4-H'ers help food bank 'Meat the Need'

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has sponsored its third year of "Meating" The Need, a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy and Swine projects and the Food Bank. HCH is a non-profit organization that supports local food pantries and feeding programs year round, all here in Hamilton County.

This year, HCH purchased seven beef and seven swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on Tuesday, July 24. The estimated 3,470 pounds of meat will be used to supply 20 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef and pork raised by 4-H members.

Meat Distribution Day will be Saturday, Aug. 11. The 14 4-H members who have designated their animals for sale to the Food Bank will be helping to feed those families and children in the community with the equivalent of 13,880 meals of good, healthy protein.

Protein is an item that is often missing from HCH clients' meals and hard to provide consistently by the pantries

Two more Pickleball

courts coming to Cyntheanne Park

On June 25, Mayor Scott Fadness told Pickleball supporters at a Fishers Board of Works meeting – many from the Britton Falls neighborhood – that if \$63,000 in dona-

tions could be raised, the city would contract for two more Pickleball courts at Cyntheanne Park. The city was able to approve two Pickleball courts at the June 25 session, but could not fund two more that the citizens on hand at that meeting wanted.

It took less than a month for enough contributions to come through the local parks foundation to fund all \$63,000. What put the fundraising effort over the top was a donation of about \$40,000 from one person. Mayor Fadness says that person's name will be disclosed in an announcement later this week.

That allowed the Fishers Board of Works and Public Safety to approve the contract for the additional two Pickleball courts at Monday's meeting.

The Nickel Plate Express railroad excursion in northeast Hamilton County will kick off 2018 ticket sales with a Christmas in July celebration. Tickets for the new Reindeer Ride Express, which takes riders from Atlanta and past the historic Arcadia Depot and back, are on sale now. Daytime and evening excursions are available.

Nickel Plate Express will begin its inaugural excursion season this September. The railroad will celebrate this milestone by pre-selling holiday Reindeer Ride Express tickets. The Reindeer Ride will offer adults and children alike a magical holiday experience complete with Old Saint Nick and a Christmas light display with regular and VIP seating options.

Tickets for fall excursions, including Pumpkin Express, Uncorked Express and Ales & Rails, are expected to go on sale mid-August.

"We are thrilled to finally go public with ticket sales," said Executive Director Deanna Holt. "We want to help families in Hamilton County create a new holiday tradition and make memories aboard the Nickel Plate Express."

The train will be lighted and will feature elevated seating in coach and dining cars. The Town of Atlanta will welcome visitors with hot chocolate, tours of holiday-themed railroad layouts at Mr. Muffin's trains, food at the Choo Choo Café and visitor amenities.

State Road 32 closed today in Noblesville

The city of Noblesville has announced that Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) is working on State Road 32 (Conner Street) in downtown Noblesville between 10th and 16th streets.

Motorists may see safe-

ty installations (barrels, cones, signage) placed outside of that area, but the scope of the work zone is SR 32.

INDOT will be milling (removing) four inches of existing asphalt and replacing it with approximately 1,800 tons of new asphalt

surface. Due to the depth of the milling (which provides for better cohesion and durability of the new asphalt), INDOT needs to close the roadway for safety to the traveling public and INDOT workers.

Range Line Road project begins next Friday

The City of Carmel will begin road improvements to North Range Line Road, from 8th Street (Smokey Row) to Clay Terrace, beginning on or after Friday, Aug. 3. The two-phase project will include a short-term closure of the roundabout at 8th Street and

Range Line Road, followed by restrictions to Range Line Road.

The first stage of the project is a retrofit of the existing roundabout. Work crews will be making modifications to the outside curb lanes in order to im-

prove traffic flow through the roundabout. This project is schedule to be done by Tuesday, Aug. 14, before school is back in session. During this phase, the intersection of 8th Street and Range Line Road will be closed to thru-traffic in

These grants represent research for lung, endometrial, colorectal, breast and ovarian cancers.

