Fadness has over \$456K in campaign war chest

Anyone challenging incumbent Fishers Mayor Scott Fadness will need to consider how much money the mayor has in his political war chest, which is more than \$456,000 to start election year 2019.

The "Fadness for Fishers" committee report to the Indiana Election Commission spanning the calendar year 2018 shows the campaign had \$354,711 in cash on hand to start the year. "Fadness for Fishers" received \$256,060 in contributions during 2018, but had expenses totaling \$154,003. That left the campaign with \$456,767 as the Republican primary election looms early in 2019.

Logan Day has announced the formation of an exploratory committee in 2019 for a Fishers mayoral run, so he has no campaign report for calendar year 2018.

Candidates will file one more financial report in April before the May 7 primary election.

Heights School Board elects officers

Laura Griswold Reuter was elected president of the Hamilton Heights School Corporation School Board at its January meeting. Reuter was the unanimous choice, taking the gavel from Arnett Cooper, who served in the role last year. Doug Ozolins was elected vice president and Dr. Kevin Cavanaugh as secretary. Cooper and newly-elected Julie Davis round out the five-member board.

Reuter has held a seat representing White River Township since 2008. Ozolins joined the board in 2015, also representing White River Township. Cooper has held the At-Large seat for close to a decade. Dr. Cavanaugh was elected to one of the two Jackson Township seats in 2017, and Davis was elected to the other in November.

"I am honored and delighted to continue serving as our board's president," said Reuter, who appreciates her colleague's confidence in her. "I'm encouraged by their leadership and I believe we're going

In a nutshell, the Office of the Hamilton County Auditor works to provide financial leadership, ensure financial integrity, protect county assets and maintain accurate financial and accounting records. The duo shared the importance of understanding and taking advantage of eligible deductions and credits by Dec. 31 for the preceding tax year. Some deductions and credits can be made online, while others need to be made in person.

An area that has been an increasing focus of the office revolves around reducing the incidence homestead credit fraud.

The very important Noblesville primary election is coming up in three and a half months at which time voters will choose a new city administration. The public should know what their candidates pledge to accomplish on issues facing the city.

General statements of honesty, efficiency, transparency and economy are fine, and should go without saying. But, in addition, voters should be made aware of individual candidate's positions on specific plans and how they can be accomplished.

It is not only important to hear a candidate say a matter deserves attention, but voters need to know how issues are going to be

handled and paid for. For example, we have heard a lot about the need for improvement and development in the downtown area. Current plans for a new project called The Levinson at 9th Street and Maple Avenue are a good start. But, there is room for more, and especially more development that includes off-street parking.

The extremely heavy traffic on Conner Street through the city is going to become more of a headache if nothing is done. A Pleasant Street bypass is planned, but this expensive project needs to get underway. Cooperation with county government on a new river bridge and a major intersection improvement at State Road 37 are keys to making

this project go. The other major highway improvement need is on 37 where financing is also a challenge. The freeway-style improvements are going to be more expensive than originally thought. But, the cost will only increase with time, so innovative thinking is needed to get this problem resolved sooner than later. Where do the candidates stand on the need for a new police headquarters? Few will doubt the need given the crowded conditions at the public safety building. The site of the former Firestone plant may be available. If so, the project needs to somehow be funded and gotten underway. Recreational trails and parkland are increasingly needed in cities. Noblesville has plans for a Nickel Plate trail. Work is under-

way on the Midland Trail, but should it be extended through the city and even to a planned park site east of the city? If so, how can it and the Nickel Plate be financed and done in a reasonable time frame?

There are no doubt other issues that will arise and should be addressed. Noblesville is growing at an incredible rate and the right people in the right places can make all the difference in assuring a greater community beyond just a growing city.

We need look no further than nearby communities to find examples of cities with dynamic and well-planned development while others may appear to be growing like Topsy or not growing at all partially because of a lack of great ideas combined with a plan to execute those ideas.

Increased education, technological advances and better coordination between departments around the county, state and country has greatly reduced the incidence of homestead fraud, which has the potential for significant penalties and causes higher tax bills for everyone. Individuals and married couples are limited to one homestead standard deduction per homestead laws (per IC 6-1.1-12-37 and IC 6-1.1-20.9). The State of Indiana has recently passed legislation (IC 6-1.1-36-17) allowing the county auditor to back tax and add a penalty for those property owners deemed ineligible.

