Carmel Rotary awards \$10K grant to H.A.N.D. playground

H.A.N.D. Inc. has been awarded a \$10,000 grant from the Carmel Rotary Club and Rotary International District 6560 to help build a commercial-grade playground at H.A.N.D.'s new Home Place Gardens development in Carmel. Rotary members also will help to install the playground.

Home Place Gardens is H.A.N.D.'s seventh affordable rental community in Hamilton County and the first to include housing for families with children: Two of the 10 units at Home Place Gardens are reserved for families who have survived violence and are referred by Prevail Inc. The other eight units will be occupied by seniors age 55 and older.

Including a playground at Home Place Gardens is important because it gives resident families and their guests a recreational option close to home, H.A.N.D. Ex-



ecutive Director Jennifer Miller said when accepting the grant at Carmel Rotary's Aug. 3 lunch meeting.

"We hope the playground can help these children feel a little sense of normalcy in a very difficult situation," said Carmel Rotary Club President Jon Walker.

Constructed on 2.4 acres south of 106th Street between College Avenue and the Monon Greenway, Home Place Gardens will welcome tenants beginning this month.

The \$2.6 million proj-

ect was funded with loans and grants from the Indiana Housing & Community Development Authority, Federal Home Loan Bank of Indianapolis, Hamilton County, Prevail Inc., Crosser Family Foundation and Woodforest National Bank.

The playground equipment was funded separately. In addition to the Rotary, contributors included 100+ Women of Hamilton County and Meyer Najem Construction. At least one volunteer work day will be scheduled for this fall to prepare the site for play.

About H.A.N.D.

Founded as Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development in 2003, H.A.N.D. has developed seven affordable rental communities throughout Hamilton County, leasing a total of 106 units to low-income individuals and families. This year, it acquired 17 duplexes in Lebanon, extending its reach to nearby Boone County. Its mission is to be a leader in promoting prosperity and diversity in its communities by providing quality housing opportunities.

As train museum moves out, new train to run next month

Forest Park may be more attractive in the next year or two without the Indiana Transportation Museum rail yard, but everything has its price. Noblesville is losing some of Indiana's oldest and most famous railroad relics.

Of course, the public never got to fully appreciate a restored display of rail cars and locomotives because the museum never completed its plans for a true outdoor museum of railroading. There was never enough money.

After more than 40 years, city officials grew tired of the unfinished and

"junky" looking site that the museum leased in Forest Park. Last month the rail cars and equipment began a slow exodus from the park after a court ordered their removal.

Through the years, museum personnel did provide a popular Fair Train and some other excursion trains on the Nickel Plate tracks which run the length of Hamilton County. But, safety concerns put an end to that more than a year ago. The museum has now moved its operation to Logansport.

On the brighter side, the

Nickel Plate Express acquires historic business car number 1

Nickel Plate Express recently signed an agreement to acquire the historic Nickel Plate business car number one. The business car will be used during 2019 operations for business retreats, private parties and themed excursions.

The business car is owned by Powell Felix, president of Indiana Boxcar Corporation and owner of four short line railroads. Nickel Plate Express will use the car at its discretion for businesses retreats, private parties and as first-class seating on themed excursions. The public can purchase tickets for the car beginning in spring 2019.

The Pullman Company built the Nickel Plate

business car in 1929 for the president of the Nickel Plate holding company. It served several other railroads before transferring to private owners in the 1970s. Built to accommodate up to 16 guests, the steel car also includes private quarters for a porter and a cook. Originally, railroad officials used the business car on inspection trips. The car allowed them to remain on the railroad for an extended period of time and is fully equipped with a kitchen, dining room and lounge room for business meetings.

These business cars were not available to ordinary passengers and were

Quakenbush serving on Homeland Security Senior Advisory Committee

Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen announced Tuesday that Captain Dennis Quakenbush will serve on the Senior Advisory Committee for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

Bowen said, "Captain Quakenbush's knowledge and expertise will be as valuable an asset to the committee as it is to the community we all enjoy. He is highly qualified and will serve Hamilton County and Indiana well."

The Senior Advisory Committee supports the National Preparedness Goal, the purpose of which is to prepare communities for all types of disasters and emergencies with a five-prong

approach of prevention, protection, mitigation, response and recovery. Among the committee's responsibilities are integrating preparedness activities across disciplines and working with local, state, tribal and territorial government agencies to maximize coordination and reduce duplication of efforts.

