Hauntingly good reason to visit Atlanta

The Roads Hotel, 150 E. Main St., Atlanta, is often listed as one of the most haunted locations in Indiana and has been featured on multiple paranormal investigation programs. On Sept. 1, the Roads Hotel will be also the site of a fundraising event in support of children who are amputees.

Paramaxx Promotions Senior Agent Stephanie Wallen is the event coordinator for what is being called the first Mini-Con to benefit the Lost Limbs Foundation.

"Mike Couch runs the Lost Limbs Foundation and is the owner of the Roads Hotel," Wallen said. "He is an amputee himself and is the one who started the foundation to help amputee children. The foundation helps with their medical and travel expenses. It is a cause that is really near and dear to our hearts. We have become good friends with Mike and have been fans of the Roads for a while. We love going up there for investigations."

This event is being called MiniCon because it is a small-scale convention.

"In the paranormal world every event is a Con (convention)," Wallen told The Reporter. "This is a smaller version of a lot of these conventions that happen around the country. We are limiting it to between 12 and 15 vendor booths. We are going to conduct some nighttime and overnight investigations as well. Space is limited and we are trying to do everything indoors so we do not have to worry about weather."

At the event you can meet actor Santiago Cirilo, who played Julio in AMC's

The Walking Dead, and is starring in the upcoming Christopher Maggard film, *Rosa Leigh*. Another actor who will be at this event is actor John Witt, who has many roles including a ghost in the TLC show *A Haunting*. Author Aldo Gonzalez will also be in attendance.

"This is a free event and is open to the public," Wallen said. "Donations are welcome. The vendors who will be on hand will be selling their services and any mer-

chandise they may have. There is no obligation to buy anything, but all proceeds will go directly to the Lost Limbs Foundation."

In addition to the various celebrities at the event, there will be opportunities to talk to professionals in the paranormal field and to learn more about the history of this famous hotel.

What lies beneath new project site?

In March of next year, Noblesville's first major downtown redevelopment project is slated to begin. It involves construction of a \$24 million mixed-use complex of commercial, residential and underground parking in the half-block north of Maple Avenue between 8th and 9th streets. News of the project was reported in Saturday's Reporter.

The site was the location of some of the city's most historic structures including the Wild Opera House, the first city hall, the second city hall and the Houston Hotel. Still standing, but scheduled to be removed, is the building housing the Holt Legal Group and Ayers Real Estate, which was home to Noblesville's first telephone exchange.

What is interesting about the project is the fact that prior to the 1970s when a building was demolished, the remains were often simply pushed into the basement and covered with dirt, and in this case, asphalt for parking lots.

What historic remnants may be found when excavating for the new complex next spring? It's hard to tell, but it will be interesting to see what all might have been buried from the opera house or the original city hall, for example.

The first city hall faced Maple midway between 8th and 9th. It was built in the post-Civil War period. It included space for the police and fire departments on the first floor and city council chambers on the second. The second city hall was built in 1954 facing 8th Street on the northwest corner of the site.

The real gem was the opera house, a three-story structure facing 9th Street just south of Noblesville Elks Club. It was built in the early 1890s. It was upscale for the time with a 66-foot-wide stage. It was torn down about 1960 for a parking lot.

The Houston Hotel, also built in the late 1800s,

was the city's only hotel for many years. It was heavily damaged by fire in the 1980s and torn down for parking.

So, who knows what relics from Noblesville's past may turn up in the excavation for the new building? We'll try to let you know as progress gets underway.

Gray Eagle Golf Course in Fishers to close

There has been much speculation about the future of Gray Eagle Golf Course in Fishers. Those living in the Gray Eagle neighborhood were informed this week that the golf course will cease operations at the end of calendar year 2019.

Mark Thompson, of RN Thompson Golf, tells LarryInFishers his company has been working with the city on the future of the golf facility, located near 126th Street and Brooks School Road. However, Mr. Thompson says ceasing operations is in the "best interest of all parties at this time."

The owner of the golf course will continue to work with the Gray Eagle Homeowners Association and Fishers city officials on the future of the golf course, but Mr. Thompson provided no more specifics.

iTown Church originally wanted to build their

new building near the golf course, but nearby neighbors voiced concerns about how that might impact the future of the golf course. iTown chose another location at 136th Street and Brooks School Road.

In a letter to Gray Eagle residents from Homeowners Association President Chris De Monclin, details are provided of a meeting involving golf course ownership, city officials and representatives of Gray Eagle HOA. Suggestions of having the HOA take over the golf course were rejected because of the large dues increase – \$300 per year at the outset for each homeowner – with city officials saying that would only be a temporary solution anyway.

Mr. De Monclin's letter says the ownership would ask for \$5 million in any sale of the golf facility, but cites a Ball State estimate putting the value of the golf course at about \$1 million.

The HOA president praised efforts by May-

or Scott Fadness and City Councilors Brad DeReamer and Rich Block for their efforts to find a solution to the future of the Gray Eagle Golf Course property. Based on the letter to residents, the city has no interest in buying or developing the property. The likely outcomes, based on De Monclin's letter, are closing the golf course at the end of 2019 with no buyer, or finding another use for the golf course property.

