Carmel Christkindlmarkt celebrates huge second season

Preliminary numbers released Thursday show the Carmel Christkindlmarkt enjoyed another successful run during its second annual season of offering one of the biggest and best German-themed holiday markets in the United States. The 26-day run drew a record

328,000 people, up from an estimated 150,000 in 2017, and total market sales revenue of \$2,233,652, up from \$1,389,000 in 2017.

In 2018, the Market attracted visitors from 45 states and 84 of Indiana's 92 counties. CEO and Market Master Maria Murphy attributed the growth to off-season

moves made to expand the market grounds, the addition of more huts, more food and beverage options and a greater diversity of the offerings made for shoppers and consumers.

"The Christkindlmarkt team is thrilled with the re-

sults of the 2018 market. Our number one goal was to hear and respond to the feedback of our guests in 2017," said Murphy. "I believe that we did so and feedback from our 2018 guests confirms this. We look forward to improving the market every year."

Sheriff's Office: Owners did not break the law by keeping dogs outside

There's been outrage throughout Hamilton County and central Indiana about a video that has been making the rounds: A group of dogs outside in the severe cold.

On Wednesday, the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office said the owners did not break the law in any way.

Videos from Arcadia flooded social media and the Sheriff's Office. They showed dogs at Raebark

German Shepherd Dog Kennel. Wind chill temperatures were well below zero, and the dogs sitting and running outside.

"You instantly are heartbroken for these animals," said Jordan Hawk, who saw the video and pictures and started a petition calling for action.

Sheriff's Capt. Mark Bowen said the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office checked on the dogs.

"They have igloo kennels. Their water is warm

HSE school board approves solar project for three school buildings

After peppering with questions, the Hamilton Southeastern (HSE) school board has cleared the way to install solar panels in three school buildings this year. Work will begin as early as April,

with full installation expected this summer.

The three buildings that will use the solar system are Sand Creek Elementary, Sand Creek Intermediate and the HIJ (Hamilton Southeastern Intermediate and Junior High).

Bob Rice, Energy Management Director for HSE Schools, told board members the savings in electrici-

"Our market is becoming an annual tradition and a destination holiday event for families from all of the country," said Brainard. "Amenities such as this are a key reason why Carmel is on the map when it comes to identifying the best places to live, work and raise a family in the U.S."

There were a number of new features this season, including the Gluhwein Pyramid, Kinderecke children's activity center, a German-style grill hut and special fire-pit tables in an area where most of the food was sold.

"Our nonprofit Christkindlmarkt board will continue to work with Maria to make more changes for 2019 to enhance the visitor experience and help our dedicated local vendors have successful holiday sales," said Dan McFeely, President of the Board. "We heard many pos-

itive comments this year, not only from tourists and local residents, but also our local business community, which also benefitted from the tens of thousands of visitors that came to Carmel."

A complete market report will be presented to the Carmel City Council after the close of the fiscal year in April. But for now, here are some numbers of interest:

- Ice skating – 19,809 skaters during the Market (16,709 last year).
- Sponsorships – \$24,000 in corporate sponsorships (\$5,000 last year).
- Local business involvement

– 29 central Indiana businesses (12 last year); 15 of those were Carmel businesses; and seven were new businesses launched to participate in the Market.

- Gluhwein – 30,000 cups of Gluhwein were sold.
- Hot chocolate – 26,000 cups
- Pretzels – 11,500 sold
- Beer and Gluhbier (including SunKing's 'Kringelbock') – 5,400 sold
- Raclette cheese sandwiches – 10,000 sold.

"NPR?" I scoffed. "You mean 'old man radio'?"

See, I still thought of myself back then as somewhat cool. Longer road trips meant listening to my favorite tunes and often blasting them loudly. They gave me the chance to listen to MY music vs. the kid-friendly stuff we had to listen to when the boys were in the car.

I only listened to NPR in bits and pieces and it sounded dreadfully boring. I don't like politics and hearing a bunch of people debating them turned me off.

Fast forward to the fall of 2017. My job with Link Observatory Space Science Institute, which is as awesome as it sounds, required me to travel more around Central Indiana to talk to different schools. This of course meant longer drives.

One day I was tired of hearing the same old songs and did some scanning. I landed on NPR and listened to a delightful book review. Books! I like books! I love discovering, reading, listening to and hearing about them.

Soon I realized I had been tuned in to NPR for over an hour. I enjoyed "1A" with its engaging debates. I was excited to be on the road around noon to discover Terry Gross and her "Fresh Air" interviews.

I didn't change the station much in the weeks afterward and discovered other great programs. I became a fan of "No Limits" hosted by John Krull, director of Franklin College's Pulliam School of Journalism, and its focus on news stories of the week and topics that hit home with Central Indiana residents.

