#### School violence hits home

The Noblesville West Middle School shooting on May 25 was the top story of the year.

For most of the second half of the year Noblesville had the unenviable distinction of having had the only school shooting in the state. Fortunately, no lives were lost when a 14-year-old student shot a fellow student and a teacher.

In the months since, the teacher, Jason Seaman, has been honored repeatedly for his heroic action of disarming the shooter. Both Seaman and the wounded student, Ella Whistler, recovered.

The assailant has been committed to a youth facility until he reaches the age of 18.

#### Massive turnout in 2018

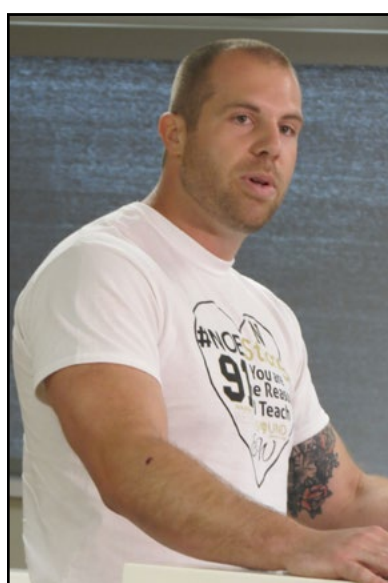
The hard-fought primary and general elections of 2018 saw historically large voter participation. Republicans fended off an unusually strong Democratic challenge in the November general election.

In the end, Republicans won all but one office – a township board seat in Fall Creek Township – but margins were closer than usual, leading Democratic Chairman Joe Weingarten to express satisfaction with the progress his candidates had made.

In most countywide races, Republicans won with about 60 percent of the vote, but that was down from the 70 percent or more that is normal in the county.

### 2019 to bring challenges and potential progress

As we head toward a new year what can we, in Hamilton County, look for in our community life? There will be both challenges and hopefully progress for our large and diverse county.

We can expect continued, unrelenting growth and development. The county's local leaders have so far done an admirable job of keeping pace with the demands of citizens for good public safety services, schools, public libraries, medical facilities and recreational opportunities.

One area that continues to present challenges is the moving of traffic on our increasingly busy highways. The new year will hopefully see work underway on rebuilding State Road 37 into a freeway-style route, and Noblesville's Pleasant Street bypass of the congested downtown business district. These projects will help immeasurably to ease traffic problems in central Hamilton County.

Other projects such as 146th Street reconstruc-

tion west to Michigan Road, reconstruction of 276th Street between State Road 19 and U.S. 31, a new flyover ramp accessing 146th to southbound Key-

stone Parkway, and the ever increasing number of roundabouts will also aid in better traffic flow.

Unresolved, and now seemingly dormant, is interest in public transportation sometimes called mass transit. Two years ago the topic was widely discussed, but not widely demanded. When and if this issue returns to the scene is uncertain.

Beyond meeting highway and transportation needs, the county will continue to face the critical challenge of drug addiction and individual drug overdoses. This scourge shows up at our hospitals and takes an increasing number of lives each year. Perhaps recently passed legislation and new ideas suggested by a new sheriff will help to curb or slow what has been called an epidemic, but often playing out "under the radar."

### Safe Haven baby box in Carmel is county's first

Hamilton County has its first Safe Haven baby box.

The box was unveiled Friday morning at Carmel Fire Department's Station 45 on College Avenue near 106th Street.

The boxes allow people to anonymously surrender their healthy newborns without fear of criminal prosecution under Indiana's Safe Haven Law. The original law went into effect in 2000 and was amended in July of this year to allow anonymity. It should be thought of as a last resort next to adoption or surrendering a baby in person.

The addition in Carmel makes the sixth baby box installed in the state so far. It appears to be saving lives.

An alarm goes off inside Station 45 when the Safe Haven baby box is locked from the outside.

The box is temperature controlled providing a warm and safe place until help arrives.

