# Fadness to propose \$108.69M spending plan

Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness briefed the media Wednesday afternoon on the 2019 city budget and was quite proud of several numbers inside the spending plan. Next year's city budget proposal, to be presented to the Fishers City Council Monday night, will total \$108.69 million.

Fadness will emphasize to the council that even with an increase in the city tax rate next year, among the 10 largest cities in Indiana, Fishers will continue to have the lowest property tax rate, projected to be 69 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation.

The mayor told the City Council Finance Committee last month he projected a property tax rate increase of 5.5 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation in 2019, but Fadness said Wednesday that his staff has lowered the projected rate increase down to

4.2 cents. He estimates about 1.5 cents of that 4.2 cent rate increase will be used to pay off a \$12 million bond. Approximately \$7 million to \$9 million of that bond is projected to fund the Nickel Plate Trail. The bond will also fund some road projects.

The mayor said that the \$12 million bond will fund the first phase of the trail from 126th Street to 106th Street. A "separated grade crossing" at 116th Street will be funded in this first phase. The mayor says this grade crossing will be built either above 116th

Street or below, but that has not yet been determined.

The mayor will also tout a 5.3 percent increase in assessed valuations of property in the city. He also said those increased valuations do not include property in Tax Increment Financing (TIF) districts, such as the new construction in the downtown Fishers Nickel Plate District.

He said the city's cash reserves of more than \$17 million - \$4 million more than the required amount - has helped the city maintain its AAA bond rating from

"I'd like to commend our Council for doing a great job," Council President Steve Schwartz said. "There are seven different viewpoints on this Council and a lot of passion in the decision-making process, but overall I'm happy with the outcome. We spend very wisely."

includes 20 new full-time positions, one each in the Coroner's Office and Parks and Recreation Department, two in the Prosecuting Attorney's Office and 16 new sheriff's deputies to staff the new jail expansion. A new part-time employee has also been added to help with Veteran Services.

# County Republicans rally for Mike Braun

Hamilton County Republicans brought out an all-star cast of candidates for their annual Fall Dinner Wednesday night. Held at the 502 East Event Center in Carmel, about 350 of the

party faithful welcomed U.S. Senate candidate Mike Braun along with a host of other state and local GOP candidates for election on Nov. 6.

Braun, a successful Jasper businessman, says Republicans are in a position to pick up seats in the Sen-

ate which now has a razor thin GOP majority, 51-49. But, the outcome of several races including his own will depend on funding, the candidate says. Currently, Democrats are outspending Republicans.

The big news of the evening was Braun's dis-

closure of results of a new Fox News poll that shows him slightly ahead of incumbent Democrat Joe Donnelly by a 45-43 percent margin, with the remainder undecided. The candidate believes "we're

More than 150 commu-

nity members attended three meetings held in Indianapolis and Noblesville on July 11 and 12 to share ideas, questions and concerns about the White River Vision Plan. A steering committee

On Sept. 13, Save the Nickel Plate, Inc. supporters in Central Indiana filed a lawsuit against Hamilton County and the cities of Fishers and Noblesville for repeated failure to follow Indiana open door laws during decision-making meetings about the future of the Nickel Plate Railroad.

The lawsuit is seeking for the Hamilton County Circuit Court to intervene to void any decisions made during these meetings and to force the cities to listen to public comment before making decisions about the future of the Nickel Plate Railroad.

Save the Nickel Plate, Inc. says it thinks there's a better, more economical way to satisfy all residents and government officials alike, one that has been proven to work across the country: Build trails next to rails (rails with trails).

The organization wants to retain and enhance a feature that makes these cities unique and provides public transportation possibilities for future commuter rail from northern suburbs to downtown Indianapolis.

also includes raises for county employees as well as \$1.3 million to support 11 not-for-profit agencies within Hamilton County. "Our expenditures will meet our revenues in the coming year," said Vice President Brad Beaver. "We were presented with budget requests from every department in the county. This is the best budget we could afford without going in the red." Beaver will become Council President in January. The Council is scheduled to formally adopt the proposed budget at a special meeting on at 8:30 a.m. on Monday, Oct. 15 in Conference Room 1A. Once approved it will be sent to the State of Indiana for approval before going into effect on Jan. 1, 2019.

