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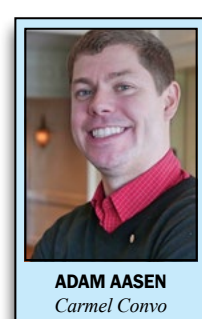
Noblesville Lions recognized with district contest award

on in the school system. So I've become familiar with how great Carmel Clay Schools are. The district is rated A by the Indiana Department of Education and has been awarded 10 National Blue Ribbon Awards. CHS was ranked as the fifth best high school in the state for 2018, according to U.S. News and World Report.

Although it's still very new, becoming a father changes everything. Immediately I bonded with her and felt an instant connection. I'm so excited to see her grow up and I'm trying my best to soak up every moment in the meantime.

Safe city

Almost every year, Carmel ranks among the state's safest cities. In November 2018, a website called Safewise analyzed crime data and ranked Carmel as the third safest city in the state, with Fishers ranking second and St. John taking first. In 2017, the same website listed Carmel as the fourth safest city in the entire United States for raising children. The website looked at graduation rates, violent crime reports, sex offender concentration and more when tallying up the score.

Of course, this column isn't about me. It's about my thoughts and observations on the City of Carmel. So in order to tie this momentous occasion into the column's focus, I'll tell you a little about why I'm excited that we're raising our child in Carmel.

Great schools

One of big reasons why people move to Hamilton County – and Carmel specifically – is because of the school system. My wife is a Carmel High School graduate (I graduated from North Central, just down the road) and my mother-in-law is a retired CHS teacher. I'm a board member for the Carmel Education Foundation and I currently participate in a program called Expedition, which informs members of the community about everything going

Not only does Carmel have low crime rates, but it's also a safe city for motorists. Because the city has 122 roundabouts, as of January 2019, there are fewer auto accidents with serious injuries. In the past two decades, Carmel's population has tripled but the number of serious injury accidents has remained the same, which means a dramatic

Saxony area to add new urology facility

The Saxony area of Fishers near Interstate 69 Exit 210 will be adding yet another medical building to the many facilities already located there.

Tuesday the groundbreaking of its Center of Excellence at 14300 E. 138th St. The company cites increased demand for urological services in this area as the main reason for the new building.

The 22,000 square-foot office will accommodate up to 12 urologic providers and multiple urologic service lines at one time. Urology of Indiana anticipates opening the building to patients in November 2019. Northwest Radiology Network is partnering with Urology of Indiana to offer advanced imaging ser-

Three education bills introduced in House, aim to "elevate" the teaching profession

Indiana lawmakers want to pay teachers more, which is something the governor has said he wants to focus on this session. Now there's more than money on the table for teachers.

Three other bills are looking to help teachers in new ways. Representative Robert Behning (R-Indianapolis), the chair of the Education Committee, says the goal of the three House bills is to elevate the profession of teaching.

House Bill 1003 focuses on putting more money into teachers' pockets by forcing school corporations to spend more education dollars for the classroom and for teachers instead of administrative costs.

House Bill 1008 would create career ladders, helping teachers stay teachers as opposed to moving to the school administrators in order to make more money.

House Bill 1009 will improve the teachers' prep programs, creating a one-year residency program.

the majority of teachers leave the profession in the first five years because they say they weren't prepared.

"Other states have pushed for increasing teachers' pay but when you look at all three of these, I think you are uplifting the profession as a whole and not just focusing on one thing or the other," said Behning. "I think everybody is excited about trying to uplift the profession of education because they are House bills 1003-9 ... they are House Republican agenda bills so I think they will very likely ... there is no question

they will make it out of the House. I think they will have success in the whole General Assembly."

Behning says he is working with a few teacher groups to help come up with these bills, including the Indiana State Teachers Association, Teach Plus and Stand For Children. All three came together to make sure kids benefit and teachers benefit. The bills were heard by the Education Committee Wednesday for the first time. They go back to the Education Committee before the second reading.

But why are they so expensive to remodel?

I hear the same in regards to putting on a fresh coat of paint. It's typically not one of the larger rooms in most homes so why does it equate to more than you thought? Think about all of the elements that need to be cut around in

a bathroom with regards to painting. Most painters might tell you they would rather paint a bedroom over a bathroom for that very reason.

In terms of remodeling, depending on the extent, one of the bigger ticket items is a custom shower. Also consider any time you want to

move/add plumbing or add/move electrical, it impacts your costs. A bathroom does not have the cabinetry a kitchen does nor the appliances, but with a full remodel, typically the same trades need to come in ... plumber, electrician, dry-wall, paint, carpentry, tile, etc. And it can be very difficult to get more than one or two people in the space at once to work.

