ting a phone call from your child running saying there's something going on at the school."

That's why it was so important to come together Tuesday night to say thank you.

"Without them, we wouldn't be as strong as they are," said Stacey Swan, the principal at West Middle School.

Jason Seaman was there, too. He's the hero teacher who stopped his student from shooting anyone beyond the already-injured seventh-grader Ella Whistler. Seaman was shot multiple times while protecting his students.

But, on Tuesday night, Seaman was preparing for his football game. He's head coach

for the eighth-grade West Middle School team. West's seventh- and eighth-grade teams played East Middle School, an established rivalry. That's why they picked to have the heroes ceremony Tuesday.

Swan said, "Every student in Noblesville, whether they were in elementary or the middle school, were impacted."

In dramatic fashion, the seventh-grade West team erased a 16-point, fourth-quarter deficit to win in the final seconds.

Richardson said about the final score, "That's the clouds aligning. It's a very special moment, but we're all together, so again, Noblesville strong."

# NOBLESVILLE SCHOOLS REFERENDUM 2018



## Strong Schools, Strong Community

Strong schools make for a strong community. The ability to attract new businesses to Noblesville, prepare our future workforce, and achieve a high quality of living as a community are all directly related to the strength of our school system.

The 2016 referendum was about maintaining the status quo and was a reduction in the tax rate. The 2018 referendum is about enhanced mental health, increased safety and retaining top-quality staff. It's about keeping our schools and our community strong.

Due to the teacher shortage and recent pay increases by neighbor districts, our teachers are leaving for positions that can pay \$5,000-\$15,000 more.



Since 2009, Noblesville Schools has lost \$46.5 million in funding.

The 2018 referendum will replace the 2016 referendum and will provide funding through 2026.

53% of the additional funding would be spent on mental health & safety, while 47% would be spent on staff pay.

The current referendum rate is 18.9 cents and the new proposed rate is 37 cents.

This referendum would raise an additional \$6.25 million/year for Noblesville Schools.

## How Much Will This Referendum Cost Taxpayers?

A median Noblesville home valued at \$206,000 currently pays \$192/year for the 2016 referendum. The new 2018 rate would cost this home \$376/year. That's an additional \$184/year—an additional \$15/month—for enhanced student mental health, school safety and teacher pay.





## HSE film teacher named Arts Educator of the Year

Nickel Plate Arts hosted its sixth annual anniversary party with the third edition of the Nickel Plate Arts Awards to celebrate the area's burgeoning arts scene and recognize some of the community's most valuable artists and arts advocates.

Among the list of honorees, Hamilton Southeastern High School teacher Jamie Follis was named "Arts Educator of the Year." The "Arts Educator of the Year" award is a new category this year, prompted by Nickel Plate Arts' identification of outstanding educators in local schools.

For 20 years, Follis has been educating and creating a passion in students for film by teaching an after-school film studies course. In 2013, he decided to use his experience in filmmaking to create Olio Road Productions, a fully-functioning film group that seeks to connect the most talented students at HSE and turn the school into a film studio. Follis guides and oversees the students as they create original, feature-length films. Follis says the students create every aspect of the project, including

writing, producing, directing, acting, filming, lighting and editing.

In addition to teaching at Hamilton Southeastern, Follis works as a professional sculptor, selling his work at art gallery shows and on a commission basis. Follis has also worked as a producer and in production design for Disney/Lucasfilm, Supernatural, Seth Meyers, Patton Oswalt and Stephen Colbert. Most recently, Follis was the art director for The Storyteller, which won the Audience Award at the 2018 Heartland Film Festival.

Follis says he will proudly display his award, made from copper, wood and stained glass by DeMaris Gaunt of Mud Horse Art, a former Fishers resident. Each Nickel Plate Arts' nominee received a gift of a locally-made item. Follis was also given a hand-turned wooden pen made by Fishers resident Chris Hayes of AskCheese Woodworks.

