Retired Judge Steven R. Nation honored at State of the County

Hamilton County Commissioners honored recently-retired Superior Court No. 1 Judge Steven R. Nation with the Continental Award Wednesday afternoon at the State of the

County address. The award is the highest honor that can be bestowed upon Hamilton County residents.

"In the 60 years I have lived in Hamilton County, I don't know of anyone more deserving of the county's

highest award more than my friend Steve," said Steve Dillinger, president of the Hamilton County Commissioners. "His commitment to the service of this community is unprecedented."

In addition to receiving the Continental Award, the Commissioners also named a new county trail that runs from Noblesville through Cicero, Arcadia and Atlanta

Among those in attendance for the award ceremony were Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, Noblesville School Corporation faculty members, Noblesville Police Chief Kevin Jowitt and members of the police department.

Steffen was nominated for the award as a result of his actions on May 25, 2018 during the active assailant

incident at Noblesville West Middle School (NWMS). Steffen was the on-duty School Resource Officer (SRO) assigned to NWMS when the incident took place. "Along with the heroic

actions of a teacher, Patrolman Steffen's immediate response, willingness to engage, and rapid and appropriate trauma care made a significant impact on the outcome of the incident,"

said Jowitt.

Steffen has been with the Noblesville Police Department since August 2010 and is still assigned as the SRO at Noblesville West Middle School.

Dillinger lays out accomplishments, future county plans

Hamilton County Commissioner Steve Dillinger gave his annual State of the County address Wednesday at the Embassy Suites Hotel and Conference Center in Noblesville. The event was hosted by the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce. Commissioner Dillinger shared county accomplishments and discussed future plans to a sold-out crowd of residents and business and community leaders.

Commissioner Dillinger gave updates on the Lowe's Way expansion project, the solar panel installation, the morgue expansion and the expansion of the county jail.

He also spoke and showed drone flyover footage and designs about upcoming projects such as the reconstruction of State Road 37, which will turn the road into a parkway where motorists can drive without stop signs or stoplights.

"It feels like we've been talking about some of these projects for decades, and we probably have," Dillinger said. "It takes a long time to design and finance them. But this is the year the rubber hits the road. This project is by far the most important county road project since the installation of 146th Street in terms of the impact it will have on the lives of the people who live in these areas."

Historic Booth home will be preserved

The historic home of nationally acclaimed artist and illustrator Franklin Booth will likely have a "safe" and secure future on Carmel's rapidly changing Range Line Road. Local historians

of his famous work.

He illustrated books for James Whitcomb Riley and Mark Twain. He created patriotic posters and other items for the U.S. government during World War

I, did illustrations for national magazines, artwork for the New York Daily News and designed a series of stamps for the U.S. Postal Service. He is also known to have entertained some clients including Riley at the house.

The Fishers City Council officially has a new president for 2019 and it will be Rich Block. The vote Tuesday night was unanimous.

Block is an at-large member of the council. Todd Zimmerman, also an at-large council member, held the gavel as council president during 2018. Eric Moeller was elected unanimously as council vice president for 2019.

In other council matters:

- The DMC Insurance Company plans to renovate and expand the building at 10475 Crosspoint Blvd., a light-colored building visible from Interstate 69. The council approved designation of that area as an "economic revitalization area" to move that development project forward.
- A transfer of land to the city redevelopment commission was approved by council, clearing the way for additional parking at a new office building

planned at the entrance of Northeast Commerce Park.

- The council approved property at the site for Geist Waterfront Park to be transferred to the redevelopment commission, allowing a sale of the land now containing a cell phone tower, to be sold by the city to the cell phone tower company for a total of \$1 million.
- Fishers Chief of Police Ed Gebhart honored a member of his force, Steven Pickett, for 25 years of service at the department.

the Steven R. Nation Pathways.

Nation was elected to the bench and took office in 1995. Prior to that, he served as the Hamilton County Prosecutor for four terms. Nation has always been actively involved in the community – coaching youth football, chairing funding drives for the Hamilton County United Way, and serving as a board member for the Hamilton County Red Cross and Noblesville Boys and Girls Club. Nation continues to be heavily involved in the Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program which he helped create. That program is designed to help at-risk students stay in school and out of the juvenile justice system.

Judge Nation's last day on the bench was Dec. 20, 2018.

The Continental Award is given only after a unanimous vote of the three County Commissioners. Recipients must demonstrate a commitment to service over at least a decade, as well as "an attitude of teamwork, a generosity of spirit, and a desire to selflessly support and celebrate the people and communities of Hamilton County."



Committee supports Goodrich's bill creating senior-youth mentor pilot program

The House Education Committee on Wednesday passed State Rep. Chuck Goodrich's (R-Noblesville) legislation that would provide opportunities for local senior citizens to share their life experiences and skills with students while improving school safety.