in good shape" at the moment, but the lead is within the margin of error, and there are 53 days left before Election Day. Braun said an "ace in the hole" that his campaign enjoys is the continued movement of former conservative Southern Indiana Democrats to the Republican Party, a shift that demographers have noted in recent years. Nevertheless, Hamilton County is seen as a major battleground. Polling in past years has shown that when a GOP candidate for statewide office wins 65 percent or more of the vote here, he or she will win statewide. County Chairwoman Laura Campbell noted that Democrats are contesting the GOP in 30 races in Hamilton County this year which presents an unusual challenge. In most elections there are few Democrats on the local ballot. Most GOP candidates for county and township office were present at the annual rally and fundraiser, and were introduced along with current officeholders. Also in the house with several young friends was a hard-charging and optimistic high school student, Chris Elmore, who volunteers for the party and is a leader in Young Republicans. Looking well into the future, Chris hopes to run for U.S. President in 2044. His card is found on his Facebook page. If his plans work out, folks can say they read about it here first.



and rebuilt or renovated, based on a study being conducted now. Also, City Hall may be in line for major upgrades, also based on an evaluation that should conclude later in September. Money has been set aside in the budget for that work. 2019 will also bring more road construction projects. They include completion of the four lanes on Allisonville Road, 126th Street & Reynolds Drive, and 96th Street will be improved to four lanes from Lantern Road to Cumberland Road.

Providing money for 911 service will cost Fishers \$1.3 million in 2019, which Fadness said would fund all the new staff positions he is proposing to add in 2019. He says there are disparities in Hamilton County as to how much each government unit pays into the 911 service fund, but that would need a county-wide solution. The mayor has had informal conversations on this issue and does not believe it will be solved in this budget cycle.

Fadness once again bemoaned the fact that Carmel gets several million dollars more as its share of the county income tax money, even though Fishers and Carmel have very similar population numbers.

and several focus groups comprised of local businesses, non-profits and neighborhood groups were created to look closely at specific areas of the White River to be addressed in the plan.

“It is incredibly important for us to hear comments from residents and reactions about the project as it develops in scope,” said Emily Mack, director of the Department of Metropolitan Development for the City of Indianapolis. “The feedback we received aligns with the White River Vision Plan’s goals to address water quality, sustainability of structures and a preservation and restoration of the river for all of Indianapolis and Hamilton County to enjoy.”

Attendees spoke directly with core team members from Agency Landscape + Planning, RATIO Architects, DAVID RUBIN Land Collective, Applied Ecological Services, Engaging Solutions, Heritage Strategies, HR&A, Land Story and Christopher B. Burke Engineering. Community members interacted with large maps of the study area, marked points where they live, work and play, and provided valuable feedback about their experiences along the river.

Ideas from the public covered many topics that impact the White River and the way people interact with it. The following themes emerged from those conversations with the community:

- Considerations for more water access
- Questions about water quality
- Opportunities to expand recreational offerings
- Ideas for healthy growth and development that does not negatively impact existing communities and private landowners
- Places to enhance corridors for wildlife along the river and preserve the river’s “wildness”
- Infrastructure (dams, levees)
- Transportation links to the river and key destinations
- Events and attractions

Water access, transportation and balanced development consistently ranked as the most discussed topics for the White River’s future. Ideas ranged from new trailheads to concerns about bridge construction, impacts on bicyclists and parking during events. Participants noted the need for more visual and physical access to the White River – an idea that reflects the limited connections today as well as the improved perception of the river and the water quality. The community also commented on the sensitive relationships between development and private property along the river.

“We’ve heard residents’ concerns about public versus private land ownership,” said Brenda Myers, president and CEO of Ham-

ilton County Tourism, Inc. “The goals of the White River Vision Plan are united with the community’s desire to preserve, restore and open public spaces for easy river access and enjoyment. We are passionate about educating residents on and off the river about how they can contribute to protecting and respecting our waterways so that future generations to come can continue to benefit from this natural resource.”

Beginning in May 2018, the core team began analyzing history, demographics, industry, connectivity, hydrology, ecology and recreational assets of the White River.

Key findings from the group’s analyses include the following:

• **Reveal History:** Since before Indiana was established as a territory in 1800, the White River has been a central part of Indiana’s history. Investments in canal and railway infrastructure in the late 1800s, major flood events that began with the 1913 flood of record and an attention to the ecological health of the river in the late 20th century, have all contributed to the river’s rich history.

