## Heights Middle School to receive Ryan White historical marker

The Indiana Historical Bureau (IHB) has approved Hamilton Heights School Corporation's 2018-19 application for a state historical marker to commemorate the impact and contributions of Ryan White. The organization administers the Indiana Historical Marker Program to recognize significant people, places, events and organizations in Indiana's history.

Heights' application was among 34 submitted and 28 approved by the IHB this year. This cast aluminum marker, when complete, will be placed near the entrance of the Hamilton Heights Middle School in Arcadia. A special community dedication and unveiling is being planned to celebrate the county's most recent historical marker.

"Ryan's legacy in Hamilton County began here at the current site of Hamilton Heights Middle School (formerly the high school) [on] August 31, 1987," explained Dan Smith, with

## Noblesville school shooter to plead guilty

The Hamilton County Reporter has learned the suspect in the Noblesville West Middle School shooting will admit guilt in the case.

According to the attorney for David Moore, a Nov. 5 hearing will involve Moore entering the juvenile version of a guilty plea and the case moving to sentencing.

When asked about when Moore could be sentenced, Hamilton County Prosecutor Andre Miksha said, "Whether the court

would decide the disposition that same day is up to the court. The court could announce it immediately, take a brief recess and come back in a few minutes later, or take the matter under advisement and come back on a later date to announce the considered disposition."

Moore, who was 13 at the time of the shooting, was accused of shooting student Ella Whistler and teacher Jason Seaman at Noblesville West Middle School on May 25. Both

## Westfield Fire receives improved readiness rating

The City of Westfield last Thursday announced an improvement in the Westfield Fire Department's Insurance Services Office (ISO) Public Protection Classification (PPC) rating. ISO ratings assess the readiness of local fire departments by classifying a community's ability to suppress a fire. The new rating puts WFD in the top 3 percent of all rated fire departments nationwide.

"I am proud of the professionalism and commitment to ongoing improvement of the Westfield Fire Department," said Mayor Andy Cook. "The men and women that make up this department care deep-

ly about how their work can improve the lives of people in Westfield and Washington Township.

This improved rating validates the excellent service they provide and may have an added benefit to property owners of lower insurance premiums."

"Because of this work by our ISO Project Team, there is the potential for significant community savings," said Westfield Fire Chief Marcus Reed.

Most Indiana insurance companies use ISO's PPC when calculating residential and business premiums. An improved ISO score can lead to a reduction in insurance premiums

Dr. Webel received his Ph.D in Comparative Nutrition from the University of Illinois in 1997, just prior to coming to Sheridan to work for what was then JBS United Feeds. Dr. Webel grew up on a small farm in Illinois where his family operated a successful hog operation, so animal nutrition was a natural fit for his academic career. He has only ever

worked for United Animal Health, beginning in the nutrition research lab 20 years ago and culminating with his current position as company CEO. Dr. Webel spoke to the local Rotarians about the growth of United Animal Health and plans for future growth. With nearly 100 employees locally and several hundred more outside of Indiana and even a few in foreign countries, United is poised to be successful for many years to come. The company is cur-

ISO assigns a rating from 1 to 10, with 1 being the best and 10 the worst. Previously, Westfield Fire Department had

a Class 4 rating in the city and 8X in the township. Beginning Dec. 1, WFD’s rating will improve to a Class 2 rating in the city and 2X in the township. “We are excited to see the Westfield Fire Department’s ISO rating improve from 8x to Class 2x,” said Washington Township Trustee Danielle Carey

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# DAR promoting Constitution Week

There are two documents of paramount importance to American history: The Declaration of Independence, which forged our national identity, and the United States Constitution, which set forth the framework for the federal government that is still in use today.

Aug. 2, 1956, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed it into Public Law No. 915.

The celebration's goals are threefold: To encourage the study of the historical events that led to the framing of the Constitution; to inform people that the Constitution is the basis of America's great heritage and the foundation of our way of life; and to emphasize citizens' responsibility to protect, defend and preserve the Constitution.

DAR has been the foremost advocate of Constitution Week. This annual observance

provides innumerable opportunities for educational initiatives and community outreach, two mission areas of crucial importance to the National Society's work. By fostering knowledge of and appreciation for the Constitution and the inalienable rights it affords to all Americans, DAR helps to keep alive the memory of the men and women who secured our nation's independence, whose bravery and sacrifice made possible the liberties enjoyed by the American people today. victims survived the shooting. Seaman was hailed as a hero for stopping Moore.