According to Goodrich, three school corporations would implement a pilot mentorship program developed by the Department of Education for students and volunteers ages 55 and over. Administrators would be able to determine how best to utilize participants in the

program based on the needs of their school.

"Many of our senior citizens want to support their community and they consistently tell me they wish there was more they could do to assist our youth," Goodrich said. "This pilot program is just one way they can get involved, offer support to students by creating positive relationships and helping them develop important life skills."

Goodrich said the United Way of Central Indiana, Indiana Urban School

Association and the Military Veterans Coalition of Indiana all support this pilot program.

"The seniors can also be a great asset for at-risk youth," Goodrich said. "Apart from their teachers, a student may not have much interaction with adults in a safe, judgement-free environment. These volunteers could reach out to a struggling student and assist them with their problem or get them in touch with the right resources."

Volunteers could receive a tax de-

duction of \$50 for each day served and schools chosen to participate in the program would receive a safety grant to assist with the costs of implementation and other related expenses.

Adult participants would need to be approved through a criminal background check and a child protection index check.

House Bill 1224 now moves to the House Ways and Means Committee for further consideration.

State Rep. Chuck Goodrich (R-Noblesville) represents House District 29, which includes portions of Hamilton County.

Indiana House passes bill to lower Child Services caseworker loads

In recent months, Gov. Eric Holcomb and state legislators committed to fixing Indiana's Department of Child Services.

Lawmakers have gone back and forth in recent months about how to fix Child Services. The workload of caseworkers was a recurring theme. This bill, if passed, would try to take a load off of those caseworkers. On Tuesday, the House of Representatives unanimously approved the bill. It now goes to the Senate to see if it'll be assigned a committee.

Often Child Services' caseworkers are stressed, overworked and just plain burned out.

"They have a very tough job. What we're trying to do is give them the tools to make them successful," said Rep. Greg Steuerwald (R-Avon).

Steuerwald filed the bill to lower the number of Child Services cases a family case manager can have at a time.

After a 2018 Child Services audit and testimony, lawmakers decided 12 cases at a time is enough. That's down from the 17 cases now.

"It's much more manageable," Steuerwald said. "They're able to do their job better. They're not overworked, they're not overstressed. We tried to find the right spot."

The bill makes another change.

Now, if Child Services gets a report that a child is in danger of being seriously hurt, Steuerwald said the agency has an hour to start an on-site assessment. The bill bumps that up to two hours.

"The discussion was: What's a reasonable time upon which a caseworker can be notified?" Steuerwald said. "Sometimes in the middle of the night and be able to actually get up and physically get to the scene."

The bill also would let foster care children keep getting collaborative services until they're 21.

Though Rep. Phil GiaQuinta (D-Fort Wayne) approves of the bill, he said it needs more "oomph."

"It lacks the teeth we believe it should have," GiaQuinta said. "That was the amendment that Rep. (Ryan) Hatfield tried to put in the bill last Friday, which we believe would have required the caseworkers needed if you went over the limit."

Indiana could soon allow use of digital driver's licenses

Indiana could soon enter the era of digital driver's licenses. One state lawmaker wants to make it a possibility.

Here's how it would work: You get pulled over by a police officer but you forgot your wallet. If state Sen. Eddie Melton's (D-Gary) bill passes, you could have a digital copy of your driver's license on your phone.

The bill would allow the Bureau of Motor Vehicles to put your state identification, learner's permit or driver's license onto an app on your phone if you ask them. Melton said a mobile driver's license would be a convenience for Hoosiers.

"This is not to replace our existing driver's license," Melton said. "This is a supplement to allow that information to be on an application."

Luke Turgeon of Indianapolis likes the idea. "A lot of people contain all the cards they need in their phone already. I think it's a smart move, to move towards that."

Several states including Louisiana either use digital licenses, have pilot programs or are considering it.

Hannah Johnson of Indianapolis does not like the idea. "I don't think I'd go for that ... I don't know, I like paper copies a lot."

According to the bill, a police officer or court would be unable to take your phone, keep it as evidence or download information without your permission.

Melton said he wants to work with the BMV and police to make sure the app on your phone is protected.

"It's also going to make sure that our law enforcement officers don't have to personally handle the device. They can simply look at the license to verify it, by the individual touching the screen," Melton said. "The seal, or crest, that indicates this is a valid identification from the state of Indiana will appear."

Still some people have security concerns about the idea.

"I feel like it would be easy to steal someone's identity, like if they steal your phone," Johnson said.

Melton will know the status of his bill in the coming days.

