Noblesville man charged with child molestation

## Filing begins for municipal elections

It's another election year, and candidates for city and town office may begin filing today at the county election office. The filing period runs until noon on Feb. 8. Candidates must file their intent to run in the May 7 primary election. Winners will advance to the November general election.

All eight of Hamilton County's municipalities will elect officials this year. This includes mayors, city clerks, city judges and city council members in Noblesville, Fishers, Carmel and Westfield in addition to town council members and clerk-treasurers in Sheridan, Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta.

Noblesville is certain to have a new mayor since incumbent John Ditslear is not running for re-election. Mayors Jim Brainard of Carmel, Andy Cook in Westfield and Scott Fadness at Fishers have announced they will seek re-election.

All current officeholders are Republican, and it will be in the GOP primary where the most activity is expected. Democrats may run for some municipal offices after making a strong if unsuccessful bid for several county offices in last fall's election.

With the beginning of filing, more candidates are expected to announce their plans to run soon. Most of the incumbent city council members in Noblesville and Carmel have indicated plans to run for another term. Carmel, which is now a second-class city, will have a nine-member council instead of the current seven.

Officials elected this year will take office on Jan. 1, 2020. The Reporter will run the names of candidates as they file.

## Brian Ayer elected as new Noblesville Common Council President

Brian Ayer will replace Chris Jensen as the new president of the Noblesville Common Council following a vote during a reorganization meeting held Monday evening. Wil Hampton was elected as vice president.

"I am excited for Brian to serve in this leadership position again and look forward to working with him and the entire common council in 2019 as we continue to make the community better and more prosperous," said Noblesville Mayor

John Ditslear.

As the most tenured member on the Noblesville Common Council, Ayer began serving his fourth term in January 2016. During his years on the council, Ayer has served on all council committees and previously served as council president in 2008. As an at-large official, he represents all of Noblesville and its voters in city limits and Noblesville Township.

"The council's goals for 2019 are to continue working to achieve the 10 Noblesville NOW capital improvement plan objectives and progressing forward on making improvements to our infrastructure, especially the major thoroughfares of Pleasant Street and State Road 37," Ayer said.

Ayer has been a Noblesville resident since 1964 and graduated from Noblesville High School in 1976.

He and his family started Ayer's Real Es-

tate in 1978, which serves Noblesville and Hamilton County. In the community, Ayer is a member of the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce and served on the board and as a past president; member and past board member of Noblesville Main; and past board member of Habitat for Humanity of Hamilton County. He also is a member of First United Methodist Church, Noblesville Elks Lodge and Noblesville Moose Lodge.

## AG Curtis Hill joins \$1.5M settlement with retailer Neiman Marcus over 2013 data breach

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced on Tuesday that the Neiman Marcus Group LLC has agreed to pay \$1.5 million and implement new policies to resolve an investigation by 43 states and the District of Columbia into the 2013 breach of customer payment card data at 77 Neiman Marcus stores in the United States.

In January of 2014, Neiman Marcus disclosed that payment card data collected at certain of its retail stores had been compromised by an unknown third party. The states' investigation determined that approximately 370,000 payment cards – 754 of which were associated with Indiana consumers – were compromised in the breach, which took place over the course of several months in 2013. At least 9,200 of the payment cards compromised in the breach were used fraudulently.

"Data breaches such as this one cause real harm to real people," Hill said. "We

work day after day to protect the interests of Hoosier consumers against both negligent and willfully malicious activity on the part of businesses."

Indiana's share of the settlement funds is \$51,452.46.

In addition to the monetary settlement, Neiman Marcus has agreed to a number of injunctive provisions aimed at preventing similar breaches in the future, including:

- Complying with Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard (PCI DSS) requirements;

- Maintaining an appropriate system to collect and monitor its network activity and ensuring logs are regularly reviewed and monitored;

- Maintaining working agreements with two separate, qualified Payment Card Industry forensic investigators;

- Updating all software

associated with maintaining and safeguarding personal information and creating written plans for replacement or maintenance of software that is reaching its end-of-life or end-of-support date;

- Implementing appropriate steps to review industry-accepted payment security technologies relevant to the company's business; and

- Devaluing payment card information, using technologies like encryption and tokenization, to conceal payment card data.

Under the settlement, Neiman Marcus is also required to retain a third-party professional to conduct an information security assessment and report and to detail any corrective actions that the company may have taken or plans to take as a result of the third-party report.

"It does surprise me. I would think driving a bus is decent pay, it does not surprise me. It is such a shortage," said Carmel parent Terri Powell.

Superintendent Michael Beresford has a solution to the shortage. It includes picking up middle school students 10 minutes earlier and dropping them off

10 minutes later.

The district has added incentives to attract bus drivers, which includes training.

Powell said, "Earlier in the morning is not a big deal. I know after school a lot of kids have sports they have to get to; that may be a problem for many parents."

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

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
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# Mark Boice seeks re-election to Noblesville Common Council

# Millers overcome early injuries, win opening meet

**NOBLESVILLE** — Olivia Mangin understands frustration -- and how to conquer it.

Four years ago, discontent all but sapped her motivation and nearly spelled the end of her gymnastics career. Facing a "mental block" at 13, Mangin, a competitor for 12 years, purposely walked away from the sport she once loved, but she didn't wander too far.

She just had to rediscover her passion.

The Noblesville junior needed a break, and once she returned, she figured out the secret.

Stop worrying.