The cost for finishes var-

ies drastically. A 60" vanity can equate to \$700 in some cases, depending on your taste and budget, to double that, or more, easily. If you need/want a custom counter top ... yep, you guessed it, usually a higher price tag.

With my projects I typically give a client a detailed budget to spend on finishes to help keep the costs in line. That way they know, as we go, if they are over or under spending.

When you really break down each item that goes in to the bathroom and start researching prices, it begins to make sense how the remodel costs can add up quickly.

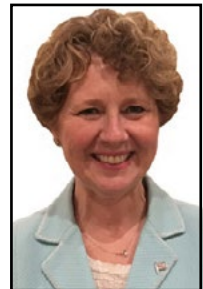
Rep. Brooks votes to provide federal workers with backpay

Congresswoman Susan W. Brooks (R-Ind.-05) voted to pass S. 24, the Government Employee Fair Treatment Act, which overwhelmingly passed out of the House of Representatives with a vote of 411-7.

"Federal employees in Indiana and across the country are

furloughed or still working are paid in full once the government has been fully funded. I am proud this bill is on its way to the President's desk to be signed into law so that federal workers now and in the future are provided the financial security they deserve."

S. 24, the Government Employee Fair Treatment Act, was introduced in the Senate by Senator Tim Kaine (D-Va.), and guarantees backpay to federal employees affected by the government shutdown. The Senate voted to pass this bill on Jan. 10, 2019.

Terry Busby announces candidacy for Noblesville Common Council

The longest-serving City Council member in Noblesville history is stepping up one more time. Terry Busby, who served the city as councilor for District 1 and at-large from 1980 to 2005, will run for the open seat in District 1 in the May 7 primary election.

"Tax rates are too high, especially for senior citizens," Busby said. "Recent changes in how we charge for sewers and trash have an unfair impact on people with fixed incomes. Where's all the money

going?"

Busby is a retired swimming coach and teacher with deep roots in the Noblesville community. He taught physical education and health at Noblesville High School for 35 years, served as the head swimming coach and coached track and cross country. He was the Hamilton County Parks Superintendent for 18 years and designed the swimming pools at Forest Park and Noblesville High School.

Busby also served on the Board of Works and Plan Commission. Most recently he served four years on the Noblesville Township board.

He holds a B.S. from Indiana State University and a Masters of Education from Ball State.

"I've been around this town a long time," says Busby. "I know the ins and outs of city government. I want to put my experience to work for the people."

AG Hill announces settlements with Fiat Chrysler

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill on Thursday announced that Indiana, as a member of a coalition of states, has reached landmark settlements with Fiat Chrysler and supplier Robert Bosch. These settlements provide for combined civil-penalty payments of approximately \$2.5 million to Indiana and more than \$171 million to 52 jurisdictions nationwide. Bosch supplied and helped program the illegal emissions "defeat device" software used by both Fiat Chrysler and Volkswagen in their diesel vehicles.

"Whenever businesses take unfair advantage of Hoosier consumers or otherwise disregard Indiana state laws, they should anticipate that our office will come after them hard for whatever damages they have done," Hill said. "This settlement represents the fruits of such labor. We will continue to work hard every day to protect consumers and defend the rule of law."

Fiat Chrysler

Following a nearly two-year investigation, the Office of the Attorney General found that Fiat Chrysler Automobiles N.V., its U.S. subsidiary FCA US, LLC, its Italian affiliate V.M. Motori S.p.A. and V.M. North America, Inc. – collectively, "Fiat Chrysler" – installed unlawful "defeat device" software and undisclosed Auxiliary Emissions Control Devices ("AECs") in 1,645 Jeep Grand Cherokee and Dodge Ram 1500 diesel vehicles that the automaker sold in Indiana. These vehicles are from the model years 2014-16.

The Attorney General's Office also found that Fiat Chrysler cheated on federal and state emissions tests by calibrating the vehicles' software to conceal that the vehicles emitted higher than permitted levels of harmful nitrogen oxides (NOx) in real-world driving conditions. Further, Fiat Chrysler misled consumers by falsely claiming the "Eco-Diesel"-branded Jeep SUVs and Ram 1500 trucks were environmentally friendly and compliant with the law in all 50 states.

The settlements announced require Fiat Chrysler to pay Indiana \$1,028,125 in civil penalties under Indiana's consumer protection laws for deceptively and unfairly marketing, selling

and leasing the vehicles to consumers. Nationwide – excluding the separate penalties the company will be required to pay to the federal government and California – the multistate agreement is expected to result in payments totaling \$72.5 million to 49 states, Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia and Guam.

