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## 4-H'ers help 'Meat the Need'

### The REPORTER

Hamilton County Harvest Food Bank (HCH) has sponsored its third year of "Meating" The Need, a partnership between 4-H Beef, Dairy and Swine projects and the Food Bank. HCH is a non-profit organization that supports local food pantries and feeding programs year round, all here in Hamilton County.

This year, HCH purchased seven beef and seven swine at the Hamilton County 4-H Livestock Auction on July 24. The estimated 3,470 pounds of meat will be used to supply 20 Hamilton County food pantries with farm fresh beef and pork raised by 4-H members.

Meat Distribution Day will be Saturday, Aug. 11. The 14 4-H members who have designated their animals for sale to the Food Bank will be helping to feed those families and children in the community with the equivalent of 13,880 meals of good, healthy protein.

Protein is an item that is often missing from HCH clients' meals and hard to provide consistently by the pantries because of cost. When beef and pork are available, the

The mayor of Fishers has released a statement after the apparent arrest of the Fishers police chief Saturday night.

According to Mayor Scott Fadness, Fishers Police Chief Mitch Thompson, 48, informed officials that he was arrested for driving while intoxicated after being involved in a three-car personal injury crash just before 11 p.m. in the 9500 block of Keystone Avenue.

A police report for the incident stated that Thompson rear-ended a car, causing it to strike a third vehicle.

Fadness has placed Thompson on paid administrative leave pending an investigation. Assistant Police Chief Ed Gebhart will assume Thompson's role while the investigation is conducted.

Officials with the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department are investigating the crash.

## Geist Waterfront Park enters design phase

Now that the court proceedings and condemnation process have ended, the City of Fishers is moving toward getting comments from the public on what it wants at Geist

Waterfront Park, the only public space on Geist Reservoir. The Fishers Board of Works and Safety approved a professional services agreement with the firm of Browning Day Mullins Dierdorf to begin that process.

Deputy Mayor Leah McGrath told board members public input sessions will be held later this fall. "We hope to bring some designs forward for the community to respond to later this year and heading into early 2019," said McGrath.

Mayor Scott Fadness emphasized that this professional services agreement is not part of the full design process, and that contract will come later.

In other news from last week's Board of Works session:

- The city is in the process of installing flashing lights at all public schools in the city to warn motorists when the school zone speed limits are in effect. The board approved an amendment to the ordinance setting all school speed limits, while school is in session, at 25 mph.

## Range Line Road improvement projects begin this Friday in Carmel

The City of Carmel will begin road improvements to North Range Line Road, from 8th Street (Smokey Row) to Clay Terrace, beginning on or after Friday, Aug. 3. The two-phase project will include a short-term closure of the roundabout at 8th Street and Range Line Road, followed by restrictions to Range Line Road.

The first stage of the project is a retrofit of the existing roundabout. Work crews will be making modifications to the outside curb lanes in order to improve

traffic flow through the roundabout. This project is schedule to be done by Tuesday, Aug. 14, before school is back in session. During this phase, the intersection of 8th Street and Range Line Road will be closed to thru-traffic in all four directions.

After the completion of the roundabout, the second phase of the project will begin. This includes installation of a new storm water collection system and pedestrian connectivity from the roundabout to a point just south of Clay Terrace.

This project is expected to last until November.

During this second phase, Range Line Road will remain open, only to southbound traffic. Northbound traffic will be diverted east or west at the 8th Street roundabout. All businesses along Range Line will remain open with access, but vehicles will have to access them from the north.

The Hagan-Burke Trail will remain open throughout the project, giving additional access to businesses for pedestrians and bicyclists.

# Clauson legacy lives on in Noblesville

A Hamilton County business owner and race fan has found a way to both give something back to the sport he loves and to help honor the memory of his friend Bryan Clauson. Joe Murello, who lives in Carmel and will soon run two Noblesville businesses, is sponsoring a local driver at the inaugural Driven2SaveLives BC39 in memory of Clauson.