• **Express Our Identity:** Many Indiana communities evolved from farming towns to incredibly diverse, vibrant metropolitan areas. To date, Indianapolis and Hamilton County are responsible for more than half of Indiana’s growth, with Hamilton County projected to double in coming years. The tourism industry also grew 6.1 percent between 2015 and 2016 (Hamilton County grew 9.3 percent). The river flows through racially and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, connecting east and west into a vibrant quilt of homes, businesses and gathering places.

• **Get Outdoors:** There are over 40 destinations along the 58-mile stretch of the White River that draw hundreds of thousands to millions of people annually. Using strategic and balanced program placement with different forms of engagement along the river, this plan can help the community celebrate and bolster areas that are already being enjoyed, as well as extend the enjoyment of the river throughout the year and through different seasons.

• **Experience Nature:** Since 1913, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) has recorded 259 floods in this region. The regularity of flood events and risk of major flooding is increasing, threatening homes, businesses and vital natural habitats. The river is also home to 134 fish species and a variety of mammals and birds. To build awareness about the river and encourage stewardship for the river, the White River must be a clean, safe and a remarkably beautiful place.

• **Connect Communities:** Within the study area, Indianapolis and Hamilton County have taken very different approaches to connectivity. Indianapolis has a well-connected bus system and several regional trails that radiate from downtown, while Hamilton County has a well-distributed trail system that bridges both east and west sides of the river. Increasing opportunities, enhancing and improving points of connection, and providing options for safe and easy access for all will culminate to more people seeing, using and appreciating all the White River has to offer.

Following the 12-month planning period, the final plan will be shared with the public and a variety of stakeholder groups and organizations. 

Franciscan Health on Wednesday announced plans to build a \$130 million orthopedic specialty hospital.

The site on a tract just east of North Illinois Street between West 106th and West 116th streets will include the hospital, a medical office building and a parking garage with a sky bridge to the hospital, the

## Reader asks Senators to vote no on conceal carry reciprocity

Dear Editor:

Last year, the U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation known as Concealed Carry Reciprocity. If this bill becomes law, the federal government would override our state's standards on who can carry hidden, loaded handguns in public and force us to recognize the standards of every other state—even the states that have lower standards than Indiana, or no standards at all.

Concealed Carry Reciprocity should never become law.

It encroaches on states' rights and would force Indiana to allow people with dangerous histories and many people with no permit whatsoever to carry hidden, loaded guns in our communities.

It's a law that would put our police,

first responders, and children in harm's way.

Twelve states have no permitting or background check requirement, including eight that have repealed their concealed carry permit requirement since the Senate last voted on this policy in 2013.

From my reading about Concealed Carry Reciprocity, I have learned that Senator Young will vote for this terrible bill, but Senator Donnelly has not yet decided how he'll vote. I want both of my senators to know that their constituents want them to put Indiana first and not force our state to accept the lower standards of other states.

## Congressional Women's Caucus holds third hearing on sexual harassment in the workplace

As the one-year anniversary of the Harvey Weinstein sexual assault and harassment allegations approaches, the bipartisan Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues recently held a hearing about sexual harassment entitled, "#Me-Too, What's Next? Turning a Movement into Action."

Caucus members heard from leaders from a number of industries to discuss ways to promote respect and dignity in the workplace, and ultimately to find innovative and creative solutions to the problem of workplace harassment.

The hearing was hosted by Reps. Susan Brooks (R-Ind.), Co-Chair of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues; Lois Frankel (D-Fla.), Co-Chair of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues; Brenda Lawrence (D-Mich.), Vice Chair of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues; Mimi

Walters (R-Calif.), Vice Chair of the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues; Barbara Comstock (R-Va.) and Jackie Speier (D-Calif.).

"Regardless of whether harassment comes from a coworker, manager or customer, it is always unacceptable and should never be tolerated," said Brooks. "Congress is no exception. It is critical that we work together, whether in the public or private sectors, in every industry, to find innovative, creative and ultimately effective solutions so that every workplace is a safe environment and is free from harassment of any kind. This hearing highlighted how Congress can help foster safer workplaces throughout our country, even within the halls of Congress, so that men and women can comfortably work without the fear of facing inappropriate behavior. I'd like to thank all of our panelists for their passionate work on these issues and for sharing their concrete ideas on how to combat and reduce sexual

harassment in the workplace."