Indiana's settlement also prohibits Fiat Chrysler from engaging in future unfair or deceptive acts and practices in connection with its dealings with consumers. Further, it requires Fiat Chrysler to carry out its obligations under a related settlement agreement in the Multidistrict Litigation ("MDL Consumer Settlement") pending in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California.

The MDL Consumer Settlement, once approved by the MDL court, will resolve claims brought by a national class of affected consumers. The MDL Consumer Settlement requires Fiat Chrysler to: eliminate the "defeat device" features from the relevant software through a software "flash fix"; provide eligible owners and lessees extended warranties; and, together with co-defendant Bosch, pay eligible owners who take their vehicles to authorized dealers for the software repair an average restitution of approximately \$2,908 and pay lessees and former owners restitution of \$990.

Related settlements between Fiat Chrysler and the U.S. Department of Justice, the Environmental Protection Agency, the California Air Resources Board and the State of California also require Fiat Chrysler to make available 200,000 upgraded catalytic converters to mitigate air pollution across the country when installed by Fiat Chrysler vehicle owners as replacements to their existing catalytic converters.

Assuming all owners and lessees nationwide participate, this will result in total available restitution of approximately \$307 million, including approximately \$4.7 million to affected owners and lessees of 1,645 vehicles in Indiana.

The settlements with Fiat Chrysler follow earlier comprehensive settlements reached between Indiana, along with other state, federal and private actors and Volkswagen for equipping,

marketing, selling and leasing more than 570,000 Volkswagen, Audi and Porsche diesel vehicles with illegal "defeat devices." Under those settlements, Volkswagen paid Indiana civil penalties of more than \$6 million, fixed or repurchased the affected vehicles and paid restitution to Indiana consumers.

Bosch

Bosch is a multinational engineering company well known for its consumer products. It is also a major supplier to the global automotive industry. Among the products Bosch supplies to its auto manufacturing customers are the electronic control units ("ECUs") that house the complex software that controls nearly all aspects of an engine's performance, including emissions systems. When Volkswagen, a Bosch customer, was revealed to have systematically utilized "defeat device" software in its diesel vehicles, several states attorneys general, including Hill, commenced a separate investigation into the role played by Bosch in enabling its customers to potentially violate federal and state emissions regulations. Now, after another Bosch customer, Fiat Chrysler, has settled claims that it too employed illegal "defeat devices," the Attorney General's Office is able to announce the conclusion of that separate investigation into Bosch's conduct.

As a result of this investigation, Hill concluded that Bosch facilitated the implementation of the "defeat device" software in more than 600,000 Volkswagen and Fiat Chrysler vehicles over a period that spanned more than a decade. Notwithstanding concerns about the illegal "defeat devices" raised internally, to management and externally, to Volkswagen and Fiat Chrysler, Hill found that Bosch continued to assist these customers as they implemented the "defeat devices" and concealed their misconduct from regulators and the public.

Under the terms of the proposed settlement with the Indiana Attorney General, Bosch will pay Indiana \$1,490,940 in consumer and environmental civil penalties. The agreement also includes precedent-setting injunctive terms and requires Bosch to maintain robust processes to monitor

compliance and to refuse to accommodate requests for software development and programming that could result in the installation of "defeat device" software.

This settlement with Bosch recognizes the important role that suppliers play in ensuring regulatory and legal compliance in the automotive industry and establishes the important precedent that those who knowingly go along with their clients' wrongful conduct will be held accountable.

Under a multistate agreement involving Indiana and 49 other jurisdictions – including Puerto Rico, the District of Columbia, Guam and all states other than California, Texas and West Virginia – Bosch will pay a total of \$98.7 million under the jurisdictions' consumer protection and environmental laws and make a separate \$5 million payment to the National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG) for training and future enforcement purposes. Under the related MDL Settlements, Bosch will also pay approximately \$27.5 million to consumers who purchased or leased the affected Fiat Chrysler vehicles. Bosch earlier paid more than \$275 million to consumers who purchased or leased the affected Volkswagen vehicles.

Indiana's finalized settlement documents will be available in forthcoming days.

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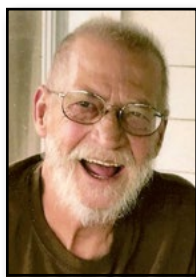

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Thompson too much as No. 6 Eagles edge Millers

NOBLESVILLE – In what's always an outright battle on the hardwood, the Eagles and Millers didn't disappoint at all in the second game of the girls/boys varsity doubleheader on Friday night.

It wouldn't be easy, but the Class 4A No. 6 Zionsville Eagles escaped The Mill with a narrow 59-57 conference win.

The visiting Eagles started off on a 5-0 run, but the Millers put a stop to that and found a groove right away on the offensive end of the court.

