Carmel parish sued over sex abuse allegations

A lawsuit has been filed against the Roman Catholic Diocese of Lafayette for alleged sexual misconduct of a child in the 1980s.

An anonymous John Doe, now an adult male, filed the suit. The anonymous man said he was sexually abused by the Rev. James Grear at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish in Carmel.

The lawsuit reads that the man told another priest about the abuse during confession and was told not to disclose the abuse to anyone else.

The lawsuit reads that the diocese knew that Grear had sexually abused other boys.

Documents show Grear's whereabouts are currently unknown.

WLFI-TV Channel 18 in Lafayette reported that the lawsuit was filed in Hamilton Superior Court 3.

HSE school board reviews \$242.8M budget

Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) Schools will see a nearly 4 percent increase in the 2019 district budget, but the tax rate will

decline slightly. HSE Chief Financial Officer Mike Reuter told board members increased assessed valuations of property within the district boundaries is allowing for the increased spending with little impact on the school corporation's tax rate.

The \$242.85 million 2019 budget will contain some big changes in the local school corporation's accounting system. Capital proj-

ects, transportation and school bus replacement will now be lumped into one Operations Fund. Reuter says he favors the state law changes allowing more financial flexibility for school corporations.

A public hearing on the budget was held, but no one chose to speak.

The school board is expected to give final passage to the 2019 budget next month.

The Track to Trail kick-off weekend will begin a month-long outreach effort that will include “think tank” focus groups with educators, students, entrepreneurs, artists and public safety officials. Other stakeholders will be reached out to proactively and include neighborhoods and businesses along the trail. Throughout the month, people will be able to also submit their ideas online or via mail. This phase of the master plan will conclude with a Community Conversation from 7 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 30 at Delaware Township Community Building.

“There are 4.5 miles of future trail in Fishers. Our

goal is to create a one-of-a-kind experience, a new kind of public space that happens to have a trail running through it,” said Amanda Welu, Co-Chair and Owner of DELV Design.

This month-long effort is the first phase of envisioning what the 4.5-mile trail experience in Fishers could be. The next phase will begin to shape the ideas into visual concepts that will be brought back to the community for further feedback and refinement in early 2019.

Updates on the Track to Trail campaign will be provided at playfishers.com/tracktotrail.

The Fishers Nickel Plate Trail Master Planning Committee was formed in May to help guide the planning of the 4.5 miles of Track to Trail in Fishers.

Carmel's CAT goes Plaid

Four fictional young men die in a car accident and get the chance to come back to perform the concert they never did in life. That is the idea behind Forever Plaid, written by Stuart Ross and directed by Sandy Baetzhold, on stage through Oct. 7 at the CAT in Carmel.

Carmel Community Players (CCP) Business Manager and Forever Plaid Producer Rich Phipps spoke to The Reporter about this one-act musical comedy.

"It's a story of four young men in the 1960s who were in high school together and who were on their way to give their first big concert," Phipps said. "They were slammed broadside by a busload of girls who were on their way to see the Beatles debut on the Ed Sullivan Show in 1964. It was figuratively out with the old and in with the new – out with the music and in with the Beatles and the rock 'n roll era. The show itself consists of the concert that they never got to give in life. They are given the chance through some astral-physical stuff – holes in the ozone layer and so forth – to come back and do the show they never got to perform in life."

This 90-minute one-act show is filled with songs from the '50s and '60s, with piano and drums as accompaniment. One of the highlights of the show is referred to as "The entire Ed Sullivan Show in three minutes and 11 seconds."

For the men in this play, much like the characters themselves, this is a reunion with a "forever" element.

"All four of us have played these roles in the past," Phipps said. "Three of us performed in the 2001 version at CCP and the fourth, Derek Gowan, performed at the Belfry in 2004. For all four of us it is a rec-

reation of past experiences with the show. Like the characters, we come back again to give this show. There is a sense of 'forever' with the cast and those of us who have done it many times. The three of us who performed in 2001 also had the chance to repeat the performances across central Indiana for 10 consecutive years. We performed at various fund-raising venues, churches and night clubs. We kept going because it is a small cast and is relatively easy to take on the road."