Soon I started tuning in during shorter trips and was delighted to discover "Wait Wait ... Don't Tell Me" on the weekend, a show that left me in stitches thanks to the hosts quizzing panelists and contestants in humorous ways about the week's news.

Months later, I realized that NPR was actually pretty ... cool. I loved being informed about what was going on in Central Indiana and beyond. My time on the road often flew by thanks to this station. We even became members of WFYI, the local station that brings NPR to Central Indiana.

I finally admitted to John that NPR wasn't just for old men. To this day he still laughs when I ask him if he's heard a certain segment on WFYI earlier.

John was right – NPR is quite interesting and you learn a lot. I encourage you to give it a chance ... no matter your age or "coolness" level!

ty means the project will pay for itself in 11 years. The solar project will be financed through a four-year bond issue that will not trigger a tax increase, per HSE Chief Financial Officer Mike Reuter.

The \$2.8 million con-

tract was awarded to the private firm AMERESCO, which has done similar projects for schools on the east and west coast, and solar projects for local governments in Indiana.

Rice told the board this

project will produce more than cost savings over time, students will be able to learn about solar energy as part of the school curriculum. He also touted the reduction in the carbon footprint, as well as awareness among

students of jobs in the solar industry.

The board vote to approve the project was unanimous.

and not frozen. They have adequate food and shelter," he said.

A man at the business said he has been out there throughout the day to check the dogs. Bowen, who is Hamilton County's former sheriff, confirmed they did nothing illegal.

Hawk said it was reassuring to know authorities

checked on the dogs. She said there needs to be clear focus on what's next.

"If we're going to come together for some good cause, it should be not to beat her down and not to say she needs to close her doors and all of this, but we need to address Indiana itself and say, 'Hey, this is our concern,'" Hawk said.

She said her concern is the state code that she said doesn't go far enough to protect animals.

Bowen said owners have to provide a shelter.

"I don't think it specifically defines size, shape or anything of that nature, just requires they have shelter," he said when asked about specifics of state law.

Bowen said under Indiana's current law, it's not defined when it's too hot or cold for animals to be out. Hawk said other states have stricter laws.

Hawk created a change.org petition to get lawmakers talking about whether the law needs to change. The petition had nearly 3,000 signatures by Wednesday night.

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

U.S. Attorney Josh Min- kler announced that a former Carmel swim coach, John Goelz, has been sentenced to 16 years and eight months in federal prison for sexually exploiting one of the girls he coached.

Goelz coached at the Carmel Swim Club and as a volunteer assistant coach for Carmel High School swim team.

Federal Prosecutors say Goelz had a relationship with the girl that lasted more than nine months through last June. Prosecutors have said they believe Goelz had sex with the girl at parks, at his home and at an Anderson hotel where he shot video of them having sex. Her age hasn't been disclosed.

Goelz also must also serve 10 years of supervised release following his sentence.

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Promoting a culture of healthy relationships

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly 1.5 million teens experience physical violence at the hands of a dating partner each year. This does not include millions of others who are experiencing verbal/emotional, sexual, financial, spiritual or technological abuse in a relationship.

Central Indiana is no exception. Abuse knows no limits and does not care about your race, religion, income, gender, sexual orientation, abilities, level of education or where you live. While we like to think that our teens are surrounded by safety and are unaware of potential harm, the reality is that they are saddled with pressure and expectations to fit into the mold of what they think others want them to be. Our teens believe that having a dating partner set guidelines of what they can wear means that they care; that rules about who they can be friends with means that they are

looking out for their partner; that being hit by their partner means they made a mistake and need to do better next time.

We are living in the time of social media where #relationshipgoals encourages teens to ignore the downsides of a current relationship and focus on their image and what other people can see. Teens see representations of relationships in the shows and movies they watch, the music they hear, and the books and magazines they read. Often, these depictions are not of healthy interactions between dating partners.

Knowing this, it is our responsibility as adults to promote a culture where we encourage conversation about relationships, provide support without judgement to teens who are struggling, and challenge our own misconceptions and messages we share to ensure we are modeling safe, stable and nurturing relationships ourselves.

Throughout February, Prevail will have daily social media posts and we encourage everyone to pick a day to wear orange, take a picture and post it online using the hashtag #GoOrangePrevail.

I ask you to join Prevail in recognition of Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month (TDVAM). This February, look for our TDVAM toolkit (available on Prevail's website at [this link](#)), social media posts and follow-ups to this article. Each of us has the opportunity to encourage and empower teens to create healthy connections with others. Please consider how you can support Prevail's mission of eliminating violence from our community by promoting healthy relationships.