"The first baby that was placed in our box was pulled from the box in four minutes, 20 seconds. The second baby, 90 seconds," said Monica Kelsey, the founder of Safe Haven Baby Boxes.

The box was unveiled in honor of baby Amelia who was found dead after being abandoned at Eagle Creek Park four years ago.

"Baby Amelia's footprint is on the logo, and there has not been an abandonment since her finding in 2014," said Linda Snachko, founder of He Knows Your

## Hamilton County GOP Women's outreach program still going strong

The Hamilton County Federated Republican Women (HCFRW) began a program in 2016 to help provide items for those less fortunate. The program, called RIGHT NOW, has generated several thousands of dollars' worth of donations to local food pantries and township trustees in Hamilton County.

Znachko claimed Amelia, known at the time as Doe, from the Marion County Coroner's Office. Znachko not only named the baby, but also, through her ministry, gave the baby a proper burial.

Since Baby Amelia was abandoned, six boxes have been installed throughout the state. Two babies have been surrendered using the boxes. In July, a third baby was safely surrendered at the Decatur Township Fire Department after it announced plans to install a baby box.

station to achieve that, I'll do that," Kelsey said. Safe Haven Baby Boxes has plans to install 14 more boxes between Indiana and Ohio.



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

**Carmel resident reaches plea agreement in money laundering**

Four suspects signed plea agreements in connection to an American Senior Communities money laundering scheme.

The former CEO for American Senior Communities, Carmel resident James Burkhart, along with Daniel Benson, ASC's chief operating officer, Steven Ganote, a personal friend of Burkhart, and Joshua Burkhart, the brother of James who is known as "Justin Barnes," were all arrested in October 2016 for their involvement in a money laundering scheme.

The U.S. District Attorney's Office confirmed that all four had agreed to plea agreements at the end of 2017.

**Nickel Plate debate**

The long running debate over the future of the Nickel Plate Railroad continued through most of the year.

Community leaders' decision to eliminate the rail line south of Noblesville and convert it to a walking and biking trail touched off a major controversy with some citizens wanting to maintain the tracks for train traffic.

In the end, a new organization, the Nickel Plate Heritage, took control of the railroad north from Noblesville and began running excursion trains on the historic line. The Indiana Transportation Museum, which had operated trains for 30 years, left for new headquarters in Logansport.

**Opioid crisis**

A continuing crisis of drug overdosing was also a top series of stories of the year. There were likely hundreds of cases of county citizens treated for drug overdoses and more than 40 deaths from deadly opioid drugs during the year.

Hamilton County was not alone in seeing the dramatic increase in drug abuse. Nationally the illegal drug use has been called a crisis of epidemic proportions. Police, health officials and the courts locally have been struggling with methods to stem the tide of drug addiction and death.

**White River and Seals Ambulance Service**

White River Township residents have been served by Seals Ambulance Services since May 1, 2018. Seals emergency service has become a very divisive topic, and there is a great deal of misinformation about both why White River chose Seals and how well or poorly residents are being served. The Reporter decided to give our readers some accurate information to consider in an editorial published on May 2.

The decision to hire Seals looks great on

paper. It is an established company and is part of a national family of companies called Priority Ambulance. It contracts for ambulance service with Ruoff Home Mortgage Music Center, the Indiana State Fairgrounds and Event Center and Indiana Downs Horse Track, and it is the preferred provider for Community Health Network. It has over 50 ambulances available in Indiana.

But Seals was only in service 48 percent of the time in April.

Perhaps, when negotiating with White River Township, Seals Ambulance Services sold the sizzle instead of the steak.

**Rascal Flatts rushed off stage, fans evacuated**

Law enforcement officials and representatives from Ruoff Home Mortgage Music Center did not initially confirm what caused the Rascal Flatts concert to end with the band being rushed off stage and the venue being evacuated on Aug. 10.

The Reporter learned there were multiple phone calls, deemed to be credible, indicating an explosive device may have been on site. Sources told The Reporter no one was injured as a direct result of the bomb threat. No one was injured during the evacuation.