"There was a time when I didn't really want to do it anymore," Mangin said. "But then I came back to do high school, and I kind of took off from there."

Her drive and redefined approach came into play on Monday night during the Noblesville gymnastics team's season opener against Western at home.

As the last competitor on floor – for the Millers' final event – Mangin shimmied her shoulders and let it all go. She nailed every flip, slamming down both feet with strong compact and powerful intent. Her swagger and gracefulness intertwined for a feisty, yet smooth delivery.

Her smile was transparent.

"You should enjoy your sport. You shouldn't hate coming to practice every day," Mangin said. "You should always be happy about what you're doing."

With three Millers gymnasts sideline due to potentially season-ending injuries, the pressure should have crept in for Mangin with Noblesville in a dead heat with Western prior to her final routine.

Instead, she pushed past the team's personnel setbacks to propel the short-handed Millers to an 80.050-78.925 win after posting a 7.850, which was good enough for second on floor.

Mangin finished third on bars with a 6.300, fourth on the balance beam with a 6.375 and third on the vault at 8.300 to place fourth in the all around with a 28.825.

"I wanted to lift our team up and just

make sure that they knew the injuries don't matter. We can still come together as a team and support them that way," Mangin said. "Since we had other girls have to step up, I wanted to give them confidence in what they can do."

The Millers followed Mangin's lead. Fellow junior Kayleigh Sahr placed fifth on vault, bars and on floor while Kiley Reisner, a freshman, was sixth on vault, fifth on beam and ninth on floor.

Noblesville entered the season with hopes of having sophomore Makayla Kauzlick, a regional qualifier on both the

beam and vault last year, and senior Devyn Palmer active. However, a back injury for Palmer and groin tendinitis for Kauzlick have both sidelined for the foreseeable future.

The Millers also lost promising freshman Hailey Knoll to a potential stress fracture, which she suffered last week.

"We are plagued with injuries to begin the season, but I'd rather deal with them at the beginning of the season than the end of the season," Noblesville head coach Jody Ramey said. "There were first meet jitters here tonight. I'd like to see our team score

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
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# Fishers boys tough out win at Tech





University's boys dominated the meet, winning eight of the 11 swimming events. The 'Blazers had two double winners: Cole Reinholt in the individual medley and breaststroke and Keegan Priest in the butterfly and backstroke. Hayden Suarez-Davis placed first in the 50 free.

University swept all three relays: Priest, Reinholt, Cordell Wilson and Suarez-Davis won the medley relay; Suarez-Davis, Asher Whitcomb, Wilson and Austin Clark were first in the 200 free relay; and Whitcomb, Clark, Reinholt and Priest paced the 400 free relay.

The 'Blazers set four new records at the meet: The medley relay swam in 1:52.08, while Priest broke his own records in the butterfly (55.63) and backstroke (57.27). Reinholt broke his own record in the breaststroke (1:10.17).

University will next swim at the Brebeuf Jesuit Schools with No Pools invitational, which takes place Jan. 22 at the IUPUI Natatorium.

## Pacers hold off late Cleveland run, win 123-115

The Pacers picked up another road win after defeating the Cavaliers in Cleveland, 123-115. After leading by 20 points or more for most of the game, things got interesting in the fourth quarter.

The Pacers seemed to be in control with a 14-point lead, but Cleveland was not ready to throw in the towel, cutting the deficit to nine, 110-101, at the 3:20 mark.

Back-to-back Cleveland scores made it a five-point game, but Thad Young answered with a huge three-point play to make the score 113-105 with 2:02 to play.

The Cavs got within five again, and this

time it was Victor Oladipo who came up big, draining a 3-pointer to push the lead back to eight, 118-110, with 1:06 left. From there, Indiana was able to convert at the free-throw line to seal the win.

"Again, we did some good things," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said. "It's something hopefully we learn from it, and we didn't drop this game. I think all games you can learn from it, and hopefully we learn that you have to continue to play regardless of what is on the scoreboard for 48 minutes."

Indiana came out firing on all cylinders. After the game was tied at 7-7, the Pacers outscored the Cavaliers 31-9 over the rest of the opening quarter to lead 38-16 heading into the second period.

The Blue & Gold's first quarter blitz was led by 14 points from Bojan Bogdanovic and 10 from Domantas Sabonis. Overall, the Pacers shot 16-of-22 in the first, with 12 assists.

In the second, Indiana showed no signs of slowing down. The Pacers grew their lead to as much high as 26 before Cleveland was able to get within 20, 63-43, heading into the locker room.

The Pacers remained comfortably ahead in the third quarter until the final few minutes. Indiana led by 22, 85-63, at the 5:22 mark, but from there, the Cavs outscored the Pacers 16-7 to trail by 13, 92-79, heading into the final period.

Cleveland continued to cut into Indiana's

lead in the fourth. With 9:18 to play, the home team trailed by just nine, 96-87.

The Pacers fired off a quick 5-0 to seemingly regain control, but the Cavaliers answered with a 5-0 run of their own to get the lead down to nine again, 101-92, with 7:22 left in the game. Cleveland would eventually get within five, but Indiana was able to make enough plays to keep a charging Cavaliers team at bay to get win No. 27.

Young led the Pacers in scoring with 26 points. Bogdanovic finished with 23 points, and Sabonis had 15 points and nine rebounds.

Cleveland was led by 26 points off the bench from Jordan Clarkson. Cedi Osman and Tristan Thompson each scored 15.
