County Council to consider \$99M 2019 budget

County officials are hoping to adopt a 2019 budget of just under \$100 million without any increase in the county tax rate. The budget proposes to spend \$99,048,426 to fund county government operations, up about \$2.8 million from this year's budget.

Anticipated revenue increases from property taxes on new construction and added County Option Income Tax (COIT) collections should nearly cover the increase without having to dip into the county's reserve funds.

Probably the largest single increase in the budget will be salaries and benefits for 16 new employees at the county jail. The need for new employees comes about due to the expansion on the facility now underway.

Nine other new employee positions are being proposed in various departments of county government, but some of these may not survive a county council review of the budget scheduled for Sept. 12 and 13.

Current county employees are expected to get raises next year ranging from 1 to 3 percent under terms of the county salary matrix. Elected officials will likely receive up to 3 percent increases.

New building projects now on the drawing boards for expansion of the Judicial Center, a new White River bridge at Pleasant Street and county obligations toward the reconstruction of

Ind. 37 are not included in the budget. They are all to be funded with already accumulated cash or partially with a bond issue.

County Auditor Robin Mills said Monday that the county remains in a strong financial position and next year's needs should not jeopardize that. She said the county council will hold a public hearing on the budget on Oct. 2, and vote on final adoption Oct. 15.

Millers keep moving in the right direction

NOBLESVILLE – The third-ranked Class 3A Noblesville Millers are right where they want to be, but they aren't even close to where they want to end up.

Unbeaten against three state-ranked opponents prior to Wednesday night's Hoosier Crossroads Conference opener against 3A No. 12 Avon, the host Millers notched a fourth straight with a 3-0 shutout

victory.

But by no means are they content. Not in late August.

"This is the toughest conference in the state, so we know we have to come out and play every night," Noblesville head coach Michael Brady said. "But we're nowhere near where we're going to need to be to challenge for the conference, or again to make the kind of postseason run we hope to, but it is good steps."

The Millers' desired destination points towards October – the state tournament – when preparation should ideally equate results similar to 2017 when they won their ninth sectional and sixth regional in program history.

Behind a pair of goals by junior Carly Hudnall and another by senior Jewell Hensley on Wednesday, the Millers (3-0-1, 1-0 HCC) are unmistakably inching in the right direction.

In their season-opener on Aug. 13, the Millers tied 2A No. 2 Cathedral 1-1. During consecutive road matches, Noblesville defeated 3A No. 14 Brebeuf Jesuit 1-0 last Wednesday and later trounced 2A No. 8 West Lafayette 7-2 on Saturday.

A lining goal by Hudnall in the match's fifth minute against Avon (0-2-1, 0-1 HCC) supplied a quick 1-0 first-half lead, which held up throughout, but it could have been more.

While the Millers' midfield proved dominant, multiple scoring opportunities materialized, including a point-blank shot on goal by Hensley and a near breakaway attempt

Fourth-ranked Tigers win the Mudsock meet

The Mudsock tennis meet took place at Hamilton Southeastern on Wednesday, and it was a rewarding event for Fishers.

The Tigers beat the Royals 5-0, making it back-to-back Mudsock wins and giving the Fishers athletic program its first victory of the year. Southeastern won the girls golf event last week, so the schools are tied 1-1.

In Wednesday's tennis meet, the Tigers won all five matches in straight sets. Fishers is now 2-0; the Tigers won their first meet a few days ago by beating Park Tudor, a school that is a perennial first-class tennis program. Fishers coach Dave Heffern coached there for several years, overseeing a program that produced several state champions.

The Tigers' victories got the attention of the Indiana High School Tennis Coaches Association (IHSTeCA), which placed Fishers at No. 4 in its first set of rankings that were released earlier this week.

"Our first two matches have been rewarding, because of the kids, how hard they've worked," said Heffern. "And to see it come to fruition where they got some good results after the hard work they've put in is rewarding."

The Tigers' lineup is full of experience. All three singles players - No. 1 Nic Knoderer, No. 2 Marcus Luke and No. 3 Will White - are seniors, and all three won their matches easily, dropping just 11 games total.

In the doubles matches, junior Sam Barrett and senior Drew Dixon played No. 1, while senior Peter Hallam and freshman Nate Simkins were the No. 2 team. Both teams won their matches 6-4, 6-4.

Heffern said his team worked hard over the summer, spending much of their time "on the aggressive game, coming to the net." It's the style commonly known as serve and volley, one that may have fallen out of favor in the professional game, but an old-school

coach like Heffern understands its value.

