Central Indiana Orthopedics breaks ground on new facility in Fishers

Friday was ground-breaking day for Central Indiana Orthopedics, as the firm joined Envoy Inc. and Fishers City officials for the ceremonial moving of the dirt. This will add yet another medical

facility to the Fishers corridor around the area of 136th Street and Interstate 69, the Saxony neighborhood.

The new structure is scheduled to be finished by the end of 2019.

"The new medical center and MedTech Park will allow our doctors and staff to continue offering advanced training and specialized care to our patients, and encourage additional investment in the area," said Dr. Nimu Surtani, President of Central Indiana

Orthopedics, in a company news release. "The MedTech Park vision is to attract a critical mass of innovative medical service providers and ultimately be a regional destination for those in need of expert care."

The new facility is described as state-of-the-art by the firm. Expansion of Central Indiana Orthopedics' services in Hamilton County will include a clinic, surgery center, imaging and physical therapy – among other services. The medical-office building

will house Central Indiana Orthopedics' Fishers-based operations, currently located in St. Vincent's Hospital.

"Central Indiana Orthopedics' concept for an emerging medical services and technology corridor embodies the innovation-driven vision that has become synonymous with Fishers," said Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness. "MedTech Park will be an economic driver, as well as a resource for health care for the entire region."

Noblesville budget up, tax rate down

The Noblesville City Council will consider a \$69.4 million operating budget for 2019 during its Oct. 23 meeting. The budget is slightly larger than the current year, but the property tax rate will be a few cents lower, according to best estimates available to city officials.

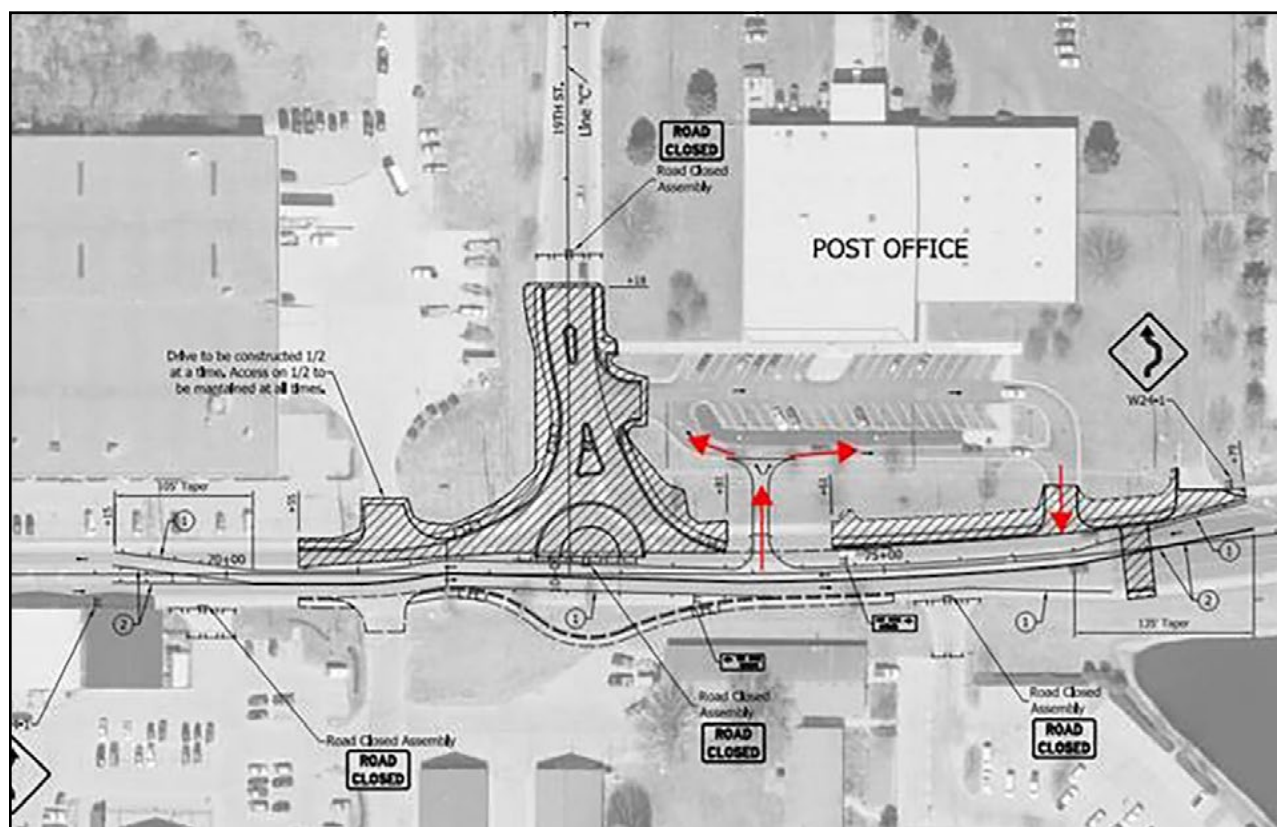
The city will have more revenue next year due to Local Income Tax collections and an expanding tax base. That will enable the hiring of 17 new employees, 10 of whom will be school resource officers with police powers. Noblesville Schools will pay half the salaries of the new hires.