Because of his age and the shootings not being fatal, Moore could not be tried as an adult.

The Hamilton County Prosecutor's Office filed a petition in June, alleging Moore "committed acts that would be felony or misdemeanor crimes if com-

mitted by an adult." Those acts included two felony counts each of attempted murder, aggravated battery, battery by means of a deadly weapon, and possession of a firearm on school property, plus two misdemeanor counts of dangerous possession of a firearm and a misdemeanor count of possession of a knife on school property.

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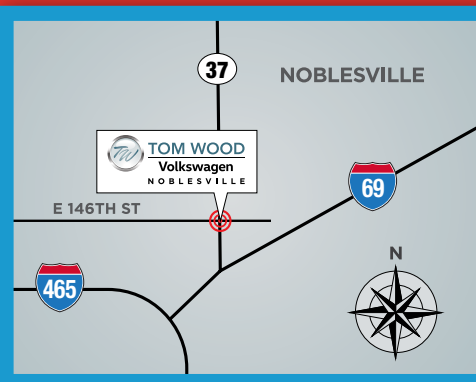
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**Howard D. Passage**

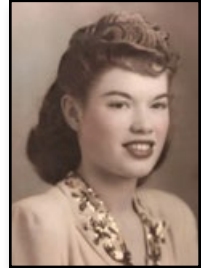

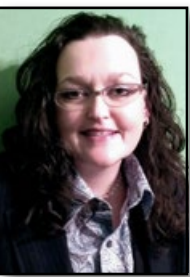

My future friend *puff5000*, with a thick British accent, asked, "Is everybody ready!?" and so we got started.

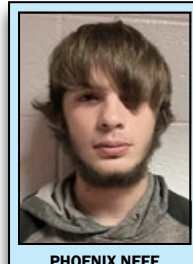
While in game, another person named *SHOOT-2KILL39* (from Tennessee) said close to nothing.

## 'Let's Make History' with the Levinson

At the meeting of the Noblesville Common Council on Aug. 28, I was proud to introduce the proposed mixed-use project on Maple Avenue known as the Levinson that would add new apartments, commercial retail and structured parking to downtown.

Mayor Ditslear and I appreciated the many residents who attended the meeting to learn more information, share their input and ask critical questions.

Cities throughout Indiana are leveraging the demand from people young and old who want to live and work in urban, walkable areas like ours that are accessible to attractive amenities such as restaurants, coffee shops, retail stores, service providers, entertainment venues and other cultural hotspots.

Fortunately, Noblesville already has these amenities in addition to the small-town charm and historic architecture that other cities are trying to emulate. But while imitation is the sincerest form of flattery,

we can't rest on our laurels.

A major goal of the Mayor's has been to attract more residents to downtown with a housing type that's missing from our community. The

Levinson's 83 apartment units will create greater density with people who will support our businesses on the square and help jumpstart a nighttime culture that's as vibrant as what we see in Noblesville during the day.

We certainly don't need to look to other cities to figure out we also need greater parking capacity. Just ask the Downtown Parking Taskforce. Since 2015, volunteers have spent hours examining current conditions, conducting public outreach and discussing best practices in parking management and technology.

I've personally talked with downtown business owners who are consider-

ing leaving due to this single issue. They simply cannot grow without more parking. And I know of other businesses that we failed to attract for the same problem.

Let's stop talking about the parking problem and do something about a parking solution.

That's why, as proposed by Rebar Development, the Levinson will have 337 total parking spaces. Approximately 50 to 100 will be reserved for apartment residents, leaving at least 237 spaces for public use by permit holders and hourly visitors – a net gain of 167 spaces above the 70 spaces of the current surface lot.

By approving the Levinson, members of the 2018 Noblesville Common Council will have made history by effectively ending the parking debate once and for all.

Speaking of history, I

know some residents are worried about the impact of this project on our downtown and the quaint charm that defines Noblesville. We believe the Levinson is the right project in the right location to strengthen our downtown and add to its vibrancy. However, we also have to achieve the right look.

