Noblesville school shooter's parents deny responsibility

The parents of a 13-year-old boy who opened fire in a Noblesville West Middle School classroom say they could not foresee their son's actions and deny any responsibility for them.

They boy's parents, Kevin and Sarah Moore, responded to a lawsuit filed in Hamilton County Superior Court 1, brought by the parents of Ella Whistler, seeking damages for her injuries suffered in the May 25

According to a report by news gathering partner WISH-TV, the shooter's parents said they are not personally responsible for the girl's injuries and that their son and Noblesville Schools may both bear some responsibility. They also say that if the court orders them to pay any damages, they should be offset by the amount the Whistlers have already received from other sources such as insurance and donations.

The mayor's appointees are Bryan Babb and Tiffany Sharpley. However, Ms. Sharpley told commission members at the last meeting she plans to move from Fishers and will need to leave





A look at Saturday's wrestling regionals

Saturday will be Step 2 of the Indiana high school wrestling world's road to state, as the regional tournament takes place that

Hamilton County wrestlers will be split among two regionals. Qualifiers out of the Frankfort sectional head west to North Montgomery, to take on qualifiers out of the Crawfordsville sectional. Meanwhile, the Elwood qualifiers participate in the Pendleton Heights regional, with qualifiers from the Arsenal Tech sectional also competing.

Each weight division has eight wrestlers, and the top four advance to the New Castle semi-state - one win and you're in.

Carmel will have the most athletes at the regional, as the Greyhounds advanced all 14 out of Frankfort to North Montgomery. Fishers and Westfield both qualified 10 to the regional, with Hamilton Southeastern advancing nine and Sheridan one. Here's a school-by-school look at each wrestler and his first-round opponent. 

Indiana (32-18) dropped its third straight game on Wednesday night, falling to the Wizards (22-29) in Washington on the first stop of a four-game road trip, 107-89.