Funds are provided to states by DHS to support efforts in strengthening national preparedness and resilience, with an overall objective of preventing terrorism and other catastrophic events, as well as preparing for threats and

hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. The committee does its part in achieving these objectives by ensuring that Indiana awards funds for projects and initiatives that support and enhance the ability to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond and recover from both natural and man-made threats and disasters.

Quakenbush said, "I'm excited about this opportunity as it aligns with our goal to keep Hamilton County one of the safest communities in the nation. We

HSE Schools kicks off new school year

It was a once-a-year gathering of the entire Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools corporation staff – part pep rally, part informational – but mostly a kick-off to the 2018-2019 school year. It all happened Tuesday morning at the Fishers High School gymnasium. Several school officials spoke and Mayor Scott Fadness talked about an internship program for HSE district students.

School Superintendent Allen Bourff told the staff that HSE 21 (an immersive educational program) allows for what he calls "deep learning," which allows students to use the basic skills learned in the classroom. He described a

new data tool teachers can utilize this school year.

Fadness says the school system is the center of what he describes as a "race for human talent," and the ability of students here to sustain Fishers as a growing community. The mayor says he wants to work with local school officials to "come together collectively, toward a common goal," which he describes

as creating "an educational experience like nowhere else in the country."

Fadness also talked about a new software program aimed at matching up internship opportunities with students looking for an internship. He also is working on a way to bring the business community into the classroom and bring their expertise into the classroom.

new Nickel Plate Express, with funding assistance from the county tourism bureau, is set to begin operations in mid to late September. Newly purchased passenger cars, a dining car and two locomotives will run on the rail line. A traditional caboose will ultimately be added. Nickel Plate Express has not attempted to purchase any of the museum's pieces.

In the beginning, the new train will run only from 206th Street to Atlanta because of the condition of the rail bed south of 206th, according to Nickel Plate director Toni Dickover.

Eventually, the excursion

train will run from Noblesville, possibly as far north as Tipton. It will not be able to offer a Fair Train because the railroad south of Noblesville is planned to become a walking and biking trail similar to the Monon Trail. But, other popular rides on the Santa Train and Pumpkin Patch will be seasonal opportunities for youngsters.

The collection of vintage museum rail stock is being scattered. The century-old steam engine 587 is being renovated in Kentucky. It may go to Logansport when it is returned to service, according to some reports.

The historic Flagler

Car, built for industrialist Henry Flagler, has been sold to a private buyer. One report indicates it may go to the Monon museum at Monon, Ind., but that is not confirmed. Flagler is credited with creating a tourist mecca of Miami, Fla., in the 1920s by building a rail line to South Florida.

And, no one seems to know what has become of the restored interurban car known as the 'City of Noblesville.' It was restored about 1970 for use as the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce office and was located along North 8th Street near the city water plant before going to Forest Park.



We, as many of you, were horrified to learn of the shooting at Noblesville West Middle School this past May. Schools are central hubs of our community and should be safe havens for young people. When that security is shaken, it can be terrifying for students, educators and families.

As much as we were shocked by this shooting, at Prevail we see the effects of horrific acts of violence in our community every single day. Every day, our advocates help people who have experienced devastating events cope with their trauma. Every day, kids, teens and adults fill our offices and share their own stories of violence, emotional abuse, stalking and sexual assault.

Hamilton County is remarkably safe, especially when compared to many other places across the state and even the country. We have incredible assets and strengths that offer opportunities and advantages many places lack. Our schools are top-notch, our parks are pristine, our law enforcement agencies are responsive, and there's always something fun to do. While these resources contribute to a wonderful sense of security, we cannot ignore the gaps in our community. We cannot turn a blind eye to our friends and neighbors who are struggling.

One of the greatest assets our community offers is the wide array of ser-

vice agencies and community organizations dedicated to improving our individual and collective well-being. However, many of these agencies, like Prevail, are often overwhelmed by the immediate needs of individuals and families in crisis. Though these intervention services are critical, they do little to reduce the number of people walking through our doors every day. In order to make our community safer, we need to be proactive rather than reactive – and we need your help to do that.