Senior Xavier Hines led the initial charge, finding his sweet spot on the right wing, making all three of his attempts from downtown, jump-starting the Millers out to an 11-3 lead with 2:15 left in the first, forcing Zionsville to burn their first timeout.

"I thought Xavier hit some huge threes, got us off to a great start and had a great fourth quarter for us. He made five threes against a tough defense," said Noblesville head coach Brian McCauley on senior Xavier Hines' play on Friday.

Jordan Schmidt extended the lead to 14-5 and Eagan Keever-Hill nailed another buzzer-beater at the top of the key for a 17-9 Miller lead after one quarter.

The Millers kept it rolling to start the second when Hines converted a behind-the-back pass to Zack Johnson and the lefty drove the baseline for the layup. Alex Hunt gave the Millers their largest lead of the night at 21-9.

Zionsville found a way to dig out of that 12-point hole and they did it quick.

Hogan Orbaugh started with swishing a pair from the charity stripe. The next possession, Nathan Childress took a pass from Anthony Scales and dunked it to cut the deficit to eight at 21-13.

Purdue signee Isaiah Thompson made his first three and then Brandon Vernon his first and just like that, the Miller lead shrunk to 21-19 in a matter of mental mistakes and moments the Millers wish they could get back.

"That little run right there got them back and they went on a 10-0 run and then I think I called a timeout. That stretch right there was a crucial step for us," said McCauley on giving up a 10-0 run that let the Eagles back into the game.

"We had control of the game. We had control of the ball. And, some poor decisions and that cost us 10 points," continued McCauley on the Millers' lapse that led to Zionsville getting themselves back into the game.

The Eagles kept at it trailing by four, 23-19, from a Hunt 15-foot jumper from the left elbow.

Another three from Thompson, this time from the volleyball line, cut it to 23-22.

The lead would change hands a few times before halftime.

Zionsville got its first lead of the game on Vernon's second made three-pointer for a 25-23 edge. On the other end, Hunt got fouled and converted the and-1 to get Noblesville back up 26-25.

Vernon made his third trey of the second quarter, giving the Eagles a 28-26.

Thompson scored the final four points of the half for the Eagles, more importantly, banked in a three-pointer at the buzzer to give Zionsville a 32-28 halftime edge.

Thompson sent the Eagles' bench into a frenzy to start the third as he made a three from the right corner as he fell out of bounds.

Orbaugh scored six of the 10 points in the third and Zionsville kept itself distanced just enough in the third, opening up leads as big as seven, but not really pulling away, leading 42-35 after three.

Hines started the fourth off with a three to make it 42-38, but five straight from another Thompson trey and two by Scales and the margin was back to nine at 47-38.

The Millers cut it to four a couple of times in the fourth. In the final minute, the Millers made it more interesting than the Eagles were hoping.

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Royals break away from Shamrocks in third quarter

Noah Smith gave HSE a 5-3 lead on a 3-pointer, after which Westfield went on an 8-0 run. Zach Banks scored four points during that time. The Royals cut the lead to 11-10 by the end of the quarter, including a 3 from Aaron Etherington, who was returning after missing some game with an ankle injury.

Smith got Southeastern ahead 15-13 early in the second period with five quick points, including a 3. Landon Morris scored six points in the later minutes of the quarter; his basket after an offensive rebounds put the Royals up 23-19. Banks made two free throws with seven second left in the half to keep Westfield within 23-21 at halftime.

HSE coach Brian Satterfield said the team tried to pick up its energy level during halftime, and did just that.

"At the defensive end, I thought we were more active and got our hands on some things," said Satterfield. "And then when that happened, that allowed us to get out and go in transition. And we definitely were more efficient offensively."

Southeastern began to roll in the third quarter, with Buccilla leading the charge. He threw in five 3-pointers in that period, which ended with the Royals ahead 49-33.

"He did a nice job," said Satterfield. "He

The momentum from the third quarter helped carry Southeastern through the fourth quarter, even as the Shamrocks made one last big push by finishing the game on an 11-0 run. Smith made five 3-pointers in that

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


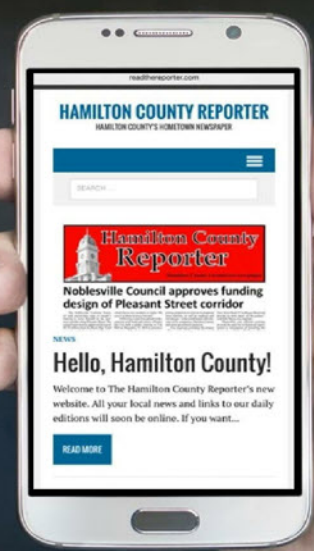