# Cicero Kiwanis still helping Newby family

The Kiwanis Club of Cicero held its annual Roadblock for Riley Hospital last Saturday. Members volunteered to staff or cover several intersections to collect money for Riley Hospital for Children. The club raised over \$3,200. All money collected is donated to support the efforts of the hospital.

“Indiana Kiwanis has supported Riley Hospital for almost 100 years, raising money and awareness for four years before it was even built!” said Keith Ecker, Cicero Kiwanis Club President. “We are proud to be part of it and proud of the local community for their generosity.”

The upcoming breakfast meeting of the Kiwanis Club on Saturday, Sept. 29 will feature Phillip and Nikki Newby, who will share the impact of their 129-day experience at Riley Hospital.

Phillip (a 2000 graduate of Hamilton Heights High School) and Nikki Newby (a 2005 graduate of Sheridan Christian Academy) will share their firsthand experience with Riley Hospital when their son, at just over one year of age, was diagnosed with a genetic, life-threatening condition called SCID (severe combined immunodeficiency) in 2017. SCID is extremely rare (affecting less than 200,000 people in the United States). Without intervention, SCID usu-

ally results in severe infection and death in children by age two. Today, Lincoln is considered cured and back home enjoying his life as a busy two-year-old.

# Bright future for jail, health department

Hamilton County officials say they are excited about the major upgrade to their jail and health department buildings: Using solar panels for their power.

They're located on top of the Hamilton County Jail and over off State Road 37, near the public safety radio tower. More than 9,300 panels were used in the

project. In total, the project cost about \$8 million.

County officials say this change will save the county \$25 million in utility and maintenance costs over the next 25 years. The solar project will provide enough energy to power 38 percent of the jail complex and 100 percent of the health services building.

It also will produce enough clean power to avoid greenhouse emis-

sions equivalent to that of 10 million driven car miles.

In addition to the solar panels, the county has also changed out all lighting to LED Energy Efficient Lighting and converted the jail's HVAC systems from electric to gas.

Lastly, there is an education piece to it all. There will be a monitoring system so colleges and high school students can learn about solar energy.

# AG Curtis Hill reaches \$148 million settlement with Uber over data breach

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced on Wednesday that he, along with the other 49 states and the District of Columbia, has reached an agreement with California-based ride-sharing company Uber Technologies Inc. to address the company's one-year delay in reporting a data breach to its affected drivers.

Uber learned in November 2016 that hackers had gained access to some personal information that Uber maintains about its drivers, including drivers' license information pertaining to approximately 600,000 drivers nationwide. Uber tracked down the hackers and obtained assurances that the hackers deleted the information. However, even though some of that information – namely drivers' license numbers for Uber drivers – triggered Indiana law requiring them to notify affected Indiana residents, Uber failed to report the breach in a timely manner,

waiting until November 2017 to report it.

As part of the nationwide settlement, Uber has agreed to pay \$148 million to the states. Indiana will receive \$1,495,450. Of Indiana's share, \$752,400 will be distributed to drivers affected by the breach. In addition, Uber has agreed to strengthen its corporate governance and data security practices.

Indiana will provide each Uber driver impacted in the state with a \$100 payment. Eligible drivers are those drivers whose driver's license numbers were accessed during the 2016 breach. Some of those drivers may not still be driving for Uber.

The settlement between Indiana and Uber requires the company to:

- Comply with Indiana data breach and consumer protection law regarding protecting Indiana residents' personal information and notifying them in the event of a data breach concerning their personal information;

- Take precautions to protect any user data Uber stores on third-party platforms outside of Uber;

- Use strong password policies for its employees to gain access to the Uber network;

- Develop and implement a strong overall data security policy for all data that Uber collects about its users, including assessing potential risks to the security of the data and implementing any additional security measures beyond what Uber is doing to protect the data;

- Hire an outside qualified party to assess Uber's data security efforts on a regular basis and draft a report with any recommended security improvements. Uber will implement any such security improvement recommendations; and

- Develop and implement a corporate integrity program to ensure that Uber employees can bring any ethics concerns they have about any other Uber employees to the company, and that it will be heard.