While we remain excited about the initial rendering, we are confident in Rebar's ability to gather public input and incorporate even more of the history and architecture of the existing downtown – without creating a Frankenstein of design that tries to please everyone.

As the Mayor has said, sometimes you need to make history as well as preserve it. And in the case of the Levinson, building the first new downtown apartments in 100 years that complement and strengthen the historic square, we can do both – while finally putting to rest the debate about parking.

Let's make history.

## Unusual factors may influence Election 2018

The days following Labor Day usually mark the beginning of the fall election campaign. In Hamilton County there is usually not much of a campaign in non-presidential years. But three factors at play this year may bring life to the off-year election.

First is the red-hot race for a U.S. Senate seat in which incumbent Democrat Joe Donnelly is being challenged by Republican Mike Braun. Our county may find itself at an important place in the statewide race. A big Republican plurality here may be needed by Braun in what

is believed to be a close contest. The outcome could even determine control of the Senate where the GOP currently has only a 51-49 edge.

The second factor that may spice this year's general election is the school board race in each of the county's six districts. A referendum asking for a \$50 million bond issue in Noblesville may bring greater than normal interest in the non-partisan competition for two seats on the five-member

school board. And, at Carmel the dismissal of a successful girls basketball coach combined with plans to close Orchard Park Elementary School have stirred controversy where three of the five board members are facing re-election.

And, a third factor in this year's campaign came about when Democrats fielded more candidates for local office than have been seen in many years. Party Chairman Joe Weingarten has indicated there will be

a more aggressive local campaign than in the past.

Republican Chairwoman Laura Campbell, aware of the Democrats' plans, sent an email update to party workers and volunteers this week pointing out the importance of the Senate, state legislative and county races. She said the party has been at work this summer identifying potential party supporters.

Meanwhile, next year's city elections, in which some candidates have already made their plans known, will likely have to take a backseat until after the statewide Nov. 6 contests are decided.

high school principal, student body, faculty and staff – and a community that came together to give the White family a warm welcome and a place to be accepted deserves the bulk of the credit," continued Smith, speaking on White's transition to Cicero and Hamilton Heights. "White lived, attended school and worked in the community. No one could have foreseen the impact and historical significance this young man would ultimately have locally, throughout the state, nation and beyond."

White's marker, the seventh in Hamilton County, will be among the more than 650 that have been commemorated by an official Indiana state historical marker since the organization began issuing signs in

1946. The IHB provides publications, programs and other opportunities for Indiana citizens of all ages to learn and teach about the history of their communities, the state of Indiana and their relationships to the nation and the world.

"We are really excited about this particular marker and the opportunity to continue to share Ryan White's story with the public," shared Casey Pfeiffer, IHB's Marker Program Manager. In fact, IHB recently posted the following on the organization's Facebook page:

"On August 26, 1985, Ryan White, a 14-year-old boy who had been diagnosed with AIDS from a blood transfusion in 1984, attended classes via telephone after being barred

from school due to his diagnosis.

At his diagnosis, White was given three to six months to live, but soon beat the odds and regained enough of his health to attend school. However, he was barred from doing so by the Western School Corporation superintendent. The school board later upheld the decision. Eventually, Ryan and his family moved to Cicero, where he was allowed to attend school and even held a job. Ryan White lived for over five years after his diagnosis."

"Ryan's story still resonates with people around the world and his legacy continues to raise awareness on AIDS. His story has become an integral part of Hoosier history," noted Pfeiffer.

# Westfield stages play about strength, healing

*The Guys* is a one-act play written by Anne Nelson that deals with the very personal aftermath of 9/11. According to everyone involved in this production, you should not let the heavy idea of that day deter you from seeing this play, which is ultimately about healing.

Director Kate Hinman told The Reporter, "This play is wonderful. I'm a little biased, but it is a script that I immediately ordered when I heard about it."

*The Guys* is a long one-act play. It will last just under one hour and is based on the real story of a fire chief in New York who lost men on 9/11.

"It takes place in an apartment one week after 9/11," Hinman said. "A character named Nick is starting to write eulogies for eight of his men. Having a hard time, he gets in touch with a writer-turned-editor named Joan who helps him write these eulogies. It's very powerful. Not only because of the content and topic, but it is brilliantly written. It is told through monologues that Joan has, then she steps into dialogues with Nick."