**Public officials retire**

State Rep. Kathy Richardson, Judge Steve Nation, Mayor John Ditslear and Sheriff Mark Bowen are among those announcing retirement from office, although Ditslear has one more year as Noblesville mayor.

Richardson is leaving the state legislature to become County Clerk on Jan. 1.

**Jail expansion and solar project**

The past year saw an expansion of the county jail underway to alleviate overcrowding, and the installation of a solar panel farm to provide sun powered energy for the corrections complex and health department.

The solar power is predicted to cut energy costs, which is a major county budget item. County officials may also use solar power when expanding the Government and Judicial Center in the next year or two.

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# Indiana lawmaker, governor want to stop taxing military retirement benefits

Veterans groups say Indiana is losing retired military members at an alarming rate, and some veterans won't even consider retiring in Indiana.

They blame the fact that Indiana taxes military retirement benefits. A state lawmaker wants to stop the practice.

Ron Martin, chairman of The Military/Veterans

Coalition of Indiana, has been out of the military for 21 years. The 68-year-old said, "I spent 25 years in the United States Army. I was an ROTC graduate back during the Vietnam War."

He and his family love Indiana so much that they decided to retire here, but he said Indiana taxes his military retirement benefits.

"That we are going to

tax them and other states won't," Martin said. "Thirty-eight states in our union do not tax military income. When you look at that from a veteran's standpoint, why aren't I living in these other states? That's what hurts. We've sacrificed a lot."

Martin said that's why roughly 3,500 military veterans who are 40 or younger leave Indiana for another state every year.

"We've got many of our young veterans, it does hurt them a great deal. Those are the ones I'm concerned about, to try to keep them here."

State Rep. Karlee Macer (D-Indianapolis) said she plans on introducing a bill that would stop veterans benefits from being taxed.

"I think in the long run not only is it the right thing to do for our veterans, but

if we're very serious about gaining and adding to our workforce, these are the simple cut-and-dry things we can do on the most basic level to lure people to our state," Macer said.

Martin said he believes 2019 will be the year this law change happens and she will keep pushing. "We need to do more for these young men and women who put their name, their

life on the line for this country. We owe them a little bit. It's about time we step up to the plate and do that."

A representative of Gov. Eric Holcomb's office said Thursday he is fighting for a military pension state income tax exemption, too. It's part of his 2019 legislative agenda.

The legislature will convene Jan. 3.

## AG Curtis Hill announces \$575M settlement with Wells Fargo

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced on Friday that Wells Fargo Bank N.A. will pay \$575 million to resolve claims that the bank violated state consumer protection laws. As part of a settlement involving all 50 states and the District of Columbia, Indiana will receive \$5.2 million.

Specifically, the settlement resolves claims that Wells Fargo:

- Opened millions of unauthorized accounts and enrolled customers into online banking services without their knowledge or consent;

- Improperly referred customers for enrollment in third-party renters and life insurance policies;

- Improperly charged auto loan customers for force-placed and unnecessary collateral protection insurance;

- Failed to ensure that customers received refunds

of unearned premiums on certain optional auto finance products; and

- Incorrectly charged customers for mortgage rate lock extension fees.

"Such grossly unfair and deceptive trade practices as those demonstrated by Wells Fargo must never be allowed to stand," Hill said.

As part of the settlement, Wells Fargo will also create a consumer redress review program through which consumers who have not been

made whole through other restitution programs already in place can seek review of their inquiry or complaint by a bank escalation team for possible relief.

Wells Fargo has identified more than 3.5 million accounts in which customer accounts were opened, funds were transferred, credit card applications were filed and debit cards were issued without the customers' knowledge or consent. The bank has also identified 528,000 online bill-pay enrollments nationwide that may have resulted from improper sales practices at the bank. In addition, Wells Fargo improperly submitted more than 6,500 renters insurance and/or simplified term life insurance policy applications and payments from customer accounts without the customers' knowledge or consent.