All current city employees are scheduled for a 3 percent pay raise with a handful of exceptions who will get slightly more. But, city council members will get only a 1 1/2 percent increase, according to Councilman Brian Ayer.

Included in the budget are some public improvement projects money for the Midland Trail, Seminary Park upgrading, the so-called Levee Trail and some renovation of some city facilities. But, major projects such as the local share of the reconstruction of State Road 37 are not included.

Among the largest expenditures after employee compensation will go to street maintenance and improvements. Projections indicate nearly \$11 million will be available for streets. This is not property tax money, but rather comes from gasoline taxes and Local Income Tax revenue.

The budget adoption session of the council will be held at 7 p.m. on Oct. 23 in the council meeting room at City Hall, 16 S. 10th St. The meeting is open, although the hearing on the budget was held on Oct. 9.

Noblesville to close portion of 19th Street this coming Tuesday to being roundabout construction

As part of the ongoing conversion of the 19th and Pleasant streets intersection into a roundabout, workers will close 19th Street from Pleasant Street to Mulberry Street on Tuesday, Oct. 23. The closure is anticipated to last 21 days.

This will allow workers

to construct the north half of the roundabout. During the closure, a temporary driveway to the United States Postal Service facility will be created from Pleasant Street. Outbound traffic will still utilize the existing Pleasant Street driveway.

The overall project will

cost approximately \$1 million, but because of funding received from the Indiana Department of Transportation, the City of Noblesville's portion is \$194,284.

Approximately 15,000 vehicles travel through the intersection daily. The existing three-leg intersection with 19th Street under stop

control will be converted to a single lane roundabout – providing vehicles with safer and more efficient travel at that location. Lighting and sidewalks also will be installed.