Hinman has been in theater most of her life. She started performing at the age of 5 and told The Reporter her first paying job was as a lighting technician in her high school. She enjoyed that so much she now prefers to work the lights for her own shows, even when directing.

Hinman said this was an interesting and challenging play to cast.

"I had eight or nine women come to auditions, but I only had three men show up," Hinman said. "I knew two of the men, but the gen-

Hinman said she had to schedule callbacks to make her final decision.

"When we had the callback, I also wanted to know what drew people to this show," Hinman said. "I got some interesting answers. Some people had very personal connections to 9/11."

Joe Aiello plays the fire department captain, Nick, in *The Guys*. Aiello has been acting for over 35 years. Speaking of the men who gave their lives during 9/11,

Aiello said, "They were just regular folks who were called to do something heroic. It is important to remember those who were lost, but it is also important to think of the people who served every day."

Aiello's character, Nick, is a captain who has lost men and has been called on to give their eulogies.

"He's at a loss," Aiello said. "He is grieving himself, but he doesn't have the time or the chance to grieve because now he has to come forward and talk about these other guys. He has to put his own grief and anger and frustration on hold."

Julie Wallyn, who plays Joan, began acting when

she was in grade school but then took a 39-year break, getting back to community theater five years ago.

When asked why she wanted to be in this play, Wallyn said, "One of the things that attracted me to the story is that it's based on fact. Everything in this play was run by the actual fire captain that my character interviewed."

She was also drawn to the way this story celebrates the humanity of the firemen involved.

"It's such a wonderful story told in such a wonderful way and I love how it humanized some really ordinary people who did some super-heroic things when they sacrificed their lives," Wallyn said. "When people watch this, they are going to find out which fireman had a great recipe for apple salad and which fireman loved to restore old cars."

Both actors and the director wanted to stress that this is not a play about tragic events, but rather about healing.

"I don't want people to be afraid to come," Wallyn said. "I'm afraid people think it's too heavy or too painful. I don't want them to stay away because it's not like that. It's a journey. Don't stay away because you think it's going to be too sad."

Aiello also pointed out the play is not focused on the events 9/11.

"It's about people – that's what it's about," Aiello said. "How they are trying to overcome this tragedy. It's more of a celebration."

Wallyn added, "It's about the strength of human beings."

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# Noblesville beats Westfield for Midland Rail trophy

It wasn't easy to pinpoint prior to the Friday night's game exactly what each team's offensive focus would be. With it raining all day in Central Indiana, Noblesville and Westfield would both put their running games to the test. On a wet, drenched Beaver Materials Field's turf, it would be Noblesville that would prevail with a 10-2 home win over Westfield.

For the first time in three seasons, Noblesville football gets to keep the Midland Rail trophy in their possession. The last win in the storied series was a 17-12 win during the 2014 season. This win over Westfield also marks the first time since 2013 that the Millers have gotten themselves off to a 2-0 record in Hoosier Crossroads Conference play.

On the second play from scrimmage, senior tailback Eddie Dziennik ran a dive right into the pile off of the left guard. As soon as he got to the line, Dziennik spun half a turn toward the outside and found himself out into the open and up the home sideline for a 75-yard touchdown run that gave Noblesville a 7-0 lead, less than a minute into the game.

"The funny thing about Eddie, he's had a leg injury since the pre-season against Warren in one of our scrimmages and he has played through it," said Noblesville head coach Justin Roden on his senior tailback.

"We'd love him to get more carries, because he's a really good runner. We're balancing the carries between he and Blevins a little bit tonight. He is a little shorter when he gets inside that pile like that, it's easy to lose him," Roden continued on Dziennik and how he got loose to score.

That's exactly what happened on the lone touch-

down of the night. When Dziennik busted through the hole, he fooled and lost everyone. Nobody knew he had the ball until he was all alone on his way to the end zone.

Westfield's punt return defense was responsible for the two Shamrock points on the scoreboard. During a constant downpour of rain, the punt snap to punter Jack Knight, deep in his own territory, slipped off his hands and he was tackled in the end zone for a safety, cutting the Miller lead to 7-2.

After the ensuing Noblesville kickoff back to Westfield, Wyatt Blades picked off Camden Simons at the Shamrock 34.