Carmel Community Players are in search of a new permanent home for their productions. Everything is set for the 2018-19 season, but next season is still in flux. Of their five-show season, including Forever Plaid, four will stage at the CAT in Carmel. One will stage in Fishers.

Ricker's, GetGo combine forces

A gas station and convenience store company started in 1979 in central Indiana will "join forces" with a newer one in the local market, the businesses announced Thursday.

Ricker's and Giant Eagle, which operates GetGo gas stations and convenience stores, said they have entered into an acquisition agreement in central Indiana. The announcement said there will be no disruption to Ricker's or GetGo store operations as a result of the agreement between the two companies.

The announcement did not include the terms of the deal.

Anderson-based Ricker's Oil has 56 convenience stores. They are owned by Jay and Nancy Ricker. He has been a voice in Indiana legislative attempts to change laws that limit carry-out cold-beer sales to liquor stores.

In March 2017, Ricker's began selling cold

beer at two locations that created a made-to-order food area. Legislators later passed a law to close what was called a loophole that allowed Ricker's to sell cold beer.

Indiana in 2018 changed its law that kept liquor stores from opening on Sundays, but did not change the law that limits carry-out sales of cold beer to liquor stores.

Giant Eagle and GetGo are based in Pittsburgh. The chain operates 200 GetGo locations in Indiana, Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia. It opened its first Indianapolis-area GetGo cafe and market in 2015 and now has six central Indiana locations with a seventh to open in Zionsville in October.

The deal is expected to be completed by year's end.

Laura Karet, president and CEO of Giant Eagle, issued this statement:

Hoosiers help build new Navy submarine named USS Indiana

The U.S. Navy's newest attack submarine will be commissioned this weekend and it shares a name with the Hoosier state.

The **USS Indiana** will be the first submarine and the third U.S. Navy ship named Indiana. Vice President Mike Pence called it "the most advanced submarine to ever serve America."

It's no coincidence that more than 100 Indiana companies supplied parts or helped build the ship, including **Thomas & Skinner Inc.** in Indianapolis.

"I can't go into necessarily a lot of detail because it's secret," Thomas & Skinner President Ed Richardson said.

The company makes magnets ... and not the kind you stick on your fridge.

"When ships and other weapon systems are nuclear-powered, that's where our magnets are used," Richardson said. "We've been in other submarines as well."

The USS Indiana could launch Tomahawk missiles. It's designed for both coastal and deep ocean environments.

The U.S. Navy said the ship can lead the way when

Two Indiana law enforcement agencies now have iPhone unlocking devices

What if the information you had on your iPhone was not as secure as you thought? Experts who spoke with I-Team 8 say that is exactly the case. A new law enforcement tool is making it even easier for police to get inside your phone, even without your permission.

People carry their phones around everywhere. They use them to communicate, share information, get places and store secrets. However, what you store on your phone is much less private than you think.

"Some phone companies, they'll give you the actual body of the texts on your phone," said Novella Nedef, an attorney and a professor at Indiana University McKinney School of Law.

Nedef said attorneys often use a subpoena to get information off your phone from your cell carrier. But a new law enforcement tool called "GrayKey" helps police get the information right off the phone itself.

I-Team 8 does not have a photo of it, but GrayKey is a small box, about the size of a portable external hard drive. If you plug it into an up-to-date iPhone, it will unlock the phone. GrayKey basically guesses the passwords until it gets the right one.

"Your iPhone typically would lock out after 10 attempts at doing that, but with the exploit that bypasses that feature, you can guess all of them," said Jason Ortiz, a senior engineer at a local cyber security firm called Pondurance.

"From the grand scheme-type, 10,000-foot-picture, really, the iPhone is a very, very secure device," Ortiz said.

How is this all legal? It's not legal unless police have a search warrant – just as if they wanted to search your home.

"The existence of this device doesn't give the police a legal right to just have a fishing expedition," said Nedef.

However, Nedef said the technology itself is a game changer. According to CNN, the FBI paid more than \$1 million in 2016 to unlock the San Bernardino shooter's phone.

