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Fishers will soon have new Design Center

Fishers will soon see a \$14 million Hub & Spoke Design Center on 106th Street along what is planned to be the Nickel Plate Trail. A city news release describes this as "a center of ac-

tivity for the home building and design industry alongside a one-of-a-kind Maker's Space for hobbyists, entrepreneurs, and students to design and create."

Hub and Spoke founder David Decker, president of OnPoint Real Estate Solutions Travis Tucker, and Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness jointly announced the project Thursday morning.

"Our goal is to show people the possibilities of success and growth in our industry through project and work-based learning. There is something magical that happens when you take an idea in your head and build it with your hands," said David Decker in a city news release.

The city is offering a 10-year tax abatement and waiver of fees for the developers of this project. The city is also making a commitment to lease space in the building.

The city council vote was on the agenda for the Monday council session.

Judge Paul Felix: 'You wanted devastation'

A judge has sentenced the 13-year-old who shot and injured his classmate and teacher last May at Noblesville West Middle School.

Judge Paul Felix gave the boy a sentence with the Indiana Department of Corrections until he is 18, unless the IDOC decides the boy should be released sooner. He did not specify which juvenile facility will house the boy, and he said he will place the teenager on proba-

tion when he is released. Felix choked up as he

Noblesville Schools issues statement

"The traumatic incidents of May 25, 2018 have forever changed the lives of our students, staff and community. Our sincerest hope is that this boy never hurts anyone again. We appreciate the court's powerful comments and final decision, and recognize that it was appropriate within the limited confines of what state law will allow. We're hopeful this will be a step towards closure and healing for the victims and our community overall.'

Police detain suspect in Noblesville High School shooting threat Friday

On Friday, police investigated a threat to Noblesville High School after what school officials described as an ugly, derogatory racial statement referencing a school shooting this coming Monday was found on a bathroom wall.

Police were made aware of the situation at approximately 11 a.m. Friday, and by evening, a suspect had been detained, according to a news release provided by Noblesville Schools.

Noblesville Schools also announced that the suspect had been removed from school grounds and expulsion proceedings were underway.

Noblesville Schools Director of Communications Marnie Cooke said, "We are sickened that we are facing this situation once again and will aggressively address hatred and threats to the safety of our students and community. We'll continue to provide our parents updates and plan for school Monday."



Safety in our schools

Hook Elementary School, Columbine, Stoneman School, Douglas High School and Santa Fe High School are just a few that come to mind when I think of school shootings. In the last decade, people have heard more about school shootings than ever before. It's an unfortunate truth, but no matter how much we wish we could go to school and not have to worry about these things, there's always the chance that it will happen to our school, no matter how many times we say it

isn't going to. Every time the news stations interview students and parents after a school massacre, the same things are always said: "I never thought it would happen to it harder for somebody to my school," "How many people have to die before we say enough is enough?", "Why aren't there more things being done?". In the past year, students have started speaking out more about what we need to do to prevent these tragedies happening in our schools across the country. If everybody keeps speaking out about it, then why has there been little to no change?

In early May of 2018, I was sitting in my choir class when an announcement came on the speakers. Our principal spoke to us in shaky voice, telling us that we were on lockdown and that it was not a drill. Frantically, my classmates we start looking at the heath and I rushed to hide in our small classroom. Thirty-one students and my teacher crammed together, and my teacher stood, trying to protect us if bullets were to come through the door. I could hear muffled cries in the room and the girl beside me stood shaking, whispering over and over again that she was going to pass out. In that moment, I held hands with people I didn't even consider my friends and I told them that we were

Maybe we should start turning to our schools and seeing the holes in our safety regulations. This year, Sheridan High School had a new security system installed on the doors. The doors are supposed to make gain entry during the school day, but there could be loopholes around these doors to give an intruder just enough time to gain entry before an alarm starts going off. Other schools have given students clear backpacks in order to see what students are carrying into school with them. This will make sure that students aren't bringing shotguns into class, but that doesn't mean that a student can't sneak a different kind of weapon in. Different schools have installed metal detectors at every door, but the metal detectors can't protect us against every weapon.