A few plays later, Jack Knight booted through 30-yard field goal that would prove to ultimately be the final score of 10-2.

The next Westfield drive, junior tailback Eli Patchett had the ball knocked out of his hands and Blades dove on it at the Westfield 37. After gaining no yards on three plays, Knight attempted a 54-yard field goal that only landed five yards into the end zone.

With two teams that center their offenses around their running game, the rain wasn't going to be a factor for either game plan.

"These are true running teams, so neither of us are scared to play in the rain, I guarantee you. They were just better than us tonight," said Westfield head coach Jake Gilbert on Noblesville getting the best of his team, weather aside.

The Shamrocks' first series of the third quarter turned out the same as their last full possession of the second. Blades stepped in front of Kyle Pepiot and intercepted another Simons pass, his second of the game.

In a game when it's raining all night it becomes

a game of field position and whoever wins the field position battle tends to come out on top.

"You can't turn it over three times, so in a field position game like this, field position matters," said Gilbert on how costly his team's four turnovers were.

It was the middle of the fourth when Noblesville pretty much sealed the fate of the game. Westfield was driving down the field and with a 1st-and-10 at the Millers' 38 and Simons decided to throw over the middle and he was picked off by senior cornerback Zach Gruver.

Westfield wasn't able to get anything going offensively, gaining just 70 yards on 33 carries for a 2.1 average.

"When you get shut out, you pretty much played bad offensively," said Gilbert on his offense's dismal perfor-

mance.

"Kudos to those guys. They played great defensively. Adam Metzler is a very, very good defensive coordinator. Coach Roden's doing a good job with this group," said Gilbert as he praised Noblesville's defensive effort against his Shamrocks.

Noblesville's great defensive play continued from last week at Fishers and right into this game with Westfield.

"I believe that's eight quarters now that we haven't given up a touchdown," said Roden, commending his defense as it started conference play.

"The scheme that we're playing, it's a 'bend, but don't break' defense, but it's also a defense one that requires you do one job," Roden on his defense philosophy that's on the front of his playbook.

The Miller defense took

the Shamrock offense completely out of their comfort zone by forcing four turnovers and ultimately stopping them the entire game. The same running game that ran for 345 yards and five scores last week vs. Zionsville was limited to just 70 yards on 33 rushes.

"We're not the sexiest team to watch. We're trying to be fundamentally sound and try to make people beat us," said Roden on his team's play overall and how it's translated into two consecutive victories.

Westfield (2-2, 1-1 HCC) heads home next week to face another tough HCC opponent with Hamilton Southeastern (2-2, 1-1 HCC). The Royals beat Fishers on Friday to win the Mudsock game, 14-10.

Eli Patchett led the Shamrocks with 20 carries for 50 yards and also caught

three passes for 38 yards out of the backfield. Patrick Beam caught two for 31, Levi Kaster snagged two for 26 and Dane Wheeler two for 24.

Noblesville (2-2, 2-0 HCC) sits tied for first place in the HCC with Brownsburg. The Millers travel next week to Boone County to face Zionsville (2-2, 1-1 HCC), who won at home over Franklin Central, 44-19.

The Miller offense showed signs that it is starting to come alive. Dziennik led with a game-high 92 yards on eight carries, including his 75-yard TD. It was an improvement, as the Millers gained 178 yards as a team on 36 carries. Senior Luke Blevins ran 21 times for 74 yards, but it was the good surprise of Dziennik who gave the Millers' rushing game the spark that was needed.

# Royals grind out a Mudsock victory

Trent delivered a 51-yard bomb to Sam Rodgers for a touchdown to start the third quarter, giving Carmel a 21-0 lead. Quigley added a 14-yard TD pass to Rhett Williams midway through the fourth. "If you would have told me that we would have held them scoreless after three

quarters, I would have been more than pleased," Carmel coach John Hebert said, relieved after watching Pike's spread offense roll but come up empty. "They are so explosive, we knew they would show us a lot of offensive looks, we had to mix it up on defense to try to and stay with them, Graves is such a smart player. They are going to beat a lot of teams this year." Carmel piled up 259 yards on the ground on 45 carries, led by Dylan Downing's 155. Pike amassed 324 yards passing, completing 23-of-45 in the air.