Francis Edward "Frank" Stevenson

August 7, 1924 – January 21, 2019



Francis Edward "Frank" Stevenson, 94, passed away Friday, January 21, 2019. He was born to Maude Marie (Flanders) Stevenson and Alvin Guy Stevenson in Indianapolis on Aug. 7, 1924. He moved to Noblesville when he was a junior in High School and that is where he met the love of his life, Martha Kaiser. They were married on August 31, 1944. She was the love of his life, his sweetie, his "Skip," and they were married for 74 years.

Frank served aboard the USS South Carolina while in the Navy in WWII. He was in the South China Sea and was part of the fighting in Buckner Bay.



Frank received a Bachelor of Science degree from Iowa State University. He then taught at Iowa State while he worked on a Master's degree. Later he received his Doctor of Jurisprudence from Indiana University School of Law. Frank started his career as an engineer and a Human Resources Manager at the Firestone plant in Noblesville and Decatur Illinois. At mid-life, he began practicing law in Noblesville and had an office on the south side of the square for 38 years.

Frank was a true visionary and as Hamilton County began to grow from a rural to an urban community, Frank began to recognize the growing need for non-governmental social service organizations. Through his experience in personnel work and later as an attorney, Frank became aware of the acute need for public mental health facilities in Hamilton County and was influential in the establishment of Tri-County Mental Health Services.

Frank was appointed the first public defender in Hamilton County, and as a result of his involvement with juveniles who were in trouble with the law, Frank was instrumental in establishing the Hamilton Centers Youth Service Bureau, serving on the initial Board of Directors for six years.

Frank was Hamilton County Chairman of the United Way and served on the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan United Way. He was a board member of the Metropolitan Community Service Council for over 15 years and was instrumental in establishing a service center in Hamilton County. He served on the steering committee and the initial board of directors of the Legacy Fund. He served for six years on the Hamilton County Chapter of American Red Cross and participated in the acquisition of the Chapter House in Noblesville. Frank served as a Boy Scout Leader for several years both as a troop leader and as an Explorer post leader.

Frank served as an Elder, Deacon and Sunday School teacher at First Presbyterian Church of Noblesville and he also served on Presbytery and Synod committees of the Presbyterian church. He was deeply involved in seeing that the Pipe Organ at the Noblesville First Presbyterian Church was rebuilt and refurbished to give many more years of service.

Frank was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Noblesville and was a member of the Noblesville Kiwanis Club for 60 years, serving on various committees and as president.

Frank was very talented musically. He played in the Indianapolis Boy Scout Band as a youth. Later in life, he enjoyed playing with the Jazz Gents, The Sentimentals and at the Atlanta Music Hall.

In his "senior years," Frank bought farmland in Benton County. He set aside part of the land and created "Stevenshire," a family retreat mecca. It involved restoring three Indiana ecosystems, a prairie, a savanna and a wetland, building cabins, a dining hall and a four-acre pond. His idea was to create a space where multiple generations could come to enjoy nature and each other.

Frank is survived by his wife, Martha; his daughter, Ann; and son, Scott. He is also survived by three grandsons, Christopher and Daniel Smalley and Casey Stevenson; as well as three great-grandchildren, Owen, Erica and Quinn Smalley. He is also survived by his brother, Richard Stevenson. He was predeceased by his parents; and his brother, Don Stevenson.

Frank's Celebration of Life Service will take place at 4 p.m. on Monday, January 28, 2019 at First Presbyterian Church of Noblesville, 1207 Conner St., Noblesville, with visitation from 2 p.m. to the time of service. Millers roll past Pendleton Heights

NOBLESVILLE - The Noblesville girls basketball team has been dealing with injuries and illness this season, but the Millers are doing the best with what they have.

In fact, Noblesville had one of the better wins of its season Wednesday at The Mill. The Millers rode a near-record shooting performance from senior Mallory Johnson and balanced scoring and offense from the entire team to a 75-61 win over Pendleton Heights. Noblesville shot 52 percent from the field and made 11 3-pointers as a team.

"We just played really well tonight," said Millers coach Donna Buckley. "We shot well."

Buckley said her team played "really good basketball" on the offensive side, and did what it needed to do defensively, which was impressive considering Noblesville only had seven players available. The Millers suffered another loss when Abby Haley became unavailable this week due to illness.

But, Noblesville persevered, with Johnson playing a huge role. She scored 30 points for the Millers, and made seven 3-pointers, just one away from Rachel Shipman's record.

"She shot the ball extremely well tonight," said Buckley.

"There's always things to improve on," said Johnson. "I think I could've done a better job just taking care of the ball. But I shot pretty well. I was one 3 away from tying the record."

Noblesville led 17-11 after the first quarter, with Johnson scoring eight points and fellow senior Maddie Knight adding five. The Arabians got as close as 27-22 in the second period before the Millers went on a 9-1 run to end the half. Johnson hit two more 3s; her second 3 put Noblesville up 36-23 at the break.