"A lot of volleys, a lot of overheads," said Heffern. "We serve and volley a couple times a week for doubles and for singles. We spend a lot of time on the things that are necessary to be a good doubles player. And it helps the singles players because we do approach shots two to three times a week

where they have to come in after they hit the first shot. We give them a short ball and they have to come in and play the point out. The kids really love that drill."

"All that stuff has really helped us become complete players with good variety," said Heffern. "You still have to be able to be steady first, but once you're steady then

you can work your way into the net, you're ahead of the game."

Fishers beat Park Tudor 4-1 on Saturday. The Tigers conceded the No. 1 singles match to Park Tudor's Aidan Harris, who Heffern said is "one of the top players in the state," but won all the others.

"This is the start of my sixth year at Fishers and my summer program has come along to the point where I feel we're going to be very competitive in the future," said Heffern.

Next up for the Tigers is play at the Noblesville Invitational on Saturday.

As for the Royals, who are ranked No. 16 in the IHSTeCA's first poll, they are now 1-2. Southeastern will play in the prestigious John Shirley Tournament, which takes place Saturday at North Central

"It was disappointing to not win a set tonight, but hopefully this is a match our players can learn from and will motivate us going forward," said HSE coach Kirk Webber.

Week 2 football previews

Carmel-Noblesville rivalry continues on Friday

Another chapter of a classic rivalry will continue on Friday, as Carmel travels to Noblesville for Week 2 of the Indiana high school football season.

The Class 6A No. 2 Greyhounds are coming off a huge win over Kentucky powerhouse Louisville Trinity, ending the Trojans' long win streak with a 24-21 victory. Sam Rodger's 21-yard touchdown catch from Tyler Trent sealed the victory for Carmel with 28 seconds to go in the game.

The Millers took on an Indiana powerhouse, Cathedral, falling to the Irish 31-7 at Lucas Oil Stadium. Grant Gremel had a solid game as quarterback, completing 11 of 29 passes for 158 yards.

The two teams played each other twice last season, with Carmel winning both games. The Greyhounds beat Noblesville 31-0 in the regular season at Carmel Stadium, then won a sectional semi-final 25-7 at the Millers' field.

"It's a rivalry game," Noblesville head coach Justin Roden told Hamilton County Television. "They're right down the road. It's a fun game. They are fantastic on both sides of the ball. John (Hebert) is a really good coach. It's probably as good of a coached football team as you're going to find. You're watching offensive linemen take perfect steps off the ball. You're watching linebackers and secondary players orchestrate a technique that is spot on, that's perfect. It's definitely a pretty tough task."

"I have all the respect in the world for Justin Roden," said Hebert in an HCTV interview. "He and I have been friends for years. He's a great defensive guy. He and I share a lot of the same outlooks. I know what they're trying to do. I've seen it work at East Central. We scrimmaged them last year. I think it's a matter of time. And I also think, you look at the progress a team makes Week 1 to Week 2, there's a lot there for Noblesville to really sink their teeth into and solidify. How are our guys going to respond? You have a big, emotional win and you beat a team like Trinity. Coming back today to work, the next day or the next week is a big challenge. We've got our work cut out for us."

SHAMROCKS PLAY HOME OPENER

After a win on the road last week, Westfield will take on Decatur Central Friday in the Shamrocks' home opener.

Westfield beat Harrison 28-16, with

Camden Simons rushing for and throwing for a touchdown in the game. Simons was 10-of-14 for 95 yards passing, while Nathan Nguyen rushed for 98 yards and a score.

The Hawks are ranked No. 4 in Class 5A. Decatur started its season with a 14-0 victory over Franklin Central, a team Westfield and the other Hoosier Crossroads Conference programs will see later in the season, as the Flashes joined the HCC this season. Senior quarterback Parker Harrington completed 10 of 18 passes for 114 yards and a touchdown.

"They're very athletic and fast," said 'Rocks coach Jake Gilbert on HCTV. "They have some playmakers for sure, so we're going to have to match that. They play hard, a good level of swagger and intensity coming out of those guys. They're in your face defensively. They blitz, they play man coverage. Offensively they're going fast and really using their speed as an advantage. So they put stress on you. "They are big," said Kirschner on HCTV. "They got some large people up front. Tall, 6-foot-4, 260 (pound) type kids. I think they're very physical. I think they come downhill really hard. They're not a complicated defense, but I do think what they do, they execute pretty well. Offensively, they've got several kids, especially skilled kids returning."

Matt Harris' two-yard run in the fourth quarter tied the game, and Mitch Hebenstreit converted the extra point kick to seal the win.

North Central has a great quarterback in Liam Thompson. The senior threw for 243 yards last week, completing 10 of 17 passes and two touchdowns. Senior Alexander Tarver rushed for 119 yards and a score, while senior Tre'von Elliott caught four receptions for 132 yards and a score.