Preventing violence begins with all of us working together to create safer and loving environments. That means building relationships, strengthening connections and checking in on the people around you. It means encouraging each other, building others up and breaking down the stigma that surrounds seeking help.

It is easy to point fingers, hurl blame and wait for someone else to do something about the conditions that contribute to violence in our community. But every single one of us has a responsibility to our friends, families and neighbors to do our part in keeping Hamilton County safe.

Patching beginning on State Road 32

Car collides with two houses in Carmel, no serious injuries reported

Carmel police say a driver's footwear is partly to blame for a wreck that caused damage to two homes in the 13500 block of Forum Meadows Drive on Saturday night.

Police say that just before 8 p.m. Saturday night, Nicole Zollinger-Muench, 44, Carmel, claimed that her flip-flop got stuck on the gas pedal when she was exiting from her

street and she was not able to stop her vehicle. Zollinger-Muench then drove through the corner of the garage of one house and through the side of the garage of the house next door before her car finally came to rest.

The impact of the crash forced a car that was in the garage of the second home involved through the wall on the other side of that garage. Duke Energy crews were called to the scene to cut

the power to both houses because of the severity of the damage.

No one in the homes were injured but the homeowners were forced to vacate the homes until structural engineers could evaluate the houses to make sure they were safe for occupants to return.

Zollinger-Muench was given field sobriety tests and consented to a blood draw. She was taken to a local hospital for treatment of minor injuries.

Rep. Tony Cook responds to vandalism at Carmel synagogue

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) released the following statement regarding the recent anti-Semitic vandalism at the Congregation Shaarey Tefilla in Carmel:

"It is my understanding that Indiana judges currently have the implicit ability to enhance sentences motivated by a criminal's bias and hatred. I believe that with the increasing incidence of these crimes, illustrated by the recent synagogue vandalism in my home county, it is time to emphasize and explicitly include within the law's aggravating fac-

tors for criminal sentencing those crimes motivated by bias or hatred toward the victims. I will vote to support a bias-motivated hate crime bill, and it is my intention to draft a bill to generate discussion and address this issue.

"I have personally experienced these types of hateful attacks through profane and sometimes physically threatening anonymous letters, while serving as the principal during Ryan

White's admission and unrestricted attendance at Hamilton Heights High School. Accordingly, I have no tolerance for these heinous, intolerable acts towards individuals and groups, and neither should our Hoosier state as a whole."

State Rep. Tony Cook (R-Cicero) represents House District 32, which includes all of Tipton County and portions of Hamilton, Madison, Delaware, Howard and Grant counties.





Tech wiz finds new home with Colts

Linebacker Najee Goode may not join Andrew Luck's book club any time soon, but the Colts tech club is ready for takeoff.

First-year Colts head coach Frank Reich didn't depart Philadelphia alone -- linebacker Najee Goode also celebrated with the Eagles in February.

"Every day we practice, I go at it. ... I talk crap to Andrew (Luck), I talk crap to Adam (Vinatieri). ... He's about 70 years old, but I call him 100," Goode said. "Me and Frank (Reich) have got a weird relationship because he's over there talking to the quarterbacks while I'm over there talking to the linebackers. So he's trying to give them hints and clues, while I'm trying to steal them and listen to them."

Goode has always been a problem solver. He was a preferred walk-on in college at West Virginia and turned that opportunity into a degree in engineering and a career in the NFL. Just before showing up as a free agent this offseason in Indianapolis, Goode had his best idea yet, but it

had nothing to do with football.

Goode created his own app called Veepio; it lets users find more information on any person, place or thing on social media with a simple touch of the screen.

"It's pretty simple: If you've ever watched something on TV or on your phone, and you want to know what it is or how to buy it, you can just click on it. It's pretty cool," Goode said.

"We love it man; we partnered with official teams in the NFL. We are data vendors. So, right now, the Colts will have our app. Soon about six or seven other teams (will too), and by the end of the year, the rest of the league," Goode said.

The best part of this whole deal? Some of his Colts teammates still have no idea.

"That's a pretty decent idea, I think. I'm not gonna lie," fellow linebacker Skai Moore said. "So you just see a picture of this guy right here and if you like his shirt, you click on the shirt? I think that's a pretty good idea, to be honest. I need to go talk to Najee and come up with an app of my own."