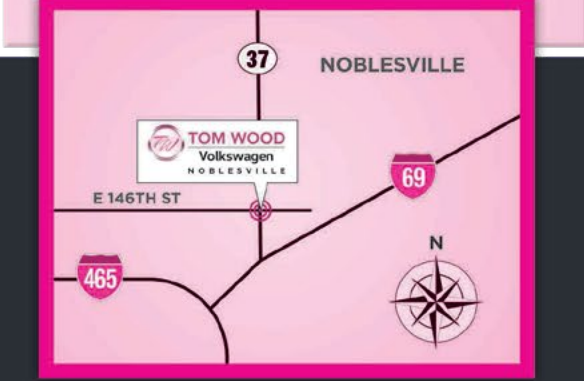

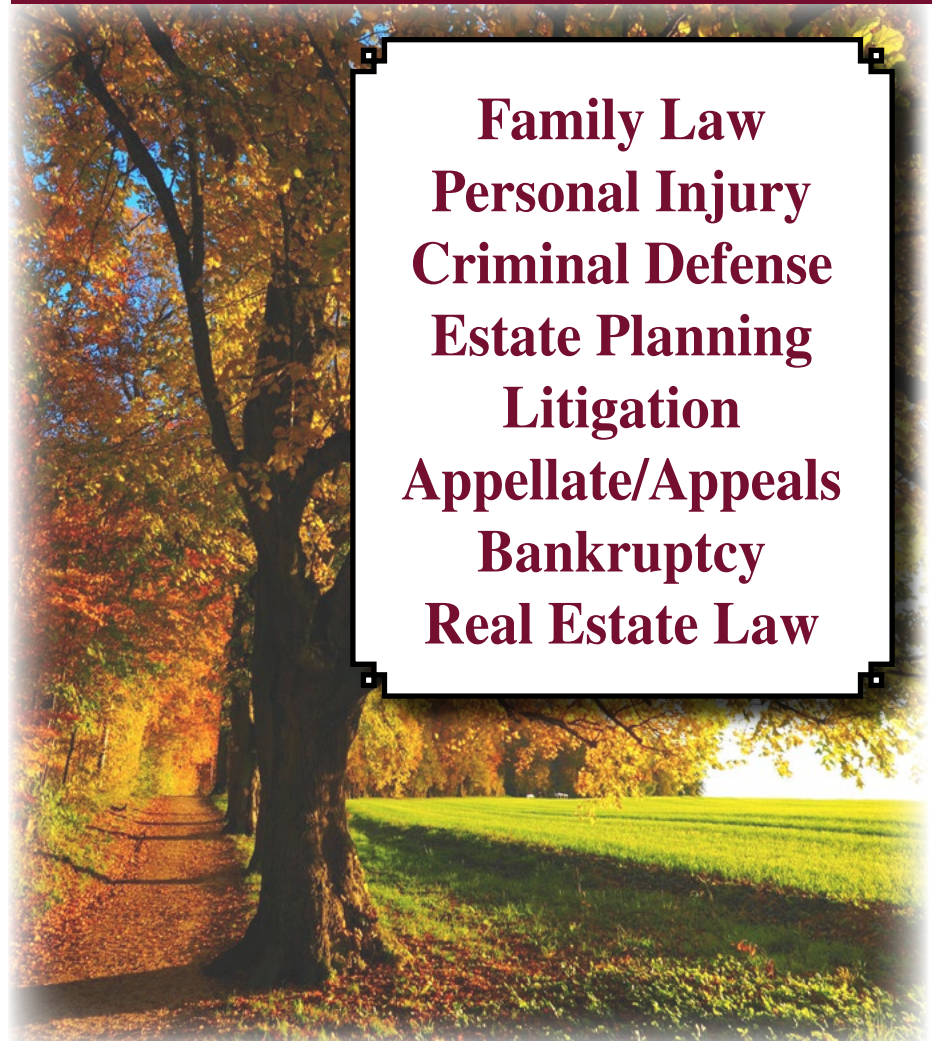

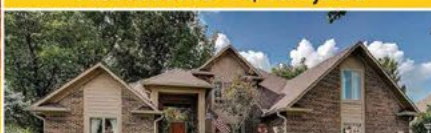

High school football - Sectional first round

Golden Eagles overwhelm Crawfordsville

Guerin Catholic got back in on the winning track Friday, just in time for the first round of the post-season.

The Golden Eagles took care of Crawfordsville 49-19 at the Eagles Nest to open play in Class 3A Sectional 26. Guerin had lost two games in a row, but got itself together and advanced to the sectional semifinals, which will be played next Friday.

"The bottom line is just to play well," said GC coach Tom Dilley. "Certainly there are plenty of things I'm sure we could've done a lot better and there are probably some things we did pretty well."

The Golden Eagles got off to a great start, scoring on their first drive. It only took 78 seconds for Guerin Catholic to get in the end zone, which it did when Jagger Albert ran in 41 yards for a touchdown.

That was the start of a sensational night for Albert. The sophomore was elevated into a leading running back role due to injuries, and he responded well. Albert added two more touchdowns in the first quarter, both on short runs.

"It sure seemed like it," said Dilley about Albert being the next man up. "He caught a few balls and ran hard and did a good job blocking."

Up 21-0 after the first quarter, the Golden Eagles made the score 35-0 midway through the second with two quick TDs. Brayden Hall ran the ball in 14 yards for Guerin's first score with 6:52 remaining in the period. Fifteen seconds later, Daniel Rhoad grabbed an interception and returned it 39 yards to the end zone. The 35-0 score would stand at halftime.