"Women, like men, go to work to take care of their families," said Frankel. "Sexual harassment is a real economic issue

and a big factor that's holding women back from opportunities and advancing in their careers. We heard the wisdom of our panelists on some solutions and I hope measures going through the House like reauthorizing VAWA, banning mandatory arbitration, boosting spending for the EEOC, and passing the EMPOWER Act will help create safer workplaces."

This is the third hearing in a series of hearings on sexual harassment in the workplace. **During the first hearing**, the Congressional Caucus for Women's Issues focused on sexual harassment in the service sector. **During the second hearing**, the Caucus heard from survivors of sexual harassment in fields where women are often outnumbered, as well as from other experts on the issue, to discuss ways to change the culture in the workplace.

# Indiana Attorney General announces lawsuit targeting Indianapolis car dealers engaged in fraudulent practices

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced on Thursday that his office has filed a lawsuit aimed at stopping the illegal activities of several individuals who conspired through illicit used car dealerships to defraud several hundred customers. Hill is also seeking to obtain restitution for affected consumers.

At the center of the lawsuit are two defendants, Jerramy Johnson and Jeffrey Presnell, who have an extensive disreputable history in the auto sales industry. The duo has owned and operated several dealerships in Indianapolis that were forced to forfeit business licenses due to violations of Indiana laws.

Documented impropri-

eties include:

- Misrepresenting the mileage on motor vehicles;
- Paying off an Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department officer to falsely affirm that he inspected repairs made to salvage vehicles;
- Avoiding paying the full amount of sales taxes owed by misrepresenting the amounts paid by customers for vehicles;
- Failing to deliver titles in a timely manner; and
- Selling vehicles without a license and conspiring with a licensed dealership to avoid licensing laws and protections.

At issue in the complaint are Wheels of Fortune LLC, Southpointe Motorcars LLC and Mid America Auto Remarketing. All three entities were owned by Johnson and op-

erated by Johnson and Presnell.

Also named as defendants in the complaint are Keith Williams, Jeffrey Berry and BWI Equipment Inc.

Wheels of Fortune was never a licensed Indiana dealer, but it sold more than 350 vehicles between October 2017 and June 2018. To obtain vehicles, Wheels of Fortune purchased vehicles using the auction access of a licensed dealer, BWI Equipment Inc. Wheels of Fortune then sold vehicles using BWI paperwork. BWI was fully aware Wheels of Fortune was using its dealer license and paperwork. BWI then received \$100 for every vehicle sold as payment for

ing significantly lower mileage than they actually did. Wheels of Fortune obtained vehicles with odometer "exempt" titles and high mileage but that had their odometers either altered or swapped out to show lower mileage. Wheels of Fortune then advertised the vehicles' inaccurate mileage, often using "low mileage" as a selling point.

Johnson and Presnell rebuilt vehicles at their business, Mid America

Auto Remarketing, before selling the vehicles to various Indiana dealers. To properly rebuild a vehicle and obtain a "rebuilt" title brand, entities must ensure the vehicles are inspected by an Indiana police officer. Johnson and Presnell paid an IMPD officer to sign off on vehicle repairs without actually inspecting the vehicles. The police officer signed off on 415 vehicles without conducting the required inspections. The police officer has since been arrested, charged with a felony for his actions and pleaded guilty.

Wheels of Fortune did not pay the proper amount of sales tax on vehicles it sold. As part of Wheels of Fortune's arrangement with BWI, BWI paid the sales tax on the vehicles sold by Wheels of Fortune

based on a report pulling the sale price of the vehicles from bills of sale. However, Wheels of Fortune falsely listed the selling price on bills of sale as significantly lower than the amount it actually received from consumers, thereby lowering the amount of sales taxes remitted.

Southpointe, owned by Johnson and operated by Presnell, failed to deliver titles in a timely manner to nine consumers who purchased vehicles.



The Shamrocks played close with Southeastern in the first set and during the first part of the second set. But the Royals, who are rated No. 4 in MaxPreps' Class 4A rankings, pulled away quickly in the second set. 