"This is considerably cheaper," Nedef said. "My understanding is the State Police have used it about 100 times."

Indiana State Police got GrayKey in March, and the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department got it in April.

ISP and IMPD each bought the GrayKey device and licensing to use it for about \$15,000.

"The device provides forensic examiners a highly specialized law enforcement "tool" to retrieve data from iOS devices," said IMPD Deputy Chief of Investigations, Christopher Bailey. "In turn, this data provides information, sometimes pivotal information, to detectives which is useful in solving crimes. Recently, using the Graykey device, a forensic examiner was able to locate and provide information which was instrumental in solving an active murder investigation. With this new technology we are able to level the playing field slightly and keep pace with criminals. The examinations are performed ONLY after we are legally authorized to do so (i.e.: valid and signed search warrant, consent, etc.)."

"While we do not address the specifics of how different investigative tools work, I can tell you it helps our ability to comply with search warrants for the forensic examination of locked cellular devices," said ISP Captain David R. Bursten. "It helps our ability to comply with search warrants for the forensic examination of locked cellular devices, thereby collecting both exculpatory and incriminating evidence, identifying victims, and preventing further victimization in ongoing crimes. The capability is only used as part of an ongoing criminal investigation, in compliance with a search warrant issued by a judge, or under long-standing exceptions to the warrant requirement under federal and state laws. Think about crimes where children have been victimized, or unsolved murder investigations, or other crimes where related evidence may have been stored on a locked electronic device. If police are not able to collect evidence in compliance with a search warrant, they are not able to save child sex victims from ongoing abuse, obtain both incriminating and exculpatory evidence in criminal investigations, or fully provide facts to prosecutors, defense counsel, judges, and juries."

"Anything out there, just like something that you lock behind the door in your house can be gotten at, and we need to face that, that's reality," said Nedef. "If it's out there, if it's in your phone, yeah, people can get to it."

Carmel, Fishers defend sectional championships

The Carmel and Fishers boys tennis teams successfully defended their sectional championships on Thursday.

The host Greyhounds, ranked No. 1 and the defending state champions, beat No. 22 Westfield 5-0 at the Todd Witsken Tennis Center. Meanwhile, the No. 9 Tigers won a tense final over No. 15 Hamilton Southeastern by the score of 3-2.

The Greyhounds got off to a fast start thanks to their doubles, winning both matches 6-0, 6-0. No. 1 singles Presley Thieneman also won quickly, by the score of 6-1, 6-0. The other two singles matches were also finished in straight sets.

"It just feels good," said first-year Carmel coach Bryan Hanan. "I tell these guys, 'Don't take it for granted.' We're just trying to take this tournament one step at a time. We've got some big goals ahead of us. We came out and played a good Westfield team tonight. Just nice to be on the court and have some good competition."

This is the ninth consecutive sectional title for the Greyhounds, and their 32nd overall. Carmel will play at the Kokomo regional, and will take on the winner of the Kokomo sectional in a Tuesday semi-final match. The Wildcats host Eastern today to decide that sectional championship.

When Fishers and HSE met earlier in the season for the Mudsock trophy, the Tigers won 5-0. Thursday's meeting was for the sectional title, and it was a fight from start to finish.

Fishers got the first point when No. 2 singles Marcus Luke won his match 6-3, 6-2. But the Royals took the next two matches, both in doubles. No. 1 Matt Meyer and Matthew Parker picked up a straight-set victory, then No. 2 Mahek Chougule and McGuire Wolfe came from behind to win in three sets.

The Tigers tied it up when Nic Knoderer won at No. 1 singles. Knoderer battled it out with HSE's Aiden De Witt, ultimately taking two tie-break sets to get the final knotted up at 2-2. That left No. 3 singles, and Fishers' William White came back from being down

a set and 5-2 to win the second set 7-5, and the third set 6-3.

With that, Fishers won its second sectional championship and qualified for the North Central regional on Tuesday. The Tigers will play the winner of today's Mount Vernon sectional championship, between New Palestine and the host Marauders.

"Last year was the first time we'd ever won a sectional at Fishers," said Tigers coach Dave Heffern. "Winning two in a row




