



Gov. Holcomb details Next Level Trails grant program

Gov. Eric J. Holcomb on Thursday announced the launch of the Next Level Trails grant program, which will dedicate \$90 million to connect communities through more hiking, biking and riding trails. Next Level Trails is part of Gov. Holcomb's Next Level Connections, a \$1 billion statewide infrastructure program announced in September.

"By linking communities, we will make a serious investment in connectivity and quality of life," Holcomb said. "Next Level Trails' strong focus on partnerships will drive collaboration among neighboring cities, towns and counties, as well as fill gaps among

Next Level Trails is the largest infusion of trail funding in state history. The grant program is divided into two




Lester was first in the individual medley, Holder paced the 500 free and Bailey Haworth won diving.