Murello said he met Clauson because he felt it was important to support a young driver from Noblesville.

"I was involved with Bryan's cars in Indianapolis through my association with Jonathan Byrd and the Byrd restaurant and hospitality group," Murello told The Reporter. "I got to know Bryan. He passed right after we sponsored him in Indianapolis."

Murello said he only played a small part in sponsoring Clauson, but came to admire him deeply.

"Bryan's major backing came from Jonathan Byrd Hospitality and Restaurant group," Murello said. "Ginny, Jonathan and David Byrd took me along and I started to get to know Bryan and started to admire him not only as a driver but as a young man."

Murello, a former drag racer, said he considers himself as a race fan more than anything else.

"I started sponsorship at a small, local 1/5-mile track mostly known for figure-8 racing," Murello said. "Then the Brickyard with Phil Parsons after I heard about Josh Wise fundraising efforts. Gee, seems to be

### Murello's new restaurant

In addition to his Noblesville business and his BC39 sponsorship, Murello is also opening a new restaurant in the next few weeks.

Giuseppe's Italian Market, 1741 Hazel Dell Crossing, Suite 500, Noblesville, will open in August. The restaurant will feature 100 percent Italian food and is a business focused primarily on carry-out service.

Murello, who lives in Carmel, says the new restaurant is only three minutes from his home. "It is a unique area. Basically three cities come together at one intersection," Murello said.

In 2015 Murello got involved with sponsorship though Byrd Hospitality Group.

"My friend Jonathan and Bryan both being from Noblesville just seemed right," Murello said. "In 2016, the 100th Indy 500

and two drivers in Dale Coyne cars sponsored again by the same sponsor group as before - so I was sure in for that! Conor Daly actually led several laps of the Indy Grand Prix and Bryan led the 100th lap of the 100th Indy 500."

On August 7, 2016, Bryan Clauson died in a racing accident while attempting

to race 200 races in one season.

After that, Murello said he was finished with racing.

"Before the 2017 Brickyard 400 and Lily Diabetes 250 Ryan Sieg Racing contacted me about their Xfinity car and I said no," Murello told The Reporter.

Murello explained to Sieg Racing his connection to Clauson. They told Murello they also wanted to honor Clauson and if Murello was a sponsor on their car, Clauson's BC logo would be included.

Thus, Murello helped sponsor them last year.

Which of course brings us to 2018.

When asked how his sponsorship efforts for the BC39 began, Murello said, "Charlie Langenstein contacted me. He knew my history with racing and Bryan was very dear to me. I have an office in Noblesville that is close to a restaurant Bryan used to eat at where I used to see him and his fiancée, Lauren. It was a pleasure to get to help in a very small way to sponsor him in Indianapolis in 2015 and 2016."

Murello said he has known Langenstein for several years.

"He is involved in all forms of racing, and his son, Austin, is now racing dirt cars," Murello said. "Charlie wants his son to race in the first commemorative race for Bryan, the BC29 at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. Austin is an up-and-coming dirt track racer, which is where Bryan started."

The Driven2SaveLives BC39 will take place the Wednesday and Thursday before the Brickyard 400, Sept. 5 and 6. Langenstein's car for that event is being built by former Indy 500 driver Billy Boat.

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## Westfield Washington Township thanks Carl Steele for 36 years

On July 18, the Alcohol Code Revision Commission had their first of five meetings. If you are looking for the words "cold beer," they are not in this, nor in the minutes of the meeting. What is the purpose of this group? If you go to the website, it says they have three primary functions:

- To protect the economic welfare, health, peace and morals of the people of this state;
- To regulate and limit the manufacture, sale, possession, and use of alcohol and alcoholic beverages;
- To provide for the raising of revenue.

The "what we do" is probably not why you are reading this; you want to know what happened.