But that was enough for the to win the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. Class 3A No. 1 Southeastern finished HCC play with a 6-0-1 record, putting it just ahead of the 3A No. 2 Millers, who completed their conference schedule at 5-0-2.

"It's hard to celebrate a tie," said HSE coach Greg Davidson. "But the tie did win us the conference championship and obviously that's one of the goals that the girls had set for themselves, because they lost the conference last year when they were in the lead. **Noblesville-HSE, Heights-Tipton rivalries highlight Week 7**

There's more at stake than just bragging rights when Hamilton Southeastern plays Noblesville Friday at the Millers' Beaver Materials Field to headline Week 7 football action.

For one thing, both teams are in the thick of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference race. Noblesville is tied with Avon for second place; both teams are 3-1 in HCC play. The Royals are right behind in a fourth-place tie with Westfield; both teams are 2-2.

As far as the regular season goes, the Millers and Southeastern are both 3-3, so one school will be back above .500 after the game is done on Friday.

Last season's game was a close one, with the Royals prevailing 13-10. This year, both teams are coming off solid wins: Noblesville beat Franklin Central 10-0, while Southeastern took care of Zionsville 30-14.

Junior Kody Sparks had a good game for HSE last week, completing 14 of 22 passes for 125 yards. For the season, Sparks is 63 of 151 with 768 yards and three touchdowns to his credit. Senior Ben Boysen has made 34 of those catches. On the ground, senior Matt Harris has 670 yards and nine touchdowns. Senior Anthony Eggers leads the Royals defense with 51 tackles.

Millers senior Grant Gremel has thrown for 329 yards this season on 32-of-80 passing, including two touchdowns. Senior Luke Blevins has 374 rushing yards and two TDs to his credit, as well as seven catches. Senior Eddie Dziennik has been strong on defense with 70 tackles, with junior Jacob Hamm right behind him by making 68 tackles. Senior Dalton Davis has 6.5 tackles for a loss and 2.5 sacks.

**HEIGHTS-TIPTON**

A classic backyard rivalry game is on tap tonight at Hamilton Heights, as Tipton will visit the Huskies in a Hoosier Conference East Division contest. It's also Heights'

Homecoming game.

The Blue Devils are unbeaten for the season at 6-0 and have won both East Division games that they have played. Tipton's wins have come over Madison-Grant 48-7, Elwood 72-6, Twin Lakes 56-35, Lewis Cass 27-15, Lafayette Central Catholic 49-21 and Northwestern 36-0.

Senior KJ Roudebush has led the way for the Blue Devils, throwing for 977 yards and 13 touchdowns on 59-of-92 passing. Roudebush is also Tipton's leading rusher, with 738 yards and 18 touchdowns. Senior Luke Stoker has 24 catches, seven of them for TDs. Senior Sebastian Connor and sophomore Jayvin Lyons each have 60 tackles to lead the Blue Devils' defense.

The Huskies (1-5), meanwhile, have gotten production out of two quarterbacks this year. Sophomore Isaac Wilson has thrown for 387 yards and five touchdowns on 28-of-66 passing, while senior Carter Campassi has completed 29 of 55 attempts for 376 yards and three scores.

Junior Deshawn King has rushed for 391 yards, while seniors Isiah Campbell and TadDefoe each have 16 catches; Defoe has two touchdowns to his credit. Senior Kray Leininger leads the Heights defense with 51 tackles, while junior Cole Portwood has five tackles for a loss.

**CARMEL-BEN DAVIS**

It's also Homecoming week in Carmel, and the big game will have the Greyhounds hosting Metropolitan Conference rival Ben Davis.

The Class 6A defending state champion Giants are 3-3 this year and 2-2 in the MIC. Ben Davis' victories have come against Arsenal Tech 51-6, Pike 40-19 and Lawrence North 48-38, with losses to Avon 41-36, Center Grove 29-22 and Warren Central 70-27.