"Councilmen DeReamer and Block, City staff, and I have been (and will continue to be) supportive of Gray Eagle HOA and its residents as they chart a path forward after being notified of the closure of Gray Eagle Golf Course," Fadness said in an emailed statement to LarryInFishers. "Fortunately, we have time on our side to make the right decision to allow for coordination between the City and the HOA on any potential future use to ensure residents are well represented in the process."

Fishers road construction updates, week of Aug. 27

Florida Road

Beginning on or after Tuesday, Sept. 4, Florida Road between Luxhaven Road and Martha Street will be closed for the rehabilitation of Bridge 192 (Florida Road over Fall Creek) by the Hamilton County Highway Department. The road will be closed to all thru traffic and will tentatively reopen before Nov. 3.

The intersection of 113th Street and Florida Road is closed for the realignment and construction of a new roundabout at the intersection. The closure is expected to last approximately 90 days. See the **Detour Map**.

106th Street

106th Street is closed to through traffic from Eller Road to Allisonville Road and from Allisonville Road to Hague Road for the 106th Street Infrastructure Project. 106th Street is also closed to through traffic between Hague Road and the Crosspoint Boulevard/Lantern Road roundabout. An updated **project timeline**

and **Detour Map** are **now available**.

Allisonville Road

Road construction is in full swing along Allisonville Road. Traffic has been shifted to the east to allow for widening on the west side. Restrictions may be in place between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. and flaggers will be on site directing traffic, as necessary. Through September, all southbound left turns from Allisonville Road onto 126th Street will be prohibited. This is an active construction site with reduced speed limits. Hoosier Road

There are periodic lane

restrictions on Hoosier Road south of 116th Street while the Hamilton County Highway Department completes the resurfacing and striping of Hoosier Road and 111th Street.

State Road 37

Civil War veterans meet for the last time

1883 – Henry F. Schricker was born in North Judson. He ran a weekly newspaper and worked in banking. Elected Governor in 1940, he was limited to one term by the state constitution. However, he won a second term in 1948. Very popular with the public, he was known for his cordiality and his big white hat. He is the only Indiana Governor to have been elected to two full non-consecutive terms.

1898 – Mary Ellen Reynolds was born in Evansville. Under the stage name of Marilyn Miller, she was a dancer, singer and actress. Hugely popular on Broadway in the 1920s and 1930s, she was a star of the Ziegfeld Follies. Her life story was the basis of the 1949 motion picture "Look for the Silver Lining."

1916 – The Circle The-



ater opened in Indianapolis. It was the first in the city to be built for the purpose of showing motion pictures. The venue also presented stage shows. Today, the beautiful theater is home to the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra.

1924 – Indiana Governor Forrest Branch and former Governor James P. Godrich were present for the dedication of the Clifty Inn at Clifty Falls State Park. Governor Branch said that the new park system should be a "chain of places of scenic interest conserving the natural beauty of Indiana."

1949 – Civil War soldiers of the Grand Army of the Republic held their final meeting in Indianapolis. Six of the 16 surviving Union soldiers were in attendance, ranging in age from 100 to 106. Indianapolis had hosted many of the GAR meetings over the years.

1973 – The state announced the purchase of a home on North Meridian Street in Indianapolis to be used as the Indiana Governor's Residence. Governor Otis Bowen and his wife Beth would continue to live at Riley Towers until the home was renovated.

Noblesville water main flushing starts tonight, running through November

Indiana American Water will conduct water main flushing in the Noblesville service area beginning overnight from midnight to 8 a.m. on Sunday, Aug. 26 and continuing through Friday, Aug. 31 in the downtown area.

Flushing of the remaining areas outside of downtown Noblesville will continue from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 3 through Friday, Nov. 16, Monday through Friday.

The company conducts the annual maintenance program to assure high-quality water service and to ensure fire hydrants are operational.

According to Noblesville Superintendent Ryan Smith, "Water main and fire hydrant flushing is an important part of a regular maintenance program for water distribution systems. Indiana American Water consistently meets or exceeds all drinking water standards."

No interruptions in water service are anticipated as a result of the work. Customers may experience a slight drop in water pressure or temporary water discoloration while this program is underway. Customers should refrain from doing laundry during the time of day the flushing program is taking place in

or near their neighborhood.

If tap water is discolored, Indiana American Water recommends allowing several cold-water faucets to run for a short time until the water runs clear. Using more than one faucet allows the water to clear more quickly.

Customers who have questions regarding hydrant flushing may call the Customer Service Center at 1-800-492-8373.

The water main flushing will be performed by Indiana American Water crews. They will be working out of trucks identified with the company logo. All employees will also have photo ID badges.

Wes Shealey receives Sagamore of the Wabash





Among those who have received Sagamores have been astronauts, presidents, politicians, ambassadors, artists, musicians, and ordinary citizens who have contributed greatly to our Hoosier heritage."