In terms of who is committing the fraud, it's about a 50/50 split of those who intentionally seek credits

for multiple properties and those who didn't know they were doing anything wrong," said Eldridge. "The bottom line is the penalty is the same."

Cicero Kiwanis Club President Robin Mills, who is into her third term as the Hamilton County Auditor, wrapped up the program by providing members with an easy way to remember who is responsible for what segment of office operations. The Auditor is responsible for deeds and mapping. The Assessor assesses. The Auditor bills. The Treasurer collects and the Auditor settles.

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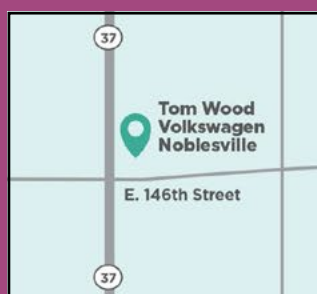

Reader questions details of supposed lower rates for Duke Energy customers

Dear Editor:

On Aug. 24, 2018, the Reporter published an article titled, "[New electricity rate proposal approved by state regulators.](#)"

The supposition was the lower rates "will mean 5.6 percent average rate reduction for Duke Energy Indiana customers by 2020, with most of the savings beginning in 2018."

Looks good on paper but so far the reduction in our bill has not materialized.

For a comparison, I took the figures from our January 2018 bill, and used the rates Duke charged on our January 2019 bill. The results: In January 2018, our bill was \$495.45 before sales tax. When I applied the January 2019 rates to the same KWh usages it would have cost us \$524.05, an increase of \$28.60.

Yes, the energy rates are lower. Duke does not reveal that the "riders" rates fluctuate mostly higher than a year ago.

AG Hill reaches \$120M settlement with makers of hip implants over alleged misleading claims

Indiana Attorney General Curtis Hill announced Tuesday that he and 45 other attorneys general reached a \$120 million consent judgment with Johnson & Johnson and DePuy to resolve allegations that DePuy unlawfully promoted its metal-on-metal hip implant devices, the ASR XL and the Pinnacle Ultamet.

The attorneys general allege that DePuy engaged in unfair and deceptive practices in its promotion of the ASR XL and Pinnacle Ultamet hip implant devices by overstating the longevity (also known as survivorship) of metal-on-metal hip implants. Some patients who required hip implant revision surgery to replace a failed ASR XL or Pinnacle Ultamet implant experienced persistent groin pain, allergic reactions and tissue necrosis – as well as a build-up of metal ions in the blood. The ASR XL was recalled from the market in 2010. DePuy discontinued its sale of the Pinnacle Ultamet in 2013.

"Products and services related to health care are among the most important con-

sumer items purchased by Hoosiers," Hill said. "We will always put a high priority on holding accountable those involved in all aspects of the health-care industry. These entities must be honest and transparent in their marketing practices. Both doctors and patients need to be able to trust the information they receive from these providers of goods and services. The settlement announced today helps advance this cause."

As part of the consent judgment, DePuy has agreed to reform how it markets and promotes its hip implants. Under the consent judgment, DePuy shall:

- Base claims of survivorship, stability or dislocations on scientific information and the most recent dataset available from a registry for any DePuy hip implant device.
- Maintain a post market surveillance program and complaint handling program.
- Update and maintain internal product complaint handling operating procedures

including training of complaint reviewers.

- Update and maintain processes and procedures to track and analyze product complaints that do not meet the definition of Medical Device Reportable Events.
- Maintain a quality assurance program that includes an audit procedure for tracking complaints regarding DePuy Products that do not rise to the level of a Medical Device Reportable Event but that may indicate a device-related serious injury or malfunction.
- Perform quarterly reviews of complaints and if a subgroup of patients is identified that has a higher incidence of adverse events than the full patient population.

Under the settlement, Indiana shall receive \$3.5 million.

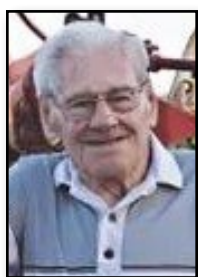

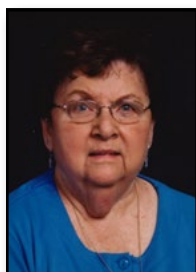

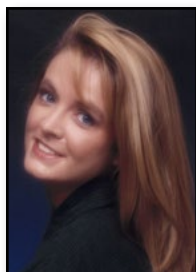