We gained some interesting factoids. Did you know there are 272 types of alcohol permits? The good news is some on this commission do believe that we need to "make the code more understandable and less complex." Best part of the discussion? Mr. Buskirk's response to finding out about this information, "I can't believe we have over 200 permits currently."

We can't either, Mr. Buskirk. The most interesting discussing was around escrow permits. A permit that goes into escrow is for a variety of reasons: "Death of the

owner, transfer of business plan or owner, etc." So, what do you do with all these permits sitting in escrow? According to Representative Smaltz, "... the permits belong to the state."

The Deputy Mayor of Fishers, Leah McGrath, spoke at the meeting. One of the most important take-aways from her remarks: "The quota system for us doesn't work. Maybe we should remove the boundaries for the system. We need to help those who have made investments already."

So no, cold beer was not a part of the discussion, but there are some items from this meeting that play an important role in how our communities in Hamilton County continue to grow their business community.

Since we are talking about alcohol, some of you might have heard of the game "quarters." If not, the way it works is simple. Each player takes turns bouncing a quarter off the table and into the glass. If the attempt is successful, the player gets to give the person of their choice a drink. If you make three attempts in a row, you get to make a rule.

This commission is currently playing quarters. We need to make sure that with only four more meetings left, the rules they create support businesses in Hamilton County.

The new Fishers Police Headquarters building should be completed by the end of August. Originally, the completion date had been set at Aug. 1, but some change orders have moved the date back.

There were two items related to the State Road 37 project. The first names Imavex as the Marketing

Coordinator during the construction phase of the rebuilding project. The second approves an agreement among the State of Indiana (INDOT), the City of Fishers, the City of Noblesville and Hamilton County, determining the responsibility of drainage trunk lines that will be installed for storm water flow.

And yet, my mom gets up every morning with the attitude that she is going to enjoy the people and the day to the best of her ability.

It's not easy.

Losing one's independence. Leaving the home where so many memories were made.

Even the sounds of the

antique clock would strike my heart as I packed her things. It's chiming seemed to echo a loneliness.

Sights that were seen at every visit are now tucked away.

Yarn for her crocheted sock dolls. Half a stick of gum lying on the end table. A Blair clothes catalogue with pages dog-eared and items marked for me to order for her. She has always been a woman who was fashion conscious.

I, now, take nothing for granted, when it comes to my mom.

I call several times a day and I visit her almost every day. It just seems to be never enough.

My heart struggles as I

see her physically struggle.

I want to make this season of her life as enjoyable and safe as possible. The decision to move her to an assisted living residence was one of the most difficult decisions of my life.

I went back to the house for a few more things to take to her.

As I wiped tears, I felt the memories trickle down my cheeks.

I sat on the front porch in the rocking chair where I spent many a Sunday afternoon with my mom.

And I thought ...

This is the house that built me. This is the house where I was loved. This is where my mom made it a home.

And I wipe a few more tears. This is a tough chapter. The words are getting harder to write.

# Andrea Neal's biography on Pence due in August

Noblesville native Andrea Neal's new book, *Pence: The Pathway to Power*, is due at bookstores next month. It is a carefully researched biography of the former Indiana governor and now Vice President Mike Pence.

The author reviews Pence's career starting with his first unsuccessful and negative campaign for Congress, after which he started a successful talk radio program and was named head of the Indiana Public Policy Review Foundation. It follows his second, and successful run against longtime incumbent Phil Sharp.

He then won the Republican nomination for governor in 2012 and was elected by a narrow margin. His term was a stormy one, but he sought a second term only to withdraw when Donald Trump invited him to run for vice president in 2016.

Apparently, Pence never doubted the Trump-Pence ticket would win despite predictions to the contrary. In the book are also found a few interesting tidbits that heretofore have not been revealed. But, my interest is more about the biography's author, a good and accomplished writer. It's hard to describe how impressed I am with Andrea Neal, a talented lady I've known since she was a child.