Albert picked up his fourth touchdown of the game early in the third quarter, scoring on a four-yard run. The Athenians got on the board with 3:59 left in the period, but the Golden Eagles answered with one more touchdown: Hall punched the ball in from the 1 in the opening play of the fourth quarter. Crawfordsville scored two more touchdowns in the fourth, but the game had already been decided.

As a team, Guerin Catholic was 7-of-7

on extra points. Nathan Friedman kicked five of them, with Kian Shinaver making the other two.

Albert finished the game with 113 yards on 10 rushes, while Hall gained 67 yards on nine carries. Quarterback Christian Gelov completed 5 of 8 passes for 72 yards. Patrick Hagel and Bernie McGuinness both caught one 30-yard reception each, and both those catches would set up touchdown runs for the Golden Eagles.

Guerin Catholic is 6-4 for the season and will host Brebeuf Jesuit in next week's sectional semi-finals.

Pacers lose to Bucks in Milwaukee's new arena

The odds were stacked against the Indiana Pacers on Friday night in Milwaukee. A sellout crowd was on hand to watch the first-ever regular season game at the Fiserv Forum.

Sure enough, Milwaukee christened its new downtown arena with a dominant performance.

Giannis Antetokounmpo looked like a potential MVP frontrunner, racking up 26 points, 15 rebounds, and five assists, while his teammates combined to make 17 3-pointers as the Bucks (2-0) rolled to a 118-101 win over Indiana (1-1).

"Anytime you're not stopping the ball and that ball is getting to the paint, it forces your defense to collapse," Pacers coach Nate McMillan said after the loss. "When the defense collapses, it's going to be a kick-out for three.

"Antetokounmpo is one of the better players in the league at finding the perimeter guys when he gets deep penetration. We didn't do a good job of keeping the ball in front of us."

The Bucks looked anxious out of the gates, missing their first eight shots, including five 3-pointers. The Pacers capitalized, starting the game 4-for-5 and racing out to an early 8-0 lead.

Milwaukee regrouped after a timeout, however. Antetokounmpo got their first points on a baseline dunk. Darren Collison answered with a midrange jumper on the other end, but the Bucks then reeled off 12 unanswered points to take their first lead of the night.

The hosts controlled the remainder of the quarter, leading by as many as 10 points before Indiana closed the frame with a 7-2 surge to trim the deficit to 30-25.

It was just a four-point game after Victor Oladipo's deep three with 6:04 remaining in

the second quarter, but the Bucks strung together a 13-4 run to open up their largest lead of the evening and took a 62-53 lead into the break.

Indiana had no real answer for Antetokounmpo, who racked up 22 points on 10-of-15 shooting and 11 rebounds in the first two quarters.

"He demands a lot of attention, obviously," Oladipo said. "One man can't stop him all by himself. We need to load to him and stop him. Overall, we have just got to do a better job of doing that earlier in the game."

But it was his supporting cast that really broke the game open in the third quarter, knocking down six 3-pointers and pushing the lead to as many as 20 points. John Henson's buzzer-beating three gave the hosts a 93-76 advantage heading into the final frame.

The Pacers never seriously threatened in the fourth quarter as the Bucks cruised to the win and took an (extremely) early lead in

the Central Division race.

Oladipo led the Blue & Gold with 25 points on 10-of-13 shooting and five rebounds in the loss.

Domantas Sabonis recorded his second double-double in as many games, tallying 12 points and 13 boards in just 22 minutes off the bench. Doug McDermott (14 points on 4-of-6 3-point shooting), Myles Turner (11 points and four rebounds), Tyreke Evans (10 points, five rebounds, and four assists) and Collison (10 points and three assists) all also reached double figures in the loss.

Chris Middleton went 5-for-9 from 3-point range on his way to 23 points, while 2016-17 Rookie of the Year Malcolm Brogdon added 15 points, four rebounds, and seven assists for Milwaukee.

The Pacers will have to bounce back quickly, as they return to Indianapolis to host the Brooklyn Nets at Bankers Life Fieldhouse at 7 p.m. on Saturday.