Since 1941 when Phi Beta Psi chose cancer research as its national project, a total of \$9,831,106 has been given. About Phi Beta Psi

Heirbrandt applauds 911 in tragic moments and for statewide leadership

Editor's Note: Hamilton County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt's letter (below) is in response to two articles published in the Reporter. Our article entitled "First first responders shine," published June 3, 2018, detailed the role of local 911 dispatchers during the May 25 shooting at Noblesville West Middle School. The second article Heirbrandt refers to, entitled "County 911 sets statewide example," published July 12, 2018, discusses an award presented to Hamilton County Public Safety Communications Executive Director Mike Snowden for helping establish statewide training standards for 911 dispatchers.

Dear Editor:

On May 25 at 9:12 a.m., I received contact from Mike Snowden, Executive Director of Communications, indicating an Active Shooter Assailant at Noblesville West Middle School. Even though it's been weeks since it happened, I think about it every day. It will be a day that I never forget.

I had a sick feeling all over when I first received this message and thought there is no way this is happening here.

I was approximately 10 minutes away from the Emergency Dispatch Department, which is located at the Hamilton County Jail Complex. Immediately I headed there to see what I might be able to do to help. Little did I know, I would spend most of the day at Dispatch and at press conferences throughout the day.

My first response as I walked into the County Dispatch room was how calm and professional all of the dispatchers were. The dispatchers were being inundated with 911 phone calls from parents, students, teachers and other counties and community groups offering assistance ... the list goes on and on. I am down in the Dispatch Center quite a bit and know many of the dispatchers personally. They handled the situation with grace and helped each and every person that called in.

I saw off-duty dispatchers running into the dispatch room saying, "Give me a console," so they could help with the calls. To see this made me proud of how our community comes together so quickly, all working collaboratively.

We were so focused that day that it really did not sink in exactly what had happened until I got home and saw it on every major television station and national news media outlet. I was overwhelmed with the outpouring of support from businesses and residents.

The collaboration of law enforcement from cities, counties and towns that day was so impressive. I remember leaving to go to the press conference from the Dispatch Center and seeing officers that I knew from Cicero, Westfield, Fishers, Carmel and Noblesville directing traffic. Everyone was there to help. It was gratifying to know that our law enforcement personnel trained for an active shooter response during spring break and even the day before this event even happened.

As I sit here and try to write out my thoughts of that day, I continue to get chills, as I will never forget what happened that day. Hearing stories about the calls coming in were gut-wrenching. So many kids and citizens in our community were in fear.

I'm thankful for those in our community who acted quick, calm and professional in this situation, and with so, so much compassion. We were as prepared as we could be. We will continue to focus on the good and prepare to prevent this from happening again. We all MUST work together. Our youth is our future.

Hug your kiddos, your nieces, your nephews, your grandkids and your younger cousins who have to go to school with a little fear inside of them. Know that we, as a community and elected officials, are working each day to protect them. I want us to live in a world where students can go to school to learn – where they don't have an ounce of fear in the back of their mind.

It's my priority to be a part of the solution.

To see the leadership of Mike Snowden that day, knowing that Commissioners Dillinger, Altman and myself hired him just a few years ago also made me proud. He is so deserving of this award.

Congrats, Mike.

All the other fall sports except football can begin their seasons on Saturday, Aug. 11. The first football games are scheduled for Friday, Aug. 17.

GIRLS GOLF

Sectionals

This sectional is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 14. Other teams competing are Brebeuf Jesuit, Cardinal Ritter, Covenant Christian, Pike and Speedway.

As for the other county teams, Noblesville will again host a sectional this year at Harbour Trees Golf Course. Fishers, Hamilton Heights and Hamilton Southeastern will also play at this site, which will tee off on Saturday, Sept. 15. Other teams competing will be Alexandria, Anderson, Elwood, Lapel and Shenandoah.

Regionals

Advancement: The top three teams and top three individuals not on an advancing team move from the sectional to the regional. All regionals are scheduled for **Saturday**, Sept. 22.

Advancers from the Noblesville sectional play at the Lapel regional, again hosted by Edgewood Golf Course.