Junior Trent Gipson is the Giants' quarterback, and he has already pushed past the 1,000-yard mark, with 1,034 yards and five touchdowns on 83-of-146 passing. Senior Delbert Mimms III has been a strong runner, with 773 yards and 15 scores.

Five Ben Davis receivers have at least 10 catches, with senior Dominic Day leading the way with 19 receptions and three TDs. Junior Capone Powell leads the Giants' defense with 42 tackles, while junior Mynais Collins has seven tackles for a loss.

Carmel is 3-1 in the MIC, which puts it in second place behind Warren Central, and 5-1 overall. Dylan Downing leads the Greyhounds' ground game with 590 yards and four touchdowns. Tyler Trent is passing at a 42-of-86 rate, with 604 yards and eight TDs. Sam Rogers has made 16 of those catches, including four touchdowns.

**WESTFIELD-AVON**

Westfield is having its Homecoming on Friday too, and the Shamrocks get a big game of their own by taking on Avon.

The Orioles will come into Riverview Health Stadium with a 3-1 record in HCC play and a 5-1 record overall - the only loss is to Brownsburg, 21-7 in a Week 4 HCC match-up. Avon's wins have been against Plainfield 44-13, Ben Davis 41-36, Southeastern 29-6, Franklin Central 48-0 and Fishers 33-0.

Sophomore Henry Hesson has already topped 1,000 yards passing, throwing at a 79-of-136 clip for 1,087 yards and nine touchdowns. Senior Sampson James has been leading the way on the ground with 791 yards and nine scores, while two Avon receivers are already past 20 catches: Senior Jalen Peterson has 22 receptions (two TDs) and sophomore Wallace Stovall Jr. has 21 catches (three TDs). Senior Alex Griffith leads the Orioles' defense with 50 tackles.

Westfield is 2-2 in HCC play and 3-3 overall. Junior Camden Simons has been throwing the ball well, completing 84 of 132

# IHSAA girls golf state finals are this weekend

Prairie View Golf Course in Carmel will host the IHSAA girls golf state finals this weekend.

A total of 15 teams have advanced five golfers each and 25 individuals have made it without their squads for a total of 100 participants. All teams and players will play 36 holes. Groups will be teeing off the 1st and 10th tees at 8:30 a.m. on Friday and at the same time on Saturday.

• Top-ranked and defending state champion Zionsville, which won its first state championship a year ago, is making its fourth consecutive state finals appearance. The Eagles' Annabelle Pancake is the highest finishing returnee from last season's state finals finishing fourth overall. Two weeks ago, she fired a 64 to win the Brownsburg Sectional at West Chase, which stands as this state tournament's best outing.

• Second-ranked Evansville North is making its eighth consecutive appearance in the state finals and will be aiming for their fourth state title in the last five years. Columbus North and Evansville Memorial are making their fifth straight visit. After Zionsville, No. 3 Homestead, No. 4 Carmel and No. 11 Hamilton Southeastern are each making their third straight showing.

• Ten of last year's 15 competing teams have returned to this year's state finals including eight of the top 10 teams in the final coaches poll from the Indiana High School Golf Coaches Association. Also, seven of the top 10 finishing teams have returned from last year's event.

• Carmel, Evansville North and Zionsville each captured sectional championships two weeks ago and tallied three of the top five scores ever recorded in a girls golf sectional. Carmel and Evansville North's 288 at South Grove and Eagle Valley, respectively, tied for the second-lowest score. Zionsville's 289 at West Chase was the fourth-best mark. The Eagles set the record with a 284 last year at the same course.

• Sixth-ranked Guerin Catholic is the only team making its initial appearance at the state finals this year. The Golden Eagles took third place at the Roncalli Regional played at Smock Golf Course in Indianapolis last weekend.

• South Bend St. Joseph is making its third overall appearance in the state finals and first since 2007, thanks to the Indians' third place finish at the East Noble Regional played at Noble Hawk Golf Links in Kendallville.
