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Indiana American Water acquires Sheridan water, wastewater systems

Indiana American Water President Deborah Dewey on Friday announced the company's acquisition of the Town of Sheridan's water and wastewater systems. The purchase of the system adds more than 2,500 water and wastewater customers to the company's customer base, which represents a population of more than 3,000 residents.

"The acquisition of this system will help hold rates down for Sheridan customers as needed investments are made and also provide access to operations and capital management water professionals and a number of customer service options and payment

methods," said Dewey. "Indiana American Water already provides water and wastewater service to several nearby communities, so this is a good fit for us and a continuation of our efforts to expand our presence across Indiana."

"In a time when communities are looking for new and innovative ways to deal with challenges they're facing and hold the bottom line on expenses, this acquisition is a great solution for the town and its cus-

tomers," Dewey continued.

Sheridan Town Council President David Kinkead is also enthusiastic in his support of the acquisition.

"Our community was working to address pressing local infrastructure needs and other community priorities," said Kinkead. "This acquisition will help us to address these concerns while also providing future rate stability by keeping our rates lower than they would have been under municip-

pal ownership, paying off our existing utility-related debt, and generating additional property tax revenues. We appreciate the experience, knowledge and resources that Indiana American Water brings to the table and look forward to working with them as this partnership begins."

The acquisition of the Sheridan water and wastewater systems for approximately \$10.75 million was approved by the Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission in September and closed by Indiana American Water and the Town of Sheridan on Monday. The Sheridan systems will be incorporated into

Federal board paves the way for Nickel Plate Trail

The Federal Surface Transportation Board has given final approval to transform the Nickel Plate Rail Line to a trail. The cities included are Fishers, Noblesville and Indianapolis.

According to Fishers city officials, the decision issued three notices of interim trail use, one for each segment of the track in all three municipalities. This decision denies U.S. Rail's motion for a preliminary injunction to use the rails.

"Today is a definitive step forward in the City's ability to execute to a vision of creating a transformative trail for our community," said Fishers Mayor Scott Faddness in a city news release. "This decision reaffirms the City's right by law to move forward with the trail and we plan to do so imminently. This guarantees that the

One fatality in Thursday night crash on Interstate 69

Fishers Police are continuing to investigate after one person was killed in a motor vehicle crash Thursday night on Interstate 69.

Shortly after 10 p.m., the Hamilton County Communications Center began receiving reports of a serious motor vehicle crash on I-69 at the 204 mile marker near 106th Street. Fishers Police and Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Response arrived a short time later and located a white 2015 Freightliner semi-tractor trailer and a white 2010 Toyota RAV 4 passenger car in the southbound lanes. The Toyota was wedged under the rear of the trailer.

Paramedics located one person deceased inside the Toyota, Ernesto Moon, 43, Indianapolis. The driver of the semi, Athrist Stevenson, 26, Indianapolis, was not injured and fully cooperated with the investigation.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene it is believed both the semi-tractor trailer and the Toyota were



traveling southbound when the Toyota rear-ended the trailer. The exact cause of this crash is yet to be determined. This crash continues to be an active investigation.

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AG Hill announces \$68M settlement with UBS for manipulating interest rates

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced on Friday a \$68 million, 40-state settlement with UBS for fraudulent conduct involving the manipulation of LIBOR (the London Interbank Offered Rate). LIBOR is a benchmark interest rate that affects financial instruments worth trillions of dollars and has a far-reaching impact on global markets and consumers.

"This is yet another case in which my office has acted in concert with other states' attorneys general to protect consumers from fraudulent business practices," Hill said. "We will continue to remain watchful for other improprieties committed by those trying to take advantage of unsuspecting victims."

The attorneys general allege that UBS misrepresented the integrity of the LIBOR benchmark by concealing, misrepresenting and

failing to disclose that UBS at times made USD LIBOR submissions to avoid negative publicity and protect the reputation of the bank, and that UBS made Yen LIBOR submissions to benefit its derivative trading positions.

As a result of its fraudulent conduct, UBS made millions in unjust gains when government entities and not-for-profit organizations entered into swaps and other financial instruments with UBS without knowing that UBS and other banks on the USD-LIBOR-setting panel were manipulating their LIBOR submissions.

Governmental and not-for-profit entities with LIBOR-linked swaps and other financial instruments with UBS will be notified if they are eligible to receive a dis-

tribution from the settlement fund.

UBS is the fourth of several USD-LIBOR-setting panel banks under investigation by the state attorneys general to resolve the claims against it.

With the UBS settlement, the states have collected \$488 million in payments from the four banks, almost all of which will be distributed to state and local government entities and not-for-profits that have been harmed by these banks' wrongful conduct. Pursuant to the settlement agreement, UBS will continue to cooperate with the states' ongoing investigation; such cooperation helps facilitate civil enforcement efforts, including the distribution of funds to victims of the offense.

Westfield's basketball teams scored a sweep of Frankton Friday night, as The Rock hosted the annual Play for the Cure girls-boys doubleheader.

The Westfield girls won 55-42, while the boys held off the Eagles 71-69. This was the eighth year for the Play for the Cure, where survivors of breast cancer from both schools are invited and recognized in between the girls and boys games.

The Shamrock girls got off to a great start, leading 20-3 after the first quarter. Westfield extended its lead to 34-13 by halftime, and that was more than enough to win comfortably, even as the Eagles made a comeback in the fourth period.

Alyssa Crockett earned herself another double-double, scoring 17 points and corraling 11 rebounds. Ava Henson added 11 points, while Regan Dimond threw in a couple of 3-pointers. Gigi Eldredge collected six rebounds.

The boys game was close the entire way. The 'Rocks inched ahead by the end of each of the first three quarters, going up 14-13 after the first period and 28-25 at halftime. Westfield led 48-44 after three quarters and hung on in the fourth.

Zach Banks had another incredible night, pouring in 31 points. That included an 11-of-12 effort from the free throw line. Braden Smith had an outstanding shooting performance, hitting six 3-pointers on his way to 22 points. Smith also pulled six rebounds and dished out four assists.

Banks made four steals, while Caleb Welch and Camden Simons both blocked two shots.