Noblesville mayoral hopefuls to take part in "Candidate Conversations"

The Noblesville Chamber of Commerce and the League of Women Voters of Hamilton County are teaming up to present a three-part series of "Candidate Conversations" featuring Noblesville mayoral candidates Vince Baker, Mike Corbett, Chris Jensen and Julia Kozicki prior to the primary election on May 7. These informal forums will be held from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Feb. 11, March 11 and April 8 in the Noblesville High School auditorium.

According to Noblesville Chamber of Commerce President and CEO Bob DuBois, this is a unique opportunity for Noblesville residents to help shape the mayoral conversation.

"The Noblesville Chamber, in partnership with the League of Women, has created an online portal to accept ques-

tions," said DuBois. "Every question asked by our residents will be shared with the candidates."

Noblesville citizens can submit questions for the Candidate Conversations series via a form on noblesvillechamber.com. Questions will be carefully selected for the Candidate Conversations based on content and time restraints. However, all questions will be shared with the candidates privately.

Candidate Conversations will offer a unique format, with specific topics being addressed at each event. On Feb. 11, candidates will discuss issues that address Noblesville people and relationships, including issues of safety, health, housing and workforce development. On March 11, the theme is Noblesville places and things, which includes infrastructure, parks, dis-

tricts and destinations. Finally, on April 8, the three candidates will tackle the Noblesville economy and finances, including city budgets, capital improvement plans and economic development.

The overall goal is that Noblesville residents will leave the Candidate Conversations series feeling better acquainted with each of the candidates and their platforms so that voters can make a well-informed decision in May.

"The Noblesville Chamber and League of Women Voters want to provide citizens of Noblesville the opportunity to learn about each candidate's vision, leadership approach, public policy positions, and specific plans to advance our city," DuBois said.

The Railroad Place was then created, mostly through Bob's innovative promoting. They sold sewing machines, vacuum sweepers, washers, dryers, typewriters and fabric. The Railroad Place also serviced these products.

Bob had many varied interests such as Morgan horses, horse drawn carriages, artistic blacksmithing, acting, bicycling, volunteering with Indiana Transportation Museum and above all, DANCING. He started dancing after a trip to Vienna, Austria. He danced ballroom dancing at the Continental Dance Club at Indianapolis on Sunday nights for over 25 years. He was voted King (Queen) two times. He also participated in line dancing with the Desert Rose Dancers and at the Noblesville Street Dances.

Surviving him are two daughters, Linda Arbuckle, Fairfield, Calif.; and Sara (Craig) Carter, Noblesville; grandchildren, Charlotte Honciano of California and Trent Carter, Indianapolis; and nephews, Paul Webb of Oregon and Marc Webb of Michigan.

us establishing an inside presence. But I thought we shared the ball well tonight."

The Pacers' losing streak is now up to four after falling 107-100 to the Magic in Orlando.

This one came down to the final few minutes, as with 5:22 to go, the game was tied at 89. From there, the Magic went on a 7-0 run to lead 96-89 with 3:19 left.

Indiana ripped off five straight to get back within two, but Orlando responded with five straight of their own to lead 101-94 with 1:26 remaining, shutting the door on any comeback hopes.

"The effort was there," Pacers guard Cory Joseph said. "I think we just need to play a little smarter down the stretch. In that fourth quarter, they had 38 points which was the game there."

Orlando threw the first punch tonight, jumping out to an early 11-0 lead. Indiana responded quickly though, answering with its own 13-2 run to tie things at 13 with 5:39 to play in the opening quarter.

Orlando would retake the lead and end the quarter on a 7-2 run to lead 26-19 at the end of the first.

By the midway point of the second quarter, the Magic had grown its lead to 13, 41-28. Once again Indiana used a big run to get back in the game. The Pacers ended the quarter with an 11-2 spurt to trail by just three heading into locker room.

In the third, the Pacers took their first lead of the game. A Darren Collison three-point play early in the quarter put the Pacers ahead 55-53 with 9:56 left in the quarter.

Indiana grew its lead to eight, 65-57, with 5:57 to play in the third, but it was immediately followed by a 7-0 run from the home team to make the score 65-64, with 4:18 remaining. The Pacers led by four, 73-69, heading into the fourth quarter, but were not able to hold on to pick up the road win.

Myles Turner led the way for Indiana with a season-high 27 points. Bojan Bogdanovic finished with 21 points, and Darren Collison racked up 16 points and 10 assists to notch a double-double.

For Orlando, Terrence Ross scored 30 points off the bench, including five 3-pointers. D.J Augustin added 20 points, and Nikola Vucevic scored 17.
