## Peterson sworn in as newest Noblesville Council Member

### The REPORTER

The Noblesville Common Council welcomed a new face to its ranks at its Wednesday meeting. Darren Peterson was sworn in as the new at-large councilman prior to the meeting. The seat was formerly held by Mary Sue Rowland, who resigned from the position last month.

"As a council member, I want to look through the lens of the citizens, all organizations and be a leader in the community as challenges come before us, to insure smart, sustainable growth for a stronger and safer Noblesville," Peterson said.

Peterson is the president of Peterson Architecture and is active in the community by serving as board president of Nickel Plate Arts, treasurer of Noblesville Main Street, a board member of Keep Noblesville Beautiful and a member of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce.

"Being on the other side of the podium across the country presenting ideas to councils and communities, makes me a valuable addition and resource to the council," said Peterson, a resident of Noblesville for 24 years. "In order to fulfill

a 14-month term, I have the experience to quickly understand presentations and communicate the best practices from around the country, using the context of active engagement with the Noblesville community."

After serving the community for almost two decades as mayor and a council member, Rowland resigned on Sept. 17. Peterson, who announced

## Toddler drowns in Noblesville creek

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is investigating an accidental drowning in the 500 block of Mill Farm Road in Noblesville. Deputies responded to the area shortly after 1 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 22 on the report of a missing person.

Although it is still early in the investigation, officials believe a toddler and a sibling opened the front door of the house and wandered away while the children's mother was in the shower. The mother found

one child nearby but was unable to locate the second child. Deputies dispatched to the call found the missing child in a creek several houses away. They immediately began resuscitation efforts and took the child to medics who continued efforts to revive the child.

The toddler was transported to Riverview Health and was pronounced dead.

Hamilton County Coroner John Chalfin identified the child as a 22-month-old female. The child's name had not been released as of press time.

## County Commissioners, Councilmen disagree over local non-profit funding

Hamilton County Commissioners on Monday approved \$3.4 million in requests for financial assistance to community non-profit organizations. The public funds were approved earlier by the County Council, but commissioners tabled another \$427,310 of council approved funds because the council had reduced and in some cases eliminated funding requests for 11 social service organizations.

Commissioners said they were uncertain why the reductions had been made, but want time to consult with councilmembers or consider what action to take. The difference between councilmembers' and commissioners' opinions over grants to the non-profits is the latest in a number of disputes between the two bodies.

The funds approved by commissioners Monday included \$2.1 million in state-prescribed funding

for Aspire, a mental and behavioral health program, \$750,000 to Janus Developmental Services for general operations and \$428,495 for Hamilton County Express, the public transportation service operated by Janus.

Requests tabled included funding for PrimeLife Enrichment, Prevail, Chaucie's Place, Cherish Center, Trinity Free Clinic, Meals on Wheels, the Hope Family Clinic, Hamilton County Leadership Academy, Good Samaritan, CIRTA, Conner Prairie and Salvation Army.

The funds going to community non-profits are not the sole source of revenue for the organizations, but supplement their efforts which officials say would otherwise either not be provided or fall entirely to local government.

Commissioners also approved distribution of \$150,000 in federal Community Development Block Grant money, which is administered by the Noblesville Housing Authority.

## Fishers Council OKs 2019 budget, bonds to fund Nickel Plate Trail

The City of Fishers has a roughly \$108 million budget in place to fund city operations for 2019, now that the City Council has unanimously voted in favor of the spending plan. Council members also approved a bond issue funding the first phase of the Nickel Plate Trail.

There were people in the audience with Save The

Train signs objecting to the funding of the trail, backing a plan to have a train and trail side-by-side, but that is not part of the plan approved by the council. One lady with a Save The Train sign asked the council if she could speak before the vote was taken on the Nickel Plate Trail, but Council President Todd Zimmerman denied the request. The Council held a public hearing on the budget at the September council session.







With Nov. 6 just around the corner, I wanted to take a moment to say why I'm voting in support of Miller Yes.

Our Noblesville students/children deserve the brightest and most creative professionals our educational institutions have to offer. With neighboring districts in Hamilton County paying teachers \$5,000 to \$15,000 more per year, I'm not surprised to see a teacher shortage in the past two years in our district.

Our teachers work tirelessly each day; concerned with appropriate grade curriculum, teaching lessons, making sure students aren't falling behind in their coursework, classmate/friend disputes, etc. They're asked to teach anywhere from 22 to 31 students per class and make sure each child gets the appropriate amount of explanation needed in each lesson.

My heart breaks as I realize, "We've lost another great educator."

Whether you have a child, niece, nephew, grandchild, neighbor, etc. who attends Noblesville Schools; don't you want our teachers to be paid fairly for their responsibilities? We all chose to live in - or move to - Noblesville, which is an awesome community. One key factor for my family is our great schools and great teachers. It's hard to compete though, with salary disparages between same county school districts. If this referendum doesn't pass, our schools, our students and our community will lose out.

Strong schools make for a strong community. The ability to attract new businesses to Noblesville, prepare our future workforce, and achieve a high quality of living as a community are all directly related to the strength of our school system.

The 2016 referendum was about maintaining the status quo and was a reduction in the tax rate. The 2018 referendum is about enhanced mental health, increased safety and retaining top-quality staff. It's about keeping our schools and our community strong.

Due to the teacher shortage and recent pay increases by neighbor districts, our teachers are leaving for positions that can pay \$5,000-\$15,000 more.



Since 2009, Noblesville Schools has lost \$46.5 million in funding.

The 2018 referendum will replace the 2016 referendum and will provide funding through 2026.

53% of the additional funding would be spent on mental health & safety, while 47% would be spent on staff pay.

The current referendum rate is 18.9 cents and the new proposed rate is 37 cents.

This referendum would raise an additional \$6.25 million/year for Noblesville Schools.

## How Much Will This Referendum Cost Taxpayers?

A median Noblesville home valued at \$206,000 currently pays \$192/year for the 2016 referendum. The new 2018 rate would cost this home \$376/year. That's an additional \$184/year—an additional \$15/month—for enhanced student mental health, school safety and teacher pay.

## Carmel family honors late son by creating foundation to help children who lose siblings

The family of a little boy who passed away last year is focusing their attention on other kids, specifically kids who lose a sibling, like two of their other kids did.

Crew Long passed away one year ago. He was only three.

"I noticed in post-partum that he was lethargic and wasn't really wanting to eat much. At that time, we thought it was probably a feeding issue, and obviously was much more than that," said his mom, Mandy Long.

Crew ended up having a number of health issues – a feeding tube, epilepsy, chronic lung disease, developmental delays, parts of his brain did not grow, and Long said parts of his brain possibly

even shrank.

Long says he could communicate without speaking. She says he would light up when they went for a walk.

His older brothers said he had the best smile and laugh.

After Crew passed away, his parents looked for services of child loss to help his older brothers, but they could not find much.

"We felt very strongly to remember Crew, but also after Crew passed away, looked for things for siblings of child loss and there's just not anything out there, and I couldn't believe it," said Long.

So they created a foundation called Crew's Crew that will focus on programming, initiatives and projects centered on helping kids who have lost a sibling.

"We feel like we have a mission that we want to help

families in loss the purpose, more focused on siblings processing grief as a result of losing a sibling," said Scott Long, Crew's dad.

"I know that even if it can put a little bit of a smile on the face of someone that's you know going through this ... I can't even put into words, you know, what it means to me, and I know Crew's right behind all of it, too. He's kind of pushing me along the way of helping, reaching out and helping these families," said Mandy Long.