The run continued in the second half. Emily Wood helped out with six points, then Sarah Etchison got hot, making two 3-pointers in the third quarter. Both would finish the game with 11 points.

"Sarah is just that kid, she's capable of putting up big numbers," said Buckley. "She's a great shooter and did a nice job tonight. And our kids did a great job of finding her, too. Woody has really come

along this year. She's playing really well, giving us that post presence offensively."

The Arabians tried to make a comeback in the second half after getting down by as much as 57-34 late in the third quarter, but Buckley credited her team with being able to fend off the Arabians.

"Twelve is as close as they got," said Buckley. "Mallory hit a big 3, Maddie made

a big play. Those kids just made plays that, again, when you're trying to come back, those daggers just make it harder and harder to come back."

Knight helped out with two baskets, one that ended the third quarter and another to start the fourth. Pendleton got to within 12

Pacers beat Toronto, Oladipo out for season with knee injury

The Pacers got a big win on Wednesday, but it wasn't without a big loss.

Indiana successfully defended home-court against the Raptors, winning 110-106 at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, but they also lost All-Star Victor Oladipo to a serious right knee injury late in the second quarter, when he left the court on a stretcher.

"It's tough watching our best player go down," said Darren Collison after the game. "Not just because he's our best player, but because he's one of the best people to be around and just his personality, how positive he is, you just hate to see that happen to him."

Without Oladipo, the Pacers still had a game to take care of against one of the best teams in the Eastern Conference, and it didn't come easy.

After trailing by double digits for much of the game, the Raptors (36-14) charged back in in the fourth quarter, making it a 98-97 Pacers advantage when Serge Ibaka — who finished with 23 points and 11 rebounds — connected on a pull-up jumper with 4:20 remaining.

But the Pacers (32-15) had a quick answer, as Thaddeus Young converted on an and-1 to send the home crowd into hysterics.

With under two minutes to play, Collison ran the pick-and-roll and delivered a

jumper from the elbow, putting Indiana up 103-99.

Following a Raptors miss, Collison attempted to work his magic again, but his jumper came up short and was rebounded by the Raptors, who quickly signaled for timeout with 1:11 left in the game.

Out of the stoppage, the Raptors got a quick bucket from Ibaka, bringing it back to a one-possession game.

But with the ball back in the hands of the Pacers, Myles Turner — who notched a double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds — baited Pascal Siakam into a foul and made both free throws, putting Indiana back ahead 105-101 with 48.1 seconds left.

The Pacers successfully forced a Raptors miss, but the rebound ended up in the hands of sharpshooter Danny Green, who canned a 3-pointer to make it a one-point game with 31.6 seconds remaining.

After a Pacers timeout, the Pacers went right back to Thad Young, who spun around the smaller Kyle Lowry and dropped in a floater to push Indiana's lead back up to three with 10.8 second remaining. The bucket was the final mark on one of Young's finest games of the season, a 23-point, 15-rebound performance to lead the Pacers in the emotional win.

"What I wanted to do is just go out there and continue to impose my will on the game," said Young at his locker. "Try to impact the game in several different ways.

Whether it's rebounding, scoring, making the extra pass, or playing defense on certain guys."

The Raptors were able to get a shot for Green in the corner off the inbounds play, but his attempt rimmed out and touched the top of the backboard, giving possession back to Indiana where the Pacers were able to close out the game at the free throw line, wrapping up the four-point victory.

The Pacers began the game with a dominant defensive performance in the opening quarter, holding the visiting Raptors to just 16 points over the first 12 minutes.

In the wake of the frightening moment, the Pacers were still able to close the half strong, getting a late three from Cory Joseph to grab a 59-47 advantage.

The Pacers started off the second half slowly, going without a field goal for the first 2:20 of the third quarter as Toronto began to close the gap. With 9:03 left, Nate McMillan called for timeout when a Fred VanFleet three capped what had been a 10-3 Raptors run to start the quarter.

Following McMillan's timeout, the Pacers broke out of their brief slump, responding with a rollicking 12-2 run to reassert control over the game.

The Pacers maintained their lead for the entire quarter, but Raptors guard Norman Powell brought the score to single digits with a late layup to make it an 84-75 Pacers lead entering the fourth quarter.

The Raptors started the final quarter hot, striking the lead down to just three when Powell made a 3-pointer with 7:09 remaining in the game.

Moments later, it was Ibaka doing the scoring, as a jumper from the forward closed the gap to just one point, setting up the thrilling finish at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

"(Toronto) is a good team, we struggled against them all season long," Pacers head coach Nate McMillan said after the win. "And I thought our guys tonight really came together."