The states alleged that Wells Fargo imposed aggressive and unrealistic sales goals on bank employees and implemented an incentive compensation program in which employees could qualify for credit by selling certain products to customers. The states further alleged that the bank's sales goals and the incentive compensation program created an impetus for employees to engage in improper sales

practices in order to satisfy such sales goals and earn financial rewards.

The states also alleged that Wells Fargo improperly purchased automobile insurance policies for more than 2 million auto financing customers and charged them the premiums, interest and fees for it, despite evidence that the customers' regular insurance policy was in effect, and despite numerous customer complaints about such unnecessary placements. Wells Fargo has agreed to provide remediation of more than \$385 million to approximately 850,000 auto finance customers. The remediation will include payments to over 51,000 customers whose cars were repossessed.

Additionally, the states alleged that Wells Fargo failed to ensure that customers received proper refunds of unearned portions of optional Guaranteed Asset/Auto Protection (GAP) products sold as part of motor vehicle financing agreements. As a result, the bank has agreed to provide refunds totaling more than \$37 million to certain auto finance customers.

Finally, the states alleged that Wells Fargo improperly charged residential mortgage loan consumers for

rate lock extension fees even when the delay was caused by Wells Fargo, a practice contrary to the bank's policy. Wells Fargo has identified and contacted affected consumers and has refunded or agreed to refund more than \$100 million of such fees.

Wells Fargo has previously entered consent orders with federal authorities – including the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency (OCC) and the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) – related to its alleged conduct. Wells Fargo has committed to or already provided restitution to consumers in excess of \$600 million through its agreements with the OCC and CFPB – as well as through settlement of a related consumer class-action lawsuit – and will pay more than \$1 billion in civil penalties to the federal government.

As part of its settlement with the states, Wells Fargo has agreed to implement within 60 days a program through which consumers who believe they were affected by the bank's conduct, but fell outside the prior restitution programs, can contact Wells Fargo to be reviewed for potential redress.

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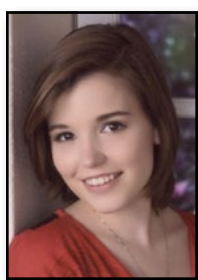

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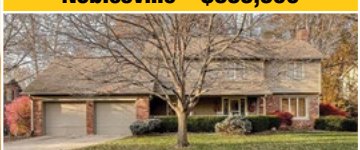

## Millers finish as Holiday Tournament runners-up

**NOBLESVILLE** - Another successful Noblesville Holiday Tournament is in the books, and who provided the event with the most excitement?

The Millers themselves.

Noblesville started Friday's semi-final action in a memorable way, as Jordan Schmidt's 3-pointer at the buzzer gave the Millers a 48-45 victory over Columbus North. That sent Noblesville into the evening championship game, where the Millers gave a very good Lawrence Central team all it could handle before the Bears won 60-51.

### BALANCE AND EFFICIENCY

Noblesville's morning victory over the Bull Dogs sounded like a college physics class: "The Model of Balance and Efficiency." All six players that took to the floor scored, and the Millers made 20 of 34 baskets.

Xavier Hines started the game with a 3-pointer, and that got Noblesville going, to the tune of a 15-8 first-quarter lead. Hines would nail another 3 late in the quarter, while Alex Hunt added four points. Schmidt knocked in a triple to end the period, and that began an 8-0 run that stretched into the second quarter.

Hines scored on a 3-point play, then Hunt made a layin to put Noblesville up 20-8. Hines later scored back-to-back baskets, and that gave the Millers their biggest lead of the game at 24-10.

"I thought we played a tremendous first quarter and second quarter," said Noblesville coach Brian McCauley. "Our execution was tremendous, it was phenomenal. Our passing, our formation, our intelligence was very good."

Noblesville led 28-18 at halftime, and continued to hold the lead through the third quarter. The Bull Dogs did cut the Millers' advantage to 37-32 after back-to-back 3s, but a pair of Zack Johnson layins kept Noblesville ahead 41-34 at the end of three.

