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Arrests made in Carmel vandalism case

Two arrests has been made after a synagogue in Carmel was defaced on July 28.

The U.S. Attorney's Office announced the arrest of Nolan Brewer, 20, Cloverdale, Ind., at a press conference on Thursday. The FBI and Carmel Police Department were also at the announcement.

Brewer has been charged with conspiracy to violate civil rights, a federal crime.

Investigators said Walmart security video shows Brewer and someone else buying red and black spray paint and bandanas the day before the incident. Prosecutors say other evidence also links them to the crime.

Prosecutors also said Brewer's partner, a 17-year-old female, is also under arrest but they will not give a name. The two offenses allegedly committed are Criminal Mischief and Arson, which, if committed by an adult, would be a Class A Misdemeanor and a Level 6 Felony, respectively.

A Nazi flag and other symbols were spray painted on a brick wall at the Congregation Shaarey Tefilla on 116th Street last month.

According to court records, Brewer admitted he and the juvenile female in the crime used homemade napalm to light a fire under the swastika to create an "effect." Investigators said they found pictures of the vandalism on his phone.

Noblesville opens Midland Trace Trail Phase II

Noblesville officials have broken ground in April on Phase II of the Midland Trace Trail, a 12-foot wide multi-use path that connects Willowview Road east to Hazel Dell Road.

Construction of Phase II and the land acquired are 80 percent funded by a fed-

eral aid grant obtained by the Noblesville Engineering Department, and 20 percent funded by the city. The project continues to increase Noblesville's trail availability and connectivity.

A new Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon allows safe crossing across Hazel Dell Road and connects Phases I and II.

Future plans for the Midland include a third phase that will extend the trail from Willowview Road to Hague Road and Metzger Lane in 2019.

A fourth phase will connect with the potential Pleasant Street extension from Hague Road to cross Cicero Creek and the White River and beyond State Road 37.

HSE school board discusses redistricting process for K-8

K-8 school boundaries for the 2019-2020

The Hamilton Southeastern school board is beginning a redistricting process for kindergarten through eighth grade. The process will end on Dec. 12 with a board vote on new

school year.

Board members held a work session early Tuesday morning to talk about what priorities the board wants in asking for input from the public, as the process moves along from the remainder of this year.

There are a number of reasons redistricting is needed. A new school, Southeastern Elementary, will open in August 2019. Some schools are overcrowded. For example, Thorpe Creek Elementary School has 900 students, many more students than an elementary build-

ing should contain. There continue to be schools utilizing portable classrooms.

Dr. William Carnes, who served as interim HSE superintendent for 2014 and 2015, is now filling in as an interim assistant superintendent until Mike Beresford's former position is filled. Carnes is leading the administration's work on the redistricting plan.

At the Aug. 8 school board meeting, Carnes presented the following priorities for consideration in the redistricting

process:

To the extent possible:

- The redistricting plan will attempt to assign students to attend schools closest to their homes.
- The redistricting plan will attempt to design a "feeder" system.
- The redistricting process will attempt to maintain neighborhoods and subdivisions.
- Stabilize the movement of the

Court documents state when Indiana State Police stopped Brewer in his car on Wednesday, he was wearing a military-style camouflage jacket with a German flag on the shoulder.

Brewer's cellphone records indicate he received a text after the incident that said, "We made CNN, Fox, IndyStar, WTHR, etc. Mike Pence even tweeted

about us."

According to a court document, Brewer admitted to investigators that he conspired to paint Nazi graffiti at the synagogue. It also states Brewer told investigators he committed the crime because the synagogue is "full of ethnic Jews."

Brewer is currently in custody of federal marshals and is facing a 10-year sentence.

The vandalism sparked support from people across the Indianapolis area and electronic billboards showing the word "love" with the Star of David.

"They tried to evoke hatred and fear," Congregation Shaarey Tefilla Rabbi Benjamin Sendrow said. "What they produced was an outpouring of love and support and solidarity."

The Water Sub-Committee reviews national policy issues for both ground and surface water which affects the nation's counties. The GIS

Sub-Committee reviews programs and systems to provide NACo and members of the Association with technical assistance on issues associated with GIS, GPS, remote sensing and other related technologies. Ward also serves on five

other NACo committees. Those are the Information Technology Standing Committee; the Environment, Energy & Land Use Steering Committee; the Essential County Technology Subcommittee; Rural Action Caucus Steering Committee; and the Resilient Counties Advisory Board. Ward also serves on the NACo Board of Directors.

REDISTRICTING

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At the Tuesday work session, board members brainstormed a number of other considerations, including:

- Have a transparent process
- Maximize school capacity on the west side of the district to allow for continued growth in the eastern areas
- Reduce the use of portable classrooms, now and in the future

Establish a feeder system, for example, where students from a junior high school will all go the same high school

- Use a neighborhood concept to keep neighborhoods going to the closest school geographically
- Maintain subdivisions and neighborhoods in the same school where possible

The board members and administrators will grapple with the fact that many of these concepts cannot both

be used. For example, using a feeder system may not be consistent with keeping neighborhoods and subdivisions headed to the same school.

Dr. Carnes will use the ideas from board members at the work session and fashion a recommendation of priorities for the board to consider at the next regular board meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 22.

The board priorities will serve as a guideline for members of the community,

as they are asked to make suggestions on how the school boundaries should be drawn. "Cluster groups," appointed by school principals, will meet on Sept. 10 and 11. There will be focus groups sessions in late September and community dialogue sessions are set for Oct. 24 and 25. Administrators and board members will then begin to take that information and form the new school boundary lines for a final board decision on Dec. 12.

"We were so comfortable in that situation at the end of the game," said Morris. "Our kids were comfortable, they felt prepared and they just executed."

Lawrence Central led 14-0 at halftime. Southeastern got on the board in the third quarter with a four-yard run from Harris. The Bears answered that with a one-yard touchdown run, but the extra point didn't go.

HSE's Manny Daniels got the Royals back within one score by making a 13-yard interception return, also in the third period. Hebenstreit kicked both extra points in that quarter, keeping the Royals within 20-14 going into the fourth period.

Kody Sparks had a solid night passing, with 14 completions out of 29 attempts and 151 yards. Ben Boysen made six catches and Landon Morris got four receptions.

The Royals will play their home opener next Friday, taking on North Central. The Panthers hosted Fishers in their season-opener, winning 31-7.

Last year's Kentucky State Champions and holders of a 50-game winning streak nearly returned home with win 51 but it all ended for the Bluegrass bad boys as Carmel Defensive lineman Ryan Tilev hauled down Trinity Quarterback Seth Jutz in the waning seconds of the game.

"We are not overly skilled, but we are tough, our guys fought hard and didn't give up, they hold themselves accountable, and I am really proud of them," Hebert said.

Carmel's two quarterbacks provided bookend performances to provide the win for the Greyhounds. Tyler Trent finished the final 45 seconds of the game connecting on a 35-yard completion to Schulyar Bradley on third and five before adding the game winning strike over the middle to wide out Sam Rodgers.

Offense production between the two was close as Trinity finished with 217 total yards and 14 first downs compared to 182 and 10 for Carmel. Time of possession also favored the visitors 28:20 to 19:40. A key stat for Carmel could have been its three sacks for a loss of 37 yards against the Shamrocks.

"Football programs don't get any better than Trinity but we had some guys who challenged themselves to prove a point

about our program and we had some reserves make some big plays and everyone fought and I think that was the difference in the game," Hebert said.