Andrea is the daughter of the late James T. Neal. Her mother, Georgianne Neal who also started as a news reporter, now lives in Indianapolis. Andrea's father, grandfather and great-grandfather were in the newspaper business in Noblesville for most of the 20th century, operating the respected Noblesville Daily Ledger.

Andrea got her first taste of journalism work-

ing part time at the Ledger while still in school. After graduating from Brown University, she took a position with the UPI news service, then went to the Indianapolis Star where she was a columnist and editorial board member. She is now a teacher at Saint Richard's Episcopal School as well as an author.

Although Andrea comes from a staunch Republican family and was a Pence appointee to the State Board of Education, her biography reveals the favorable, the unfavorable and, most of all, the accurate story of the vice president's political career. It is not fluff, according to those who have reviewed the book.

In 2016, Andrea wrote a book entitled *Road Trip*, a travel guide of Indiana history for the state Bicentennial. Her deep family roots in Indiana led to her interest in state history. Andrea's immediate family, besides her mother, includes two adult sons, Drew and Scott, and a sister, Dede.

# Fishers man spearheads ban on holding phone while driving

An effort has launched to change how drivers are allowed to use cell phones while behind the wheel.

Hands Free Indiana, a group spearheaded by Joe Locke of Fishers, is approaching lawmakers to consider banning hand-held phone use.

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety has listed 16 states and Washington D.C. as already passing a law on talking on a hand-held phone while driving. Most of the laws exist on the West and East

coasts. Illinois is the only state with the ban in the Midwest.

"We're getting to a very dangerous activity and a habit and it's just got to change," Locke said. "It's a public safety issue. It's not infringing on a personal right or anything of that nature. We're trying to keep people safe."

Locke has used a hands-on approach to prove his point about hands-free driving.

On several occasions during the month of July, he stationed along streets in Fishers with two tall counters. With one, he

took record of the number of vehicles passing, the second counted the drivers who were visibly using a mobile device.

Locke did the math and determined that while on Brooks School Road for 30 minutes, he counted one distracted driver every 50 seconds.

The following day, Locke spent 30 minutes on 126th Street in Fishers counting one distracted driver every 15 seconds.

"It was pretty disturb-

ing," Locke said. "It's putting everyone at risk ... I see someone on the side of the road whether it's a jogger, even a family walking on a sidewalk that's close to the road ... just think about a motorcycle or anyone in the car."

Hands Free Indiana planned to launch a website on Aug. 1 detailing the proposal the group would like to see sponsored by the legislature as well as ways the community can get involved in the campaign.

The Dentino fan club, led by Nick's grandfather Calvin, did not dream of topping that moment this summer. But, it happened.

With "Paw" behind him and one more season at Carmel still ahead, Pebble Beach and the U.S. Amateur are up next.

### HARRIS ALSO QUALIFIES

Dentino was the only Indiana player to qualify for the U.S. Amateur - until Tuesday.

Dentino's Carmel teammate Cole Harris qualified that day after his finish at the USGA qualifying event at Westwood Country Club in St. Louis. Harris, also a senior, carded a five-under par 69-68=137, finishing third at the event. Harris had a bogey-free second round.

Actually, Carmel's lineup is already familiar to everybody. The Greyhounds have five returning players, led by senior Nina Hecht and sophomore Katie Kuc. Hecht has been named to the All-State team the past two years, while Kuc was part of Carmel's regular lineup as the 'Hounds made their usual run to the state meet.

Junior Elizabeth Hedrick will be another key varsity player; she was part of Carmel's state lineup last year. Senior Ella Woods and sophomore Sydney Longstreth both had solid summers and will also be big contributors to the team.

"We feel very fortunate to have been selected by the Coaches Association and Tony Pancake and the Crooked Stick membership for these outstanding tournament fields, and believe that the strong summer success of our players and their strong tournament play has been rewarded."