Columbus North used a 10-0 run that ate up a majority of the fourth quarter to take a 44-41 lead. This included a sequence where the Bull Dogs held the ball for about a minute and a half.

"We didn't panic, we didn't fold," said

McCauley. "We kept our composure, kept our poise."

"So if we're down one and there's four and a half minutes to go, we come out and attack them, then they maybe go by us and they can expand the lead. So we decided to be a little bit patient. We went to our trap."

Hines ended the run with a jumper, then tied the game at 45-45 with another basket. The Bull Dogs had the ball with time running out, but Eagan Keever-Hill made a steal, and the Millers called a timeout with

## Pacers dominate Pistons, get seven players in double figures

With just a few days left in 2018, the Pacers put together arguably their most dominant performance of the calendar year on Friday night.

Seven players scored in double figures for Indiana in a 125-88 wire-to-wire victory over the Detroit Pistons at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. It was the fourth straight win and the 11th in their last 13 games for the Pacers (24-12), who shot 60.2 percent on the night and matched their season high with 68 points in the paint.

It was also the largest margin of victory ever for the Pacers over Detroit (16-17) in 191 regular season games against their Central Division rivals.

"We had good ball movement again tonight," Pacers coach Nate McMillan said. "When we have that type of movement, passing to guys when they're open, normally you shoot a high percentage."

Domantas Sabonis had another double-double off the bench in the victory, scoring 19 points on 8-of-12 shooting and grabbing

12 rebounds. Darren Collison shared high scorer honors with Sabonis, went a perfect 7-for-7 from the field, and dished out seven assists.

The starting frontcourt duo Myles Turner and Thaddeus Young each played just 24 minutes, but both scored 17 points on the night. Turner went 8-for-11 from the field, while Young was 8-for-13.

"We're playing with high confidence," Collison said after the win. "The best thing about it is everybody is contributing. It's not just one or two or three guys...that's what's going to make us a special team down the road."

The Pacers got off to a fast start from the opening tip on Friday, converting their first four field goal attempts and jumping out to a quick 8-0 lead.

Turner was all over the place early on both ends of the floor. The 22-year-old center scored two of those first four baskets for Indiana and finished his first 10-minute shift 3-for-3 from the floor with two assists, two blocks, two steals, and a couple more deflections.

The Pistons briefly climbed within one possession of the lead, but Indiana closed the opening frame with a 14-6 run to take a 32-21 advantage into the second quarter.

The offense kept rolling for the rest of the half. The Blue & Gold racked up 38 points in the paint over the first two quarters and led by as many 16 on their way to a 58-45 halftime lead.

Indiana reeled off nine unanswered points early in the third quarter to stretch the margin to 20. That sequence featured a right-handed slam by Collison on the fast break, the first dunk of the season for the 31-year-old, 6-foot point guard — an event that sent the Pacers' bench into hysterics.

"The guys (were) making fun of me talking about how I can't dunk no more," Collison joked in his postgame interview with FOX Sports Indiana's Jeremiah Johnson. "So yeah, take that."

Those were just two of 15 points from Collison in the third quarter alone, as he connected on all five of his attempts in the frame.

The hosts had the game well in hand by the time the third quarter buzzer sounded, taking a commanding 91-69 lead into the fourth.

Turner and All-Star guard Victor Oladipo never saw the floor in the final frame, as the Blue & Gold continued to extend the lead all the way up until the final seconds.

Bojan Bogdanovic and Doug McDermott each tallied 12 points for the Pacers, while Tyreke Evans added 10 off the bench in the victory.

Oladipo scored just seven points on 2-of-9 shooting in 25 minutes, but still finished with five rebounds, seven assists, and two steals.

All-Star forward Blake Griffin led Detroit with 18 points, seven rebounds, and five assists, but also had seven turnovers on the night. Luke Kennard had 14 points off the bench, while Andre Drummond finished with 12 points and 12 rebounds.

The Pacers have just one more game in 2018, hosting the Atlanta Hawks on New Year's Eve at 3:00 p.m.
