan and Westfield have requested metal detectors. Carmel, Hamilton Southeastern, Guerin Catholic and University high schools have not yet committed.

Noblesville and Westfield have said they hope the security changes help bring peace of mind to parents and make students feel safer.

The referendum we passed in 2016 was about maintaining the status quo of our staffing, programming and services, and was a 10.5 percent reduction in the tax rate," said Dr. Beth Niedermeyer, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "This referendum is asking the community to support an increase in funding so we can address school safety and mental health enhancements, as well as teacher recruiting/

retention needs." In addition to school safety and mental health, the additional 18.1 cents per \$100 assessed property value will likely be used to provide the district with the opportunity to provide teacher pay raises.

The proposal comes on the heels of Noblesville receiving a \$50,000 safety grant and an \$800,000 counseling grant.

In a release provided by Noblesville Schools. the district noted that the teacher shortage in Indiana continues to make recruiting and retaining talteaching

staff a significant challenge.

"As the teacher shortage continues to intensify and as other area school districts have recently increased teacher compensation, we must do the same or we will continue to lose talented staff to other districts and the private sector." added Niedermeyer. "Strong teachers are the most important factor for student growth and academic excellence."

Fishers setting up local arts, cultural commission

The City of Fishers plans to apply to the Indiana Arts Commission and ask that the Nickel Plate District in Downtown Fishers be designated as a cultural district, and the city is working toward establishing the Fishers Arts and Cultural Commission.

Past and present officials of the local arts community packed into a City Hall conference room to support the arts proposals as members of the city council were briefed on the ideas by Deputy Mayor Leah McGrath and Mayor

Scott Fadness. Work has already started on applying for the Nickel Plate District's designation by the state as a cultural district, described by McGrath as a "pretty rigorous process." The deadline to submit the application is Sept. 5.

The City Council Nonprofit Committee decides how to divide-up the city's contributions to local organizations, and this proposal would ask the council committee to provide a specific sum of money to support local arts organizations, then have the Fishers Arts and Cultural Commission decide which organizations get the money, and how much each group will re-

The new Fishers Arts and Cultural Commission would be established as part of the city's Planning and Zoning Department.

"The point of the Arts Commission is to take the people that really do understand the soul and vibrancy of art, and meld that with the people that understand the land development and development process," Fadness told council members. "Those two together should create a really unique environment where we have the synergistic vibe.'

Council members appeared generally supportive of the plan to establish a Fishers Arts Council and ask the state to designate the Nickel Plate District as a cultural district.

The city is currently developing a finance plan and costs for each project. Exact numbers are not known at this point, but options include federal and state funding, tax increment financing, bonds and cash.

"I'm proud of the work we as a Council have achieved over the past two-plus years. But our work has only begun, and I look forward to helping the mayor achieve our vision and finally moving forward on these initiatives that have been talked about and studied for years," said Noblesville Common Council President Chris Jensen. "We need to get this work underway now so our residents can reap the benefits sooner rather than later."



Syrian national in Fishers facing federal charges in connection to unlawful purchase of firearms

A Fishers man is facing several charges after officials said he attempted to unlawfully purchase several firearms while also lying on federal forms in attempting to purchase another.

Investigation into the behavior of 24-year-old Majd Al Helwani began in December 2017 when officials said Helwani was in possession of at least one firearm, an AR-15 style rifle. It was later determined that Helwani was admitted into the United States as a non-immigrant tourist, and could not possess firearms.

After obtaining a search warrant for his home, investigators found Helwani to be in the possession of two guns: the .223 caliber rifle, and a loaded 9-millimeter handgun which he answered the door with.

It was later determined that Helwani attempted to purchase a shotgun from a Dick's Sporting Goods using false paperwork claiming that he had not been admitted into the U.S. as a non-immigrant tourist.

Helwani faces three counts of unlawful possession of a firearm, as well as one count of false





Fowles feeds Indiana Fever fifth Lynx loss

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. – Sylvia Fowles had a season-high 30 points to go with 16 rebounds while pacing the Minnesota Lynx to a 89-65 matinee victory over the Indiana Foyor

Fowles, a 6-foot-6 Olympic gold medalist and reigning WNBA MVP who was recently named to her fifth WNBA All-Star Game, helped Minnesota to a 36-24 rebounding edge that contributed to 17 second-chance points as the Lynx snapped a two-game skid in front of a raucous Kids Day crowd of 17,933. Minnesota, 13-10, avenged a 71-59 Indiana victory at Target Center just 15 days ago and handed the Fever, 2-21, their fifth straight loss since the upset win.

The Fever, who rarely trailed in the 71-59 upset on

July 3, never led Wednesday while Fowles shot 13-of-15 from the floor to lead a 52 percent shooting afternoon for

"When teams shoot almost 53 percent, you have to think to yourself, 'We're not making them very uncomfortable, are we?" suggested Fever coach Pokey Chatman. "Sylvia shot 13-of-15 and she's the best in the world. We let her get comfortable under the bucket and stay comfortable. And she buried us."

Minnesota led 27-21 after one quarter, then scored 10 unanswered points to begin the second period and command a 16-point advantage. The Lynx got 18 first-half points from Fowles and 13 from Seimone Augustus – and led by as many as 22 before halftime when Danielle Robinson's free throw staked Minnesota to a 51-29 lead

with less than two minutes before intermission.

The Lynx matched the 22-point bulge again in the third period with a 3-pointer from Alexis Jones and led 70-50 heading to the fourth quarter. A bucket by Fowles opened the fourth quarter for another 22-point margin and the Lynx eased the lead to 24 late in the final period.

"I have to give credit to Minnesota," added Chatman, "but I would like more for teams to take things from us rather than [us] always contributing to our own demise. Don't get me wrong, I really do give Minnesota credit for making things so hard on us. I would just like for that to be the only reason for our difficulties."

Indiana was led by Candice Dupree's 20, her second straight game with 20 points or more, and her fourth of the season. On the game's second possession, she also became the eighth player in WNBA history to secure 2,700 career rebounds. Cappie Pondexter finished with 10 points for the Fever, including a pair of free throws that helped her pass Katie Smith with the fifth-most free throws (1,441) in league annals.

The Indiana veterans were the Fever's only players to reach double-figure scoring. Augustus joined Fowles among double-digit scorers for Minnesota, scoring all her points in the first half. Maya Moore and Cecillia Zandalasini each added 10 for the Lynx.

The Fever claimed distinction with a first-quarter 3-pointer by Victoria Vivians, her only score of the afternoon, making Indiana just the third club in league history with a rookie duo (Vivians and Kelsey Mitchell) who both boast at least 40 3-point field goals in their first season.

Indiana continues a stretch of seven games in 14 days when the Fever visit Los Angeles, Friday, and Las Vegas, Sunday.
